Speaking of congressional investigations, there is another opportunity for some swift and thorough action in the matter of army food wastage, disclosed in the recent report of War Secretary Patterson's nine-man willian inspection committee.

The committee's report, a shocking one, attracted considerable atten-tion but little action. General Eisenhower sent out an order decreeing art-martial proceedings against any officer who permitted loss of ge of food through neglect, and demanding reports of any violaof of army food regulations. But beyond that there was little or no action. So far congress has likewise seemed indifferent.
