LYNN COUNTY TO ORGANIZE.

(From the Lubbock Avalanche).

The commissioners court on last Tuesday evening, Feb. 10th, acted on a petition containing 1-56 names, passed an order allowing Lynn county to organize. On the urgent request the court decided to reconsider the action in the matter, and Friday the opposition appeared in court and offered a protest. It was protested by a petition of 35 names.

The court heard argument by counsel both for and against organization during the whole of Friday morning. Friday evening was consumed in hearing evidence. After several witnesses had been allowed to testify, the court took a vote on the measure and by a majority vote, decided to let the original order stand.

Hence if the court is not enjoined by a writ of injunction it will organize on April 17th.
