## New Varieties of Winter Wheat Are Used in Panhandle

TOPEKA, Kans. -Superior new varieties of high-yielding winter wheat are adding millions of dollars to farm incomes in the hard winter wheat belt which stretches up the Plains states from Texas Panhandle to Western Nebraska, ac. cording to George A. Montgomery in an article in the current issue of a farm magazine. These new varieties are adding

extra bushels to the world grain supplies when food is badly needed, he declares. Foremost among these varieties are Pawnee, Comanche, Wichita

and Westar, all products of a new era in winter wheat production. That era had its start when Tenmarq variety was released by the Kansas station in 1932.

"To that time," writes Montgom-ry, "virtually all improved hard winter wheats were selections, most of them from Turkey. Tenmarq was cross of Marquis and a selection from Crimean wheat. Its breeder was Dr. John H. Parker. Parker's success in combining in it good traits from both parents shifted interest from selection to breeding as the more practical way to improve wheats.'

Tracing development of the superior new varieties from this point on, the article points out that success of these already developed has not slowed the effects of breeders of still newer types.

"They have seen new varieties that showed resistance rushed out of the picture because diseases to which they were susceptible increased rapidly when competition of other diseases was removed," Montgomery declares. "In less than 10 years, one spring wheat was eliminated from a large section of northern areas. The same thing has happened, though less spectacularly, to other wheats."

Among the tests a new variety must meet before it is released are these: milling and baking quality, disease resistance, good straw, winter hardiness and fly resistance.


