

Cutting Stripper Well Subsidies Saves \$2,500,000

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Economic Stabilizer John R. Steelman yesterday announced a reduction in stripper oil well subsidies which, he said, will save the government about \$2,500,000 a month.

Effective retroactively to Aug. 1, the plan calls for a reduction of subsidies in the various pools of 25 cents a barrel. This is the amount by which stripper well producers have benefited by price increases since crude petroleum was removed from price control.

"Reducing subsidy payments when producers benefit by price increases," Steelman said in a statement, "is in line with the general program of making removal of subsidies. Under this plan most operators of stripper wells will receive the same return per barrel and will have the same incentive to produce the oil which the country needs as they did under price control."

The reduction order was outlined in a directive to the reconstruction finance corporation, which handles the subsidies.

Steelman said that when oil was removed from price control, producers generally received increases of approximately 25 cents a barrel. Subsidies for most stripper production under price control had ranged from 20 to 35 cents above ceiling prices.

In view of the general 25 cents a barrel price rise, it added, subsidies will now be discontinued in pools where the premium payment was 25 cents or less.

Where premium payments were 35 cents under the old plan, the maximum now has been reduced to 19 cents.

Brushing Remains As Preventative In Care of Teeth

AUSTIN—The fact that dental decay is likely to occur in the mouth of the average person, despite proper home care given the teeth, does not lessen the importance of brushing the teeth and massaging the gums daily, nor does it minimize the need for a cleaning and inspection of the teeth twice a year by the family dentist, Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer, says that the lack of these measures gives added power to germs that attack the enamel of the teeth and gum tissues.

"If despite proper application of such procedures, decay is suspected or teeth are injured in any way, the thoughtful person will seek the dentist's office promptly for the necessary corrective work," Dr. Cox said.

"It is surprising though, even in these days of comparatively painless dentistry, that so many persons neglect to make good their dental defects, inevitable or otherwise, before they foolishly fear the discomfort they might experience in the dentist's chair," said the state health officer. "There are others who have lost a tooth or several teeth make no effort to obtain replacements. Apparently they believe they can get along without them. Reduce masticating power, the annoyance and sometimes actual discomfort of chewing hard substances on the exposed gums, and crooked teeth are some of the possible consequences of gaps in the teeth."

Dr. Cox advised those who are interested in experimenting with dental and bodily health possible, to give daily attention to their mouth and visit the dentist twice each year and promptly seek the dentist's services should decay or other suspicious conditions arise between the periodic visits.

"In short," Dr. Cox declared, "successful mouth hygiene means not only intelligent personal daily application of prophylaxis but complete and timely cooperation with the family dentist as well."

Texas Today

The eyes of the nation—not just the eyes of Texas—are upon an industry at Lufkin, Texas.

It's the Southland Paper Mills, Inc., and it makes newspaper (the paper newspapers are printed on) and Kraft board, used to make frozen food containers, milk containers, and other items.

The Southland paper mill started at a gamble, and it's paying off. During these days of acute paper shortages, it's a godsend to 40 newspaper publishers in Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas and Oklahoma. Thirty Texas papers obtain about half their necessary paper from Lufkin.

Enter the 11 get more, because the plant is doubling its capacity. Work on a new unit started in January, and will be completed late in 1947.

One reason for the national interest is the new process being used. Over the industry said southern pine couldn't make newspaper. Dr. Charles Herty of Savannah, Ga., proved it could. He developed a process that uses all pine, 80 percent mechanical pulp and 20 percent chemical pulp. Mixed together they make good, strong newspaper.

The Lufkin plant was built and operation in January, 1940. Its head E. L. Kurth Lufkin, president, R. W. Wooten is vice-president and W. L. McHale is mill manager.

The man who keeps the plant rolling 24 hours a day, three shifts, is Charles Carpenter, general superintendent. Young inventors and entrepreneurs: He was trained by Dr. Herty.

It's an all-Tex plant. Most of the employees, getting \$120,000 a month in salary, are Texans. A few skilled paper men had to be imported.

The timber is cut in East Texas, which has an inexhaustible supply. Water of about 60,000,000 gallons are used daily in iron deep wells nearby. Salt water comes from Monahan in West Texas; chlorine for bleaching from Corpus Christi; lime from Houston; fuel is natural gas from Texas and some from Louisiana.

They pay the former OPA ceiling of \$975 per cord of wood and a profit margin of revenue has been gained to East Texas. Selective cutting insures a steady supply of timber they just don't go in and level a forest.

Texas uses about 125,000 tons of newspaper a year. In 1946 figures, the plant produces about 50,000 tons a year today. Later, with a new plant it will be producing well over 100,000 tons annually.

The present daily capacity is groundwood 140 tons, sulphate pulp 200 tons, bleached sulphate pulp 55 tons, and newspaper 125 tons.

The process is so fast that a lumber mill can drive a three in the morning haul to the mill and then read his afternoon paper on paper made from his own tree.

The wood is debarked, ground and made into long rolls of paper in a matter of hours. A string of benders waits at one end of the mill ready to take the paper immediately to southeast plants.

NEW YORK—Today's daughters are being brought up in the practical school of home-making. They not only become familiar with sewing machines, vacuum cleaners and radio tubes, but they know how to fix, adjust and keep them in running condition. In a survey of 152 Stephens College, Columbia, Mo., it was found that 93 of these future housewives had actually used mechanical tools and most electrical devices in their parents' homes, and their attitude toward the job of running a home is far from helpless.

At the age of fifteen, all but three of the girls questioned had learned to cook and 49 were able to care for the furnace. Helplessness around the home is steadily being out-moded by good practical training in the homes and colleges, and the Stephens College girls' answers stress this.

The ideal in daughter's home incorporates all the appliances their parents had, plus such new electrical items as dishwashers, air conditioning and sun lamps. The extensive advertising of these new appliances today has introduced the modern way to a model home.

CIO-PAC Plans Public Relations Program

Dodgers Fall to Chic Cubs, 4-3; Bob Feller Handed 10th Defeat

Manager Eddie Dyer's knack of picking the right pinch hitter at the right time has moved the fast flying St. Louis Cardinals into a game and a half lead over the Brooklyn Dodgers in the sizzling National League pennant race.

The quiet spoken Texan put the finger on Rookie Walter Sessi last night and the young outfielder, who had connected for only one hit in 11 official times at bat, came through with a two-run ninth inning homer which gave the Redbirds a 3-2 victory over the New York Giants and a sweep of the day and night doubleheader at St. Louis.

Earlier in the day, the Cards had broken their first place deadlock with the Dodgers by outgunning the Giants 13-9 while the Dodgers were bowing to the Chicago Cubs 4-3.

Dusak's big bat provided the main punch in yesterday's first game, the rookie left fielder hammering a pair of homers to drive in four runs. Whitey Kurowski and Enos Slaughter also homered for the Cards.

Two Cubs runs in the last of the ninth proved the Dodgers' undoing, a few minutes after Pee Wee Reese's eighth inning triple had apparently won for Brooklyn. Trailing 3-2 in the ninth, the Bruins tied the score on Peanuts Lowery's single followed by Marty Fleckenstein's double. Brooklyn reliever hurler Hank Luke Appling followed the contest in the 7th when he passed Bob Scheffing and Lou Stringer stung him for a payoff double that scored Rickert with the winning run.

The New York Yankees handed 22-game winner Bob Feller his 10th defeat when Ernie Bonham shut out the Cleveland Indians 4-0. Feller struck out only four batters in the seven innings he worked to raise his season's total to 284.

Orval Grove and the Chicago White Sox shaded Bobo Newsom and the Senators in Philadelphia 2-1 in 12 innings. Hanes Luke Appling followed Thurman Tucker's triple with a long fly.

With Denny Galehouse pitching two-hit ball, the St. Louis Browns shut out the Athletics in an after dark game at Philadelphia 7-0 to even the season series at 10 games apiece.

Cincinnati and the Braves divided a doubleheader. Johnny Sain reeling his 15th victory in the 8-4 opening Boston success and Ewell Blackwell registering his fifth shut-out in the Reds' 2-0 victory in the nightcap.

Detroit finally beat the Boston Red Sox, downing the American League leaders 7-2 with the help of homers by Hank Greenberg (No. 28) and Roy Hallenbeck (No. 10).

Oscar Judge limited the Pirates to four hits and drove in two runs with a double as the Philadelphia Phils shoved Pittsburgh deeper into the National league cellar with a 4-1 trounce.

BOSTON—(AP)—The Boston National league baseball club today announced the purchase of approximately 90 percent of the stock of the Milwaukee Brewers of the American association and reported the Boston club would take title at the conclusion of the current season.

The Braves' statement said that the Boston club's president, Louis R. Perini, had bought for the Braves the controlling stock in the Milwaukee club held by Oscar Salenger.

"So far as the transfer of players, through sale or trade is concerned," the Braves added, "the Boston National league club, as of this morning will handle the entire situation."

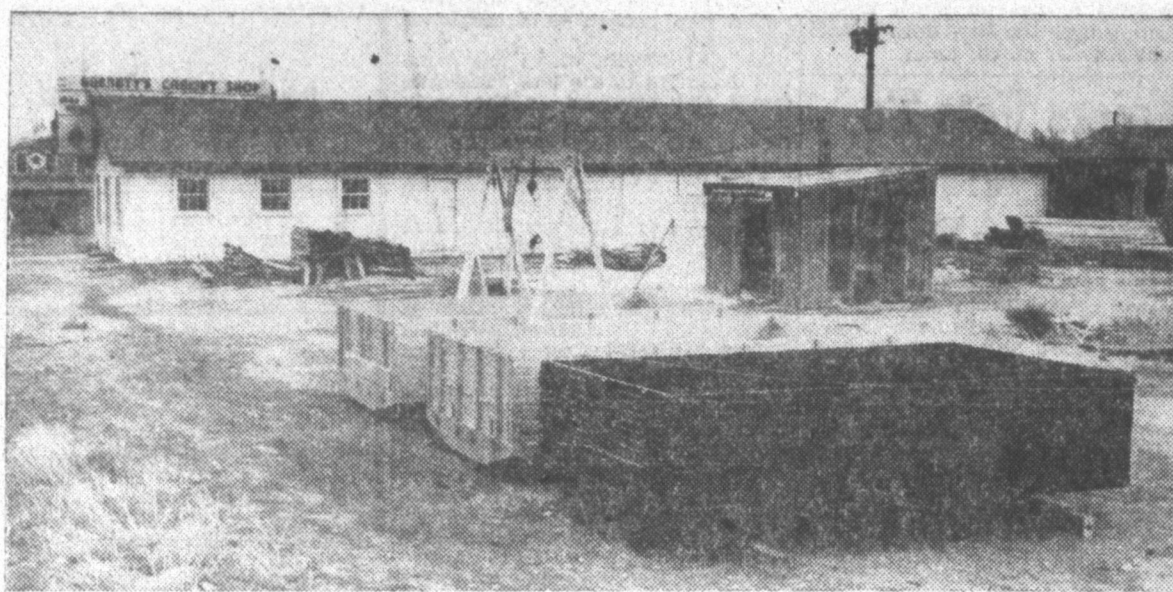

AUSTIN, (AP)—Consumer buying in Texas is still increasing, the University of Texas bureau of business research has reported.
Statistician John R. Stockton reported that July business activity in Texas reached its peak so far in 1946 with an index of 189.3.
This was 88.3 percent above the prewar level and 4.6 percent above June.
Factors and trends noted by Dr.

Stockton for the month of July, included:
Bank deposits were 6.8 percent higher than in June.
Miscellaneous freight car loadings declined 5.1 percent from June.
Department and apparel store sales are now nearly three and a half times the prewar volume.
The statistician reported "considerable evidence that inventories of finished consumer goods are showing increases."

FFA Awards To Be Given Again

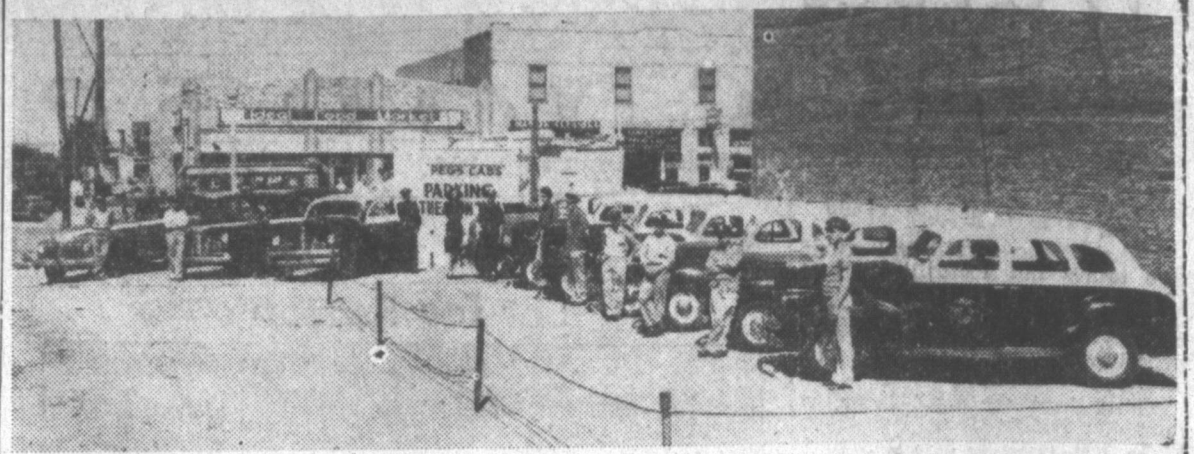

Aircraft Industry on Way Back to Normal

WASHINGTON — The aircraft industry has delivered an estimated 17,385 airplanes in the first year since V-J Day, when an \$18 billion-a-year business collapsed under a shower of contract cancellation telegrams, Aviation News declares.
"The day following the surrender of Japan, the AAF sent 9,988 termination notices to 2,700 contractors, cancelling contracts worth \$7,000,000,000. Last week there remained unsettled only 155 cases involving \$1,960,000,000, and half of this was with one company.
"Settlement of claims arising out of the cancellation at the close of World War I of contracts amounting to about \$5,000,000,000 took several years and much litigation. This time, the job was practically accomplished in one year."



Leaves From a Correspondent's Life Notebook

GRONINGEN, Holland (AP) — Playing of national anthems in honor of the 20 chess masters from 13 countries competing in a four-week tournament here is causing some confusion and bringing not a few mixed memories to the contenders.

Most of the participants in the tournament, which ends Sept. 7, can claim at least two nationalities, and a jig-saw puzzle could not be more fascinating than trying to sort out the international hodge-podge.

At one of the official dinners, the Belgian anthem was played for Irish-born Alberic O'Kelly De Galway, and the Polish anthem for Michiel Najdorf, a resident of Argentina for eight years, who stood in rapt attention when the Argentine national song was sung for Carlos Guindard of Buenos Aires.

But the Polish lullie undoubtedly sounded familiar to Russian-born Dr. Savielly Tartakover, a former Polish citizen, who now is French. The orchestra played the Marseilles for him and for Russian-born Dr. Ossip Bernstein, but both were more than casually acquainted with the Russian anthem played for the five Soviet representatives.

The Hungarian national song was for Laszlo Szabo, but indirectly, too, for the American Herman Steiner of Los Angeles. But Steiner, if his memories went back far enough, also probably was moved by the Czech anthem played for Cenek Kottbauer, for he came originally from a region alternately belonging to Hungary and Czechoslovakia. The Russian Szal, Fiehr also was once a Czech.

The American champion Arnold S. Denker, although born of German parents, could listen to the Star Spangled Banner with undivided allegiance, as could 21-year-old Abe Yanovsky to the Canadian anthem since he was only four months old when his parents left their home in Polish territory which now is Russian.
