#### U. S. Official On Way to See **Marshal Tito**

-A-U. S. Ambassador Richard C. Patterson set out by plane for Marshal Tito's headquarters near the Austrian border today to deliver the United States ultimatum demanding release of American fliers within 48

A well-informed military source said Yugoslav attacks on two unarmed American transports, which gave rise to the stiff state department demand, apparently were made in Russian-manufactured Stormovik fighter planes.

Tito summoned his No. 1 foreign relations expert, Gen. Vladimir Velebit, to be present at the meeting at Bled. With Velebit, Yugoslavia's deputy foreign minister, went Mirko Bruner, a foreign office secretary. Velebit attended the San Francisco conference and is regarded as the Yugoslav chieftain's top personal advisor on foreign af-

tion representatives, First Lt. Charles O. Provow and Private George Demasi, went in Patterson's

Provow and Demasi were given permission to search the area near Bled for the bodies of three American air force personnel believed to have been killed Monday when a C-47 transport was shot down in The wreckage was reported found about two miles inside Yugoslavia from the Austrian border.

Although the wholesale price of pine windows has increased 50.3 percent since 1938, the price of the win-dow glass used to plaze them has scarcely changed at all. This is despite in increase of 48 percent in glass industry wage costs since 1938. Actually, there has been a 14.1 per-cent decline in window glass prices ince 1930 as contrasted with a 40 percent increase in building material prices generally.

In reporting recently that record production of flat glass would "undoubtedly meet all the foreseeable requirements" of the construction field for the remainder of the year, one industry spokesman emphasized the "urgent need for price relief," adding that, "it will be difficult to maintain present production levels without some correction in present price discrepancies.'

Another encouraging price situation from the consumer's point of view exists in aluminum. While in 1939 building construction ranked fifth among aluminum-consuming industries, taking only about one-twelfth of the mation's output as compared with transportation which consumed nearly a third, building contruction today heads the list. The price of aluminum has declin-

ed 25 percent from 20 cents a pound in 1939 to 15 cents a pound today. 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AUSTIN. — Because of the fact that a venereal disease is no reof persons, people of every class and color, rich and poor, edu-cated or ignorant are numbered among the victims, asserts Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer.

"Venereal diseases are among the most vital health problems in the State of Texas today," Dr. Cox said. "The amount of suffering, economic loss, insanity and even death from venereal diseases cannot be accurately estimated but would reach a shocking figure if disclosed."

The state health officer pointed out that self-diagnosis and selftreatment are extremely dangerous and advised consulting a physician for determining definitely whether or not a veneral disease

"Only a reputable physician can properly diagnose such a disease, The presence of gonorrhea is not and the diagnosis of syphilis requires more than a blood examination," declared Dr. Cox. "Both syphilis and gonorrhea are almost 100 per cent curable if discovered and treated in their very earliest sta-ges. Thousands of deaths annually could be prevented," Dr. Cox said, "if sufficient attention were







And anyone who knows the meaning of the word psychiatry, and who has looked seriously at the suspicion, suffering, selfishness and indifference which hang like a cloud over that world, must sometimes suspect that the diagnosis and prescription are not greatly exaggerated.







