





AUSTIN—(P)—Increased storage of Texas crude oil indicates that allowables for September will have to be reduced by 100,000 to 125,000 barrels daily, Ernest O. Thompson, railroad commission member, said The commission holds its monthly

proration hearing tomorrow. "A study of storage figures on oil of Texas origins would indicate that waste prevention will require a reduction in Texas oil production in the nature of 100 thousand to 125 thousands barrels per day," Thomp-

He said total Texas production as of the latest week reported Aug. 3, was 2,196,350 barrels. This he de-clared is approximately 100 thousand to 125,000 barrels in excess of daily demand as proven by the Texas bureau of mines latest storage

He said the mines latest figures show the Gulf Coast field went to storage for the week ending Aug. 3 with 910,000 barrels.

Thompson was highly pleased with the 8.4 pounds increase in bottomhole pressure reported for July in the East Texas field. That field had accumulated 48,000 additional barrels in storage for the







Answer: According to the agreements made in Moscow and more recently in Paris, the conference will review all proposed peace treaties made by the Big Four., and make recommendations on these treaties which shall be taken into account by the Big Four.

Question: Does an enemy country need to ratify the peace treaty made for it before it comes into

Answer: Each nation suing for peace has no choice but to accept the treaty drawn up for it and presented by the Big Four.

Question: Has any progress been made on administering Germany as an economic unit?

Answer: The British government has accepted the U.S. proposal zones of occupation. Joint administration for trade, agriculture, industry, and finance will be set up. The U.S. proposal has thus far been rejected by Russia and France concerning their zones.

Question: Has the U.S. announced its policy on the subject of trusteeship concerning bases in the Pa-

Answer: No. the U. N. Charter provides for a trusteeship system for strategic bases, but the U.S. has not declared its readiness to place under this trusteeship system any bases it may occupy.
