sage sent at 9:48 a. m. (EST) said three persons, believed to be Newfoundland civilians, were at the scene and an army searching party was at the foot of the hill into which the plane crashed. The message said the searching

party had one-half mile to go. The plane crashed 100 feet from the top of the hill, which is covered with rocks and scrub trees. The message, sent from a coast guard plane at the scene, said the irliner appeared to have exploded fter the crash and that only a tiny fragment of the ship was visible.

There was a heavy rain at the time. It was the second plane tragedy in the Newfoundland wilds in two veeks. On Sept. 18 a Belgian Sabena airliner crashed near Gander, killing 27 of the 44 aboard. Stephenville is on the West coast

WASHINGTON—(P) — Treasury figures today showed the government finished the first quarter of the current fiscal year (July 1-Sept. 30) with a \$119,300,000 surplus

of receipts over expenditures. This is the first time in years the government has got through the first quarter in the black. The corresponding period of last year, covering the last two months of war and early days of peace, saw the government \$11,900,000,000 in the

For September of this year alone, government income exceeded spending by \$1,700,000,000, more than wiping out the deficits run up in July and August.

President Truman, foreseeisg deficit operations in later quarters, has predicted the government will be in the red by \$1,900,000,000 on current operations when the fiscal year closes next June 30.

The federal debt as of Sept. 30 was reported at \$265,768,000,000 but is scheduled for a reduction approaching \$2,000,000,000 in early October through cash redemptions of securities out of an idle cash balance that exceeded \$10,171,000,000 at the end of September.

Convicted High Criminals Won't Set Any Record; 231 Others Convicted

WASHINGTON—(P) — Hanging Goering and the other top nazis for war crimes won't set any record, in numbers

NEW YORK—A nationwide series of industrial plants directed and manned entirely by disabled veterans is being proposed to key executives as the first rehabilitation program based on the wishes of casualties themselves.



The skipper and some guests were sleeping peacefully on board some unexplained circumstance, the boat came loose from her moorings. Nobody waked for a long time. The boat drifted with the current, which was not fast at first but gradually gained speed as it neared the falls.

Start Investigation The keel was grinding on the odulated rock bottom before the boat's unsteady motion roused any of the sleepers. Then they all got active at once. Most of them had no idea what to do first Some actually began accusing one another and trying to fix the blame for loosing the anchor-this, with the thundering cataract in plain seconds away.

The skipper was a man of ac tion and presence of mind. While his guests suffered panic, he went below and blasted a hole in the hull with dynamite. The crippled craft took on water fast and settled to bottom in the swift stream Then it lodged! Days like months passed before the handful of frightened people could be brought ashere, but no lives were lost. Quick action saved them.





Diamonds polished in Palestine

These tiny jewels, usually destined to stud milady's wrist watch or similar valuables, are called "brilliants," shipped from large, irregular stones. So skilled are the hands and eyes of these workmen that they, with the aid only of an eight-power magnifying glass and a tool that serves only to hold the stone, grind as many as 57 separate reflecting surfaces on a diamond the ize of a grain of sand.

Rough diamonds flow to Palestine rom South African mines via the Diamond Trading Corporation in England. One shipment of roughs, averaging six carats per stone, may have two dozen stones worth a total of \$10,000. When perhaps sixty pairs of skilled hands have had a turn at it, this same shipment will have a hundred stones, weighinlg only 50 carats but worth \$30,000 or The added value is the skill of the polishers, the loss in weight is the dust from cleaving cutting and grinding.

Allowances for Thefts

Sorted as to size and color, a rough diamond goes first to the cleaver. He cleaves the diamond into the most valuable combination of smaller stones, using only diands as tools for diamonds. The eleaver studies and furrows the rough, and then in a nerve-wracksecond strikes the single blow that cleaves the stone.

From cleaver, to cutter where the cleaved stone is halved for polishing, to shaper to polisher is an average of one month's operation. Cutting, grinding and polishing is done by coating metal surfaces with diamond dust suspended in castor oil, a solution that costs the Palestine industry about \$2,000 a day. That cost, plus labor, machineryand an average of \$50,000 a month written off in thefts by workers— puts the total cost of producing a polished gem out of a rough stone at \$175 per carat. Add to that the cost of rough diamonds and apparent is the reason diamonds have for 400 years been the symbol of wealth and romance.

Pyorrhea Curable **In Early Stages**

AUSTIN-Contrary to the popular telief that oyorrhea is incurable, this is only true in the most ad-Dr. Geo. tate Health Officer, advises those ersons who even suspect the presence of pyorrhea to take time by the forelock and seek an early diagnosis from their dentist so that proper treatment can be instituted while the disease is still curable.

"Early detection and proper treatment of pyorrhea represent the formula for a successful cure. This means that the dentist must have an opportunity to discover the preof the disease at the earliest possible moment since the symptoms are often so vague that the patient is unaware of its existence, Cr. Cox said. "Regular visits to the family dentist are therefore extre-

mely important."

The treatment of pyorrhea is not an involved procedure. In the average early case one of the main therapeutic features is the proper hygenic care of teeth and gums as outlined by any reputable dentist. Carelessness regarding mouth hygiene is usually the basic cause for

he condition. The family dentist can usually emove the cause of the trouble Dr Cox said, and when this has been done, intelligent routine home-care of the mouth by the patient will efect a cure in the majority of early

Concern regarding pyorrhea should not be based upon the mis-guided notion of its incurability, ccording to the State Health Officer, but rather that it be discovered by the dentist when still in a cur-


