

In "the gravity of the present hour." the Pontiff invited the rulers of the world to base their policies on three considerations:

"To remove dangerous international tensions" and "end the pre-sent intolerable state of uncertainty," he urged "the advent of a definite peace among all states."

2. To the labor of peace, he pleaded, let the rulers apply "the seal of a true justice, of a far-reaching wisdom, of a sincere service to the common interests of the entire

3. Let them finally, he said, es-tablish in their instruments of peace "a procedure clearly determined" for correcting them, so the "volce of reason and equi demanding modifications might be

the mountains in the rear are in Tito's hand anyhow. (So is Trieste's military port, Pola.) Russia's bitter fight for a small area of sheer nuisance value, stymying the peace treaties, is typical of a policy of troublemaking for trouble's sake.

Furthermore, peaceful cooper-ation with us would compel her to stop the denuding of occupied countries by requisitions, reparations, unilaterally imposed bilat-eral arrangements, and similar "Schachtian" methods of exploite-tion, also slave labor. But her economic backwardness impels her to live on the fat of others, for which American loans could offer no substitute: the strings attached might impair the foundations of collectivism. And they are not likely to be forthcoming in sufficient volume. (To be continued))

Waits Serenaded Long Before **Advent** of Season Carol Singing

By GERARD TETLEY **AP** Newsfeatures

Voices heard on the frosty air the night before Ohristmas go back to the Sixteenth Century, when the Waits made their rounds in England. The Waits actually were watchmen, or the nocturnal policemen of the day whose duties are defined in an old book of customs as those "who nightly pipe the Watche within this court fower tymes."

On Christmas Eve, the watchmen would collect and reap a neat profit from the expansive feeling of Christmas by playing tunes on such instruments as clarigolds, lutes, viols, citterns, hornpipes, anomes and room postoffice and the top shops harps-later by singing. The hat was usually passed for a gratuity which Thanksgiving. was divided among the players.

Carols came later, and in rural England were heard first on Christmas morning usually starting at the manor house. These were mostly sung by well-mittened children carrying holly on the end of a pole. Carol is derived from the Latin "cantare" to sing and "role," a joy-

ful interjection. A vulgarization of the two words produces the terminology as we know it today.

Carols were first noted in the United States before 1659 when the Massachusetts legislature, evidently influenced by the Puritans of England, passed a law forbidding any observance of Christmas. At Boston it was the custom in early colonial times for the householders on Beacon Hill to place a candle in the window, and wherever the carolers saw a candle they stopped to sing. The serenaders also were, at first, night watchmen, but as years went by trained bands of musicians took their places and the idea of the candle-in-the-window spread to become today an accepted Christmas rite and decoration.

Carols in their earliest form were identified also with mummers' parades and even dances which has caused some historians to opine that all of the Christmas singing has a pagan background and that in some mysterious way Christmas rejoicing is a perpetuation of the Roman Saturnalia or the Goths' old festival connected with the winter solstice. In the Fifteenth Century dancing was allowed in the churches of

Europe on Christmas Eve usually around cribs or manger scenes known to the French as "creches."

otherwise be lost in holiday tragedies. State Fire Insurance Commissioner Marvin Hall has suggested a nine-point safety program. These were his suggestions: Set the tree up in a pan of

water. The base of the tree should be cut at an angle at least one inch above the original cut, and

kept standing in water until removed from the house. 'The tree should be kept away from stoves and other sources of heat.

It should be securely placed to prevent failing, and so placed that it will not block an exit. Only safe and approved elec-tric sets should be used for lighting purposes - never candles.

Only flameproof materials should be used as decorations. Christmas wrappings should be removed without delay. Protect gas heaters and fire-

places with screen guards to prevent clothing from catching afire. Consult your local fire marshal or fire chief when in doubt about the rules of safety in preventing fires.



To turn good old mistletoe, for instance, into a modern courting device, she suggests a "kissing ring" out of two ribbon-wrapped embroidery hoops of the size. She uses velvet ribbon. color-matched to the berry's foliage, inserts one hoop into the other cross-wise, and decorates the botwith streamers of velvet rib-

JESUS, THE PERFECT MAN (The following editorial is reprinted here as one of the great newspaper writings of the profession. It was written by the late C. P. J. Mooney, editor of The (Memphis, Tenn.) Commercial Appeal, and was first printed in the issue of Dec. 22, 1912. Since that time it has been printed many times throughout the United States.)

PAMPA-NEWS

There is no other character in history like that of Jesus.

As a preacher, as a doer of things, and as a philosopher, no man ever had the sweep and vision of Jesus.

A human analysis of the human actions of Jesus brings to view a rule of life that is amazing in its perfect detail.

The system of ethics Jesus taught during His earthly sojourn 2,000 years ago was true then, has been true in every century since, and will be true forever.

Plato was a great thinker and learned in his age, but his teach-ings did not stand the test of time. ' In big things and in little things time and human experience have shown that he erred.

Marcus Aurelius touched the reflective mind of the world, but he was as cold and austere as brown marble.

The doctrine of Confucius, gave a great nation moral and mental dry rot.

The teachings of Buddha resulted in mental and moral chaos that makes India derelict.

Mohammed offered a system of ethics which was adopted by mil-lions of people. Now their children live in deserts where once there were cities, along dry rivers where once was moisture, and in the shadows of gray, barren hills where once there was greatness.

Thomas Aquinas was a profound philosopher, but parts of his system have been abandoned. Francis of Assisi was Christ-like in his saintliness, but in some

things he was childish. Thomas Kempis' Imitation of Christ is a thing of rare beauty

and sympathy, but it is, as its name indicates, only an imitation. Sir Thomas More's Utopia is yet a dream that cannot be realized.

Lord Bacon in writing on chemistry and medicine under the glasses of the man working in a 20th century laboratory is puerile. The world's most learned doctors until a hundred and fifty years

ago gave dragon's blood and the ground-tails of lizards and shells of eggs for certain ailments. The great surgeons a hundred years ago bled a man if he were wounded.

. Napoleon had the world at his feet for four years, and when he died the world was going on its way as if he had never lived. Jesus taught little as to property because He knew there were

things of more importance than property. He measured property and life, the body and soul, at their exact relative value. He taught much as to character, because character is of more importance than dollars

Other men taught us to develop systems of government. Jesus taught so as to perfect the minds of men. Jesus looked to the soul,

while other men dwelled on material things. After the experience of 2,000 years no man can find a flaw in the governmental system as outlined by Jesus.

Czar and Kaiser, President and Socialist, give to its complete merit their admiration.

No man today, no matter whether he follows the doctrine of Mills, Marx or George as to property, can find a false principle of Jesus' theory of property.

In the duty of man to his fellow no sociologist has ever approximated the perfection of the doctrine laid down by Jesus in His Sermon on the Mount.

Not all the investigations of chemists, not all the discoveries of explorers, not all the experiences of rulers, not all the historical facts that go to make up the sum of human knowledge on this day of 1912 are in contradiction to one word uttered or one principle laid down by Jesus.

The human experiences of 2,000 years show that Jesus never made a mistake. Jesus never uttered a doctrine that was true at that time and then became obsolete.

Jesus spoke the truth; He lived the truth, and truth is eternal. History has no record of any other man leading a perfect life or doing everything in logical order. Jesus is the only person whose every action and whose every utterance strike a true note in the heart and mind of every man born of woman. He never said a foolish

thing, never did a foolish act and never dissembled. No poet, no dreamer, no philosopher loved humanity with the love Jesus bore toward all men.

Who, then, was Jesus? He could not have been merely a man, for there never was a man who had two consecutive thoughts absolutely in truthful perfection. Jesus must have been what Christendom proclaims Him to bea divine being-or He could not have been what He was. No mind but an infinite mind could have left behind those things which Jesus gave to the world as a heritage.
