

identified as LCIL 1090 (landing craft infantry large) left Dairen Dec. 21 (Dec. 20, U. S. Time) on a return trip to the U.S. base at Tsingtao, on the north coast of China. There was no other immed-

iate comment from the department.) The vessel, LC-3 1090, was on a second routine courier mission to for prosaic destinations, catching Dairen carrying diplomatic mail and supplies to the U.S. Consul-

ate there. The ship arrived at Dairen Dec.

18, and requested permission to re-main in port for 48 hours. This was accepted without comment by the Soviet authorities who met the ship at anchorage.

The ship remained in the harbor two additional hours while the U.S. Consul General H. Merrill Benninghoff attempted a last minute appeal to the Soviet military authorities to permit an American businessman, Jesse L. Poole, Atlanta, Ga. representing the Standard Vacuum Oil Co., to go ashore. It was at

this point that the Soviet ultimatum was delivered. The Russian military commander of the city, Maj. Gen. V. U. Korzhanoff, refused to see the Ameri-can Consul General, however, and the ultimatum was delivered to the ship by one of his military aides.

When the Consul called at the Soviet commander's home to appeal from the decision banning the three Americans from Dairen, he was left standing in the bitterly cold street while a sentry carried his request inside. After some time, he was told that General Korzhanoff was not available.

Benninghoff has previously called on the Russian Consul General, S. U. Petrov to inquire why American citizens were not allowed ashore. Petrov replied that the whole matter was in the hands of Soviet military authorities. He said authorization for such entries must come from Moscow.

The refusal today was the third rebuff the American Consul General had received from the Soviet military during the American ship's chief visit.





In 10 years the British have never completely recovered from the abdication of Edward VIII and his marriage to a divorced American.

And now the lovely Princess Elizabeth seems to be heading into a far less sensational but possibly difficult betrothal.

The young man is Prince Philip, 25, of Greece And the one complicating factor is the continued presence of British troops in Greece.

The marriage apparently has been arranged. He is an acceptable enough chap for a royal marriage. He is sixth in line for the throne of the Hellenes, now occupied by his second cousin King George. Although born on the Greek island of Corfu, the prince spent most of his younger years in England.

Educated at an English preparatory school, a Scottish public school and the Royal Navy College at Dartmouth, he made his home with his uncle, none other than Admiral Viscount Louis Mountbatten. He had a good war record with the British navy in the Mediterrean and the Pacific.

He speaks flawless English. The match is well enough made, it seems.

But there remain those British troops in Greece. Summed up in four-syllable words by the New York Time here is the problem:

"Because of the troubled situation in Greece it was thought that the present was an inauspicious time for the announcement (of the betrothal) lest it provide a new reason for criticism of the government's policy of keeping British troops in Greece."

Britain's leftists are reported already in full cry. They did not like the return of King George to Greece. They did not like British troops there.

They fear a marriage between Elizabeth and Philip will commit Britain even more thoroughly to the continued sponsorship of a rightist-monarchist regime in has no exceptions. Peter expressed Greece.

Some sentiment is against Philip because he is not British, despite his German blood and flawless English diction. Opines columnist Tom Driberg, a leftist member of parliament:

"It might be different if the poor girl had not been so carefully sheltered from contact with ordinary working-class and middle class people.'

From their angle, the Soviets must feel that they have gotten worst of the deal and that even the "little" compensation they have acquired is being contested by the "greedy" western-

To restore the power-balance is the objective of Moscow's foreign policy. "World conquest" would do, of course, but it is misleading to guage the Kremlin atmosphere in such simple terms. Whatever their ultimate aims-and no doubt they are as determined crusaders as the Jacobins and Nazis werethe immediate goals are far more realistic and could not include war, for which the Soviets are not strong enough. It is in terms of the necessity, as they see it, to correct the political disequilibrium of the world, and to do so without being defeated by war, that the current strategy of Russian diplomacy has o be understood.

Ever since Stalingrad, Russian foreign policy has been determined by this necessity to restore the Balance of Power, the cornerstone of their Security. Without that Balance, "socialistic" Russia stands surrounded by hostile capitalistic forces which appear united against her. The most disquieting fact is the unity of her opponents, as proven already in diplomatic clashes, to say nothing of the de facto military alliance between Britain and the U.S., vastly superior to Russia's military potential-given the Bolshevik conviction that cap-Italism is bent on uprooting Utopia by propaganda and sabotage, if not by actual aggression, How could it be otherwise since they themselves are bent on destroying capitalism?

Two alternatives are open to the Soviets in tackling this unbalanced situation, One would be: to challenge the West and fight it out, if necessary. Such a war, with Rus-

sia facing all others combined, must be avoided. The other: to compromise and temporize, capi-talizing on the immense Anglo-American good will accumulated during the war. That is the course of friendly cooperation and mutual toleration, on which the Roosevelt-Churchill crowd banked, hoping to achieve it by unethical territorial
