Strike Control Bill To Ban Closed Shop

WASHINGTON (P)-Rep. Howard W. Smith (D-Va.), co-author of the War Labor Disputes Act. today outlined a peacetime strike control program that would ban closed shops and provide indirectly for compulsory arbitration.

Smith sketched out details of his proposed measure during a con ference with President Truman yesterday but declined to say what, if any, reaction it met at the White House.
