## Council Agrees To Government **Troops** in Area

announced today that Dr. Sallamollah Javid, the Communist Governor-General of Azerbaijan province, had wired Premier Ahmed Qavam that the Provincial Council agreed to the assignment of government security forces in Azerbaijan.

Four columns of government troops were dispatched only yesterday across the frontier of the semiautonomous state which had rejected Qavam's orders for government of coming elections throughout the nation

The Supreme War Council of Iran met here for three hours this morn-

Gen. Razmara, chief of the general staff, was in attendance, as the troops struck northward against the Azerbaijan fedaie (militia) of Dr. Sallamollah Javid, the Communist governor-general in a movement which may challenge Soviet Russia's interest in the northwestern border

Reports yesterday that the troops had cantured Mianeh, a highway and railway town five miles beyond the Ghaflankooh Mountain pass, remained unconfirmed.

Premier Ahmed Qavam ordered the military action after the Azerbaijan regime rejected his plan for any army supervision of coming

**Tests Tried on Captives Related** 

NUERNBERG, Germany— (A) Prosecutor James McHaney intro-duced today records showing Nazi doctors singled out certain concentration camp victims to undergo experiment until they died.

Letters from Dr. Sigmund Rascher, who committed suicide, implicated at least three of the physiclans among the 23 now standing trial before a United States war crimes court for the inhuman ex-

Each document referred to "control groups," McHaney told the court. He described these as those units "assigned for ex-terminal experiments." That meant the victims would be under constant testing and if they were strong enough to survive one test they would be subjected to another.

The victims were put under high altitude conditions in pressure tanks at Dachau. The aim was to see how much a German airforce pilot could stand in he had to bail out. One record stated that the heart

of a 37-year-old Jew continued beating for some time after the brain was removed. This led Heinrich Himmler to suggest in a letter that those who could be revived should be "pardoned" to life imprisonment provided they were not Poles or Russians.

One subject named Wagner lived through tests simulating a height of more than 10 miles without oxygen. Rascher wrote that Wagner was put through some more tests, however, and eventually died.







night at Georgetown Hospital. He was 59 years old. For eight months his life had been dimming from a brain tumor which doctors dared not try to re-

Johnson left the Senators after the 1927 season to pilot Newark in the International league. He re-turned to the Capital as manager of the Senators in 1929-1932 and ended his baseball days as manager of the Cleveland Indians in 1933-





Man Is Sentenced to 3 Years for Forgery

PARIS- (P) -Vernon Tull, 29, warehouseman and cotton buyer of Cooper, has been sentenced in Federal Court here to three years in prison for forgery. He also was fined \$1,000.

Tull pleaded guilty to charges of forgery of Commodity Credit Corporation cotton loan and sales documents. The government's in-dictment alleged that Tull had altered grade and staple reports on 2,600 bales of cotton, thus raising the loan value to about \$21,275 in excess of government rates.

The indictment also charged that Tull had failed to account for 312 bales of cotton at Cooper and Wills Point, for which he allegedly re-



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
