Control Mesquite With Chemicals

According to Geo. Sealy, county agent, during the past few years about a million acres of mesquite infested Texas rangeland has been sprayed with chemicals. Results generally have been fair to good considering it as a control measure and not as complete eradication. Aerial spraying is the most popular and practical method for applying the chemicals.

He states that recent research findings at the Spur Experiment Station shows that one-half to two-thirds of a pound of low volatile ester 2,4,5-T applied in an emulsion of one gallon of diesel oil and three gallons of water will give good results. He also points out that chemical applications will give good control for a few years but will not eradicate the mesquite on the area.

Sealy states that an acre of average mesquite infested range land is tapped daily of about 50 gallons of water. That loss is the amount given off by the mesquite through transpiration.

When moisture is not a problem, he explains, the loss gets little attention, but when dry the grass that might have been produced with the 70 to 75 tons of water loss per acre yearly would mean a great deal in the plans of ranchmen.

Mesquite takes from three to four times more water to produce one pound of leaves or beans than is required for a pound of buffalo grass or side oats grama. He cites figures released by the Spur Experiment Station to show the value of clearing brush from range land. Beef cattle on the brush cleared pastures produced 35.6 pounds of beef an acre against 23.2 pounds an acre from non cleared pastures. The condition of the mesquite growth at the time the spray is applied has a strong bearing upon the final results. Generally the proper time for making the chemical application is during the heavy leaf stage usually from 40 to 90 days after the mesquite leaf out in the spring accompanied with good soil moisture conditions and a vigorous plant growth.

Ranchers desiring assistance in carrying out this practice should contact the local ASC office and request assistance before any actual work is done on their ranch.

Finally, cautions Sealy, extreme care must be taken when spraying for the material may drift onto susceptible crops such as cotton. Spraying in areas where susceptible crops are growing is not recommend-

**Males Beware!
Outnumbered
By the Women**

NEW YORK, N.Y.—Women already outnumber men in the United States, and the indications are that the difference in numbers will become even larger in the future, statisticians of a life insurance company said recently.

The reversal of the historic sex ratio in our population occurred in 1945, the statisticians reported, and showed up for the first time in the 1950 census. At that time there were about 1,430,000 more women than men.

Many Factors

Many factors are contributing to the increasing proportion of females in the population, according to the statisticians. The most important is the higher death rate among males. At birth, the ratio of the two sexes has been very stable for many years, at a level of about 1,055 males per 1,000 females. On the other hand, the ratio of male to female deaths has been increasing; in 1930 this ratio was 1,210 males per 1,000 females, and by 1951 it had risen to 1,333 males per 1,000 females.

Both sexes have shown a long-term improvement in mortality, but the reduction has been more rapid among females. As a result, the gain in population by natural increase (the excess of births over deaths) has been greater for females. In the six postwar years 1946 through 1951, natural increase added half a million more females than males to the population.

Migration

Another factor has been the trend in the sex pattern of migration. For most of the country's history, there was a marked excess of males over females among immigrants. However, this picture was reversed about 1930; in every year since then, more females than males have come into the country. During the depression years 1932 to 1936 three of each five immigrants were females. After the war the difference became even greater with the arrival of war brides and fiancées of American servicemen. In 1946, female immigrants outnumbered the males three to one.

On the other hand, more men than women leave the country.

War deaths have been another factor in widening the margin between males and females in the population.

**Sulphur a Favorite
With These Orphans**

MIDWAY, Ky.—Students of the Kentucky Female Orphan School in this little town like sulphur—and with good reason.

The school, believed to be the oldest of its kind in the U. S., is a "silent partner" in a new sulphur development of Freeport Sulphur Company at Nash dome in Fort Bend county, Texas.

Here's how it came about: Back in 1945 Mrs. Belle Wisdom, a native of Paducah, Ky., bequeathed the school 15,000 acres of Texas land which included Nash dome. The discovery of sulphur there came later, and Freeport leased the sulphur rights from the estate's trustee.

For every ton of sulphur that is mined the Kentucky school will receive a royalty. Freeport is developing Nash dome as part of an over-all program to increase the nation's supply of the mineral that is needed to make fertilizers, chemicals, petroleum products, steel, rubber, explosives and hundreds of other items.

Mrs. Wisdom, who died in Houston, Tex., in 1945, was one of the school's principal benefactors. During her lifetime, she gave \$50,000 to the school which now has 225 students from 21 states and two foreign countries and a 55-acre campus. A high school and a junior college prepares the girls either for business careers or for senior college.

**Nutrition Expert Sees
No More 'Three Meals'**

AUBURN, Ala.—The usual American custom of three meals a day is not necessarily the best eating schedule.

Mary Hulsey, API extension nutritionist, explains that some people, often the elderly, feel better if they eat more frequently, but less at a time. They may prefer to divide their daily fare into four or five meals instead of three. Or some food may be saved out for snacks between meals or at bedtime.

"However," warns Miss Hulsey, "older people who eat frequently need to guard against two hazards. First, don't spoil the appetite for milk, fruit, vegetables, and other

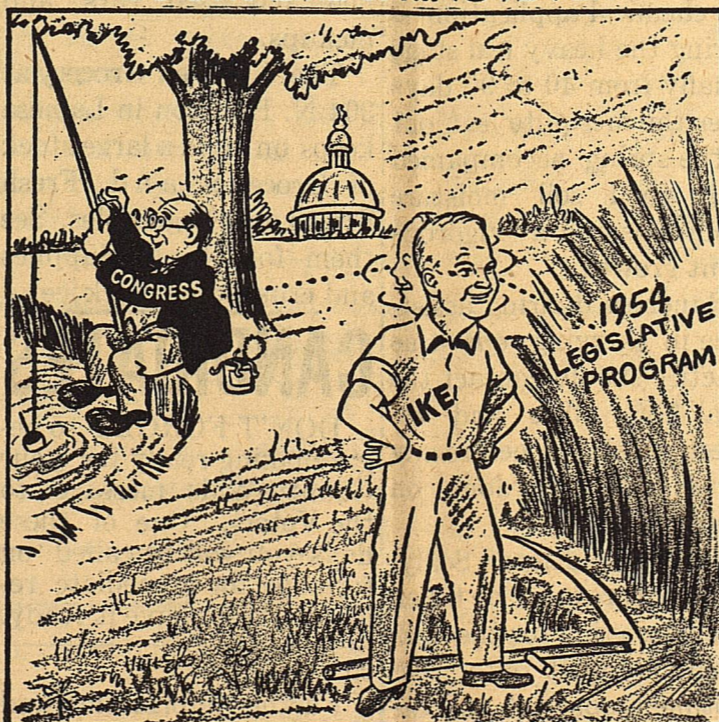

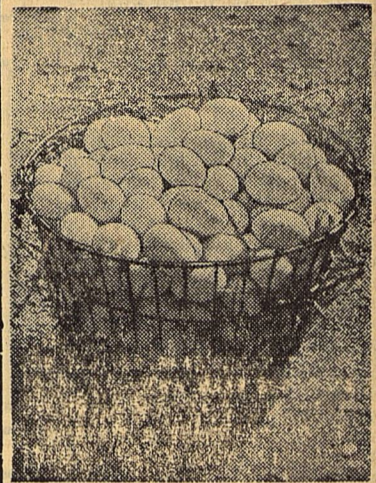
Poultry Industry In Price-Cost Vise Efficient Operation Means More Profits

Because of the price-cost squeeze in the poultry industry, it is imperative that every farmer get the most money out of his laying flock. But producing quality eggs begins long before the pullet lays her first egg.

The first requirement of any flock owner is good disease-free foundation stock with satisfactory egg-laying records.

Near the top of the lists of "musts" that bring top egg prices is the elimination of stained, dirty eggs. The producer can eliminate most of the dirty eggs by keeping hens confined to the laying house when the ground is wet and muddy.

Feeding plenty of oyster shells and vitamin D will cut down on

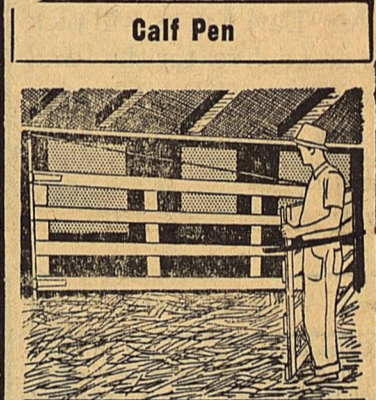


Use a wire basket to gather eggs. They will cool twice as fast as when they are gathered in a solid pail.

The number of cracked eggs, another item that reduces the poultryman's profit.

If eggs are left in a hot henhouse for more than half a day, they will start to lose their freshness and moisture. The sooner the eggs are gathered after they are laid, the better.

The eggs should be taken to a cooling room immediately and allowed to cool overnight before they are packed.



The above fold-back calf pen is suitable for a number of farmers who have pen-type barns. It is a hinged affair, using two gates which have been hung to a pipe on the wall. The gate attached to the wall is wired to prevent sagging. It is convenient in that it can be folded back against the wall for quick cleaning of the barn.

Flies Get Tougher

One of farming's hazards is the ever-present house fly, which always has been a mean, tough opponent and seems to be getting even meaner and tougher.

A long parade of residual insecticides has failed to eliminate the problem; so instead of relying solely on the "magical properties" of one of these preparations, practice sanitation, use insecticides recommended by the Extension Service in your county, and buy from a reliable dealer.

To Be Shared

As some one has said, "A crust eaten alone is only a crust. A crust shared may be a sacrament of friendship." There is one fact about the Living Bread which is not true of ordinary bread. A loaf from the grocery will be just as nourishing if you eat it alone as if you eat it in company. A loaf stolen is as nourishing as a loaf honestly bought. And yet church members will sit in their comfortable churches, listening to sermons about Jesus, standing up and saying they believe in him, singing about him, even taking the bread of Communion,—and all the while soul-starved people are on the outside. How can we ever truly have Christ in our lives if we never try to share Him?

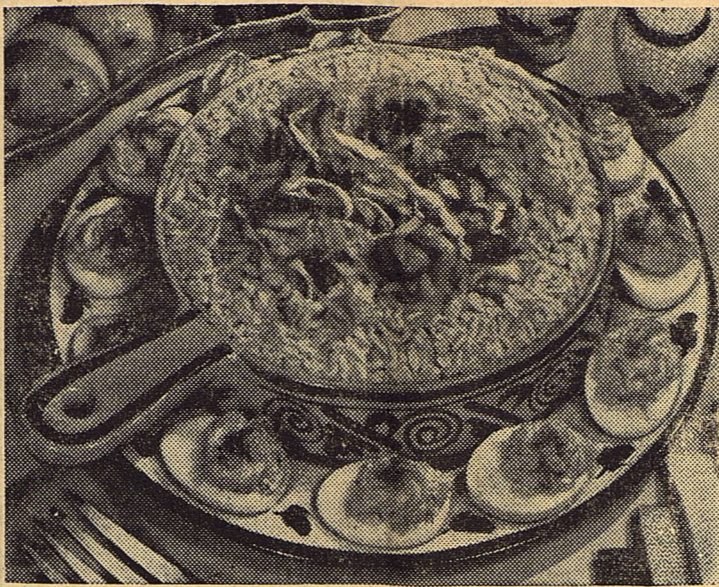

Rice is Topped With Creole Cabbage

INGREDIENTS:

3 cups hot cooked rice
2 pork chops, cut in 1/4-inch
cubes (or 1/2-cup cooked
meat)
1 cup onions, chopped
1 No. 2 can tomatoes
6 cups green cabbage,
shredded
1/2 cup canned mushrooms
sliced
2 teaspoons salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1/4 teaspoon chili powder

QUICK METHOD FOR COOK- ING FLUFFY WHITE RICE:

To make 3 heaping cups of white,
fluffy, perfectly cooked rice:
1. Put 1 cup uncooked rice,
2 cups cold water and 1
teaspoon salt into a 2-quart
saucepan and bring to a
vigorous boil.
2. Turn the heat as low as
possible. Cover the sauce-
pan with a lid. Do not re-
move lid or stir rice while
it is cooking.
3. Leave saucepan over this
low heat for 14 minutes.
Turn heat off. The rice is
now ready to use. How-
ever, leave the cover on

the saucepan to keep the
rice warm if you are not
ready to use it immediately.

For extra fluffy, tender, separate
grains — allow the rice to steam
for an additional 10 minutes —
with heat off, but without re-
moving lid.

METHOD: Brown meat in a
skillet. Enough fat should cook
out of the meat so that it is not
necessary to add additional fat
to the skillet. Add onions and
some of the juice from the to-
matoes. Cover and cook over a
medium heat until onions are
tender and meat is done. Add
tomatoes, cabbage, mushrooms,
salt, pepper, and chili powder.

Cover skillet and cook only un-
til cabbage is tender. Do not
overcook. Cabbage should re-
tain its green color. If there is
not enough juice from the to-
matoes to prevent the mixture
from sticking, add a small
amount of water. Spread cooked
rice on a platter. Serve cabbage
over the rice. Deviled eggs are
an ideal accompaniment to be
served with the rice and creole
cabbage.
This recipe makes 8 servings.
