

Introduce Children To Recordings That Teach As Well As Entertain

NEW YORK (NEA)—Stop worrying about the effect comic books, television and the movies have on your children, and do some constructive planning instead.

This is the advice of Nanette Guilford, founder of a special type of children's records that teach, among other things, the history of our country.

Miss Guilford, who has had a wide and diversified background in music, having sung in many well-known operas, turned her talents to children's records after the last war. These records teach everything from history to atomic theory—in language and songs that youngsters can understand.

"Plan a prescribed period for daily record sessions," she suggests. "And don't leave your children alone while they listen. Share the experience with them."

If, for instance, you want the youngsters to hear the records that tell about the life of President Lincoln, see if you can't find some pictures of the President so that the children can look at them while the records are played.

Since children love to repeat over and over again the stories that appeal to them, after records are finished, give the youngsters an opportunity to talk about what they have heard. Then, too, they will probably want to ask you a variety of questions.

Be selective about the pieces you choose. If your little boy is interested in engineering, he will appreciate the records that de-

scribe the lives of some of the nation's leading engineers.

Since so many young children are frightened at the prospect of going to school, Miss Guilford has also introduced recorded lessons in such school subjects as arithmetic. This is certainly one way to get your youngsters off to an early and enjoyable start in learning.

"Records," says Nanette Guilford, "are one of the most positive means of teaching children. Pleasant and entertaining to listen to, youngsters remember them with delight rather than annoyance."

It might be fun to stimulate interest by giving record parties for the children in the neighborhood every now and then. Allow each child to pick the records he or she likes the best, and then write the names of the child and the records on a slip of paper. Put the slips into a box.

Next, explain to the children how many records may be played and have them pick the allotted number of slips from the box. You can save the unused slips from one party to the next.

"Children love to daydream; to escape from the realities of life just as we grown-ups sometimes do," explains Miss Guilford. "With loving and thoughtful guidance from you, their energies and imaginations can be channeled along constructive and interesting lines."

There's little doubt that once you expose your children to this new type of entertainment and education, you will be helping them to build their lives on a strong, healthy foundation.

Use Own Rules In Canasta

Today we have more questions on Samba and Canasta, sent in from several different parts of the country.

I must state, as I so often have done in the past, that I can answer only on the basis of the official rules of the game. Any group is at liberty to make up its own rules, and many players prefer to do so.

But if you are one of those independent souls you cannot expect an official ruling from an outside authority — since no outsider can feel sure that he fully understands all your "local variations."

Q—Do you meld red threes at your first turn to play, or does each player put his red threes on the table and replace them before the top card of the stock is turned up at the beginning of a hand?

A—Each player puts down and replaces his red threes at his first turn to play. This is the procedure that you follow in Canasta and also in Samba. The method of putting down and replacing all the red threes before you turn the top card of the stock at the beginning of a hand is sometimes followed in South America, but has never been favored by American players.

Q—Suppose you are playing Samba and have a closed canasta of kings with an additional pair of kings in your hand. The player at your right discards a king, and you promptly take the discard pile with the pair of kings in your hand. Must you add this group to the closed canasta, or should a new meld be started?

A—You must start a new meld of kings. In the game of Samba you would not be allowed to use a closed canasta for the purpose of taking the discard pile. Therefore you are obliged to start a new meld in this situation.

If you were not taking the discard pile, you would be allowed to add natural kings from your own hand to a closed canasta of kings. This would be both foolish and unnecessary. If you had three or more natural kings in your hand, for then you could start a new meld anyway.

Players of the parent game of Canasta will do well to notice this difference between the two games. In the game of Canasta you are not allowed to have more than one meld in the same rank.
