SEOUL(Korea, Feb. 2-UP-American Sabrejets caught Russian MIGs out in the open for the 15th straight day and destroyed or damaged five of them in dogfights over North Korea Monday.

U.S. Superforts, ranging cloudless skies, dropped 200,000 pounds of bombs across the 155-mile battleline in their biggest attack in more than a year as the Korean fighting continued to be mostly from the air.







Glib statements by AFL President George Meany and CIO President Walter Reuther about wanting to cooperate with the new Eisenhower administration are the usual stuff for this season of New Year resolutions as yet untried and unbroken. But they may also be an indication that union politicians may be running a little bit scared. Not so much of Eisenhower, maybe, as of the

A checkup on the new Congress by AFL labor's League for Political Education sizes up the situation this

House - 160 friendly to organized labor, 239 unfriendly and 36 doubtful. Senate - 38 friendly, 57 unfriendly, I doubtful.

The one doubtful is Sen. Richard Russell of Georgia. His voting record has been considered unfriendly to union labor. But last summer when he was running for the Democratic presidential nomination, Senator Russell came out for repeal of the Taft-Hartley labor law. Union lobbyists on Capital Hill are therefore watching closely to see how Senator Russell will vote on the first labor

This new nose count on labor sentiment in Congress represents a net loss to the unions for support of their programs. In the last Congress the score was:

House - 181 friendly, 222 unfriendly, 32 undetermined.

Senate — 40 friendly, 56 unfriendly.

But even this year's box score does not represent the lowest level to which pro-union sentiment in Congress has dropped. When the Taft-Hartley law was enacted in 1947, the union lobbyists could count on only 80 friends in the House, 24 in the Senate.

In the 1948 election, union leaders claim their supporters came back to the extent of 200 in the House and 50 in the Senate. This still wasn't enough to push over repeal or even serious amendment of the Taft-Hartley law. Their chances of having anything done about it in the new Congress are correspondingly slimmer.

The political influence of the organized labor movement in the United States has now been pretty generally written off as negative.

All major unions openly endorsed the Democratic presidential candidate, Gov. Adlai Stevenson of Illinois. With about 16 million union members and a potential family vote of perhaps another 14 million, there was theoretically enough strength there to throw the election. But it simply couldn't be delivered.

This shows up in the reports on funds collected from labor union members for political activities in the last

CIO-PAC — the Congress of Industrial Organization's Political Action Committee — which was the outfit most cussed by Republican candidates for having a half relson on the White House, did poorly.

CIO now claims about six million members. Collections were under \$600,000 from Jan. 1, 1952, to Oct. 30. This indicates that only one member in 10 contributed his buck to PAC.

AFL-LLPE reports total collections for the year of only \$251,470. About \$30,000 was expended for a fundraising drive which apparently didn't produce, for AFL claims eight million members.

The whole union labor political campaign fund probably would add to \$1,000,000 - placing a value on Democratic party support at roughly, 614 cents per man in the organized labor movement.

The "excess profits" defined by law are actually the source of most business expansion. They are the income usually plowed back into the company.

When the government takes these earnings in excess profits taxes, expansion and growth slow down. One of the worst aspects is that these taxes hit the smaller companies hardest, and they are the ones which most

Expansion funds are the birthplaces of new jobs. If a company expands by buying 10 presses, it creates jobs for 10 pressmen and their helpers.

The United States is a growing country. Every day the work force is enlarged by hundreds of new men and women looking for jobs.

Because of our mis-named "excess profits" law, available employees may someday seriously outnumber jobs. That's what's in a name.

The Bricker Amendment The Bricker Amendment is aimed at correcting this method of changing our Constitution and overiding our laws. It is strange that this amendment has any opposition. However, some special interests in the Senate sidetracked this important amendment in the last Congress. It has been again introluced. We want to pass this amendment so that the Constitution cannot be changed without being in accord with Article V. which reads:

'The Congress, whenever two thires of both Houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose Amendnents to this Constitution, or, on the Application of the Legislatures of two thirds of the several States, shall call a Convention for proposing Amendments, which, in either case, shall be valid to all Intents and Purposes, as Part of this Constitution, when ratified by the Legislatures of three fourths of the several States, or by Conventions in three fourths thereof, as the one or the other Mode of Ratification may be proposed by the Congress; Provided that no Amendment which may be made prior to the Year One thousand eight hundred and eight shall in any Manner affect the first and fourth Clauses in the Ninth Section of the first Article; and that no State, without its Consent, shall be deprived of its equal Suffrage in
