Taft Promises Long Session **On Cabinet**

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26 -UP- Republican leader Robert. A. Taft promised to hold the Senate in overtime discussion Monday if necessary to confirm Charles E. Wilson as defense secretary and complete formation of the Eisenhower cabinet.

Advance nose-counting indicated that the former General Motors president would win Senate approval by an overwhelming vote, now that he has agreed to sell his \$2.7 million worth of GM stock. But Taft evidently expected some lengthy anti-Wilson speeches from Oregon's independent Sen. Wayne Morse, an avowed foe of the nomination, and possibly some Demorcrats.

He gave the controversial nomination top priority at. Monday's Senate session and told a reporter: "We're going to stick with it un-

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26 -UP --- President Eisenhower will deliver his State of the Union message in person to a joint session of Congress next Monday at 11:30 a. m. CST, congressional leaders announced today.

House Speaker Joseph W. Martin, Jr., (Mass.) announced the plans for the President's appearance after he and eight other top-ranking GOP House and Senate leaders spent two hours with the President at the White House cov-ering the outstanding matters to


be included in he message. House and Senate GOP leaders went over all of the matters which will be treated by the President in his State of the Union message," Martin said. Studied List of Subjects







Homemakers will find supplies f onions somewhat tighter, than they were this time last year, according to the Production and Marketing Administration which keeps with fruit and vegetable market news.

Here's why. Current stocks of onions from the late 1952 crop are 11 per cent smaller than a year ago and 23 per cent smaller than the average for the six years between 1946 and 1951.

Between now and the new spring onion crop,' consumers will have a supply of slightly more than 6 million, 50-pound sacks of onions to meet their needs.

But there's a bright side to the picture. South Texas, the only source of early spring onions, has planted 20 per cent more acreage than last year. This crop will start rolling in March.

they were this time last year, according to the Production and Marketing Administration which keeps up with fruit and vegetable mar-ket news.

Here's why. Current stocks of nions from the late 1952 crop are 11 per cent smaller than a year ago and 23 per cent smaller than the average for the six years between 1946 and 1951.

Between now and the new spring onion crop,' consumers will have a supply of slightly more than 6 million, 50-pound sacks of onions to meet their needs.

But there's a bright side to the picture. South Texas, the only source of early spring onions, has planted 20 per cent more acreage than last year. This crop will start rolling in March.

Communist actions always are susceptible of many interpretations, and often they have many purposes at once.

For instance, East German Reds are now weaving a net about certain former top party members, seeking to link them with the so-called Slansky group in Czechoslovakia. Fourteen of this group recently were convicted of treason and other crimes, and 11 were hanged in Progue.

In this new effort, the Communists seem basically to be striking at the problem of disloyalty to the Soviet Union - Titoism, if you like. It is not enough to be a. good Communist. You must be loyal to the Russian Fatherland

It is not easy for men who want to be not only Cammunists but good Germans, Czechs, Hungarians, Romanions, etc. The conflict is deep. The stronger personalities, the very individuals most useful to Russia in fastening Red control upon a country, ultimately become the most likely condidates for elimination. For in their leadership runs inevitably a marked nationalistic strain.

The Soviet Union's relations with the satellite powers are at the stage were nationalistic tendencies must be suppressed if the process of consolidating the Iron Curtain countries is to make substantial headway. Tito's example is a painful reminder to the Kremlin of the dangers of independent satellite action.

In the East German case, the Reds are striking also: at "Zionists." The Slansky group is so labeled, and the former Germon Communists under fire bear the same. tag. Again, the problem is disloyalty, but in a different sense. The Jews have a cultural unity of their own, internationalistic in scope. The Russians cannot tolerate so powerful a rival.

Anti-Semitism in the Communist world thus does not have the same base as elsewhere. It is just one more reflection of the ruthless Red policy of allowing no competitors of any kind --- whether cultural, political, economic or spiritual. Divided loyalty is the enemy of the totalitarian principle of government

Always alert to propaganda potentialities, the Kremlin my not be unmindful of the fact that its current blast ogainst "Zionism" among satellite Reds will sound good to the Arab world. The Arabs bitterly resent western, especially American, attention to the young Zionist state of Israel.
