Lowly Boll Weevil Was Responsible For Formation Of Extension Service

The lowly boll weevil literally ate the Extension Service, now celebrating its 50th anniversary, into exis-

Destruction caused by the boll weevil in cotton crops immediately after the turn of the century caused a group of Kaufman County citizens to back a farmer, Walter C. Porter, in a project in 1903 to cultivate his crop according to instructions furnished by an agriculture teacher, Seaman A.

The crop was a success and the Secretary of Agriculture and some of his bureau chiefs, then attending a meeting in Dallas to discuss methods to control the national problem of the boll weevil, went to the Porter farm to see the demonstration being conducted.

As a result, the farming methods used there were adopted by the Department of Agriculture. The nation's fancy was taken by the experiments and groups or ganized over the country.



About Machinery

Numerous novels have been written about the migration of people to America from many lands. None describes the reason for such migrations better than Vilhelm Moberg in his book "The Emigrants." In it he presents the dilemma of a Swedish couple one hundred years ago as they argue for and against coming to this country, in the following fictional scene: "They are both of them strong and healthy and accustomed to hard work, and that was all that they need bring along: Their ability to work; it was all America asked of them, but they would do it in another spirit, with another hope, another loy. Because the great difference between the two countries was this: In America they could improve their lot through their own work."

Moberg's scene must actually have occurred in thousands of peasant cottages in many countries where political oppression and the rule of tyrants drove people by the millions to the freedom of America.

. Now all around us we see the miracles wrought by people seeking to "improve their lot." Nowhere is the evidence of these miracles more striking than in agrisulture. In America for the first time in thousands of years new methods and new machines were developed tor working the soil. The Country Gentleman recently featured an article "New Machines for 1953." In picture and in word the article describes the modern farm equipment that has made this nation the most productive on earth

A field harvester is shown that can handle up to 25 tons of corn or hay silage per hour. Mechanized cottonpickers are illustrated along with a sagebrush shredder, various types of balers, harrows, manure spreaders, side-delivery rakes, picker-shellers, etc. These and countless other-tabor saving farm machines would cause the early immigrant to gaze in owe struck wonder and yet they are the direct result of the compelling force that drove him to America, the urge to better his lot. And they have done just that. They have cut down drudgery, increased production and lowered costs.

A much-discussed phenomena of recent times has been the trend toward rural and suburban living. As the Census Bureau breakdowns show, there has been a steady migration out of the great, congested centers of population and into the country.

All kinds of factors have played their part in thisrapid transportation, which makes commuting swift and easy, first class schools, the desire of people to spend their leisure hours in natural surroundings, and so on. One factor which hasn't been given as much notice as it may deserve is present-day rural and surburban retailing.

The small-community shopping center of today is a far cry from that of the past, It contains all kinds of stores - chains, independents, often branches of bigcity department stores. Standards of display, sanitation and service are of the best. A wide and attractive selection of goods is offered. Competition, which is just as potent in the country as in the metropolis, sees to it that prices are held to their proper level.

This doesn't mean that our big cities are withering away. Quite obviously they are a permanent part of the landscape, and many will keep right on growing. What it does mean is that representative small-town and suburban areas are growing even faster, and that the face of the little community is undergoing a continuing and salutary change. The rural dweller gets the same kind of goods and services as his city cousin, he gets them at about the same price with less effort. Retailing is one of the pace-setters for a better nation.

Take our "social security" and taxing laws and how they handicap the youth from getting ahead - from building up an estate - from building up security for his old age.

Our "social security" laws promise things that cannot be delivered in the long run. The older men may get something out of "social security" but by the time the vounger man arrives at the age when he is entitled to "social sethe dollar will be worth curity" practically nothing and all the younger people will have to pay more and more taxes in order to give him these deflated dollars. So "social security" is one of the worst frauds against the youth of the land. It was brought forth to appease the older people without regard for the youth.

Graduated Tax The graduated tax also hurte the young man. The older man who had accumulated property before the graduated tax became so oppressive is in better shape than the younger man ever can be. Under the present graduated income tax, no young man can ever become a Henry Ford, Chrysler or an Andrew Mellon. Taxes do not permit them to become wealthy. The graduated income tax does not work as much of a hardship on the older person who has already accumulated property as it does on the younger man who is trying to accumulate property.

The labor laws also work a hardship against the working man. It requires him to pay tribute to a lot of labor bosses in order to have the right to earn a living. This did not used to be the case when our country was making great progress. The youth is obliged to pay both higher prices for what he buys and also pay tribute to labor bosses for the privilege of working.
