UN Commander Agrees To Resume Truce Talks

Pampa's New Fog Machine

guests are in for a taste of jet propulsion in just a few days when the city's new fogging ma-

The new fogging machine, its fogging mechanism fired by a tiny jet engine, will cost \$1,285, according to prices given the city commission this morning by two fegging machine manu-

The old machine, City Manager B. H. Cruce reported, was heav-ily damaged last year when it fell into a sewer ditch on the last day it was being used. The mishap was not reported to city officials, Cruce said and its damages not known until a few days ago when it was being inspected to see what run-of-mill repairs would be needed before putting it into service. The estimated cost to put the old machine back into service would run around \$800

To augment the fogging machine, the commission also purchased a Hudson Sprayer at a cost of \$511. This machine will be used for spraying in and around trash cans trees and shrubbery in city parks and other local insecticiding jobs. The fogging machine is used for

spraying wider areas. About \$1,300 was put in the budget for a new spraying ma-budget for a new spraying ma-ehine and fepairing the fogging machine. The cost of the new machine. The cost of the new equipment will run \$1,796 or \$496 more than originally anticipated.

Clark Puts POW Repatriation First

TOKYO, March 31 -UP- Gen. Mark W. Clark agreed Tuesday to resume Korean truce talks as soon as arrangements have been completed for the exchange of sick and

But the Allied commander-in-chief made it plain to the Communists that the basis for any resumed armistice negotiations will be the exchange of all Korean war prisoners on a voluntary basis - as Chinese Red Premier Chou En-Lai suggested in a statement broadcast from Peiping.

Clark sent a note to North Ko- Choral Concert Chief Kim Il Sung and Gen. Den Ten-Huail commanding Chinese Is Slated Today Red troops in Korea, accepting heir offer to exchange sick and vounded men.

'Second Order of Business' As soon as this prisoner exchange agreement is reached, Clark said he will then be prepared, as the Reds suggested, to esume truce talks "as a secondorder of business."

Thus the basis has been laid aleady for an armistice agreement if Shou's offer proves to have been made in good faith.

Chou's offer raised hope throughut the world for peace in Korea.





Free Market Results

Herrell DeGraff, an authority on food economics, recently discussed the big subject of food prices. At the end he made this memorable observation: "I have not the slightest doubt that if we retain an unfettered competitive market, we will continue in the future to get more and better food and service for our retail dollar, as we have in the past. Food prices and services determined by competition will be sometimes higher, sometimes lower, depending upon inflation, deflation, production and the like. But they will be as low as aggressive competition can make them — and that certainly will be lower than any kind of economic system would pro-

What is true of food is equally true of clothes, furniture, dry goods, hardware and everything else that is sold in America's tens of thousands of retail stores. Nothing conceivable can do as much to protect the consumer as free competition. Chain stores and independent stores, little stores and big stores, mail-order houses and supermarkets - all are competing with each other, day in and day out, for the consumer's favor. That means that each must always try to offer lower prices, better service, more attractive goods, or some other inducement the buying public wants.

The average American can buy more goods with the money earned for each hour he works than can the average citizens of any other country — and he can buy more than was the case in past times. Competition is one of the main reasons for that.

Your Meat Supply

The American meat packing industry comprises the world's largest food manufacturing group. Some 4,000 companies make up its component parts.

These companies are in constant daily competition. with each other for the available supply of livestock, They have to have meat if they are to stay in business -and meat is a perishable commodity which cannot be kept on hand for any substantial length of time. One result of this intense competition is that the price the producer gets for his meat is the best that the supplydemand situation of the moment will permit. Another result is that the consumer gets his meat at a reasonable figure — and that is true both when prices are high and when prices are low. A third result is that the packer's profits are always small.

The year 1951 is a good illustration. Of every dollar taken in by the American packers in that year, the armers received just under 80 cents. The next largest share of that dollar went for payrolls - almost 10 cents. Other necessary expenses are up practically all the rest of the dollar. The packers' net profits actually averaged about one-third cent per pound of meat sold. Even in the best of years, those profits amount to only about a cent a pound.

It's a big and complicated job to transform livestock into meat ready for market, and to see that all our farflung consuming centers are taken care of.

Underwater Oil

The Wall Street Journal recently carried this interesting item in its news columns: "Oil companies, if unhampered by legal squabbles and materials shortages, drill enough wells in the underwater lands of the continental shelf to produce 200,000 barrels of crude oil daily after five years. This report was submitted to the Interior Department by the National Petroleum Council, an advisory group composed of industry representatives. In addition, the report said, the companies could produce more than 600,000,000 cubic feet of natural gas daily and would probably discover 'an important number of major oil and gas fields."

The materials shortages will eventually end. But the legal squabbles and the political bickerings which stand in the way of progress are birds of another feather. Powerful groups in this country, motivated by socialistic impulses, practically make a business of attacking the oil industry with all kinds of unsubstantiated charges - and are doing exerything conceivable to block needed development of untouched oil resources.

The oil people are ready and able to start work on the underwater lands. And no one need worry for fear that these resources would be wastefully exploited. Oil's record in the field of true conservation is outstanding and additional safeguards can be incorporated into law. It's high time the go-ahead was given.

Low Big Are Profits

Do you think that a sizeable proportion of the money you spend in retail stores goes into the pockets of the ewners in the form of profit?

If so, the 1952 financial report of a national variety chain should interest you.

The chain sold more than \$176,240,000 worth of goods to its customers. But, after the bills were paid, only a little over \$9,1000,000 remained as net earnings. In other words, the profit amounted to around five cents on each dollar of sales.

Not all of that profit could be distributed to the stockholder-owners. Nearly \$2,100,000 was retained in the business, and the stockholders actually got a trifle more than \$7,000,000. By contrast, wages, salaries and other employee benefits came to more than \$35,000,000, and taxes accounted for nearly \$10,000,000 - more for government than owners.

This is typical of retail enterprise today. The inexorable force of competition keeps prices as low as possible and at the same time holds profits to moderate levels. That is always true of the free enterprise system — and of the free enterprise system only.

The way men develop spiritually, intellectually and morally-depends largely upon the amount of liberty they have. And if human initiative in education is not respected in the United States and we become, as the older countries, a nation where the government is master rather than the individual, then the rest of the world will have no example of a Christian liberal government that respects human initiative.

And when a government does not respect human initiative, men's character is deadened and production is greatly reduced and poverty reigns.

The Doctor Says

A number of readers have asked for information concerning a condition known as ruptured intervertebral disc, what it comes from, and whether recovery is possible without an operation.

This is a good question, since a ruptured disc is one of the most common and unpleasant causes of backache, It is not, however, as has been pointed out many times in this column, the only cause for First, what is a disc? The in-

tervertebral disc is a moderately soft cartilage which lies between the bony vetebrae of the spine; It is these cartilages which make it possible to bend the back-in other words, they give it flexibility. However, since cartilage is softer than bone, the discs are more likely to be injured, strained or otherwise damaged than the

When there is pain the the lower portion of the back or down the course of the sciatic nerve along the back of the leg, a rupture or hernia of this cartilage must be

bony vetebrae themselves.

Diagnosis is not easy, but can usually be made by a careful study of the history of the pain-that is, whether it followed an injury, and similar information obtained from the patient-by the physical findings, and by what can be seen in an X-ray film.

The X-ray, however, may not show anything immediately after the rupture has occurred. After a while, however, the rupture of a disc will cause a narrowing of the space between the bones of the
