Tornado Skips Over **East-Central Texas**

The worst blizzard since the disastrous storms of 1949 howled across the Northern Plains states Friday and blocked roads with mountainous snowdrifts.

A school bus, missing for 17 hours, was found 12 miles northwest of Sterling, Colo. The driver and his young charges had found shelter at a farmhouse and were eating

Sheriff Ernie Brown used a power tractor to track down the missing bus. He found the children safe and well. The prairie storm blew up Thursday while a tornado skipped across east-central Texas, demolishing buildings and ripping off rooftops. The blizzard raged through the

night, moving eastward from Colorado. At Lincoln, Neb., state highway maintenance engineer John Mc-Meekin reported the storm had paralyzed traffic in many sections of

Spending Cut Vital

As the annual March 15 date with Uncle Sam's income tax collectors approaches, taxpayers impatient to figure the bad news are finding that about the only change from last year's struggle is that checks are to be made payable to the "Director" of Internal Revenue instead of the "Collector."

Next year the story may be different.

The new national administration is committed to a pledge of tax relief. The extent of that relief will be a subject of ardent debate. But even if Congress makes no drastic changes in existing tax laws, these reductions are slated to take place automatically under present

The Corporation Excess Profits Tax, which currently enriches the Treasury by 2½ billion dollars a year, will be removed on June 30.

A rate cut of approximately 10 per cent in the individual income tax, amounting to an aggregate tax reduction of 3. billion dollars, becomes effective at the

Regular corporation tax rates will be reduced from 52 to 47 per cent on April 1, 1954, resulting in a tax

Also on April 1, 1954, excise tax cuts totalling 1 billion doltars a year will take effect.

In total, the national tax bill is scheduled to be reduced by 81/2 billion dollars within a year and a few months. Congress, of course, has it in its power to revise that figure upward or downward.

There seems little doubt that the excess profits tax will expire as scheduled. The tax has been criticized for discouraging investment incentive and for encouraging waste and inefficiency as matters of business

It seems certain, too, that individual income tax rates will be reduced. There is considerable sentiment in Congress to move up the effective date of the scheduled rate reduction from December 31 to-June 30. If that were done, a married couple with two dependents with a net income of \$8000 would pay \$65 less tax in 1953 than in 1952 and \$130 less tax in 1954.

The income tax of a single person with a net income of \$5,000 would be reduced by \$52 in 1953 and \$108 in 1954.

Fiscal experts are less certain that Congress will allow the regular Corporation income tax rate cuts and excise tax reductions to take effect as scheduled. Before these reductions can be made, it is argued, definite reductions in Federal spending must be established in order to avaid deficit financina

Important Victory

A year-long battle to rescue Stark County, Ohio, from the federal government's list of critical defense housing areas has been won by businessmen in Canton, Alliance and Massillon.

An order from Economic Stabilizer Michael DiSalle, wrote "finis" to the long fight, and halted efforts to jam 750 rental housing units into three Ohio communities that didn't need them.

The government capitulated on the basis of facts and figures supplied by Ohio business leaders and their congressmen. The case demonstrates what one area with the help of its chamber of commerce (Massillon) was able to do in mobilizing against government interference

Just a little more than a year ago, after rent controls had been ended in Massillon, federal officials began laying the groundwork for certifying Stark County as "critical." The certification order was issued September 30, 1952, just a few hours before rent controls were due to expire in Canton and Alliance.

Primarily, the government's decree was based on the Department of Labor's contention that 8,000 in-migrant workers had moved into Stark County between May, 1950 and September 30, 1952. That didn't check at all with figures collected by local businessmen, who said total industrial employment in the county had increased by only 4,500 in that period.

It was this point which won the battle for Massillon and its neighboring communities, according to Rep. Frank T. Bow (R., Ohio) who led the fight in Wash-

'We won by discrediting the Department of Labor's claim about in-migrant workers," Rep. Bow said. "We were able to show that the claim was based on nothing at all."

The victory, which was also supported by Senators Robert A. Taft and John W. Bricker of Ohio, saved Stark County from construction of 750 rental housing units which would have flooded the housing market. Further, the "critical" tag, if allowed to continue, would have impeded the flow of defense contracts into the

'Planning For Freedom"

I want to comment and quote further from Ludwig von Mises' new book "Planning For Freedom." Professor Ludwig von Mises was until 1934 Professor of Economics at the University of Vienna. Austria. Economic Adviser of the Austrian Chamber of Commerce and acting Vice-President of the Austrian Institute for Business Cycle Research. From 1934 to 1940 he taught as Professor of International Economic Relations at the Graduate Institute of International Studies in Geneva, Switzerland. At present he is Visiting Professor at the Graduate School of Business Administration. New York University. He has lectured as a guest at Universities and other learned institutions in Great Britain, Germany, The Netherlands, France, Italy, Mexico and

One of the papers in Freedom Newspapers, Inc. brought him from New York to Santa Ana, California to give a free lecture on the causes of war.

He has a sub-heading called "Interventionism the Cause of Depression" and by interventionism he means government interference with human action. He puts it in this way:

"It is true, many people believe that economic policy should not bother at all about long-run consequences. They quote a dictum of Lord Keynes: 'In the long run we are all dead.' I do not question the truth of this statement; I even consider it as the only correct declaration of the neo-British Cambridge school. But the conclusions drawn from this truism are entirely fallacious. The exact diagnosis of the economic evils of our age is: we have outlived the short-run and are suffering from the long-run consequences of policies which did not take them into consideration. It is useless to divert attenion from the main problem by vilifying capitalists and entrepreneurs and by glorifying the virtues of the common man. Precisely because the common man is worthy of all consideration, it is necessary to avoid policies detrimental to his welfare.

"The market economy is an integrated system of intertwined factors that mutually condition and determine one another. The social apparatus of coercion and compulsion, i.e., the state, certainly has the might to interfere with the market. The government or agencies in which the government, either by legal privilege or by indulgence, has vested the power to apply violent pressure with impunity, are in a position to decree that certain market phenomena are illegal. But such measures do not bring about the results which the interfering power wants to attain. They not only render conditions more unsatisfactory for the interfering authority. They disintegrate the market system altogether, they paralyze its operation, they bring about

"If one considers the working of the market system as unsatisfactory, one must try to substitute another system for it. This is what the socialists aim at. But socialism is not the subject matter of this meeting's discussion. I was invited to deal with interventionism, i.e., with various measures designed to improve the operation of the market system, not to abolish it altogether. And what I contend is that such measures must bring about results which from the point of view of their supporters are more undesirable than the previous state of affairs they wanted to alter."


