Plains States Bow Under Fury Of Howling Blizzard

Tornado Skips Over East-Central Texas

The worst blizzard since the disastrous storms of 1949 howled across the Northern Plains states Friday and blocked roads with mountainous snowdrifts.

Winds Kick Up Dirt Over Area

High winds, blowing dust and chilling temperatures continued to plague Pampans today as the Panhandle's current storm blew into its second day.

The blizzard slammed into Kansas Thursday night, cutting visibility to zero at weather-beaten Goodland, Kan. Winds up to 60 miles per hour drifted the snow, but no roads were reported closed.

Two persons were killed Thursday in an auto collision in a snowstorm near Des Moines, N. M., and one man died in a six-car accident on an icy highway near Cheyenne, North Platte, Neb.

Borger, Pampa Study Airline 'Isolation'

Isolation of Borger and inadequate southbound airline service for Pampa were brought out this morning in a joint meeting of the cities preparing to put their arguments before the Civil Aeronautics Board when it sits to decide whether Pioneer Airlines should operate in Pampa.

Representatives from Borger brought out that city's isolation from major transportation facilities saying they were not on any cross-country highway, have only a railroad spur and no major airline service.

Concentrated testimony, giving cold facts and figures of industrial growth and pending growth, need of more and more direct air transportation to Dallas and points south will also be used in the hearing, more than generalities because each city appearing will be granted only 10 minutes to testify.

BERLIN, Feb. 20—UP—Trigger-happy Communist border guards fired at four persons along the frontier of the western allied sectors of Berlin and West German police said Friday the Reds apparently have issued "shoot to kill" orders to halt the flight of German refugees from Soviet East Germany.

HOUSTON, Feb. 20—UP—The Houston health officer predicted Friday that there will be an "unholy mess" this year because so many Houston residents will want to have their children inoculated with gamma globulin.

Only Three Prisoners Loose Of Ten Who Escaped Jail

FORT WORTH, Feb. 20—UP—Only three of 10 prisoners who slugged guards and escaped from the Tarrant County jail were still at large early Friday, but one of the missing men was Floyd Hill, 41-year-old former Alcatraz inmate.

The other two were Glenn Crawford, believed to have kidnaped his 20-year-old pregnant girl friend during his flight, and Michael Kenneth Davis, 19.

Truman And Pampans To Show Low Ex-President Is Expected For Highway 60 Convention

Nationwide representation at the U. S. National Highway 60 Association convention in Show Low, Ariz., May 15-16 will include Harry S. Truman and a Pampa delegation.

Low is to carry approximately 300 delegates to the National Highway 60 convention. One will originate in Deming and Lordsburg, N. M., representing the U. S. Highway 70-80 associations, one from Nogales, Sonora, Mexico and Tucson, representing the Canada-to-Mexico Highway and the Tucson Chamber of Commerce and Sunshine Club, while the fourth is to start from the California coast.

8th Army Admits 'Mistake' Bombing

SEOUL, Korea, Feb. 20—UP—The Eighth Army admitted Friday that three American soldiers were killed and five others wounded on Feb. 2 when several planes, presumably Allied, dropped bombs on U. S. troops behind the front.

In a brief statement, the Eighth Army said the planes dropped six bombs "of unknown size" on the Americans.

Dairies See No Change In Milk Prices

Pampans can expect prices on dairy products to hold the line, according to local dairymen. Stable prices are foreseen in the area despite lifting of price controls on milk and other dairy products by the government Wednesday.

In fact, a decline would be more in order than would an increase, dairymen say. But because of poor feed conditions in the area even this is not anticipated too highly.

Two local dairies also pointed to a 1-cent per quart decrease Feb. 1 as ruling out any immediate change in prices.

This is not because I am overly fond of the stuff which babies have to drink out of bottles, or because I look fetching and adorable in a long, white dress, or because I am daffy about having my world bordered by the four sides of a play pen. Nor is my wish to be once again an infant in swaddling clothes prompted by any memories of how pleasant it was to be hair-pinned over a shoulder and bubbled, how much fun it was to bang the daylight out of my high chair with a spoon, or the delight, even of being given a ride on an uncle's instep as if it were a horse, or thrown halfway to the ceiling. I would like to be a baby for mercenary reasons, pure and simple. The moment Mama or the baby-sitter or nurse weren't looking, I'd pitch up my diapers and start crawling to a movie studio where half a dozen musical instruments, and do their own bargaining with the studio. I mean just plain babies, whose only talents are those they were born with, such as crying, yawning, sleeping, squirming, more crying and more yawning. If I could become a baby again I'd choose to be one between fifteen days and 29 days old. This is the top money-making age. Babies who have had their 15th day anniversary but haven't lived long enough to celebrate the start of their second month on earth, are paid seventy-five dollars per day. And what a working day! By California law they are prohibited from appearing before the camera for more than thirty seconds at a time, working more than twenty minutes a day, and must not be on the movie lot more than two hours a day. That's mighty good dough for gurgling, yawning, crying, and

W. E. Richerson Rites Wednesday In Miami Church

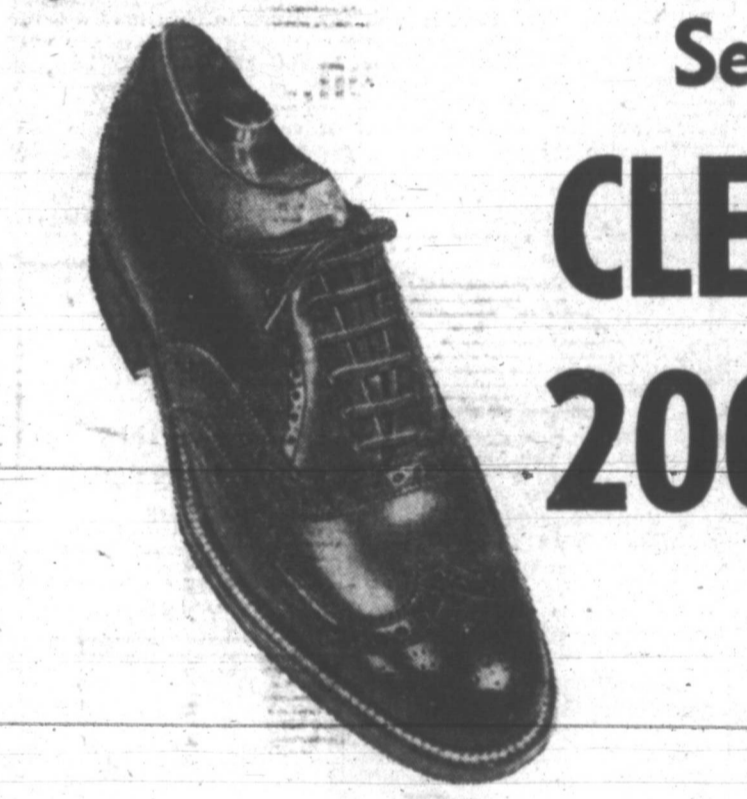

Subcommittee Wrestles With City Annexation Measure

AUSTIN, Feb. 19—UP—A Senate subcommittee Thursday had the thorny problem of deciding what to do with an annexation bill which opponents charged would "put an iron ring around Texas cities."

The controversial bill lays down new rules for annexation of outlying districts by cities. It was sponsored by Sen. Johnny E. Rogers of Austin. Rogers and other proponents argued that the proposal does nothing more than "lay down orderly rules for annexation."

Houston City Attorney Will Sears led the opposition at a hearing Wednesday. Other opposition came from representatives of Austin, San Antonio, Fort Worth, Palestine, Dallas, Amarillo, Aransas Pass and Lubbock.

Sears said the bill "would prevent any annexation" and assailed

one section requiring detailed mapping and census studies prior to annexation.

He said Houston annexed 79 square miles in 1950. "If we'd had the law then, we'd still be drawing the map," he said.

Austin attorney Truman O'Quinn said he drafted the proposed law at the request of a Travis county citizen's organization. He said all the maps required by the bill were necessarily at hand when any city planned to annex a territory.

But San Antonio City Attorney Harvey L. Hardy said mapping requirements were "absurdly detailed" and the cost would be prohibitive.

Sen. Jimmy Phillips, who wants lighter annexation laws, said that a man "killed a deer on Lot 42, Block 11" in the city of LaPorte. He said the hunting grounds, while in LaPorte's city limits, were three miles from any residences.

Sears said that LaPorte "had recently discontinued" that area as being part of the city, but Phillips snapped: "They might have, but they didn't discontinue this man's last year's taxes."

Sen. Carlos Ashley of Llano made the motion to send the measure to the subcommittee. Sen. R. A. Wehnert of Seguin named Sen. Dorsey Hardeman, San Angelo, Phillips and Ashley to the subcommittee.
