WASHINGTON, Feb. 5 -UP- President Eisenhower's order that the U. S. Seventh Fleet stop shielding Red China has been put into effect, it was learned Thursday.

Authoritative sources said formal instructions to abandon the "neutrality patrol" of Formosa were dispatched to the Far East a few hours after Mr. Eisenhower informed Congress of his plan.

A Senate leader suggested meanwhile that removal of the Seventh Fleet barrier to Chinese Nationalist operations might result in Formosa-based air attacks on Red rail lines. Mr. Eisenhower announced in his State of the Union

### **Agent Dies** In Africa

NAIROBI, Kenya, Feb. 8-UP-Stephen J. (Steve) Hannagan, the press agent who put glamor in the publicity business, died of a heart attack Thursday in his hotel room. Hannagan, 53, arrived here Tues-day by plane on a tour of Europe, Near East and Africa for one of his many public relations clients, a soft-drink bottling firm. A Nairobi doctor who was summoned to Hannagan's room told authorities he found the press agent dead in his bathroom. Hannagan's body will be flown to

## **CIO Demands** Death; Expire

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5 UP - CIO President Walter P. Reuther Thursday urged President Eisenhower ie scrap wage controls immediately - a move expected within 48 hours unless Mr. Eisenhower objects.

It was learned that government stabilization officials plan to de-control wages in all industries within 48 hours unless the White House vetoes their plans.

Reuther's request went to Mr. Eisenhower as these plans were in the works. However, White House press secretary James G. Hagerty would say only that termination of controls is "still under study and consideration" and that no definite orders had been issued yet.

Reuther said "hundreds of thousands of workers are being denied wage benefits" because the Wage Stabilization Board, anticipating the end of controls, has stopped work on pending contract consider

"In view of the pending termi-nation of controls," Reuther said, continued processing of petitions by the board would appear to be

Informed sources said orders also are in the works - again subject to presidential approval—te lift price ceilings by the end of this week on cattle, all kinds of items. Most of them are now sellng well below ceil





Speed and a clean hole seem to be the primary advantages to the use of the gas.

So far, Cree has only one small rig converted to gas. Conversion involves fire - proofing the rig and making some changes in the ignition system of the rig power units. Thre is, of course, the ever - present danger of fire and explosion when natural gas is used. In addition, insurance companies demand the rig be well

### Stork Plays A Joke

Since 1946, there has been a steady decline in the marriage rate. 1952, the experts predicted, would see a drop in the birth rate.

But according to national figures compiled by the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, a new record was set in 1952 of 3,875,000 births. Last year was the sixth in succession in which the baby crop was in excess of three and a half million bundles!

What is happening, the company's experts explain, is that the old-fashioned custom of large families is gaining in popularity. The 1952 crop, in view of the decline in marriage, reflects a large number of second, third and fourth children.

Last year's infant mortality rate, it was pointed out, also was the lowest of record, so that the chances of survival for the 1952 arrival is better than ever before.

For many business lines, all this activity on the part of the stork is as good news as it is for individual parents. Early last year when retail sales as a whole were lagging, sales of infants' and children's wear were showing gains. The toy business last Christmas was never

The entire building industry will benefit. Apparently, too, the market of the future for homebuilders will be in large homes. The great majority of homes built since the end of the war have been four and five room dwellings, often dining roomless, and obviously inadequate for families of even moderate size.

. All homeowners, of course, won't be able to go out and buy a large home as the need arises. The difference in cost between three and four bedroom homes is often more than the cost of just one room. Larger homes usually are located on more expensive lots and are built with less general thought of economy in the planning. Therefore, it is predicted, remodeling and "adding to" will have a great vogue in the next few years.

And in the matter of home remodelling, an increasing number of young parents are finding, under the pressure of economic necessity, that they can swing a hammer and wield a paint brush as well as --- well, almost as well as a professional.

### College Labor Market

New college graduates are being offered higher salaries than ever before, but there still won't be enough men to meet the demand, according to a nation-wide survey by Dr. Frank S. Endicott, Northwestern University director of placement.

Endicott has studied the college labor market annually for seven years. A study of 176 major corporations showed that the

average starting salary now is \$304 a month. The average was \$235 in 1948.

Most businessmen think they get their maney's worth at present salaries paid college men, but about 39 per cent of the personnel directors disagree, contending that

the starting rate is too high compared with that paid Industry hopes to hire 25 per cent more technical

men than previously despite the shortage of engineer-Endicott pointed out that about 75 per cent of all

college seniors are due for induction into the armed services, but many companies are willing to hire a man despite imminent induction because experience shows that 83 per cent of all college men entering service eventually return to their former companies.

The over-all demand for non-technical graduates is up slightly -- about eight per cent -- mostly in sales, merchandising and general business. However, a third of the companies said they plan to hire fewer non-technical graduates and Endicott thinks this may indicate a "levelling-off" in the demand for non-technical men in

Endicott said he found that, on the average, each of the 176 companies had to interview 151 seniors for every 1 man employed. The companies had to make 24 job offers to find 10 who would accept.

### Competition

I am continuing to quote from Ben Moreell's address before the Society of Automotive Engineers 

As stated in the first issue, Ben Moreell is Chairman of the Board of Jones & Laughlin Sieel Corporation and is one of the few big business men who can vividly defend free enterprise and show its advantages.

Under the heading of "The

Right to Plan" he states: "Now, I do not deny to any person the right to make any plan he whether it be a plan to fly to the moon or a plan to create a superior human being. But I do deny to the planner the right to force me, or any other person, to conform to his plan.

"We scientific engineers do not need law's to force people to adopt our plans or to buy our products. I believe that each of us is willing to leave the decision to the competitive market where all persons have complete freedom to buy or not to buy, to join or not to join,

to invest or not to invest. "But these would-be managersat-large of society are not willing to extend freedom of choice to others than themselves. They must have the power of government-the police force - behind their plans or they are helpless. They know that in almost all cases a free people in a free market would reject their wares. That is why they want to abolish the market economy and force people to conform to their plans to suffer the penalty of fines and imprisonment.

"For example, I am an unwilling 'stockholder' in the Tennessee Valley Authority. I continue to pay makey into that project for the simple reason that the police force will use violence upon me should I refuse. I am willing to sell my share of TVA, and of all similar welfare projects, at a large discount. In fact, I would give my equity to these humanitarians if they would only stop forcing me to subsidize their

"They claim they can 'prove conclusively that the Tennessee Valley Authority is a great financial success which regularly returns a profit to the people of America. If this is so, why do they come to Congress almost every year for additional appropriations? Why do they not offer stock in the open market where the people can have a choice?

"The answer is simple: A free people would reject the stock. If this were not so, there would have been no reason to make their participation compulsory in the first instance.

These promoters with the public purse have been planning a Missouri Valley Authority and various other such authorities for many years. And they have been lican blocs on Capitol Hill, using your money to propagandize the gullible into believing that the projects are economically sound; that they will pay back far more than they cost. If this is so, why do they demand that the police force, government, recruit

Good Intentions "Now, these social busy-bodies may have the best intentions in the world. Their personal lives may be above reproach. Their primary motive may be only to 'do. good for the people.' I question neither their intentions nor their sincerity. But I do question their basic belief that good can be accomplished through the use of violence. To illustrate my point, et us consider the French Revolution. The people rebelled against conform to its decrees on wages, prices, profits, employment, housng, and similar matters.

"Now, it would be logical to suppose that the revolters against a government of favoritism would reject favoritism and entrust their social and economic relationships to a market and a society where freedom of choice was controlling.

"It is true that some effort was made in this direction in the early stages of the French Revolution. But soon there came to power Robespierre - a man of unquestioned personal integrity and habits - a dedicated humanitarian. He became the foremost 'social engineer' of his.day. Here is his master plan for re-creating the people of France.

'In our country,' he said, 'we desire to establish morality, honesty, principles, duties, reason, contempt of vice, pride, greatness of soul, love of glory, good people, merit, genius, truth, happiness, greatness of man, generosity, strength-in short, we desire to substitute all the virtues of a republic for all the vices of a mon-

"Who can disagree with those noble objectives? Certainly, I do not, any more than I disagree with those of most of our social planners. But Robesnierre had no faith in people. He rejected any thought that the people would develop those desirable virtues by their own choice if left free to so. So, he decided to establish virtue by the use of violence; to use the power of government to force all people to conform to his plan for making them better. He became known as the 'humanitarian with the guillotine.' Those who refused to conform to his concepts of morality and economic behavior were fined or imprisoned or executed.

"When it came his own turn to bow to the guillotine, his defense was that of all humanitarians who rely on the force of government for the accomplishment their good works. He said that his every act had been 'for the good of the people'; that he was only trying to help them to peace,




