

Local residents toast to Texas; Celebrate courthouse anniversary

It was a day of double celebration at the Bailey County Courthouse on Thursday. In addition to celebrating Texas Independence Day, which is March 2 and giving a "Toast to Texas"; it was also the 70th anniversary of the Bailey County Courthouse.

The celebration was hosted by the Jennyslippers and invited guests were all of the Muleshoe Schools 4th grade students. In addition to celebrating with a toast of clear Texas water and with cake; the 4th graders also got a crash course in Texas and Bailey County history.

The March 2 Texas Independence Day commemorates the battle at the Alamo at San Jacinto, at Goliad and numerous nameless battles of will and integrity.

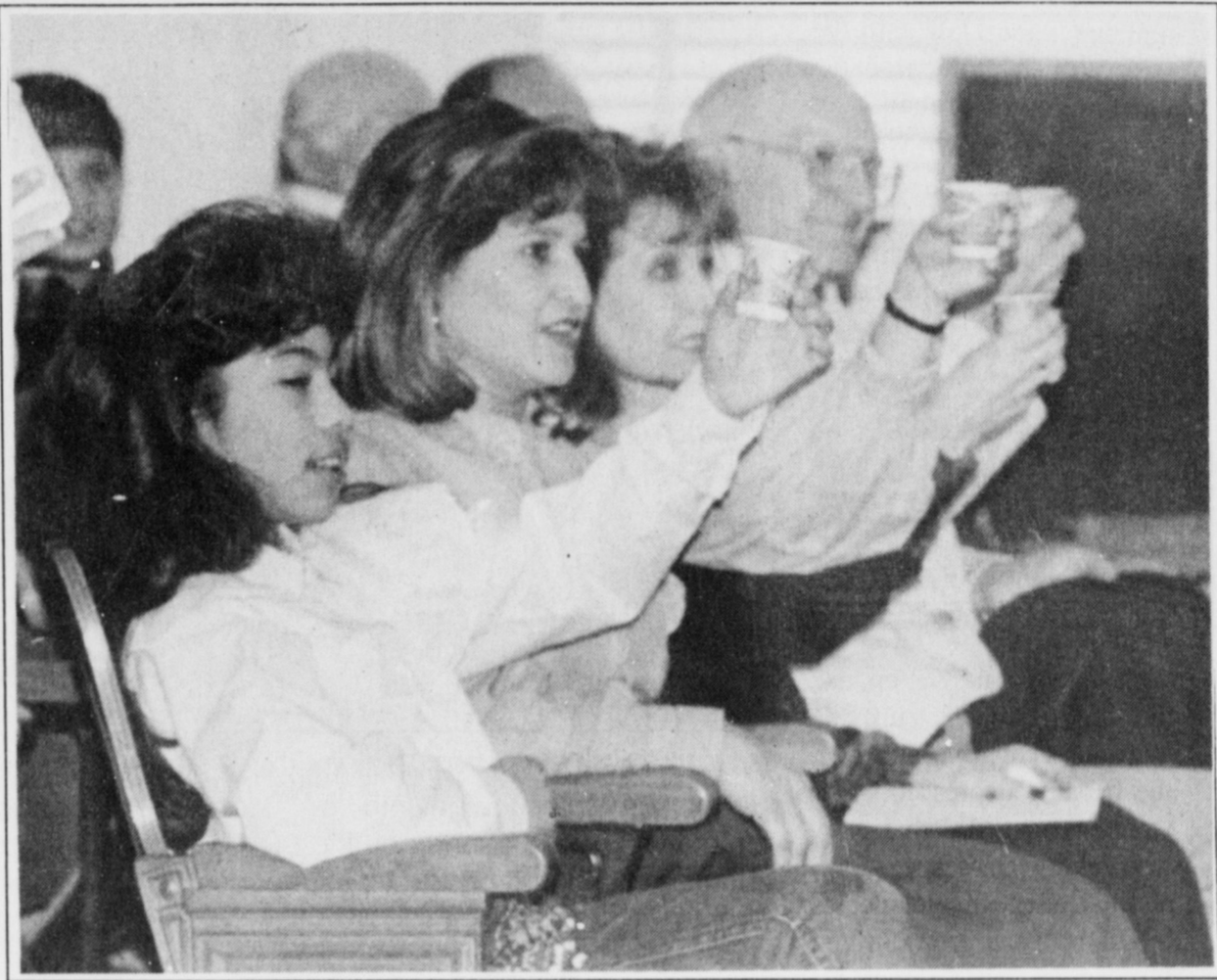
But that was not the end of it. Texas was a state that endured a great deal of changes, even before it was officially admitted into the union. Up to

the present time, Texas, which means "Friendship", has been under the rule of six different flags.

Four days later, after the battle at the Alamo, the Alamo fell to Santa Anna's 5,000 troops. But Sam Houston's 800 troops were victorious over Mexican forces at the Battle of San Jacinto on April 21.

Former Bailey County Clerk Hazel Gilbreath told about the history of the Bailey County Courthouse on Wednesday. The courthouse was completed in 1925. The first Bailey County Courthouse was located next to the current Spudnuts and Thrift Shop, in the old Blackwater Bank Building.

Bailey County Judge Marilyn Cox welcomed the students to the Toast to Texas celebration and conducted the toast. Posting of the colors and pledge was led by Muleshoe police officers. A prayer was said by the Rev. Ben Davis.



Toast to Texas

Local fourth grade students, along with county officials and community members, celebrated another year for Texas as a commemoration ceremony in observance of Texas Independence day on March 2 was held on Thursday. The fourth grade students toasted with a glass of clear Texas water.

Bailey County Sheriff Jerry Hicks then gave a historical account of the county jail.

The original Bailey County Jail was bought from Parmer

County in 1919 for \$100, under authorization from the commissioners. The Bailey County Jail was then set up in a garage of a house that be-

longed to former sheriff H.A. Douglas in 1919. This old jail was actually located in his ga-

The word that made Elizabeth a winner was "grinder," which she was able to properly spell. But what Elizabeth feels really helped her win the spelling bee Wednesday was a saying that her reading teacher Mrs. Collings taught her. A saying that stuck in her mind. It is what she refers to as the "i" before the "e" rule.

The second to the last word Elizabeth was asked to spell was the word "briefcase."

"I thought I was going to have a problem there because I was not sure if the 'i' came before the 'e.'" Elizabeth said. "But then I remembered the

"i" before the "e" rule Mrs. Collings had taught us."

Elizabeth is the daughter of Sylvia and Gilbert Castorena.

Elizabeth will represent Muleshoe when she competes in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal Regional Spelling Bee at Cavazos Junior High School on April 1. The first runner-up in the Muleshoe spelling bee was Kamal Bhakta. Bhakta, who is the son of D.I. and M.D. Bhakta of Muleshoe, will represent Muleshoe at the regional bee in the event that Elizabeth cannot attend. A total of 11 students in grades 3rd to 7th competed in the spelling bee.

Hard work and long hours of studying paid off for Elizabeth. She said she began preparing for the spelling bee when she got her spelling book about a month ago.

"I was nervous because a lot of kids were older than me,"

she said. "I consider myself an "okay" reader. I joined the spelling bee though, because I wanted to do something."

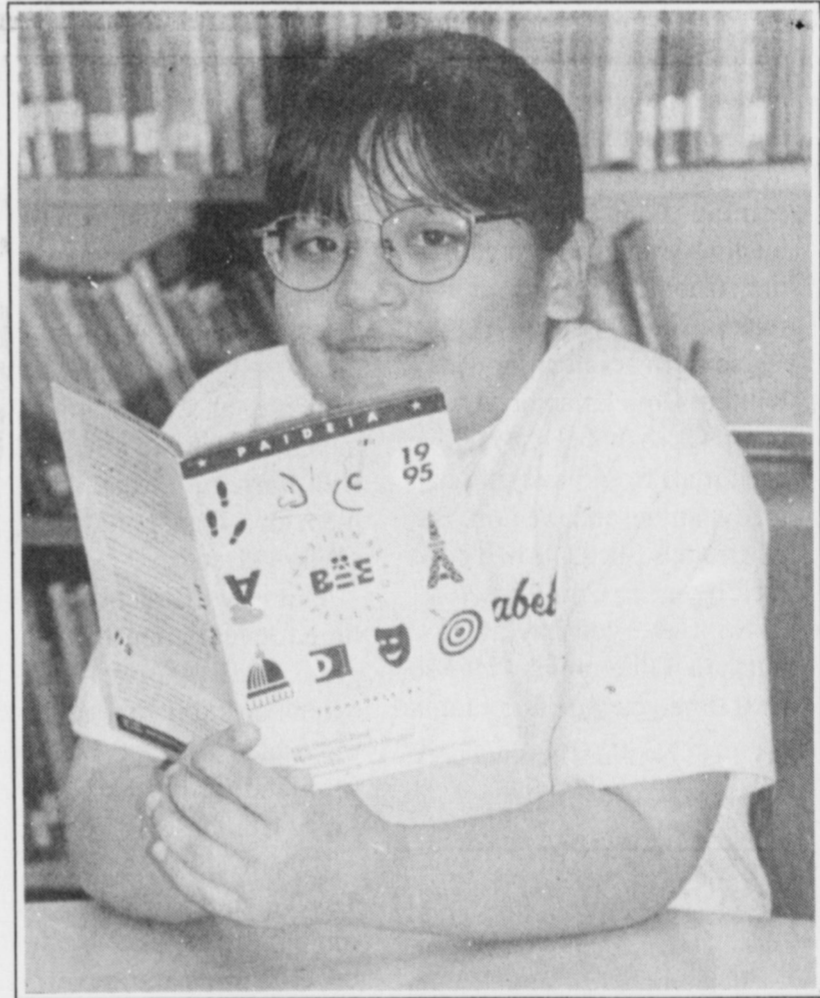
Elizabeth is used to performing well in spelling though, she said she usually gets "A" in spelling.

rage across the street, on the westside of DeShazo Elementary School.

That jail was used until the Bailey County Courthouse

was completed in 1925. The jail was then moved to the third floor of the courthouse. When the law enforcement center was built next to the courthouse in 1969, the Bailey County Jail was then moved into that building. So Bailey County has actually had three different jails.

Hicks also talked about ways the county jail has

changed over time, mainly by its capacity. The Bailey County Jail could once hold up to 46 prisoners. But because of tighter regulations today, their capacity is now only 22.

Sid Felan, juvenile probation officer, along with other staff member, talked to the students about law enforcement and juvenile probation and introduced probation officers. Entertainment was provided by Tina Davis, who sang, "Texas, Our Texas" and by Nicole Felan, who sang and lead students in a melody of Texas songs.

Transportation study of West Texas is expanded

A study of transportation needs in West Texas was expanded this past week by the Texas Transportation Commission to include the Texas Panhandle.

Commissioners voted to amend the study to consider transportation needs from Interstate 27 in Amarillo to the state line. The original study, approved by the commission in January, focused on the area between Lubbock and Interstate 10.

"With the increased transportation needs that will result from the North American Free Trade Agreement, we need to determine how well the current system will handle travel demands and what improvements we need to make," said Bill Burnett, Texas Department of Transportation executive director.

"This is an efficient and well-timed development to my congressionally-approved I-27 extension study that invisions the added plus of I-27 both south and north," said U.S. Rep. Larry Combest (R-Texas).

"I am always glad to see Texans take a good idea and run with it, especially when it benefits trade and travel."

The first phase of the study will be to evaluate corridors in West Texas and determine if a freeway is feasible.

If a freeway is not feasible, each of the corridors will be analyzed to determine what improvements are necessary

to enhance rural mobility in the area and complement the Texas Trunk System.

The transportation commission authorized \$1.8 million for the original study. The expanded scope is expected to add about \$500,000 to the cost.

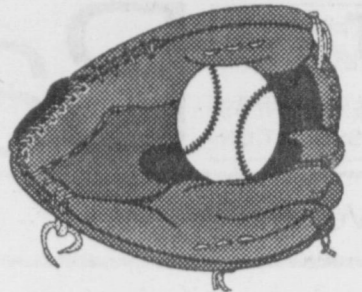

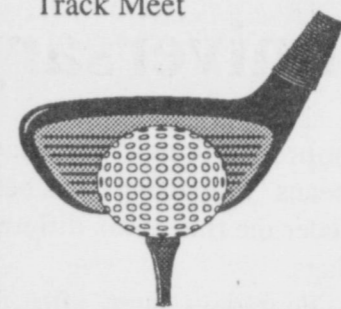

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Muleshoe woman's recipe is published in book

Featured in a country cooking cookbook is Mary Alice Ramm of Muleshoe. Ramm's family favorite, "Apricot Coffee Cake" can be found on page 54 of the *Cookin' Up Country Breakfasts* cookbook, a book being published on a national basis.

Ramm said she and her daughter came across the recipe back in the 1970s. She is not sure exactly where she found it but said the apricot coffee cake has grown to be a family favorite.

"The apricot coffee cake has gotten to where my family likes it so well that for any special occasion, I make one up. It is just not Christmas at our home without apricot coffee cake," Ramm said.

Ramm does a lot of cooking, but this is the first time one of her recipes has been accepted for publication.

To anyone thinking about whipping up this family favorite, Ramm advises "use tart apricots."

She also says, "It is a good day's project so don't plan on going anywhere if you are going to make it." But judging by the reaction from her family, the recipe is probably worth the effort. A copy of Ramm's apricot coffee cake can be found below.

The *Cookin' Up Country Breakfasts* cookbook contains hundreds of the country's greatest cook's recipes, as they share some of the best break-

fast recipes around. More than 300 recipes and photos are featured in the cookbook.

All of the recipes in this cookbook have been kitchen-tested and family-approved. Each dish can be made with practical ingredients likely already found in every kitchen.

Apricot Coffee Cake

1 pkg. (1/4 oz.) active dry yeast
1/4 cup warm water (110 to 115 degrees)
3/4 cup warm milk (110 to 115 degrees)
1 egg
1/2 cup butter or margarine, softened
4 to 4-1/2 cups all-purpose flour
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt

Apricot filling

12 ozs. dried apricots
3/4 cup water
3/4 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon

Glaze

1/2 cup confectioners' sugar
1-2 teaspoons milk
1/2 teaspoon butter or margarine, softened
1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

In a large mixing bowl, dissolve yeast in warm water. Add warm milk, egg and butter, mix. Add 2-1/2 cups flour, sugar and salt, beat until smooth. Add enough remaining flour to form a soft dough.

Turn onto a floured board, knead until smooth and elastic, about 6-8 minutes. Place in a greased bowl, turning once to grease top. Cover and let rise in a warm place until doubled, about an hour.



WHAT'S COOKIN' - Maybe Mary Ramm of Muleshoe has the answer to the question "What's cookin'?" One of her recipes has been included in the *Cookin' Up Country Breakfasts* cookbook

For filling, combine apricots and water in a saucepan, cover and simmer for 30 minutes. Cool 10 minutes. Pour into a blender, process at high speed until smooth.

Stir in sugar and cinnamon, set aside. Punch dough down. Divide in half and roll each half into a 15 inch by 12 inch rectangle. Place on a greased baking sheet. Spread half of the filling in a 15 inch by four inch strip down center of dough.

With a sharp knife, cut dough on each side of apricot filling into one-inch wide strips. Fold strips alternately across filling to give braided effect. Repeat with re-

maining dough and filling. Cover and let rise until doubled, about 30 minutes.

Bake at 375 degrees for 20 minutes or until golden brown. Cool on wire racks for 15 min-

utes. Combine glaze ingredients, drizzle over warm coffee cakes. Serve warm or allow to cook completely.

Yield - 2 coffee cakes.

A discussion on No Pass/No Play and non-school sponsored activities will be held and the board will receive policy update information.

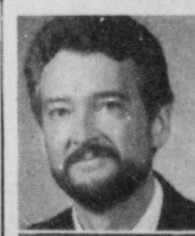

The Lord's Supper Is a Beautiful Testimony to Unity

One of the most beautiful testimonies to the unity Christians share in Christ is communion, the Lord's Supper.

Those who first heard the Lord say, "I tell you the truth, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you have no life in you"

(John 6:53) were shocked. What was this gruesome talk of eating his body and quaffing his blood?

In many ways, his statement is still perplexing. But we do well to remember, as C.S. Lewis writes, that the command, after all, was, "Take, eat: not Take, understand," for there is meaning and mystery here we will never fully understand. Still, we ponder it.

Some commentators deny that there is any reference in Jesus' words in John 6 to the Lord's Supper at all. They worry about making the holy meal a kind of magical thing in which the elements themselves hold power to impart life.

Obviously, those who heard

Jesus' statement that day knew nothing of the Lord's Supper. They probably understood him to be speaking in a metaphorical sense telling his followers to completely fill themselves with his teaching, his way.

But we can be equally sure that the first-century Christians to whom John was writing, and John himself as he wrote, and I think, the Lord himself as he spoke, also had in mind the beautiful Christian feast, the Lord's Supper.

And so today in communion we eat his body and drink his blood and share in his life. And I think all Christians agree that however we view the elements, apart from the faith of those who receive them, they mean much less than they should. But, received in faith, the meal becomes much more than a mere physical symbol, much more than just a reminder of an important historical event long past.

As William Barclay writes, when we sit at the table eating the broken bread and drinking the poured-out wine we are somehow in the grace of God brought into living contact with the love and the life of Jesus Christ. And all who meet at his table are one in his love, one body indeed.



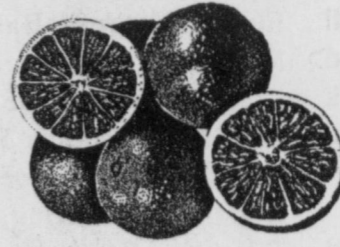

Children will be selling items until March 10. On March 10, all forms need to be returned to homeroom teachers. During the week of March 20-24, the children will distribute their orders and collect the money.

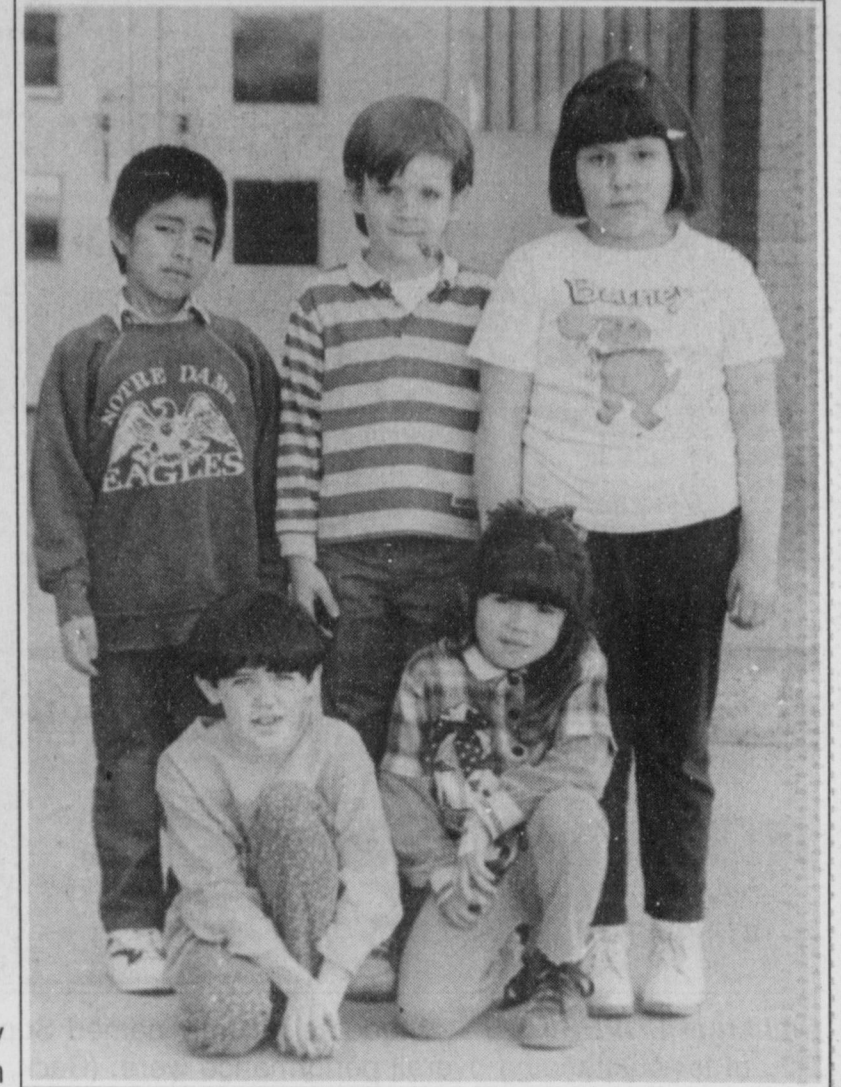
After the children turn in the money the children will be awarded their prizes. Each child who sells at least one item will receive a prize.

Furniture company recalls side rail cribs because of potential danger

WASHINGTON, D.C. - In cooperation with the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC), Okla Homer Smith Furniture Manufacturing Company of Fort Smith, Ark., is recalling, replacing, and providing retrofit kits for drop side rails that have missing or loose slats on certain models of its cribs. A child's head can get caught in the loose or missing slats, presenting an entrapment hazard.

In September, 1993 a child died in an Okla Homer Smith crib with a missing slat that was used in a homeless shelter. The company has received additional complaints of loose or missing slats, a few of which have resulted in minor injuries (scratches and bruises) to children.

The following models of cribs manufactured between April 1992 and December 1993 may have missing or loose side rail slats: 30562, 80005, 80007, 80010, 80012, 80023, 80029, 80035, 80038, 80054, 80056, 80057, 80068, 80090.

Consumers should check the bottom of the crib headboard below the mattress for the model number and manufacture date. Owners of cribs with the above models should check the drop side rail slats to make sure the slats are secure. If the rail slats are missing or feel very loose, consumers should contact the company to arrange for a free drop side replacement or retrofit kit.

Do not use a crib with

missing slats!

Consumers owning cribs subject to this recall are urged to call the company for a free retrofit kit to make sure the slats remain secure.
