

### Small Town Story

Everyone is fascinated by a success story. Making good against odds is inspiring. America became a great nation because it was a land of opportunity and the right of the individual to make the most of those opportunities was protected.

Buchanan, Georgia, after World War II was about as near destitute as any community could be and still not become a ghost town. With a population of about 500 it lay in a declining cotton area. Young folks were leaving to seek work elsewhere.

At the end of the war a couple of veterans who lived in Buchanon decided to do something about the situation. They enlisted the support of townspeople to build a factory. Then they interested a large shirt manufacturing concern in leasing the factory. The result was the town literally lifted itself by its boot straps out of oblivion.

Hundreds of local people were employed in the factory. Within a year there was money to pave the court house square, build a new Baptist church, a movie theater, a new drug store and a dry cleaning plant. A baseball club was formed. Young people stopped migrating to cities.

The story of Buchanan, Georgia, is significant for two reasons. First it shows that this country is still a land of opportunity, and secondly it shows that local problems can be solved without subsidies or handouts. We need more Buchanans.

### A Step Forward

How would you like to pay off a big bill AND make a profit? Charles E. Wilson, former Defense Mobilizer, thinks you as a citizen can do it. For \$27 billion, U. S. citizens could buy all government-owned enterprises. Wilson's idea, very simply, is this: convert governmentowned enterprises into stock companies and sell them to holders of government bonds.

Wilson claims his proposal has six great things in its

(1) Reduce the national debt by 10%. (2) Reduce interest on debt by around \$750 million a year. (3) Produce a large annual tax yield from properties which now require taxes to support them. (4) Give more people an actual share in U. S. production, and added security from income. (5) Break the trend toward socialistic public ownership. (6) Slow up the drive of burequcrats for more Big Government.

"Our national debt today is approaching \$270 billion. Suppose we cut that by about 10%. This saving is not the main purpose, though the sum involved is considerable." Wilson says.

The real purpose, he said, was to let all Americans buy shares in America. Make them stockholders in the true sense instead of forcing them as taxpayers to finance undertakings beyond their choice and control. The public power and water projects, and all other government business enterprises he graved should be sold to the people who own government bonds. Bonds would be exchanged for shares of stock in the new companies to spring from plants now owned by the government.

The Council of State Chambers of Commerce in Washington, D. C., has released a statement advocating that the government turn over to private enterprise all those businesses which the government has handled with indifferent success, not excepting the Post Office. Congress has already approved appraisal and sale to private industry of 26 government-owned synthetic rubber plants.

### Part Of The Scene

There was a time when the word "corporation" brought up visions of mysterious accumulations of wealth and dubious financial machinations.

This is a picture which the enemies of free enterprise and representative government within and without this country are still trying to keep alive. But that effort, happily, seems doomed to abysmal failure and for excellent

One of these reasons is that corporations of all kinds and sizes now employ most of the working populationand employ them at wages and under working conditions which are the envy of the rest of the world.

Another reason is that corporations provide us with an almost endless list of goods and services which are responsible for our unprecedented living standards, supply them at prices within the means of the average family, and earn in return a very modest profit for the owners. Nowadays it is commonplace for a corporation's taxes to total a far large sum than is paid in dividends to the shareholders.

Still another reason is that there has been a gratifying increase in the number of those shareholders in late years - and it hasn't been made up of the "bloated plutocrats" who were a favorite target of the cartoonists of a bygone era. It has been made up of people with average incomes and ordinary jobs, who invest some of their savings in corporation stock - just as they invest In real estate, bank accounts, life insurance policies, government bonds, or other property.

The corporation is a permanent and necessary part of

the American scene.



#### BETTER JOBS

**Enslaving Mankind By** The Way Of Licenses

Very few people realize how far the various subdivisions of the United States Government have gone in enslaving mankind by the practice of not permitting a man trade or profession without a li cense from the state, county or

Some states have gone much farther than others. California is probably one of the worst states in the union in taking way from individual men their God-given right to use their initiative with out the consent of some state or county or city bureaucrat. While other states probably have not gone as far as California, they undoubtedly will as soon as the bureaucrats get enough power unless checked by public opinion.

In California a man cannot get a license to enter the contracting business without having first worked four years as an apprentice and having three other contractors endorse him. The claim of contractors is of course that this is necessary in order to protect the public. It would be much better to let any individual hire any contractor he wanted to without any interference from the state and then require the owner of the premise to post whether or not there is any insurance carried on the building to cover liabilities of a collapse or defects. Then if anyone wanted to enter the building at his own risk, he would have a perfect right to do so. The cost of insurance would make the builder and the owner be careful to build the property so that there would be no more risk than there is when the state determines who is qualified to build. And thus would be much cheaper than reducing competition and supporting all these bureaucratic inspectors in non productive jobs. The license practice has gone so

far in California that even a paint er can't be a paint contractor without having worked four years as an apprentice and having the recommendation of three competing contractors and a license from isting contractors because they know that it will just mean more any great harm to any individual who might come onto the property. Of course, this practice of licensing keeps the costs up.

Most people believe that no one should practice medicine without the consent of the state. The doctors of course spread the theory that they do not want to reduce competition but they are just mighty interested that no man practice medicine who doesn't agree with them. They are really in an embarrassing position. We do not give the newspaper publishers credit for there being no license required to publish a newspaper. Thank God the amendment to the Constitution of the United States made it so that newspapers cannot run to the state to reduce competition.


And a newspaper can undoubtedly do more harm than a leacher or preacher or doctor or a lawyer or a contractor or a plumber or painter. Yet we recognize that would do more harm to give the state the power to issue a license to publish a newspaper, magazine or book than the harm that can be done by letting every man enter the publishing business
