After A Day With Daisy . . . Hank Gives With Interesting Statistics About Champion Cow

SEATTLE — I spent all day yesterday with a cow. Yes, I'm in my right mind. Yes, I know that men in their right minds do not usually spend an entire day with a cow, a cow being, day in and day out, one of the Lord's most unenlightened creatures.

Cows don't read, don't go to shows, don't care about baseball or football, and few, if any of them, are interested in politics or the associated arts. Save for the astronomy-minded one who jumped over the moon, I can't recall a cow who was interested in the activities that fascinate men.

But the cow I visited is a different sort of cow. Her name is Carnation Homestead Daisy Madcap, and right now she is chewing her cud and switching her tail on the top of the cow world. If a Cow Coronation were to be held in June in London, or in any other city of the world, Daisy would wind up on the throne wearing the crown in her black and white Holstein head.

Daisy is better at doing what cows are supposed to do than any other cow on earth. She proved this by smashing all records for the production of milk and butter fat between the dates of January 15, 1952, and January 15, 1953.

During this period Daisy produced 36,414 pounds of milk. That's a lot of milk, but I didn't realize how much it was until I got it translated into something I could understand like pints and quarts. All by her lonesome and without any special training, Daisy filled 16,987 quart milk bottles.

Try to stack those on your porch sometime. Daisy's milk wasn't the kind you drink when you're on a diet, either. Those 36,414 pounds contained 1,311 pounds of butter fat, another world's record. If the Carnation folk had been of a mind to, they could have turned Daisy's butter fat into 1,890 pounds of table butter, or enough to butter enough slices of bread to shingle the White House, the Capitol, half of Washington's Monument, and still leave plenty for breakfast for a family of twelve.

*** EDSON IN WASHINGTON ***
No Drastic Changes In Offing Is Secretary Benson's Word

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — Don't anticipate any sweeping changes in the Department of Agriculture immediately. This is the word from new Secretary Ezra Tamm Benson himself.

In spite of the fact that Secretary Benson was the first of the Eisenhower cabinet officers to announce reorganization in his department, he isn't making any other sensational moves right away.

"Now is the time for deliberation, not haste," he says. His immediate staff has been holding two night meetings since they took office. They have been studying the responsibilities of the department and the spirit and the intent of Congress in the laws governing its operations.

The new secretary hopes he can emphasize freedom of action on the part of the farmers. He hopes he can maintain a high level of well-being on the part of the American people. He hopes for close relations with Congress, and that its policies will be his policies. He hopes these policies can be established without political bias. He would like to see the taxpayers some money saved.

If the budget is going to be balanced, there will have to be some savings. "With God's help," he says, "we'll give it everything we have."

This broad outline of Secretary Benson's approach to his new job was given in his first meeting with Washington reporters. He was the first of the cabinet members, incidentally, to hold a press conference. "I'm sure there will be many things on which we will differ," he said, "but I hope you will never doubt my sincerity."

Kindness and good intent mark almost everything said by this Mormon apostle who has now become head of what his own first press release called a "huge, swollen bureaucracy." In a natty blue pin-stripe suit, he doesn't look at all like a farmer, completely free enterprise economy and price supports at the same time.

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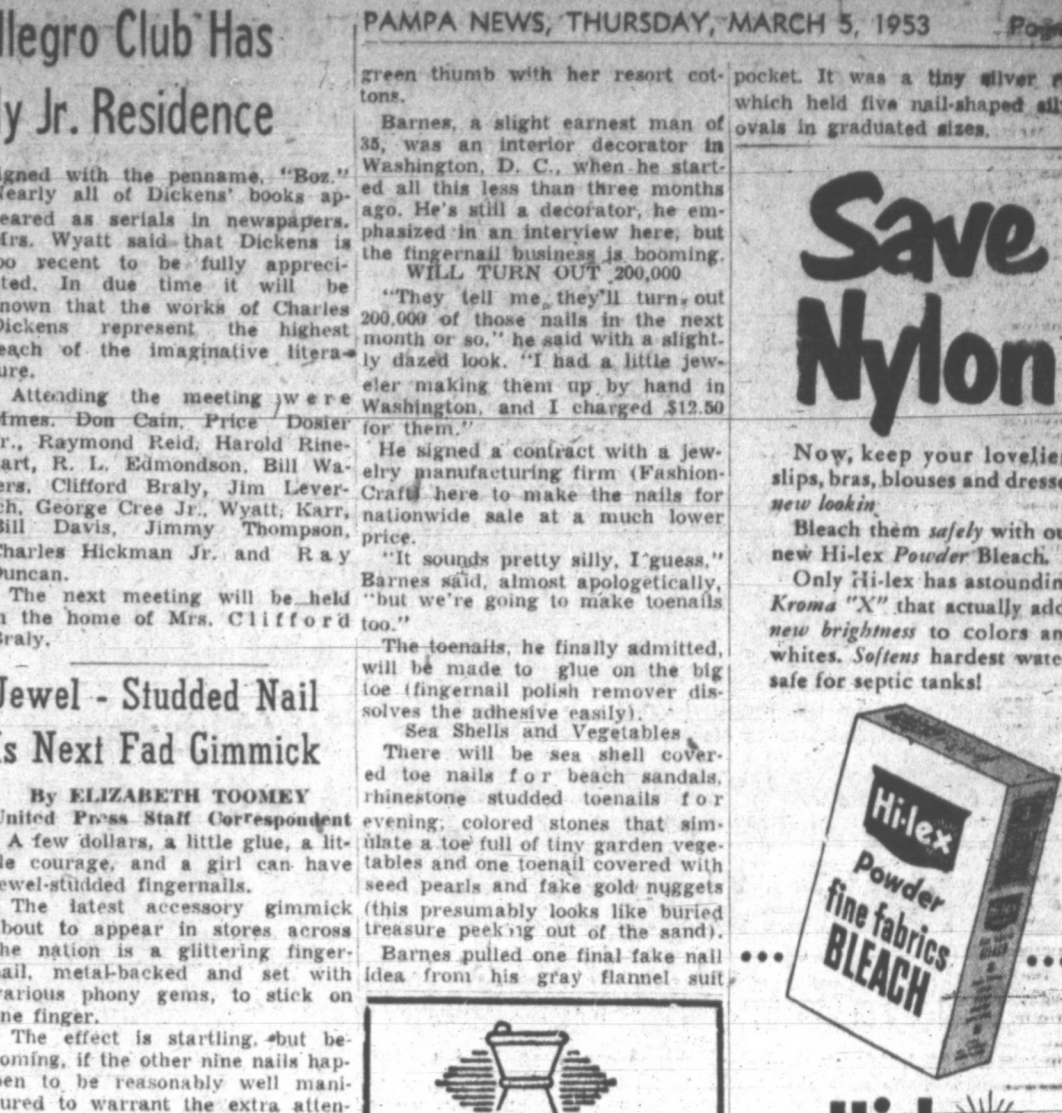

Good Garlic Salad Dressing: 2 1/2 cup salad oil (not olive oil), 1/2 cup evaporated milk, 2 tablespoons vinegar, 1 small clove garlic, 1/2 teaspoon salt.

1-18 teaspoon pepper. Measure ingredients for dressing into a jar that holds at least a half pint. Cover tightly and shake vigorously for about a minute. Chill thoroughly. Before using, remove garlic clove. Makes about 2-3 cup of dressing.

"Peace, ain't it wonderful?" yelled the angels on the dock.

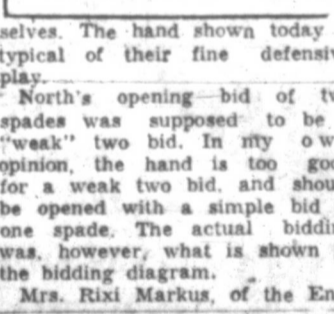

Kerbawy And Froberg Testify In Football Anti-Trust Suit

PHILADELPHIA, March 5.—UP—Nick Kerbawy, general manager of the Detroit Lions, and Milward "Frosty" Froberg, business manager of the Cleveland Browns, will testify for the defense Thursday in the government's anti-trust suit against the National Football League and 12 member teams.

The witnesses are expected to maintain that unlimited television would hurt their gate receipts, the basic point taken by other NFL executives who have preceded them on the stand.

The NFL and its member clubs are on trial for allegedly violating the Sherman Anti-Trust Law by restricting the televising and broad-

casting of games. Trial is being heard without a jury by U. S. district Judge Allan K. Grim.

George Preston Marshall, owner of the Washington Redskins, testified Wednesday that if the league's blackout policies were wiped out professional football "no longer will be a sport."

Marshall said unlimited television would cause the pro grid game to "deteriorate into a commercial enterprise."

He claimed radio and TV stations, and not the fans, complained about the league rule which forbids telecasts within a 75-mile area of the city where a game is being played.

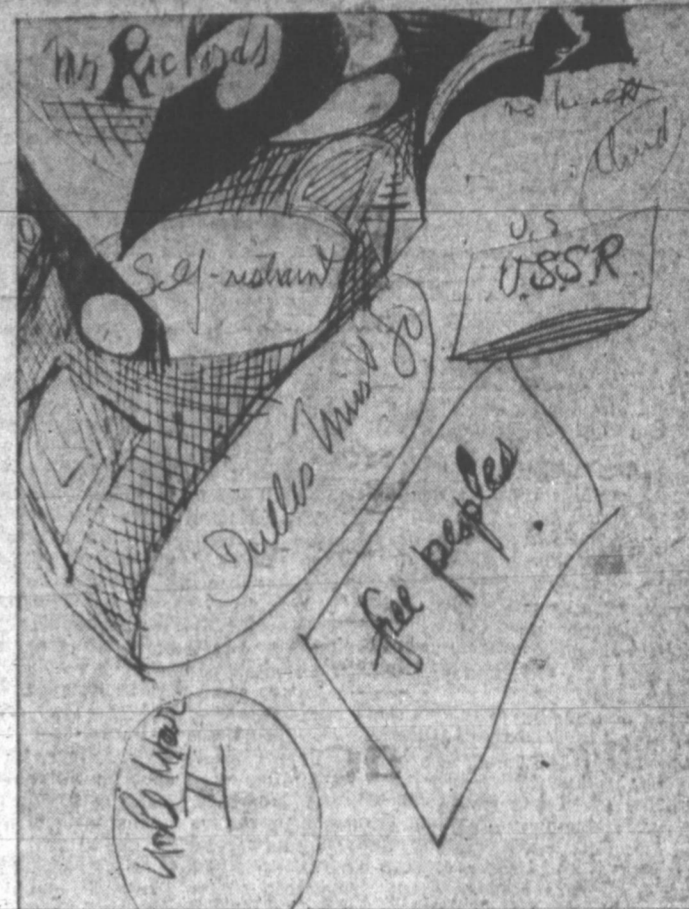

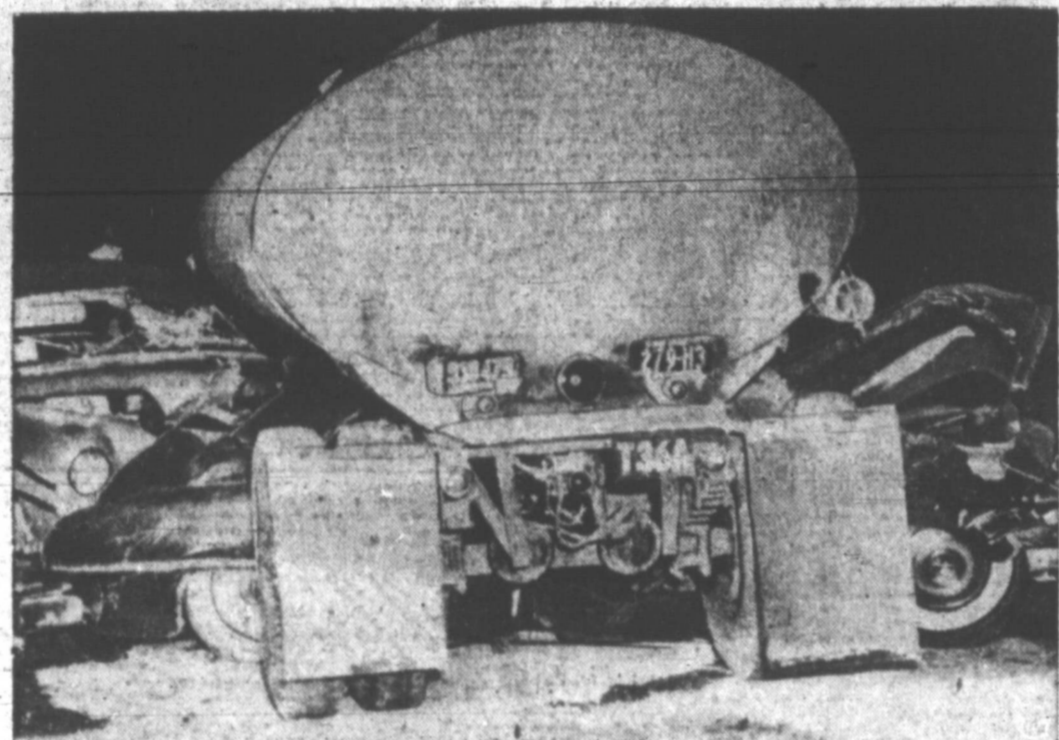

'Mr. Attack' Korea Bound

WASHINGTON (NEA)—Mr. Attack is going into battle again. That's the Army nickname Gen. Maxwell Davenport Taylor will take with him in his new role of 8th Army Commander, succeeding Gen. James A. Van Fleet as boss of ground forces in Korea.

General Taylor, who was Deputy Chief of Staff when he was tagged for his new job, started his Army career with a more scholarly label. The West Point yearbook called him "one of the most learned members of his class."

These two descriptions of Taylor very neatly frame the man. Few men in the history of any U.S. service can match both his combat record and diplomatic and administrative accomplishments.

On the battlefields his deeds include exploits with the 82nd Airborne Division and command of the 101st Airborne in World War II. On Normandy D-Day he was the first Allied general to hit the mainland of Europe.

He also performed one of the vital military-diplomatic missions of that war—dropping into enemy territory to help negotiate the surrender of Italy.

Off the battlefield, General Taylor is responsible, among other things, for a major revision of the curriculum of West Point, putting more stress on such subjects as economics, history and political science.

The cadets should not live in a mental cloister; their interests must be catholic, avoiding the small horizons sometimes attributed to the military mind," he says.

Taylor became superintendent of the Academy in 1945, at the age of 44. Only Gen. Douglas MacArthur, at 39, has been a younger head of that school.

Another major decision he made at the Point was the start of the de-emphasis of football, with the ending of games with Notre Dame.

"Football has been a distracting influence which pulled us away from our major objectives," he stated. This attitude was expressed at a time when other leading educators in the U.S. were saying the same thing.

Today, it is hard to reckon his important new assignment with the first fleeting impression you get as you meet him. He looks far too youthful and mild for all that responsibility. Compared to his lean, unlined face and placid blue eyes, his graying hair seems premature.

But you don't have to be around him long to understand the "Mr. Attack" nickname. He talks in a well-modulated voice but he's far ahead of you in any subject that comes up.

His secretary reports that it took her a couple of months of practice to get her shorthand up to the speed of his dictation. "You'd think he wrote out all of his letters in advance and then memorized them before he gave

them to you," she says. With troops, or in an office, he gets the maximum out of his help with an easy-going manner and a minimum of orders.

Discussing physical training at West Point, he is fond of saying, "A brilliant mind is of little value in war if it is not housed in a vigorous body." He lives by this rule, too.

Most Saturday afternoons in the officers' club gym adjoining the Pentagon he could be found beating all comers in handball and squash. He's a flashy tennis player and loves hiking.

The General and his wife have always been conservative in their social life, keeping their outside activities at a minimum. He does not smoke, and drinks little.

He reads a great deal and has mastered four different languages including Japanese. He's also one of the few top generals who delivers an informative, interesting speech.

General Taylor's awards and decorations include everything the U.S. Army has to offer except the Medal of Honor. He has numerous foreign decorations plus an honorary Doctor of Engineering Degree from New York University.

In the opinion of the experts, Taylor's job of commanding U.S. troops in Berlin, calling for the maximum qualities of diplomacy and leadership, makes him perfectly suited for his new assignment.

The first textbook on bacteriology was written by a U.S. Army surgeon, Gen. George Miller Sternberg, in 1896.

Benson Has No 'Pet' Ideas;

WASHINGTON, Mar. 4—UP—Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson said Wednesday he has no "pet ideas" to sell and welcomes a "debate" on the advantage of flexible rather than rigidly high farm price support.

The secretary, who has taken a firm stand in favor of the flexible variety, said he is glad the issue is "out in the open."

He said he hopes he can "win over" some Congressmen and others who favor current fixed levels of price supports. If not, he said, "Maybe I will be won over. I'm not interested in pet ideas."

Asked in an interview if he would like to remain in his post if Congress extends current high price support after the 1954 expiration date, Benson said, "We'll have to wait and see." He said he hasn't "gone that far in my thinking."

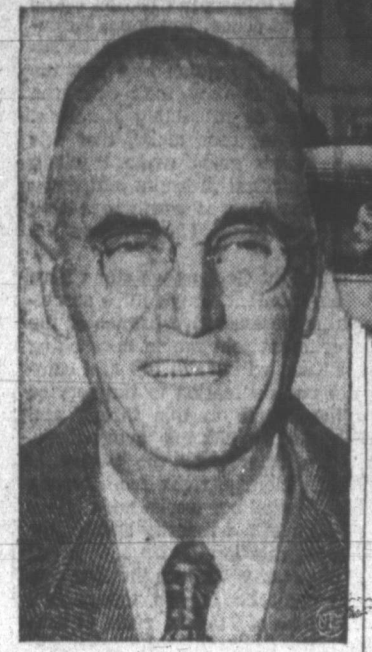
However, he said it is the "duty" of the Executive branch to carry out the "letter and spirit" of laws enacted by Congress. In the past, he said he thought the executive branch "went too far."

Benson thinks President Eisenhower wants people in his cabinet who are in sympathy with his own views—even though they may be in conflict with Congressional views.

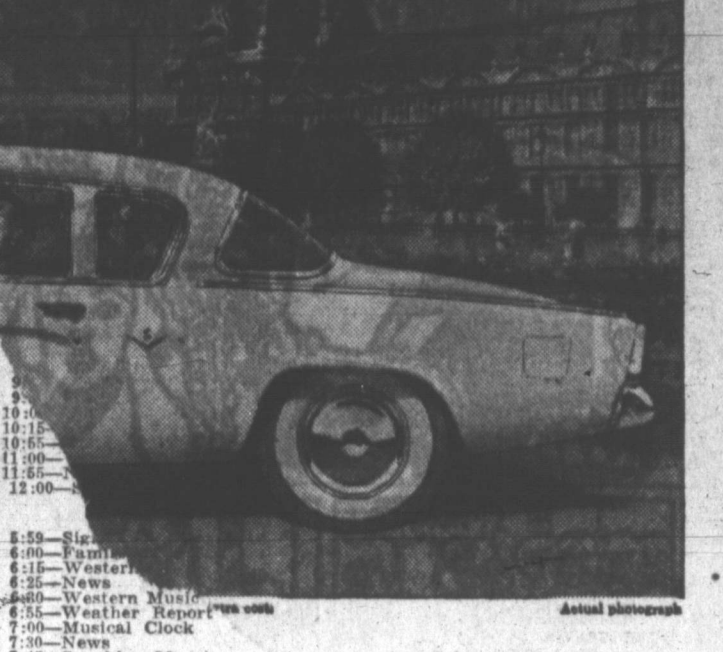
Nothing he has said, he reported, has been in conflict with Mr. Eisenhower's personal sentiments regarding farm policies. Benson said he thought some farm leaders "mis-read" the GOP campaign endorsement of farm prices at 100 per

cent of parity "in the m place" to mean federal price at that level.

Benson also said he is "ing" ways of putting the mechanism of carrying out price support programs in the hands of private industry.

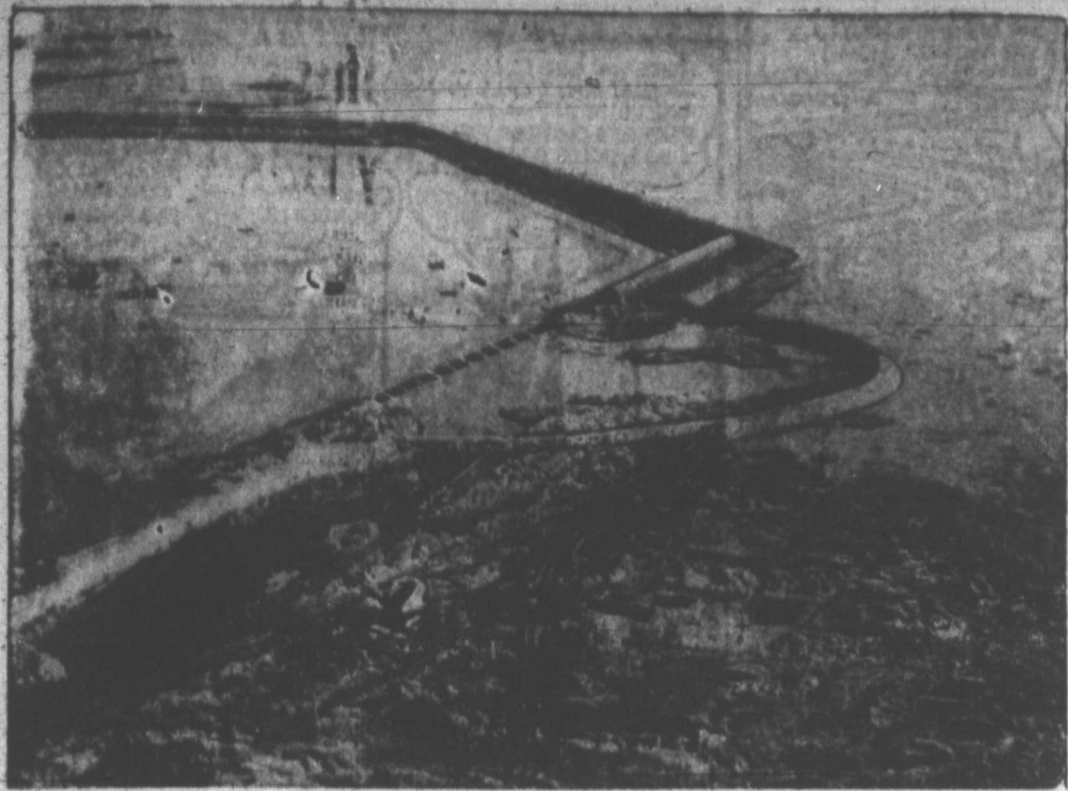

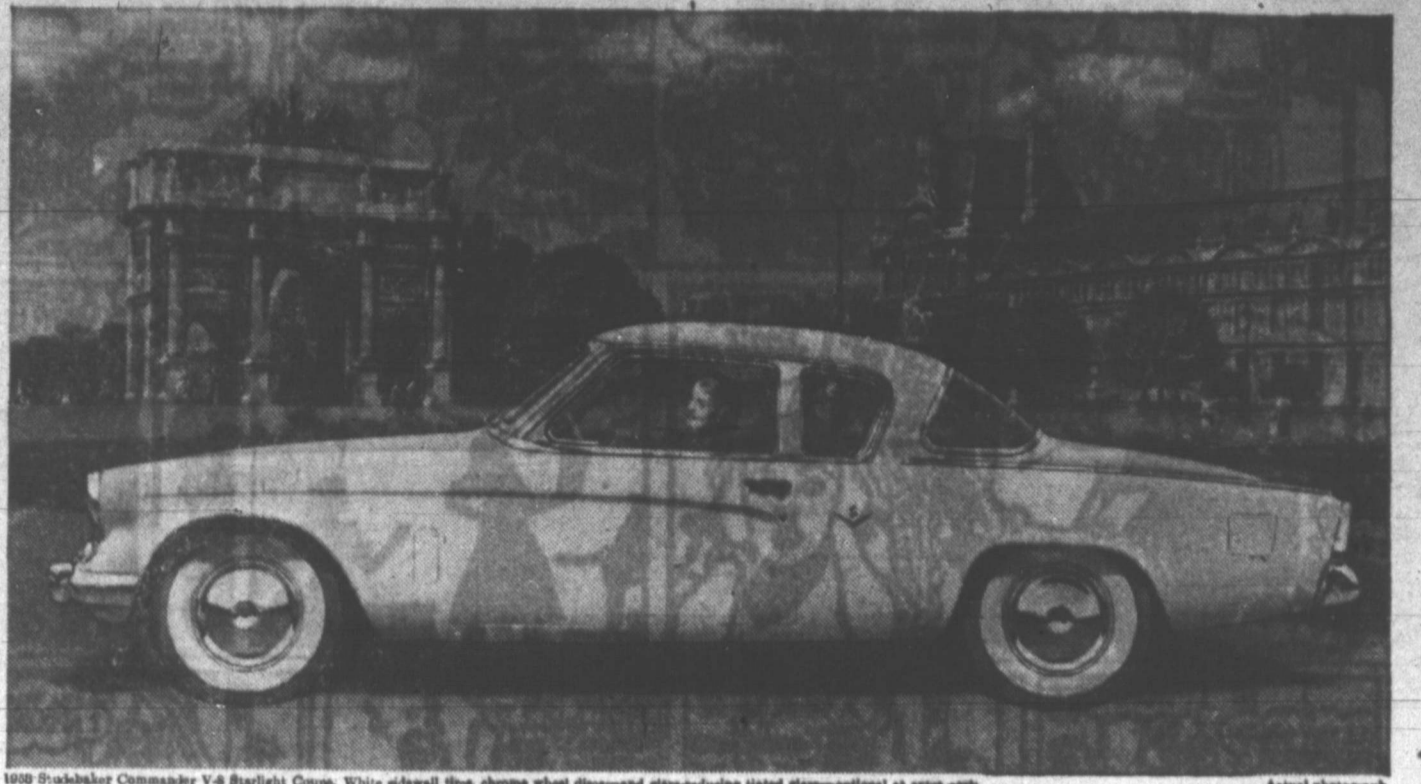

Youth Admits Taking Part In Assault

HOUSTON, Tex., March 5—UP—A 15-year-old youth who admitted taking part in the mass rape of a pretty 27-year-old blonde was being held Thursday while police pressed a search for his three companions. The youth admitted to police Wednesday that he was one of the four who kidnaped the woman as she walked to church, then raped her six times in a nearby wooded park. Lt. Alex Bartlingek of the Houston police crime prevention division said the 15-year-old youth had implicated another boy, whose name he didn't know. The woman, an insurance company clerk, was forced into a car as she walked to Lenten services early Monday morning. Four youths ripped off her clothing, assaulted her six times and left her naked in the park still clutching a prayer book. Pickup orders have been issued for two other men, one of them a 20-year-old ex-convict. Lt. Bartlingek said the youth

who admitted taking part in the attack said there was no previous plan to carry out the assault, that it took place "on the spur of the moment."

Stalin's Death, Illness Can Make Changes In Ike's Plans

WASHINGTON, March 5—UP—Dead or dying, Josef Stalin will interfere with major plans of the new Eisenhower administration and of the Republican majorities in Congress. Adjournment, tax and economy policies are affected. News of the stroke which partially paralyzed the Russian leader and struck him mute came as the Republicans were paring down the money to be spent in the next 16 months on national defense and foreign aid. The administration cannot be sure about that now pending developments in the Kremlin. Until Stalin's successor is known and his intentions become evident by his actions, President Eisenhower will have difficulty deciding how far his administration may go in cutting a spending program which, basically, is designed to resist Communism.

An economy slow-down is likely for a few months until some standards of Soviet Russia's conduct under new leadership are established. The man who succeeds Stalin may have more to say than our congressman on the subject of a reduction of government spending and of our taking any time soon. Unless the uncertainty in Moscow is cleared up one way or the other, it is likely that Congress will not attempt to wind up its 1953 business by the end of July. A special session in October would be probable

No Magic Food To Build Stars

CHICAGO, March 5—UP—The American Medical Association said Thursday there is no magic food guaranteed to make a star athlete. The AMA's council on foods and nutrition reported that feeding an athlete is basically just the same as feeding anybody else.

The same meat, milk, eggs, vegetables, fruits, enriched and whole grain breads and cereals that are fundamental to the health of every person are needed by the athlete, the council said in an article in the current AMA Journal.

But it said many present-day training table diets are regulated by "old wives' tales."

So long as proper, protective foods are eaten and weight is maintained at the desired level, the AMA said, such items as cakes, pies and gravies are not harmful to an athlete.

The article said it was a coach's responsibility to understand a player's eating habits and encourage him to like the variety of basic foods.

Practical eating schedules can be arranged for any sport, the AMA said. Reasonable amounts of food and fluids can be taken five or six hours before game time without ill effects, it said, and food should not be eaten for one to two hours following a game.

The article said there was no evidence to support the old idea that drinking a great amount of fluids during strenuous exercise was harmful.

ed. If there is something abruptly aggressive in the Kremlin works, its first signs would be expected to show in the current trouble spots when the new man takes over. The spots are Berlin, Korea, Indo-China and Malaya.

Any friendly gesture from the Kremlin could speed the cutting of defense costs and related spending here. But the administration would want the assurance of deeds rather than words as a guarantee of any change of heart in Moscow. Something really substantial, such as a reversal of the Communist position on exchange of prisoners in Korea, could start a re-orientation of world policies overnight.

October Congress Seen There is scant hope here for any such friendly gesture from the Kremlin. President Eisenhower and his advisers will be compelled by inability to forestall what comes next in the Soviet Union to adopt a wait-and-see policy on all fronts, probably including the economy front at home.

MUSKEGON, Mich., March 5—UP—Five year old Jimmy Harryman thought something ought to be done when he noticed his pet cat's fur was left damp when the feline cleaned itself with its tongue. So Jimmy popped Figaro, the cat, into the family's automatic laundry dryer. Some 45 minutes later Jimmy's mother rescued Figaro. The cat was still alive but the scorching tumble in the dryer had burned off most of its fur.

Sooners Told Modern Farming Can Step Up State's Income

By UNITED PRESS Not so long ago, the top brass at Oklahoma's Agricultural Experiment Station estimated state farmers could make an extra \$100 million a year if they would bring their farming up to date.

That would add quite a chunk of green to the \$700 million Oklahoma farmers made last year. Some folks might believe the experiment station boys are too optimistic. But they've got some pretty good facts to support their statements. An Oklahoma A&M extension division report just off the press does a good job of telling what's already been done.

For instance, wheat farmers are banking an extra \$25 million a year by growing varieties developed through the experiment station. By the same process, corn farmers are taking in an extra \$14.5 million.

Cotton Up \$18 Million Cotton farmers upped their profit \$18 million just by following State Cotton Station's advice on how to kill bugs.

Some of this advice came directly from the experiment station. Other parts of it came through 4-H clubs, FFA chapters, county agents and the like.

Regarding wheat, the extension division says 95 per cent of last year's acreage was planted to recommended varieties. Tests of several years show these new varieties have yielded an average of 2 to 3 bushels an acre. For a farmer with 100 acres of wheat, that means \$400 to \$600 extra cash.

Corn experts figure that crop's yield has been boosted 10 to 12 bushels an acre by using hybrid varieties. A little better than 70 per cent of the state's crop is now planted to hybrid seed. Use of fertilizer is also on the increase, and 100 bushel corn yields are getting more common every year.

Biggest Industry in State Here are a few more interesting facts on Oklahoma's agricultural empire, which, incidentally, brings the state more money than any other industry. Oklahoma now has soil testing laboratories in 70 of its 77 counties to help farmers know just what's best for his soil.

The state has 100,000 farm ponds providing water for livestock, irrigation, a haven for fish and wildlife, and, in some cases, an old-fashioned home-type swimming pool. Farmers are catching on to irrigation. There are about 95,000 acres of irrigated land in Oklahoma. Some of it is worth \$1,000 an acre. Before irrigation it was worth \$50 to \$100.

One of the big irrigation boom spots at present is the Panhandle. There are about 20,000 acres under irrigation there. The Altus area, of course, is the current leader in irrigation, but farmers are eyeing it everywhere. Electricity has made a big change in farming. Today, 17 of ever 20 Oklahoma farm families have electric lights. About 130,000 farms have electricity. All of which adds up that Oklahoma's farmers are going places.

Russians Delighted In Ruin, Young German Tells Rotary

Two stories — one of terror, the other of joyous excitement — were told Rotarians during their weekly meeting in the Palm Room, City Hall by Burkhard Brehm and Gretchen Johansen, German exchange students at Pampa High School.

Burkhard told Rotarians his family had to flee Russian Army terror at least three times before they made their way to West Germany from Saxony. At that time the borders were still open. When the Reds got into Germany during World War II they destroyed everything they could not use or didn't know how to use. Never entering houses or shops through doors, Burkhard said they seemed to get a pleasure out of kicking and breaking through windows. Inside a building they would tear up everything in sight; breaking radios because they did not know how to use them, tearing and ripping sheets, furniture, dishes, glassware and other household articles.

Fleeing from northeast Germany to Saxony and then into Czechoslovakia and then back to Saxony, Burkhard related his own family's three-room apartment at Saxony was virtually demolished. Glassware, dishes were strewn on the floor and broken into bits, sheets, linens, and other items were soiled or ruined and showed signs of being trampled by heavy hounded boots.

The Brehms managed to get out of the Russian sector of Germany and into the West where his father — a high school teacher — was given a school teaching job in the British zone.

Most of Burkhard's relatives live in East Prussia but an aunt, whose husband was a Nazi Party member, succeeded in moving into West Berlin recently. West Berlin, he said, is the only pipeline through which East German refugees can reach West Germany. Russian border guards will shoot on sight, using heavy machine guns. Guard stations are located so every inch of ground is under constant surveillance; bright lights keep the border well lit at night.

"The people of Germany are toiling under terrible conditions. And, I thought you might include them in your prayers tonight," Burkhard said closing.

Gretchen's portion of the program centered on her selection as an exchange student and her first impressions of America, and Texas.

She said she applied for the exchange program as soon as she heard about it because she likes to visit foreign countries and learn their languages. She has studied English for years, French, Latin, Italian and is now taking Spanish in High School here.

When interviewed she was told she would receive a letter telling her if she was selected. But, Gretchen couldn't wait. Instead of waiting for the letter, she telephoned the next day and learned she was one of the 200 students to be sent to America.

"I was so happy and so excited, I didn't know what to do," she said. Her parents, who live on a farm, hoped she would get to New York because an aunt and uncle who live there.

"When my letter came informing me I was to be sent to Texas, I was very surprised," she related.

Gretchen also told of the various programs for young people being held in Germany, built around international understanding and religion.

She said she had learned a lot while in Pampa both in school and out of school, adding that she was very thankful for the things Pampa people have had done for her and the things she had an

opportunity to see and learn. — Texas isn't near as wild as Gretchen was led to believe by seeing Western films in Germany, most of them centering around Texans toting "sixguns". She was surprised to learn most people in Pampa are fully decked out in western regalia only during rodeo time.

The two students were introduced by Aubrey Jones of the Kiwanis Club, the club sponsoring them here.

Jones, in introducing the two, said a group of foreign students from all over the world are being brought to Pampa on March 27 from Plainview. Plans for that occasion are still in the making and the details expected to be completed within the next 10 days.

Prior to the program, Ray Evans and Alvin Chapman, district Rotary governor, here for the district conference opening today in Borger, urged Rotarians to attend every meeting they could. Today's business in Borger will be all recreation and fellowship, getting acquainted, playing golf, etc.

Although the Pampa club has a 100 percent registration for the conference there was no way of determining how many Pampa men would attend the various events on the three-day program in Borger. Some may go over on the spur of the moment for one session or another.
