Premier Takes A Turn For Worst

MOSCOW, March 5 -UP- Stricken Premier Josef Stalin took another turn for the worse Thursday and the newspaper Pravda, in a rallying call to the Russian people, told them to unite behind their "experienced leadership." Stalin entered his fourth day of deep coma and his





MINIATURE CHINCHILLA-

A great many people are convinced that the best way to deal with the socialized power problem is to get the government out of the power business entirely. However, short of that, Secretary McKay's position marks a refreshing change from that of past top Interior officials - and especially those in the Reclamation Bureau, which has been the hub of a vicious campaign to villify, undermine and ultimately destroy the publiclyregulated, heavily-taxed investor-owned utilities, Reclamation, prior to January 20, was not at all concerned with how many tax dollars were wasted in its ideological war against free enterprise. To cite but one illustration, it was tireless in seeking appropriations for building transmission lines which would have duplicated the existing lines of private utilities - and so have resulted not only in an indefensible waste of money, but a waste of manpower and vast quantities of critical materials as well, not to mention injury to or destruction of private savings and property.

The utility industry has tried to cooperate with the government systems. In those cases where government agencies have also shown a cooperative attitude, both public power and private power have been sent over existing lines and delivered to commercial and household consumers at low rates which are determined by federal and state commissions.

We need a power policy which is in the interest of the whole country, not just a socialist clique in and out of government whose influence has been out of all proportion to its size or its public following:

A Definite Threat

Limitation of central authority is a basic principle of any self-governing people. In spite of this, we have had a trend toward greater central authority - more and more power vested in the federal government - for

One of the latest schemes to add power to the central government is contained in the report of the President's Commission on the Health Needs of the Nation. While this report praises the principle of local initiative, virtually every one of its recommendations, with regard to medical and hospital care, and health needs generally, would in the final analysis shift initiative, authority and responsibility from the community or state to the federal government. It proposes grants and subsidies to schools of medicine and allied health agencies to the tune of more than \$2,000,000,000. In spite of protestations to the contrary, it fosters the idea that the federal government should play a dominant role in the national over-all medical care planning because it has a propriatary interest in the nation's health.

We should consider carefully before accepting findings such as these. In 1913 state and local governments received two thirds of all revenue collected from taxes. Of late years the federal government has been taking three-fourths of all tax revenue. What sense is there in pauperizing the people by taxation and then "granting" doles to support them?

The one thing we should all remember today is that the more powerful and costly the central government becomes, the greater the threat to self-government. And without self-government it is idle to talk of progress in medical care or anything else. The tragic experience of people living under European dictatorships is conclusive on that score.

Medieval Touch

There is a medieval touch to the latest arrogance of Prime Minister Malan of the Union of South Africa.

Malan's Nationalist government whose forte appears to be race segregation and white supremacy legislation has proposed to the South Africa parliament a law that would subject any citizen who criticized any law to five years' imprisonment and 15 strokes of the lash.

If such a law existed in the United States the bastilles would be loaded with editors and their backs would resemble a checkerboard.

Suppression of news and oppression of news gathering agencies with the intent of curtailing information on maneuvers of law dispensing agencies and eliminating criticism of government's in power is the order of the day throughout the world in this era.

But outside the Iron Curtain, this is the crudest assault on human rights we've heard of in many a moon.


