The Right To Waste

You might say the Supreme Court of the United States has upheld the theory of "featherbedding" in its recent decisions involving practices of the musicians' union and the printers' union of the American Federation of Labor. But this is not precisely so.

What the court has done is to assert that the Taft-Hartley Act does not specifically forbid "featherbedding" in the issues under consideration; and therefore it is all right to force employers to pay for work not

The court's decision only adds color to the Alice-in-Wonderland labor-management world in which we live.

It emphasizes a startling idea - which wouldn't have been startling 20 years ago - that government and government legislation have no place in the world of work.

For those who are unfamiliar with the term, "featherbedding" is the term applied to a situation in which an employe is paid for work not done or done without necessity in a labor union operation.

A constitutional amendment was required in California not long ago to eliminate the employment of unnecessary trainmen on rail lines in the state.

And it would appear from the latest Supreme Court decree that it will be necessary to legislate specifically against each useless job, if we continue present labor-

Since such policies involving government intervention become more and more complex, it would appear that the reasonable action would be to untangle the skein by repealing all labor laws and permit labor and management to function under the general laws which apply to fraud

The case against government intervention does not rest exclusively upon constitutional rights. It is not necessary to raise the question of legal or illegal, good or bad, desirable or undesirable. The measures involved just do not produce the results adduced to them. When economic freedom is ignored, the government must add more and more decrees until it not only regiments every. phase of production but consumption as well. The system of coercive interference can only be maintained in a despotism which because of its rigidity must topple and smash like a rotten tree.

Right here we would like to point out that this conclusion is also held by no less a labor big-wig than John L. Lewis, chief of the United Mine Workers, who makes no bones about his position. He wants no labor control

It is his contention — and ours, too — that neither legislation regulating the relationship between workers

It is rarely we find ourselves in agreement with the glowering John L. But certainly this is one time we agree with his reasoning although we suspect that our motives are somewhat different.

John L. realizes that laws that can be turned to the special privilege of employes, can also be twisted to the special privilege of employers. And when it appears the shoe is about to be put on the wrong foot, he wants to get out of the deal.

It is our belief that labor laws work to the detriment of everyone and serve only to build up the power of government bureaucrats.

To return to the "featherbedding" issue it is an iniquitous waste which is leveled directly against the con-

In the court decisions, one of the cases involved the so-colled "bogus" rule of union printing shops. The rule states that publishers must pay printers for setting type for odvertising for which available matrices eliminate the need for new type-setting. Much national advertising copy is set once in a printing shop and replica matrices are distributed to newspapers. But the "bogus" rule in union shops requires it to be set anyway; and the type is subsequently thrown away.

It is impossible to see the justification for such proctices and the extra costs become charges against the advertiser or the newspaper subscriber.

The National Labor Relations Board takes a very conical stand on this practice. It maintains the policy of setting useless type is okay because the printers

actually work when they set type. This gives authority to a most unusual "right": the right to waste.

We have to agree with Sen, Jenner of Indiana in his emarks on Sen. Robert Taft. Sen. Jenner says that Taft is "rather naive" about Communists in education, Recently Taft remarked that he would not favor firing a Communist professor unless he was sure the professor

was teaching Communism to his students. Jenner, as chairman of the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee now investigating Communism in colleges, made his statement when asked to comment on Taft's

recent speech in Chicago.

Because Communism is an ideology, it is virtually impossible for a teacher to be a believer in Communism and not have it reflected in any teaching he does. In all but the pure sciences there are all sorts of opportunities, by inflection, by reference and by direct statement to beat the Communist drums, either for the Communist idea or against those who are opposing Communism:

Of course the avowed Communist is not the really dangerous person, for Americans instinctively reject those who come out in the open and say they are Communists. The really dangerous person is the one who Bity's that he is opposed to Communism and then espouses all at the facets of Communism in the name of "liberaliem" or "democracy."

"A Study In Conscience And Politics"

I want to quote further from a ook on Lord Acton or "A study in Conscience and Politics" written by Gertrude Himmelfarb and

In the last issue I pointed out that Lord Acton had contended that the first of many disasters to befall liberty occurred when Babylonia conquered Judah and freedom under divine authority made way for absolutism under human authorities. He also pointed out that Solon inaugurated a revolution in philosophy and politics when he introduced the idea of popular election, "the idea that a man ought to have a voice in and wisdom he is compelled to trust his fortune, his family and his life." Government by consent replaced government by force, and those who ruled were made responsible to those who obeyed.

The author of the book observes that Acton contended that:

"The experiment of Athens taught that democracy, the rule of the most numerous and most powerful class, was an evil of the same nature as monarchial absolutism and required restraints of the same sort: institutions to protect it against itself and a permanent source of law to prevent arbitrary revolutions of opinion. Men learned for the first time what later history was to confirm again and again: 'It is bad to be oppressed by a minority, but it is worse to be oppressed by a majority. For there is a reserve of latent power in the masses which, if it is called into play, the minority can seldom resist. But from the absolute will of an entire people there is no appeal, no redemption, no refuge but treason."

This same fact was pointed out by President Harding when he was President and adressed the Associated Press. He said we were gradually drifting towards a pure democracy and that no pure democracy lasted long. It would be well for those people who are interested in liberty and good government to recognize how rapidly we are drifting towards a pure democracy and to understand the end results of a pure democracy. Here is a remarkable statement

by this liberal Catholic. He said: "The growth of liberty, the great achievement of the Middle Ages, came not from the forests of Germany, as one theory had it, nor from the Christian Church itself, but from the conflict between the two."

Acton believed that most of our progress in securing liberty came religious organizations checking the authority and power of the state and the state checking the authority and power of the church. Civil Liberty Began in 1776

The author points out that Acton believed that:

"America made all previous attempts to capture the secret of liberty look like the futile grapplings of shadows. In the strictest sense the history of liberty dated from 1776, for 'never till then had men sought liberty knowing they sought." Acton decided that the Ameri-

can Revolution was the greatest Liberal event in the history of the world, that the idea of natural rights and natural law was the basic motif in the history of liberty, and that the abolution of slavery was a symptom and a symbol of moral emancipation."

Lord Acton did not believe that the upper classes had a monopoly. of political wisdom and virtue, or even sufficient wisdom and virtue to rule justly over the lower, "It is easier to find people fit to govern themselves than people fit to govern others. Every man is the best, the most responsible, judge of his own advantage."

A significant sidelight on present-day corporation financing accompanied the announcement that Secretary of Defense Wilson would sell his General Motors Stock almost 40,000 shares, with a market value of close

Some people feared that the disposal of so large a block might cause abnormal market disruptions. But this fear was at once shown to be groundless. The Secretary's stock holdings amounted to less than one-twentieth of one per cent of GM common stock outstanding. Some 2,500,000 shares of the stock were bought and sold on the exchange last year. It was obvious that Mr. Wilson's holdings could be handled in a routine fashion.

The day when one man or a small group of men could dominate representative "big business" through their ownership of securities is as much history as the horse and buggy. Once the number of people who awned stocks could be numbered in the thousands. Today the figure runs far into the millions. Once most shareowners were men of wealth and large affairs. Today most of them are people with average jobs and incomes. As the total of individual shareholders has increased, the average number of shares owned by each has di-

Share ownership, in other words, is now for the many, not for just the few. The United States is the stronger because of that fact.

Chart The Road

A recent Saturday Evening Post editorial began, "Of the 1,117 bills and resolutions dropped into the hopper of the House of Representatives on the opening day of the 83rd Congress, few are of more potential significance than an item identified as House Resolution 12." This resolution, introduced by Representative Coudert of New York, authorizes the House to conduct an inquiry and recommend to Congress ways and means by which commercial businesses now owned and operated by the government can be sold to private citizens, cooperatives, or corporations.

Going on, the Post said, "Some weeks before the election, Charles E. Wilson -- the former Defense Mobilizer, that is - proposed specifically that the country consider the possibility of 'selling our national dams, generating equipment and distribution facilities to the people.' Mr. Wilson suggested that the switch-over could be accomplished simply by authorizing holders of government obligations to exchange their bonds for stock in TVA, or what have you:

"This is a tempting idea . . . Mr. Wilson estimates the value of government-owned businesses at about £27,000,000,000. If they were sold, three things would appen. First, the debt itself would be reduced. Second, iterest payments on this much of the debt, some \$500,-000,000 per year, need no longer be paid. And third, these properties would yield taxes for federal and local

"The whole idea of desocializing is likely to become popular. In any event, there is nothing wrong with Mr. Coudert's proposal to make a study of the whole matter. The road away from socialism must be charted or it. will never be completed."

Endless discussion is now being given to the problems of debt reduction and tax reduction. How could a better start be made than by getting government out of debtbuilding, tax-eating commercial business?

Stockpiling Jobs

It has been announced that the President will not ask Congress for stand-by authority to reimpose price controls in the event a national emergency should occur after the present law expires. He believes that if such an emergency arises, Congress can quickly pass new laws to deal with it. However, a number of Congressmen still are urging that a stand-by bill be passed. .

Senator Bush of Connecticut offered an interesting Judgement on this when he characterized the stand-by law as a plan for "stockpiling bureaucrats." It is obvious that if the stand-by law were to have any meaning at all, some sort of an organization for putting it into effect and enforcing it would have to be maintained - and our huge public payroll would be that much larger.

Going beyond this phase of the matter, it is difficult to see how the stand-by plan can be justified. In these days of fast transportation and instant communication, Congress could assemble and vote new laws with little delay even if an emergency should appear when it was not in session. And it is one of the truisms of political life that when a law giving government great powers is in existence, even though dormant, many people

Price control has been a costly experiment for the producers, retailers, and consumers it was supposed to help. It is repugnant to every concept of economic, social and individual freedom. Its burial should be complete.

Printers' Union Wins Right To Waste Human Energy

The Supreme Court has ruled that the practice of the typographical union that requires the publisher, or really the subscribers of a newspaper, to pay the printers for doing work that the publisher does not want and does not use is not a violation of the Taft-Hartley law.

Evidently the Taft-Hartley law was not written concise enough to eliminate featherbedding. If resetting type that is not to be used in the newspaper is not feather-bedding, then nothing is featherbedding.

It seems that the technicality of the decision rested on the fact that the printers actually reset the work that was not wanted, instead of being paid for it without doing the work. In many cases printers that see the absurdity and the wickedness and the disservice to their fellowman to reset type that is not to be used make the employer pay them the equivalent of what it would take to reset it. This the Taft-Hartley law seems to outlaw, but it does not seem to outlaw, according to six of the nine Supreme Court judges, forcing the employer to pay for work that he does not want and does not use and that does not benefit his customers. Wicked To Waste

It is a moral law that it is wicked for any man, rich or poor, to waste, and the biggest waste in the world is the waste of human energy. There is no question but what doing work that no one wants and no one uses is a complete waste to society and lowers the standard of living of all people. It does this because the time and energy used in producing useless work could be used in producing other wealth that would make possible for everyone to have a higher standard of living. And this other wealth would be produced f it were not for government and labor unions interfering with an unhampered market for what men

The practice shows how unrealistic and how selfish and abstird labor union practices are. They seem to have no conception of what raises real wage levels. They seem to be only interested in a temporary gain for a privileged

Of course, when the cowardly publisher is intimidated and signs the printers' union contract that makes him a party to helping rob his customers and give them a poorer service than he could give them without such practices, he is doing it because he does not have the backbone or courage or the foresight to properly represent his customers. He should be, in reality, the agent for his customers, trying to give them as much as he can for their money. When he signs a contract that permits his employees to run up his costs by doing useless work, he is doing it under duress and the Taft-Hartley law was intended to give him a little backbone and make it easier for him to refuse to add to the price of his product the cost of paying for useless work.

In many of the smaller cities this practice is not enforced. It, however, is held over the head of the employer and if he says anything in the newspaper that the printers' union does not like, then the union compel him to pay for resetting what is called bogus type that is never used.

It is hard to conceive how any self-respecting worker would want to be paid for doing something that benefits no consumer, but only temporarily gives him a job at more wages than he could get without this bogus. If printers could get equal wages for equally difficult jobs, they would not want to enforce this bogus proposition. It is prima facie evidence that their wages are above wages of equal skill in other lines of

Resetting type that has already been used and is not wanted and not used is just as ridiculous and absurd as it would be for them to contend and to rule that no publisher dare print more than paper from the type they set and require the publisher to reset the type for every copy.

It is practices like these that help keep real wages down; If every other labor union compelled its workers to do work that was never used and never wanted, our production would be greatly reduced and thus our standard of living would be a lot lower than

Readers should scan their newspapers and their magazines and see whether they carry the printers' union label, advertising that they only employ union printers who insist on doing work that is of no benefit to any consumer. The public has a way of correcting this. If they would refuse to patronize newspapers and magazines that are a party to this exploitation of other workers, the publisher would get a little backbone and see that their first duty is to their customers. And they have no moral right to enter into conspiracy with their workers to help rob their customers by making them help pay for non-
