Oilmen Seek **Better Deals**'

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23-UP - The CIO and Americans for Democratic Action accused "greedy" oil interests Monday of seeking state control of the tidelands so they can make better deals for exploiting off - shore petroleum deposits.

Spokesmen for the two organizations said in testimony prepared for the Senate Interior committee the federal government should hold on to the submerged coastal lands and divide oil and gas revenues from them among all 48 states for aid to education

They specifically endorsed bills by Sen. Clinton P. Anderson (D-N.M.) and Sen. Lister Hill (D-Ala.) to continue federal control of the tidelands and earmark their revenues for schools.

John J. Gunther, representing the ADA, said the "oil lobby" is legislation to give the tidelands to the coastal states because "this powerful selfish interstate legislatures and state regulatory bodies.



Farm Price Decline

A problem of considerable magnitude appears to be developing in the farm sector of the U.S. economy as the result of the continuing weakness in commodity quotations. The general level of farm prices has receded some 15 per cent from the post-Korean high reached in Feb., 1951, and there is no indication as yet that the downward tendency has been checked. Declines in prices of wheat, corn, cotton and meat animals have been particularly steep, especially in recent months, and a number of key quotations are now at or below support levels. Since there has been no decline of corresponding extent in the prices of materials and services used by farmers in production and consumption, farm income and purchasing power have suffered, and farm leaders fear that this situation will grow worse.

There is no mystery about the basic causes of the downward pressure on prices. Larger crops abroad together with exchange difficulties, have sharply reduced foreign demand for American farm products. Wheat exports during the first-six months of the current marketing year, for example, were 30 per cent below those in the comparable period a year ago, while this decline in demand coincided with record form output in this country, it is not surprising that price weakness has de-

Congressmen are reported to be dissatisfied with the workings of the present farm program and are urging that new and additional support action be taken by the government in order to bolster sogging quotations. It has been suggested, for example, that the Commodity Credit Corporation be directed to discontinue all offerings of grain from its current stocks, even where spoilage is threatened, and that it be instructed to start buying substantial quantities of the major grains from country elevators. Sentiment is also known to exist for a greater use of subsidies to expand export markets. In addition, a bill has been introduced which would raise the statutory support level for basic commodities from 90 to 95 per cent of parity.

All these measures are aimed exclusively at pricemovements, not at the fundamental supply-demand, relationships that underlie them. Hence they revive the old question as to the adequacy of correctives aimed at symtoms instead of causes. Arbitrary price-raising devices compound rather than solve the basic problem, since their natural effect is to stimulate, not reduce, farm out-

The 'Mess' Story

As the new Administration buckles down to the big cleanup job in Washington, the public is learning more each day about what was meant by the presidential campaign phrase "the mess in Washington." The mess is busting out all over.

For example, Senator Joe McCarthy's (R-Wis.) investigating committee has dug up an alarming disclosure of negligent filing methods in the State Department. So loose were security provisions under the ineffable Dean Acheson that 300 to 400 persons could dip with ease into secret, classified files.

Among such privileged characters was John Stewart Service, suspected for years of tender feelings toward Stalin and recently bounced from State's employ as beina of doubtful loyalty.

Then, there is the Civil Service Commission. According to Senator John Williams (R-Del.), federal agencies for years have been a fire-and-rehire racket for favored employes, which has cost the taxpayers large sums. The SCS should have known about this, but didn't put a

There is also the revelation, affecting the Defense Department, that the armed forces are scandalously topheavy with big brass, like a comic-opera army.

By making himself a complete bore, Dr. Erickson argued, the dentist can distract the patient's attention from the pain of dental work. Talk about the old magazines in the waiting room, deliberately muff the punch line of an ancient anecdote, discuss in technical terms the relative merits of commercial mulches for rose bushes, and the patient, so the theory goes, will be in pain dire enough to act as counter-irritant to the ravishes of a dying nerve.

'Planning For Freedom"

If there is any man in the world who understands the causes of unemployment and what makes wage Freedom" he has a chapter on the German and British experience

"It is noteworthy to remember that British socialism was not an net of Mr. Winston Churchill.'

Then he says:

"Great Britain is to be called socialist country not because certain enterprises have been fornally expropriated and nationalized, but because all the economic activities of all citizens are subject to full control of the government and its agencies."

Under the heading of "Crises and Unemployment" he remarks:

"The same is true of all other types of meddling with the market phenomena. Minimum wage rates, whether decreed and enforced by the government or by labor union pressure and violence, result in mass unemployment prolonged year after year as soon as they try to raise wage rates about the height of the unhampered market. The attempts to lower interest rates by credit expansion generate, it is true, a period of booming business. But the prosperity thus created is only an artificial hothouse product and must inexorably lead to the slump and to the depression. People must pay heavily for the easy-money orgy of a few years of credit expansion and inflation.

"The recurrence of periods of depression and mass unemployment has discredited capitalism in the opinion of injudicious people. Yet these events are not the outcome of the operation of the free market. They are on the contrary the result of well-intentioned by ill - advised government interferwage rates and the general standard of living can be raised other than by accelerating the increase of capital as compared with population. The only means to raise wage rates permanently for all those seeking jobs and eager to earn wages is to raise the productivity of the industrial effort by increasing the per-head quota f capital invested. What makes ceed the wage rates of Europe and Asia is the fact that the American worker's toil and trouble is aided by more and better tools. Second, there are several good treatments for scables, but most of them may irritate the skin as well as kill the insect, so it is not wise to try them without direc-

But there are several preparations which contain sulfur, D.D.T., Rotenone, pyrethrum, benzobenzeate, or other chemicals which the insects causing scabies find most unpleasant. By means of one or more of these preparations scables can almost always be cured- and by the use of hygienic methods it can be prevented from spreading.

As said earlier, one of the most difficult problems is to avoid secendary infections of the skin from scratching or from the chemicals used.
