LAS VEGAS, Nev., June 4.—UP—The most powerful atomic bomb ever set off in the United States burst with the brilliance of a giant sun in the predawn darkness Thursday, lighting the western sky from Canada to Mexico and from the Golden Gate to Colorado.

The tremendous explosion, possibly two and one-half times as strong as the A-bombs of World War II, concluded the Atomic Energy commission's spring test series.

Farmers Asked For Report On Grain Acreage

Area farmers who have not reported wheat acreage and summer fallow for the year 1951-52 were urged today to do so immediately by production and marketing association officials in order to receive a fair share of the county allotment for 1954.

If no report is received, Miss Evelyn R. Mason, office manager, stated, the county PMA committee will have to estimate the wheat acreage for farms in computing the wheat allotment.

Allotments and quotas for 1954 are due to be proclaimed, Miss Mason pointed out, and it is necessary that farmers have a wheat allotment and seed within the allotment before they may sell their wheat.

The interim loan rate for Gray County has previously been set at \$2.20 per bushel less storage charges. Wheat loans will be made on this rate, Miss Mason said, until the final rate is received after July 1.

Many producers in the county will collect a total loss from the government wheat crop insurance program this year. Miss Mason stated, Farmers not covered by this insurance now may sign up at any time for coverage on the 1954 wheat crop.

Pair-Of-Dice Deal Czechs Undergoing Shady Coin Trade

Ten weeks ago Czechoslovakia's newly "elected" president, Antonin Zapotocky, promised the Czechs a new "paradise."

Today most of his audience have reason to suspect the word was "pair-of-dice" and that the dice were loaded.

All Czechs were under orders to line up Thursday morning at banks and special money exchange centers and submit to a financial shake-down that would make Big Julie's crooked game in Guya and Dolls look like a charity bazaar.

Basically, the deal works like this:

If you've managed to keep a few dollars — they call them crowns in Czechoslovakia — jingling in your pocket or nesting in the company till, you step up to the window and shell them out to the man for crisp, new currency.

Fifty to One
Fifty of the old "capitalistic" dollars will get you one of the new, pegged to the Russian ruble.

Bank savings for workers will be run through the wringer at rates scaled from five to one for the first hundred dollars worth, to 30 to one for the more respectable sums.

Owners of several billion crowns of bank accounts dating back before 1945, and impounded since then, have been advised to simply forget the whole thing. That money is worthless.

The government also had news for anyone foolish enough to have invested in Czech government loans or government securities. They're worthless, too.

But that's not all.

A whopping 80 per cent cut in wages and salaries has been decreed by the government. In other words, if your pay check was 5,000 crowns last month, the next one will be only 900 crowns.

Sugar Coated — Thinly
That bitter pill was sugar-coated — thinly — with an announcement that prices will be cut an average of 31 per cent. At best that would leave a 50 per cent gap between the cut in wages and the cut in prices.

But even that is not the end of the story. One additional decree has been quietly issued. It provides that Czech workers can be required to work "unlimited overtime," on top of the standard 48-hour week "in the interests of the state."

Nothing said, either, about time and one-half or other benefits.

It all adds up to something that has been long suspected.

The Czech economy is staggering, to the point of collapse, under the strain of trying to dance to Moscow's Communist tune.

De Gasperi Faces Test In Election

Ever since Italy's return to the family of nations after World War II, her destiny has been guided by Premier Alcide De Gasperi. But on this coming Sunday—in Italy's general elections—the man who led Italy into the Atlantic Pact, faces his strongest test.

Even the most optimistic will not give him much more than a 50-50 chance of winning. In Italy, as elsewhere, the fight against communism is a primary issue. But, if De Gasperi's Christian Democrats and the Allied rightwing socialists, Republicans and liberals are defeated this time, it won't be by the Communists.

Internal Differences
Rather, it will be on purely internal differences which have resulted in splinter groups and a division of anti-Communist forces so firmly allied in the 1948 elections.

In 1948, the Christian democrats alone got 48.5 per cent of the vote, and, with their three present allies, amassed 62 per cent.

The result has been for the last

five years a thoroughly De Gasperi dominated government.

This year Italy votes under a new election law. It gives 380 of the 890 seats in the chamber of deputies automatically to the party or coalition winning 50.01 per cent of the popular vote.

Recently opinions were asked of editors of 10 major non-party newspapers in Italy, Sicily and Sardinia on this year's outcome.

Three believed De Gasperi's coalition would fall short of the needed majority by one or 2 per cent.

May Squeak Through
The others thought he would squeak through. They believed, however, that the issue would be decided by only one to 3 per cent of the vote.

If De Gasperi's coalition wins, the new law giving the winner 64 per cent of the chamber seats will assure Italy of a stable government.

But if the outcome brings about a shakier coalition of center-moderate left or center-moderate right, then Italy could become another France with periodic cabinet crisis.

Government Asks Oil Pact Renewal

WASHINGTON, June 4—UP—The government Wednesday asked 14 U.S. oil companies to renew a 1951 agreement to provide oil to friendly foreign nations in case the need arises.

Defense mobilizer Arthur Fleming sent the request to 14 companies having foreign oil operations.

Mobilization officials said there are no current emergencies requiring any action under the agreement, but that Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson has stressed the need for having an agreement in case of an emergency in the world oil situation.

"Need for the agreement is pointed up by the fact that the loss of any substantial current source of world petroleum supply can seriously jeopardize the interest of the free nations of the world," Fleming said.

The 1951 agreement followed the shutdown of the British oil refinery in Iran.

Former Attorney General James F. McGranery withdrew his approval of the agreement during his last days in office, apparently because there was no current emergency requiring action under it. The oil companies then withdrew.

Under the agreement, the oil companies may act jointly to alleviate any substantial shortage of oil abroad that would impair the defense program without fear of anti-trust action resulting.

Several of the companies are defendants in the government's civil anti-trust case charging they were members of an alleged oil cartel.

The companies which were asked to renew the agreement:

Gulf Oil Corp.; Socony-Vacuum Oil Co., Inc.; Standard Oil of California; Standard Oil of New Jersey; the Texas Company; Arabian American Oil Co.; Barber Oil Corp.; Caltex Oil Products Co.; Creole Petroleum Corp.; Pacific Western Oil Corp.; Sinclair Oil Corp.; Standard Vacuum Oil Co.; Superior Oil Co., and Venezuelan Petroleum Co.

Never Satisfied
TYLER, Tex., June 4—UP—Jack McCollister, 9, who has a season ticket to all home games of the Tyler East Texans in the Big State Baseball League, chose instead to join his friends in an attempt to climb a fence into the park.

Jack fell about 16 feet from the top of the fence and was knocked unconscious. Physicians said he apparently wasn't seriously hurt, but held him at the hospital for observation overnight Wednesday.

You can, for example, mothproof "washable" woollens as you rinse them, thanks to the development of EQ-53 by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. DDT is the insecticide in EQ-53 which also contains a solvent and an emulsifying agent. The new product is marketed under various trade names.

To use it you weigh the dry woollens and add one tablespoon of EQ-53 for each pound of clothes to the first rinse water if you wash by hand, or to the suds water if articles are machine-washed.

Wool picks up the DDT which protects it until washed or dried. The department, causes shrinkage or matting of wool.

I find this new treatment especially good for blankets that must be washed anyway before or

or the pair of gloves that's usually overlooked. Bulky woollens, like coats, jackets, heavy blankets or auto robes, can be sprayed with DDT or fluoride solution to protect them from ravenous moths. Pick a nice sunny day and hang the clean articles on the clothesline. Spray them until their surfaces are moist but not really wet. Then let the garments dry thoroughly before storing.

Most of us will continue to use moth crystals (paradichlorobenzene), naphthalene flakes, or balls for some woollens stored in boxes or closets. This is good protection as long as they are used in sufficient concentration and in containers that are as airtight as possible.

What a poor opinion of our dignity we must have to imagine that we can lose it by turning dirty dishes into clean ones.

Do we know that many wise observers of our time are deeply troubled by out-modern hate for menial and unpleasant work? Our hate of housework is part of the Great Revolt.

It's a pretty unrealistic revolt. Bodies are still here. The earth is still here. Coal must be mined, engines stoked, meals cooked and fields plowed by human hands.

If dirt on our hands is going to be able to destroy our dignity, just what do we have in mind for the human race? More gadgets—and permanent playtime on Miami Beach? A home is a place where feeling

ELIZABETH *the Queen*

AND so we come to that fateful last day of January, 1952, when the King stood at London Airport waving his daughter good-bye as she and the Duke of Edinburgh set off on their flight to Africa and the Commonwealth tour they were undertaking in his place.

For 40 minutes the King stood bareheaded in a biting, wintry wind, and after he had waved what was to be his last goodbye to his daughter, he followed her plane with his eyes until it was no more than a faint speck in a gray sky.

Who knows what feelings were in his heart when at last he turned away—and what were the feelings in the heart of his daughter as she sped across the world on her Royal mission?

Twice within six months Princess Elizabeth had been called upon to endure parting from her father after a grievous operation, for which the nation's prayers were asked, when all her instincts as a daughter must have cried out to stay by his side.

This time, Princess Elizabeth was never to see her father alive again.

All over the world newspapers carried stories of the progress of the Atlanta, Princess Elizabeth's airplane, and her safe arrival in Africa, where she was met by 400 African chiefs resplendent in plumed headdresses and leopard skins.

The hearts of millions of ordinary men and women going about their humdrum tasks were daily warmed by the happy, carefree pictures of the Royal couple in their informal moments in the first few days of their great tour.

Pictures of the Princess with her camera eagerly "shooting" lion, stalking through the jungle while a nearby guard moved with his rifle at the alert; pictures of her and the Duke of Edinburgh in the Royal Lodge—the wedding gift of the people of Kenya—joyous, unworried pictures we all loved to see; pictures, like those of any young married couple, of the Princess and her husband enjoying the peace and beauty of their home. But the sands of time were ebbing fast.

In Britain, King George was at his beloved Sandringham, scene of his birth, living a country life. The Queen and Princess Margaret were with him. Daily he enjoyed one of his favorite sports, shooting, with a few chosen friends from among his neighbors.

Tuesday, Feb. 5, was a particularly lovely crisp winter's day in Norfolk, and the King enjoyed one of his best days' sport. That evening he made arrangements for the next day, and before she said good night to him Princess Margaret suggested that he might like to make an early start in the morning.

The King went to bed and his valet brought him his usual nightcap, a cup of hot chocolate. The King wished him good night in a cheerful voice and settled to read a book.

ACROSS the world, Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh were spending the night in the picturesque Treetops, a four-room hotel some distance from their Royal Lodge, which is built in a giant fir tree overlooking a water hole so that its visitors may observe animals by night.

The Princess arrived wearing a bush shirt and brown slacks, and was afforded a magnificent spectacle of the big game of Kenya. When she arrived at the beginning of the forest trail she heard that less than 40 elephants were gathered around Treetops. And later when she arrived at her hotel she was asked to climb the ladder slowly so as not to disturb one elephant who was by a pool only 10 yards away. Thirty-five elephants and 11 calves appeared while the Royal party were having tea, and after dusk eight rhinos were spotted.

It was around midnight when the Princess retired.

After breakfast next day she delayed her return to the Royal Lodge for an hour, enjoying the first sunlit moments of the African morning, amusingly watching the antics of a family of baboons which had climbed to the Treetops windows and were grabbing slices of sweet potato laid on the sill. Then she and the Duke set off for the Royal Lodge, unaware of the terrible news which awaited them.

ON that morning of Feb. 6 there was silence in the King's bedroom at Sandringham. His valet, entering with his usual cup of tea, could not rouse him. Beside his bed, its bookmarker set, lay the book the King had been reading when he fell asleep some time before midnight.

At 10:45 a. m. the news of his death was announced.

And in one of his most moving broadcasts, Mr. Churchill revealed that the King had known that from day to day his life hung by a thread.

"The King walked with death as if death were a companion, an acquaintance whom he recognized and did not fear.

"In the end death came as a friend, and, after a happy day of sunshine and sport, after 'Good night' to those who had loved him best, he fell asleep as every man or woman who strives to fear God and nothing else may hope to do."



U. S. Case Against Former USDA Man Said To Be Weak

But Kirkland overruled a defense motion for a directed verdict of acquittal and ordered Walker's attorneys to begin presenting evidence.

In casting doubt on the strength of the government's case, Kirkland observed that there, nevertheless, appeared to be reason for continuing the trial. However, he told Walker's attorney he would entertain a similar motion for acquittal at some future time after hearing defense testimony and arguments.

"In fact, I think of it as a program of melodrama rather than a crime show," he said. "As the title implies, this is a program about people caught in the web of circumstance. The things that happen to our characters could happen to any of our viewers without them going

Classic Poem ... Stockton, Boston In Casey Tiff

SAN FRANCISCO, June 4—UP—The City of Stockton, Calif., is ready to battle with Boston, Mass. And all the fighting will be over a little ditty known as "Casey at the Bat," written (supposedly) by Ernest L. Thayer.

Boston, it seems, claims that "Casey at the Bat" was written about a Boston baseball team in 1897.

Stockton has proof that the poem not only was written about Stockton, but that it was written in 1888. The city will commemorate the occasion with an elaborate pageant there on June 12.

A bit of research on the subject shows that the poem first appeared in Thayer's column in the San Francisco Examiner on June 3, 1888; that the players mentioned in the poem, Cooney, Flynn, Blake, Barrows and Casey, of course, all played for a Stockton team that year.

And the dock area, where the games were played at that time, was called "Mudville."

A group of major league ball players came to the coast in 1887 to play ball on the last stop of a round-the-world barn-storming trip. They played against the Stockton team that fall—and the immortal men in the poem were the ones playing for Stockton. Or at least they had the same names. As far as research has shown, no other city has come up with proof that they had players at that time with these names.

So, on June 12, the Stockton players will portray the events that led up to:

"Oh, somewhere in this favored land
The sun is shining bright;
The band is playing somewhere,
And somewhere hearts are light,
And somewhere men are laughing,
And somewhere children shout,
But there is no joy in Mudville,
—The mighty Casey has struck out."

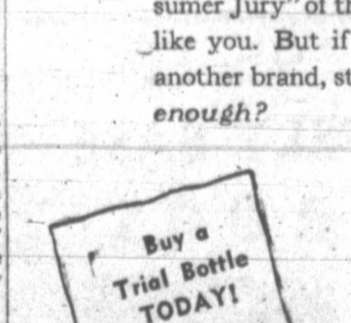

Sad Story Of Browns Yankees Lead Junior League

NEW YORK, June 4—UP—Don't tell mournful Marty Marion the Yankees are running off with the pennant race. His Browns would be in first place instead of seventh if they had won the 13-one run games they lost.

Like the kingdom that was lost for want of a horse-shoe nail, the Browns, for lack of a little punch at the right time, are struggling along at a .432 pace with 19 wins and 25 losses, whereas they'd be at 32-12 and .727 if they could just have turned around those 13 one-run reverses. That would be two full games ahead of the current Yankee standing of 29-11.

Latest of these heart-breakers came Wednesday night, a 4 to 3 10-inning defeat by Washington in which Satchel Paige gave up the first run in his last six relief appearances totaling 11 2/3 innings and suffered his first defeat. He was touched for a single by Ed Yost, who stole second and scored on Wayne Terwilliger's third hit, a pop single.

Just the same, the Yankees do look like runaways. They pounded out the biggest total of runs scored by a major league team this year in drubbing their most persistent rivals, the White Sox, 18 to 2 in 19 1/2 innings Wednesday. In other American League games the Red Sox came from behind to defeat the Indians 4 to 3 and Philadelphia defeated Detroit 10 to 7.

Milwaukee, which is also getting some runway notions, made it two in a row over Brooklyn with a 14 to 9 clubbing in the National. The Pirates handed poor Warren Hacker his ninth defeat against one victory 1 to 0 while the Giants drubbed Cincinnati 11 to 3 and the Cards topped the Phils 5 to 3, then lost 6 to 5.

The Yankees were merciless. Every starter drove in at least one run except Phil Rizzuto and he sniped two doubles and scored twice. Mickey Mantle drove in four runs, two on bases loaded walks, one on an infield out. Joe Collins hit four singles to lead that department. Ivy Noren hit a homer and Gene Woodring and winning pitcher Whitey Ford drove in three runs apiece. Ford also pitched six-hit ball before going out after the seventh, gaining his fifth win without a defeat.

Cleveland's defeat by the Red Sox put the Indians 5 1/2 games behind the Yankees. Early Wynn had a three-hitter until the ninth when Boston scored three runs, the tying and winning ones coming in on Sammy White's single.

Gus Zernial hit two homers, drove in five runs, to pace the Athletics as Detroit suffered its eighth straight defeat. Owen Friend and Bob Friend hit Detroit homers as the Tigers outdid the Athletics 14 to 12 but couldn't do much else right.

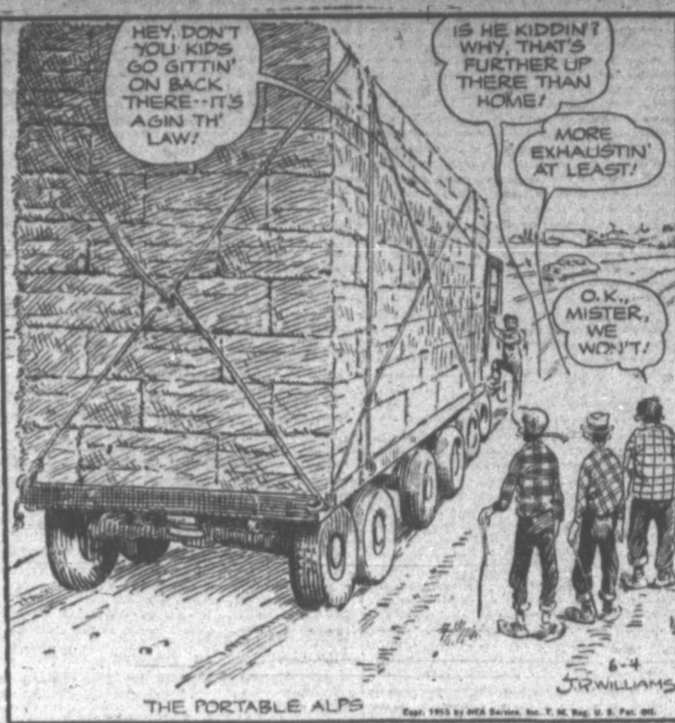
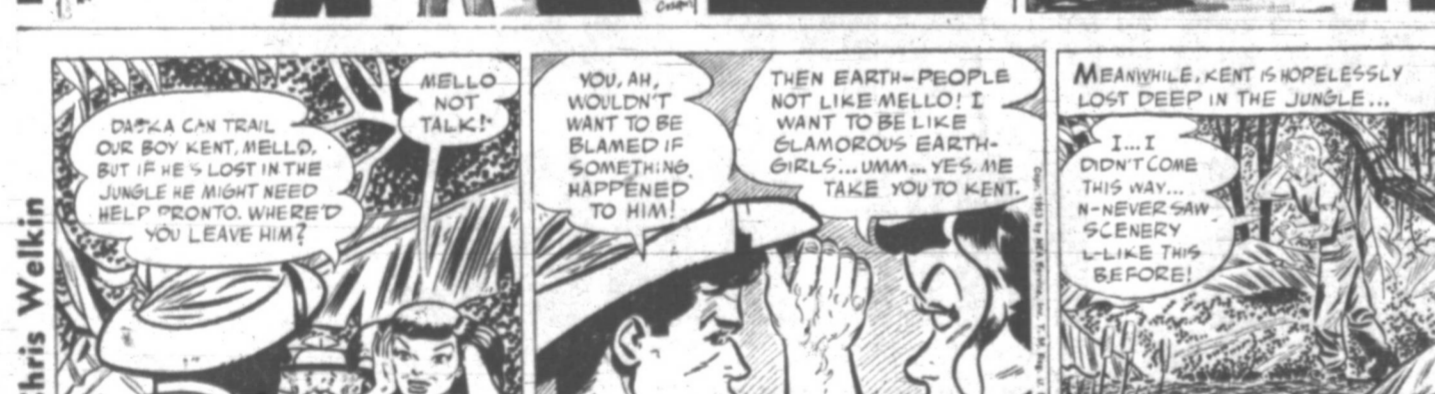

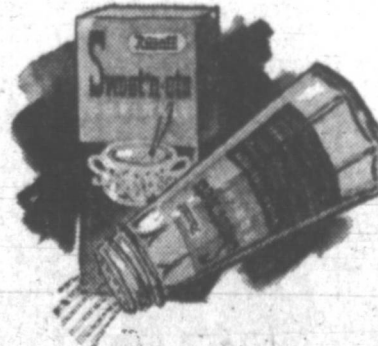
