

Hollywood Manufactures New Tough Guy: He Likes Poetry

HOLLYWOOD, May 23—UP—Hollywood's manufactured its first "tough lover" since Humphrey Bogart and Jimmy Cagney, but Jack Palance turned out today to be a soft-spoken poetry fan who isn't impressed by his new fame.

Palance is that villain with sunk-a eyes and high cheekbones who crashed through the star barrier when he tried to murder Joan Crawford in Sudden Fear.

Now he's swamped with hero roles having Joan Fontaine and Corinne Chavel to woo in Flight to Tangier, and the studios are hotly bidding for the new leading man.

"Impressed? I wasn't impressed with myself before, so I'm not now," said Palance, who almost always wears a hat when he talks.

"I'm a hero now, sure, but I wouldn't mind doing heavies again. Acting is acting. If you're good in one thing, you ought to be good in something else, otherwise you're just a personality."

"I would like," he reflected slowly, "to portray the artist, Vincent Van Gogh, on the screen."

Palance once worked in the Pennsylvania coal mines, played college football at Stanford and boxes. Those sports broke his nose and otherwise mixed up features that now bring him celluloid success as a leading man of the "homely" school.

But in San Francisco he once had a radio program, The Poet's Corner, in which "I read poetry while they played Mendelssohn in the background."

After flying airplanes in World War II, he appeared in comedies and drama, including Shakespeare on Broadway. Director Elia Kazan took him to Hollywood to play a gangster with that unforgettable face in Panic in the Streets.

Some 1,800 delegates to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the USA—which has 2.5 million members—will meet May 28 through June 3 in the municipal auditorium.

Up for major consideration is a proposed merger with two smaller independent Presbyterian denominations, one known as the Presbyterian Church of the U. S. and the other as the United Presbyterian Church.

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McLEAN STUDENT Graduates Despite A Polio Handicap

McLEAN — (Special) — Roy Norvell, who has "wheeled" himself one mile to school and back every day for the past two years, was graduated with his class at McLean this spring.

And he plans to enter college this fall to begin a career as a professional photographer.

Completely paralyzed from an attack of polio July 17, 1950, this McLean student lost use of his legs, but through treatment at the West Texas Polio Center, Plainview, regained use of his hands and arms.

His school work as a sophomore was done during his hospitalization in Plainview. At the beginning of his junior year he returned to McLean to attend school in a wheel chair.

He wheeled himself from the home of his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Rosson, one mile from McLean High School, this polio victim required help only on stairways. Low steps he made by himself and he is now using his second wheel chair.

Since his return from hospitalization he has developed an active interest in photography and carries a credit line on many athletic events appearing in the 1953 McLean High School yearbook.

Care provided by the Gray Society March of Dimes fund pulled Roy through, according to his grandmother, with whom Norvell and his three brothers and sisters have made their home for the past 14 years.

Norvell will be 18 on June 28.

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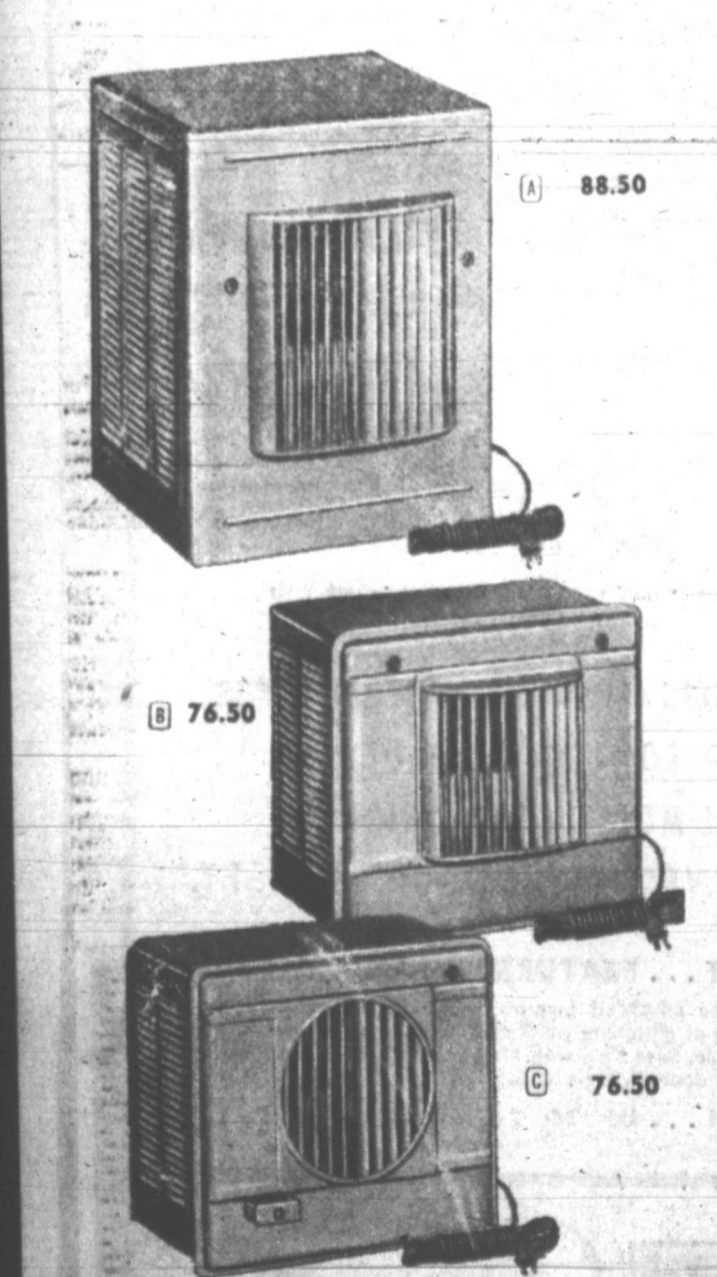

Sewer Line Work Progresses Here

Trenching for the second sewer lateral line installed in the Lamar Subdivision was underway today after the city engineering force finished staking out the route Thursday afternoon.

The 8-inch line starts on Crawford, crosses Bond and winds up on the north side of McCullough line crosses property owned by Dr. N. L. Nicholl and Frank Silcott who gave the city right-of-way easements for the line.

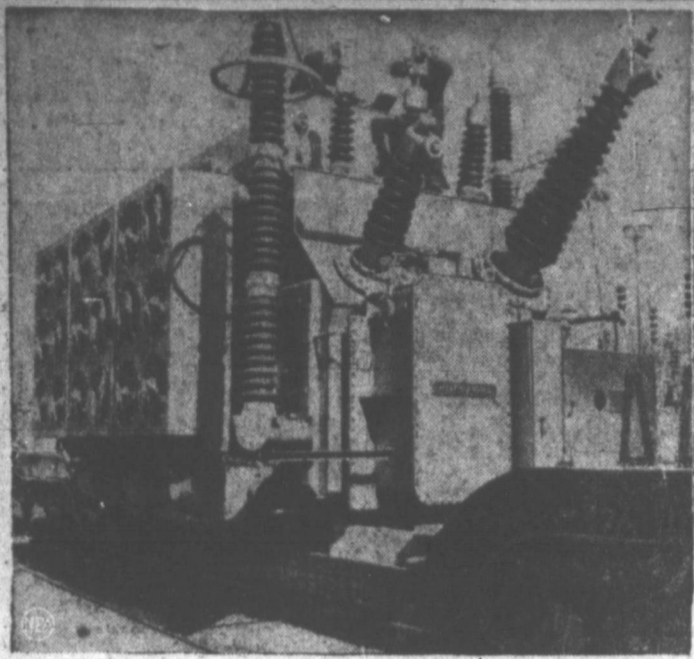

More Air-Conditioned Cars Predicted By Authorities

DETROIT, May 23—UP—Automotive experts predicted Saturday that within the next few years one of every 10 new cars will be equipped with air conditioning. A device to keep automobiles cool in hot weather and evenly heated in winter will add only about \$500 to the original price of the car, according to present estimates.

P. J. Kent, an air conditioning expert for Chrysler Corp., told the American Society of Automotive Engineers recently that air-conditioned cars are still considered for the "carriage trade," although many families of only moderate means have small air-conditioning units in their homes.

"The closed passenger car has definite drawbacks in the matter of summer comfort," Kent told the ASA.

"In really hot weather its occupants have a choice between ventilation by warm and often dusty drafts, or confinement in the steam atmosphere of dead air if they drive with the windows closed," he said.

"Direct ventilation is not the complete answer for pleasant hot-weather driving. But with people spending so much time in their cars the incentive to make them thoroughly comfortable under all conditions is strong throughout the industry."

Kent and most other engineers present at the Detroit meeting of the ASAE expressed belief that production economies in the future will make air-conditioned automobiles available to the general market at reasonable cost.

Dodge speeded up its schedule on factory-installed cooling systems in its Coronet models this week when it received orders from customers in 17 states—most of them in the South and Southwest.

The biggest drawback at present in trying to install air conditioning units in most cars is in the design of the auto itself. That's one thing the designers of new cars are taking into consideration for future models—space for an air conditioning unit.

No matter where the space-cooling system is placed, it becomes a rather bulky device that must provide for the refrigerant, source of power, compressor, condenser, evaporator, fans and controls. Good design requires simplicity of installation and ready accessibility for service.

Even the heat of the sun outside the car must be taken into consideration. Controls are needed so that occupants on the shaded side will not be too cool, and those on the sunny side will not be too warm.

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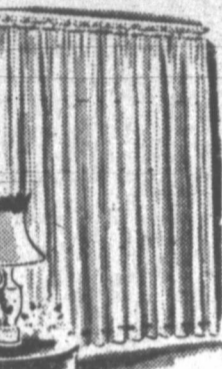


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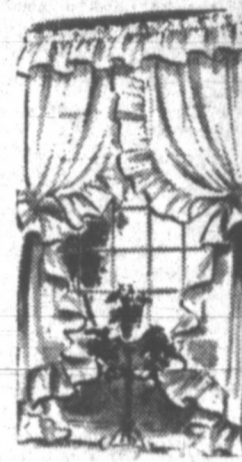
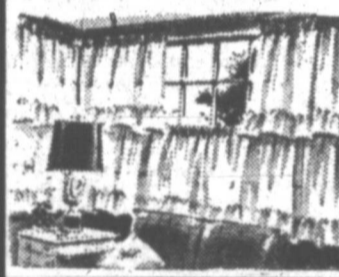
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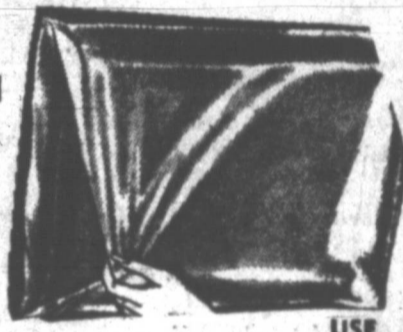
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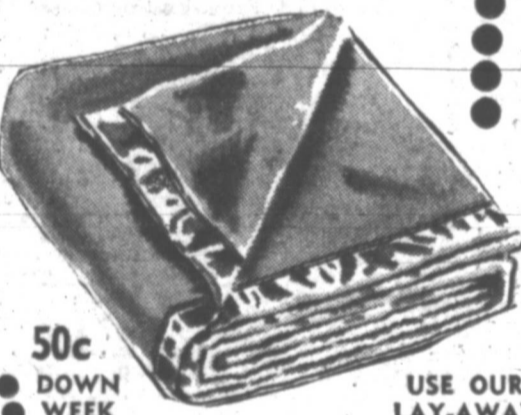
