Bandits Rob Armored Truck At Amarillo

AMARILLO, May 18-UP-A burglar robbed an armored truck Monday less than 50 yards from the FBI and sheriff's offices.

C. C. Price, owner of the truck said he could not immediately estimate the total worth of the loot, but police believed the loss was heavy.

The driver, C. H. Poindexter, had parked the truck in front of the post office and federal building, while he went in to post mail. The armored car company also operates a mail service.

When he returned he found the door next to his seat opened with a skeleton key still in the lock. There was no sign of the burglar. The FBI and U.S. marshal have



Great Britain's socialist government has taken the wraps off gasoline service stations, after thirteen years of operation under bureaucratic regulation.

The "service" station, as we know it in the capitalist United States, disappeared in England when the socialists took over.

As a result, many dealers charged for checking tires. Drivers had to clean their own windshields, and wait, according to Thomas F. Brady, correspondent of the New York Times, "for a grudging attendant to detach himself from a cup of tea in the back room to pour a tew gallons of petrol into their tanks at 48 cents a gallon."

Today, the sweet uses of competition have once again put the customer in the driver's seat. The customer is the most important person is the slogan of the training courses which competitors were quick to provide. Ironically, the training of dealers includes films of American service station operations showing how it is done - in a copitalist country.

This change-over to competitive selling received as much attention in the House of Commons as if steel, coal and banking had been restored to private operation.

In our eagerness here to ask Washington to take on more of our business activities, we forget that the consumer ultimately pays. He pays in higher taxes, he pays in loss of attention and services.

When you take the individual incentive out of any job and pass it on to the desks of public office holders, it becomes a routine, lifeless and costly activity.

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

Some people seem to think that this attitude will lead to political death for Mr. Benson. But a recent piece by columnist Holmes Alexander takes a different and much happier view. He interviewed the secretary just after his return from a speaking tour and wrote: "Over flow crowds had applauded his calls to freedom. Hundreds of persons had shaken his hand and wished his efforts well. Benson's mail runs 15 to 1 in favorable responses. The serious-minded economists whom he's brought into the department can find for you statistical proof that the secretary's judgement about farm people is correct."

It tooks as if more and more farmers are realizing that government should not and cannot be a source of endless largesse. And certain important segments of agriculture, it is a pleasure to report, want no part of either bureaucratic domination or coddling, The beef producers are a fine example of this. The biggest recent price breaks have taken place in beef. Some cattle raisers and feeders have been hit with very heavy cash losses. But the beef people have not run to Washington or snowed their congressmen under with demands for government relief. Their attitude has been quite the contrary --- spokesmen for major producers' organizations have made it crystal clear that they prefer to take their chances in the free market.

Mr. Eisenhower also told the GOP congressmen that he is willing for a 10 per cent tax cut on individual incomes to go into effect Jan. 1 as scheduled.

The excess profits tax is scheduled to expire July 1 unless Congress votes to keep it in effect.

Dr. Godfrey L. Cabot, 92-year-old founder and presidant of Godfrey L. Cabot, Inc., Boston, is in Pampa for a brief visit with local officials of the company he heads, We want to take this occasion to welcome him to our town and express the wish that his stay here is profitable and pleasant.

Known by his employes as "The Chief," Dr. Cabot flew here yesterday from Tulsa where Saturday he was one of seven men honored by the International Petroleum Exposition for outstanding contributions to the industry. He was named the "Grand Old Man" of the gas branch of the oil business.

Look At Isonomy

Had a good look at the isonomy lately? Odds are you haven't, because there hasn't been too much of it in recent years. "Isonomy" is a very old Greek word, even older than "democracy." It means "equal laws for all men." "

It's the egg that grew into democracy, the idea that a country should be ruled by impartial laws, not by men. Historically, it was developed before the republican form of government was first tried back in ancient Greece. The result of isonomy, or equal laws, is to give the citizen freedom from the whims of a ruler who might change his mind from day to day, or from person to person, about what is legal and what is not.

Our American government, with its separation of the law-making Congress, the law-interpreting courts, and the law-administering President, was shaped around that principal by the men who wrote the Constitution.

The founding fathers were a little too trusting, however. They didn't think there ever would be so many laws that a prosecutor could pick his victims and choose his laws. They can, though, and that's government of men, the very thing that was to be avoided. In the last half-century, and particularly the past twenty years, rule-by-law in many fields has been thrown out the window - because there are so many laws. The Congress, the bureaus, and the agencies have spewed out such a tangle of law, rule, regulation, and other restrictions that often a whole crew of lawyers can't tell if a certain activity is legal or not. "The government can find some charge to bring against any concern it chooses to prosecute," is the way a former chairman of the Federal Trade Commission, Lowell Mason, described the mess. Why Tax Supported Schools Result In Poorer Jobs Rather Than Better Jobs

In the last issue I was explaining why tax supported schools were bound to produce poorer jobs rather than better jobs.

I do not want to leave the impression that we can have good jobs without education. Education is absolutely necessary if we are

to have better jobs. And by education I mean an understanding of both moral and physical laws. While tax supported schools might teach physical laws, they cannot teach moral laws, and an understanding of physical laws without

an understanding of moral laws will undoubtedly lead to a violation of these moral laws. And a violation of moral laws creates confusion, ill will and hate and one discriminatory law after another. Real education, of course, is bound to include both moral education and an education in physical laws. The reason tax supported schools

cannot teach moral laws is that they are violating the Coveting Commandment and the Golden Rule, and of course it would be embarrassing for them to teach something that was contrary to what they were practicing. Besides that, it is very difficult for any man to teach what he doesn't understand. And public school teachers do not seem to understand that the Coveting Commandment and the Golden Rule apply to individual whether they are acting as individuals or whether they are acting as agents for society, or the state or the majority. 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
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



Lie Urges Surrender

Trygve Lie, Secretary General of the United Nations, sang his swan song in a worldwide broadcast. The theme of the piece was that the UN and the United States should surrender on a cardinal point in the dispute with Soviet Russia.

Lie's key sentence: "It is not possible to foresee a Korean settlement except in relation to other Far East issues, and there can be no settlement unless the People's Republic of China (Mao Tze-tung's Red usurpers In Peiping) is a party to it."

Thus, the Lie advice to the so-called free world is to recognize Red China, just as F. D. Roosevelt recognized Red Russia in 1933, and hand it a seat in the UN General Assembly if not on the Security Council.

The UN amounts to little, in and of itself. But adnission of Red China to the organization would give Mao the same sort of world prestige as Roosevelt's recognition gave the then tottering Stalin back in '33. Reds all over the world could and would brag that they had bludgeoned the UN into backing down on this key issue, and had humbled the mighty United States in the process.

Such a step, too, would start the decline of Chiang Kai-shek and his Nationalist Chinese Government on Formosa. It would be only a question of time before the big strategic island would fall to the Communists, who would turn it into an unsinkable aircraft carrier located just about midway between Japan and the Philippines. The whole development would be a resounding and deadly defeat for us in one of the most important phases
