

# Bodies Of Three Pampans Due On Train Saturday

The Santa Fe's Train No. 24, which arrives in Pampa at 6:30 p.m. Saturday, will bear the bodies of three Pampans — one, a Korean war hero; the other two, traffic accident victims.

Aboard the "Grand Canyon" will be the bodies of Marine Pfc. James Robert Braly, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. R. Braly, Meriden, Conn., and Dr. and Mrs. A. L. Lane, 832 S. Banks.

Pfc. Braly, a rifleman, was killed in action April 10, according to a telegram signed by Gen. L. C. Shepherd, commander of the U.S. Marine Corps.

Dr. and Mrs. Lane, on a vacation trip, died from injuries received Tuesday noon in a two-car collision, some 30 miles northeast of Las Vegas, Nev.

Funeral services for both the whose husband — Dr. Lane's brother — is on his way back from Las Vegas.

Accompanying the body of the dead Marine will be Sgt. Tommy J. Allison, Pampa, now stationed at Camp Pendleton, Calif.

Word of the arrival of the bodies of Dr. and Mrs. Lane came by telegram Thursday afternoon from Emmett Lane, who had left Pampa Wednesday to help with arrangements.

A telegram to the Bralys Thursday from the U. S. Department of Defense's Oakland (Calif.) office advised them that their office was to leave Oakland at 9:07 a.m. today by Santa Fe train.

## Reports Give New Hope For An Armistice

SEOUL, Korea, Saturday, June 6 — UP — United Nations and Communist delegates meet at Panmunjom Saturday in a truce session that may mean the bloody three-year Korean war is coming to its end.

Reports here, in Tokyo, in Washington and in United Nations headquarters in New York are that the two delegations are within a hair's breadth of agreement on the main outstanding issues.

For the moment the South Koreans, in whose behalf the UN forces are fighting, were evidently the only obstacle to agreement.

## Eight MIGs Shot Down

SEOUL, Korea, June 5 — UP — Allied Sabrejets shot down eight Communist MIGs Friday, probably destroyed one and damaged five more in low-level air battles near the Suhoi reservoir.

# Taft Clears Up View On Policy

WASHINGTON, June 5 — UP — Senate Republican Leader Robert A. Taft Friday proposed a military alliance with Great Britain in the Far East in a statement denying that he favored a "go it alone" policy.

The Ohio senator issued his statement in reply to the criticism of the foreign policy statement which he sent to a Cincinnati meeting May 26. His critics included President Eisenhower, who told a news conference two days later that this nation needs allies and cannot go it alone.

In his statement Friday, Taft said he had received a number of questions about his views expressed at Cincinnati and that there was only one matter which he felt called for further explanation.

"At no time did I use the words that the United States should 'go it alone' in the Far East or anywhere else," he said.

# ELIZABETH the Queen

IN Africa the first intimation of the king's death was given to the Princess's staff by a local newspaper reporter, Lieutenant Colonel Martin Charteris, the Princess's private secretary, hardly crediting the news, sought confirmation from London.

It was the Duke of Edinburgh who gently told his unsuspecting wife the news of her father's death and that she was now Queen of England.

When the first understood what he was saying, she wept, but said Lieutenant Colonel Charteris, she took the news "bravely, like a Queen."

It was the first time in history that a British monarch had acceded to the Throne in Africa.

At once the new Queen gave orders to return, and through streets lined with rows of silent, sorrowing Africans she drove to her airplane. But—so typical of her—before she left she did not forget to give her personal thanks to every person, white or colored, who had attended her during her stay.

So began the Atalanta's 4444-mile return flight, to Britain and to the continent of Europe, which she did in 20 days previously. The King waved his daughter farewell. Tropical thunderstorms delayed the passage of the Royal plane, and escorting aircraft carried land and sea rescue gear throughout that sad journey from continent to continent.

When the Queen was a little child there was one diminutive name by which her father loved to call her. And on the all-white wreath which lay on his coffin in the church at Sandringham, was the inscription:

DARLING PAPA—FROM LILBET

QUEEN ELIZABETH was the first of her line to be pro-

claimed Head of the Commonwealth.

Millions of people of many races and colors are bound not only to her but also to one another by their common allegiance. This allegiance is dependent on many factors, including mutual assistance and defense; but the one factor that gives meaning to all the rest is the affection in which the Throne is held.

When the world was stunned by the shock of her father's sudden death, Princess Elizabeth faced the news—and all that lay before her—with the courage with which she faces all crises.

For the heir to the Throne private grief must be swallowed up in the office and the task must be merged in the continuity of the Monarchy.

It is her lot to be, in a sense, "owned" by her people. No anger does a monarch command in the old, absolute way. Today he is the personage who symbolizes for all of us the perfection we would most like to attain.

Her influence is not factional, but is above factions, maintaining the balance among classes and interests.

SOME of Britain's greatest rulers, in the ages of greatest glory—such as the Elizabethan age and the Victorian age—have been Queens.

Inspired by the gracious woman we now know as Queen Elizabeth, shall we see a second Elizabethan age, marked not only by the resurgence of the old spirit of adventure but also by a renaissance of the arts and sciences?

We British people for many generations have been fortunate in our Royal women. They have served us well and in turn we have given them a devotion that has kept alive the spirit of Chivalry.

# JACOBY ON BRIDGE

## Follow This Rule For Good Defense

When you are defending against a no-trump contract it is usually wise to keep hammering at the same suit. This is a sound play for two reasons: first, it is the best way to set up your long suit; and second, it may cost you a trick to make the first lead in a new suit.

In today's hand East broke this rule and thus found the killing defense. It was partly a matter of logic, and partly a matter of working out declarer's probable

holding for his jump to three no-trump.

West opened the king of hearts, and East signalled encouragement by playing the nine. South prop-

erily refused this trick, and West continued with a low heart. When East put up the jack of hearts, South had to refuse again.

He could take only eight tricks on the run, and knew that the opponents would surely beat him with the ace of spades and the rest of hearts too quickly.

By holding the second trick with the jack of hearts, East thought carefully about his next move. It was clear that South had the ace of hearts. It was also clear that no defense could defeat the contract if South had all of the missing high cards.

If South had less than all of the missing high cards, the only excuse for his jump to three no-trump could be a solid diamond suit. In a short time, therefore, East managed to visualize the very sort of hand that South actually held.

It was clear that a heart continuation would give declarer his contract. He could simply take the ace of hearts, run his diamonds, and then lead a spade. East would be able to take the ace of spades, but nothing could then stop South from winning six diamonds, and one trick in each of the other suits.

Instead of continuing the hearts, East found the killing defense by returning a club at the third trick. If South went up with the ace of clubs, the opponents would gain the lead with the ace of spades in time to cash the setting trick in clubs.

If South played his ten of clubs, West could win with the king of clubs and return the suit. Either way, South could take his eight tricks but no more.

# It's Your Deal

One of the most interesting features of the game of Backgammon is the "back" game. It's very unusual to "stoop to conquer" in any game. In this case you deliberately set out to make your position as bad as possible.

This doesn't happen all the time, of course. You adopt a back game only when you have had luck in the beginning of a game and therefore fall too far behind to catch up with normal rolls. If you can't catch up, you try to fall farther behind.

The idea is to keep as many men as possible in your opponent's home board. As he tries to bring his men around, or as he tries to bear off, he will probably have to leave blots. That gives you the chance to hit the blots with the men you have kept back in the enemy's home board.

One or two such hits may put you back on even terms with the opponent. If you have managed to make a few points in your own home board, you may shut the enemy out when you have hit a blot. Then you can not only catch up but can even race ahead and win the game very easily.

When your opponent is a good player, a back game is unlikely to succeed against him. He will not hit all of the blots that you deliberately expose when you are trying to fall farther behind.

He is satisfied to stay substantially ahead of you in the running game; he will not try to get so far ahead that you develop a good back game.

Even if you manage to get far enough behind, your opponent may

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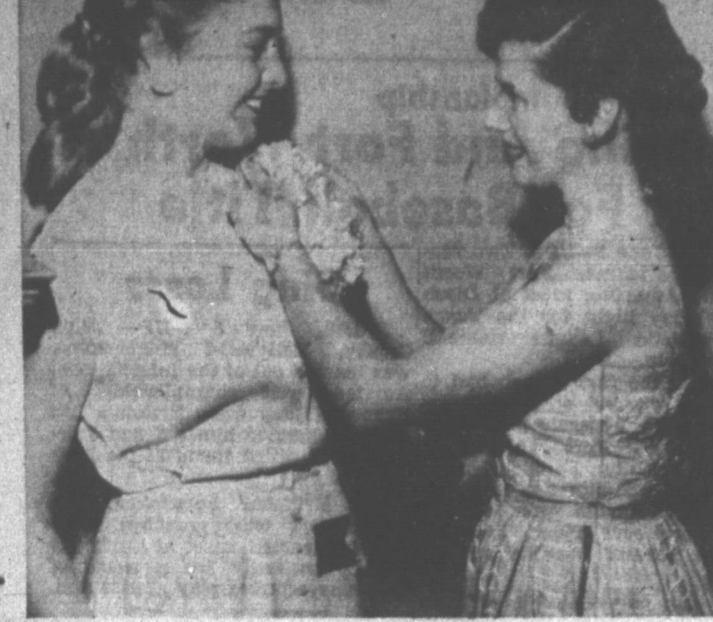

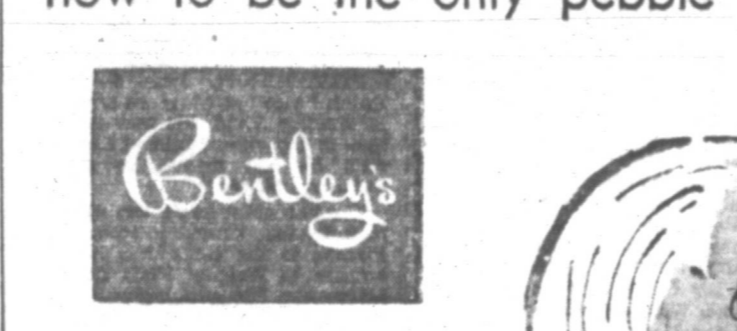

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# Hubbers - Capture Two-Game Series From The Oilers

## Glane Wins 6 Of 7 Contests For Ft. Worth

Fort Worth's Bill Roy Glane, who looks up to just about everybody in the Texas League when he isn't standing on the pitcher's mound, is showing the big boys this year that a good little man can still be the 'em in knots.

The 5-foot 7 1/2-inch southpaw from Darabon, Mich., has started seven games this season, won six of them, and finished them all. He scattered six hits Thursday night as Fort Worth beat Houston 10 to 3 to bounce back into third place in the standings.

The only real blow off the lefty was Don Spencer's home run in the eighth inning with none on. Fort Worth scored six runs in the seventh inning, three on Jim Eames' homer, off Dick Bokelmann, the fourth Buff pitcher. Bob Clark, who lasted less than one inning, was charged with the loss.

In other games, Dallas dropped San Antonio into the cellar with a 12 to 2 win at San Antonio; Shreveport whipped Tulsa for the second night 10 to 2; and Oklahoma City scored in the 11th inning to tip Beaumont 7 to 6.

League teams will continue the current series Friday night: Fort Worth at Houston, Dallas at San Antonio, Oklahoma City at Beaumont, and Tulsa at Shreveport.

Four home runs were hit in the Dallas-San Antonio game, three by the Eagles. Shortstop Al Stringer slammed his second in two nights in the eighth inning with one on, outfielder Wiley Moore hit a home run in the fourth with none on and catcher Bob Barford cracked a four-bagger in the ninth with two on. Bob Balena hit for the circuit at San Antonio in the fourth inning with none on.

League-leading Shreveport grabbed five runs in the first two innings to win easily over Tulsa. Sport outfielder Harry Heslet hit his 30th and 17th home runs of the season in the first inning off Tulsa starter and loser Cliff Ross, and in the eighth off reliever Niles Jordan. Hugh Sooter pitched the distance for Shreveport, spacing 10 hits.

The Oklahoma City-Beaumont game consumed four hours and 30 minutes. In the 14th, singles by Frank Kellert and Joe Frazier and Russ Burns' high fly scored Kellert from third with the winning run.

LUBBOCK, June 5—UP—Bobby Fernandez was the show for the Hubbers here last night, slamming out a pair of three-run homers to lead an uphill battle that brought Lubbock a 12-10 victory and a sweep of the two-game series with the Pampa Oilers.

Denny Davidson, who relieved Benny Day in the second, received credit for his first decision of the year, although Rene Vega had to come in in the eighth, Ben Quintana, who took over for Roger Aldridge in the first, absorbed the loss.

Ben Felder was taken to a Lubbock hospital in the third inning after being hit in the head by Day's first pitch to him. Late reports from the hospital indicated that his condition was satisfactory.

X-rays of Felder's head showed no fracture and near midnight, the Negro infielder didn't ever have a headache. The pitch that hit him was high and inside, Felder ducked away, turning his head, and the ball caught him on the crown at the back of his head. He will probably be released from the hospital in the morning.

The Hubbers had to stage a sixth inning rally to take the lead for the first time, getting two runs on what should have been the third out when Ed Krewall dropped Ray Newsome's short fly in left. Joe Valdivielso singled, and Fernandez hit his first home run to put the Hubbers out in front, 8-7.

## Hate-Yankees Policy Might Be Bad Tack

NEW YORK, June 5—UP—Maybe it would be better not to "hate the Yankees."

The White Sox tried to stir up a feud by saying the umpires favored the Yankees, General Manager Frank Lane openly challenged some decisions and protests went all the way to League President Will Harridge. Before that General Manager Hank Greenberg of the Indians told all of his players to "hate the Yankees" and similar sentiments were voiced throughout the league.

Before the White Sox got into the act, they were the only club in the league to dominate the Yankees. They had beaten the four out of five times. Then came the reckoning. Casey Stengel brought his boys into Chicago, and they came out swinging. They wound up with three victories in a row, taking the finale Thursday by a 9 to 5 count in 10 innings when Gil McDougald hit a homer in the appended frame to open the flood gates for a rally that put the issue beyond doubt.

Tough Going Before

The only consolation left for the anti-Yankee bloc was that the last time the New Yorkers dominated the races so completely at this stage, they had to win the pennant on the last day of the season.

That was in 1949, the first year in which Stengel was manager. On June 5 of that year they were six games in front, two days later they were six games ahead and they kept the margin until the last week when Boston overtook them. But they won in the long run.

Thursday's victory was their seventh in a row and it gave Alie Reynolds, in a relief role, his fifth victory. Mickey Mantle homered for New York and drove in four runs, also drilling a double.

The Giants settled into the kind of a rut they'd like to rest in for a lifetime when they won their second straight game by an 11 to 3 score from Cincinnati. The Pirates without Ralph Kiner defeated the Cubs with him, 6 to 1 as Ralphie got a double but couldn't offset the slugging of his team mates of the day before Carlos Bernier hit a homer inside the park and Bob Hall pitched seven-hit ball for his first win. The Phils beat the Cards, 6 to 5, in 10 innings when Johnny Wyrostek's single scored Ricine Ashburn from second base. The win gave the Phils sole possession of third place.

Ray Noble's three-run homer was the big blow in the Giant eighth as Hoyt Wilhelm won his fourth game in a relief role for starter Sal Maglie. Ted Kluszewski hit two homers, his 13th and 14th, for Cincy, and Roy McMillan got one. Whitey Lockman also homered for New York.

The A's smashed out 16 hits to win their opener from the Tigers, as Marion Fricano went the distance to win and winless Ted Gray suffered his seventh defeat. In the nightcap, Cass Michaels cracked a three-run homer in the 10th inning to give reliever Charley Bishop his third win.

John Dixon pitched a seven-hitter for the Senators as Mickey Vernon hit his fourth homer to lead his 15-hit support.

PITTSBURGH, June 5—UP—Cubs Manager Phil Cavaretta jubilantly predicted Friday that slugger Ralph Kiner "hit more home runs in Chicago" than he did as a member of the Pittsburgh Pirates.

"We got the better of the deal as far as power hitting is concerned," said Cavaretta as he surveyed the new Cub lineup which features Hank Sauer and Kiner batting back-to-back in the National League's top 1-2 homer punch following a big swap Thursday.

1. In a world of blood and sweat, toil and tears, the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II came as welcome relief. As the jeweled crown of St. Edward settled on the young Queen's dark hair, the cry of "God save the Queen" went up throughout Britain and the Commonwealth accompanied by the cheers of the rest of the world. Even in Moscow, Red Foreign Minister Vyacheslav Molotov toasted the Queen's health with champagne.

2. In the Korean war, it was another period of hope but with fingers crossed. A secret compromise proposal for reaching a truce was submitted to the Communists by the Allies this week. It purportedly gave in to Red demands for a

## Couldn't If He Would

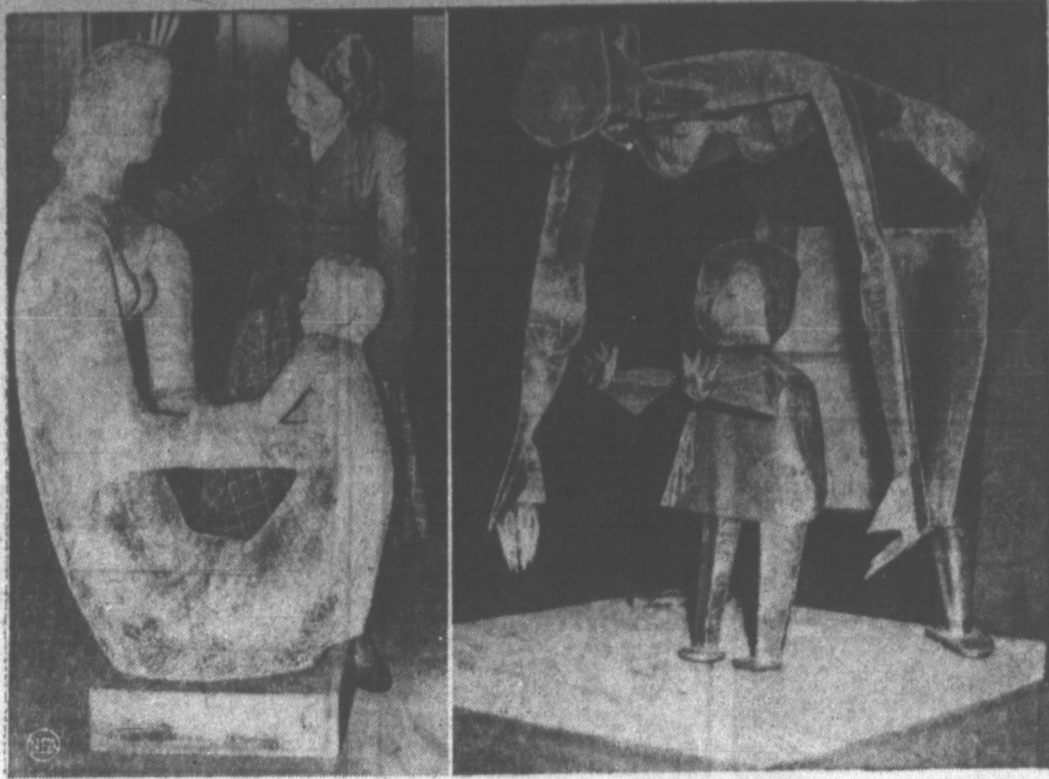

S. of siding with Britain in the dispute over Suez, and both the warring Israeli and the Arabs resented his secret conferences with the opposing side.

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# Slot Machines Run Freely In Nevada

RABBITHOLE, Nev., June 3—UP—Slot machines almost outnumber people in Nevada.

You'll find them in every store, gas station and bread shop. Every place almost except churches, schools and banks.

The minute you cross the Utah line heading west along Highway 30 and 40, you are aware that gambling is legal in the state.

Rabbit-hole isn't much different from the big towns. The operators of slot machines and game tables are happy to take your dough, but oddly they appear just as gleeful if you walk out of their joint a winner. It's considered good publicity.

**Boast of Jackpots**

In one gaming house in a nearby city, you get a little folder when you change your bills into silver. It boasts of 750 slot machines which, during the torrid hours of play, are said to average a jackpot every 40 seconds.

Most of the big clubs make it easy for the gambler. They don't want a player to get leg-weary and one spot even has an escalator way

which runs up and down the three floors.

Owners of gaming houses are pained almost to the point of philanthropy when a man goes broke. One big lace greets the amateur risker of silver dollars with a sign which says, in effect, that you're silly to risk more than your wallet can afford and added that "you may not win anyhow."

Some do win a lot. A doorman told me about a fellow who came in not long ago and made enough money to finance a first-class vacation in Mexico.

**They Never Close**

There is no key to any gambling house in Nevada. People risk what they have around the clock.

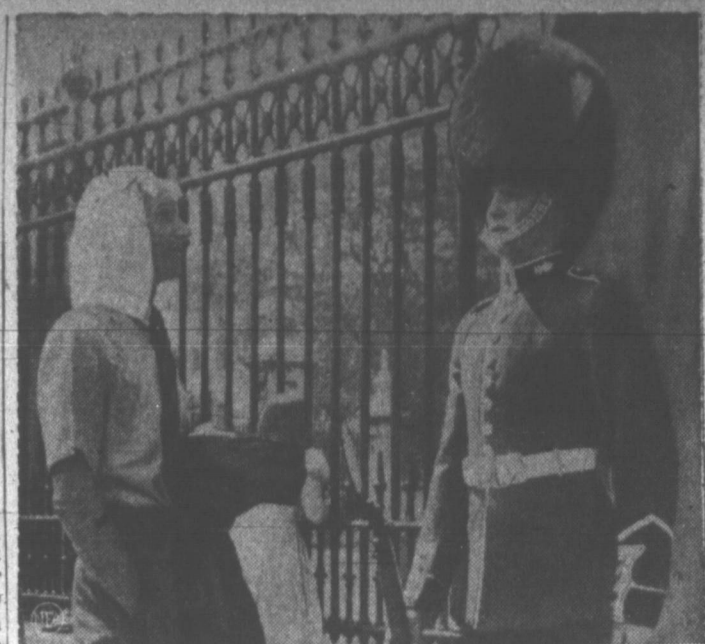
## Can't Blame Her
