### By The Backdoor

There is a close relationship between militarism and socialism. Indeed, anyone who has had any experience with the military establishment can project that experience to determine what it would be like to live under the communistic end result that socialism leads

We are currently faced with the development of a phase of socialism as a result of the militarism of the era we live in. The situation is not new, having begun inthe wars of the past, but it is aggravated today because of the large number of young citizens who were embroiled in World War II, and are still being called into the armed forces.

The issue, of course, is socialized medicine which should be as dead as a dodo so many shellackings has it taken when it was presented undisguised. Nevertheless, we are edging up to it because there are some 20,000,000 Americans who can lay claim to government-provided medical treatment in their status as veterans or dependents of veterans.

The latest development is a rider tacked on the Veterans Administration money bill by the House Appropriations committee which would establish an entirely new concept of medical care.

We already have a broad field in which medicine is socialized - the existing operations of veteran treatment and tax supported institutions like county hospitals are an example - the former, theoretically, at least restricted to war casualties.

Under the new House maneuver, the Veterans Administration would be allowed to investigate the case of each veteran applying for medical treatment of non-service connected ailment. The rider says that where the veteran can pay the administration should "make every effort" to collect. But the inference direct is that the treatment should be rendered.

This amounts to a standing offer on the part of the federal government to pay part of the cost of medical care for every veteran suffering any ailment - traceable to wartime causes or not.

Heretofore, non-service disabilities have been treated at federal hospitals if the patient will sign an application declaring his inability to pay. His signature is final with no inquiry involved. But at least the question of personal honor was raised. Under the new rider there is no such hindrance. The veteran would be informed, if obliquely, that he is entitled to medical aid and is required to pay only in part.

Already 65 per cent of veteran hospital facilities are used by patients suffering non-service ailments. And the financial and medical difficulties arising from claims of veterans already on the rolls are as nothing to what looms ahead even without liberation of the conditions under which treatment will be provided.

in case the average citizen sees this only as another tax burden to be carried on benalf of men wno tought for their country, and therefore justitied, it is necessary to point to what this growing medical phase of government is doing to their own lives.

Une reason today why medical costs in private life are high is because of the scarcity of doctors. Following the irrevocable law of supply and demand, the fees or the fewer available men have risen.

The Veterans Administration alone hires 7,000 doctors regularly and an equal number on call. This creates an artificial shortage of doctors for the rest of the population that is not relieved by the medical schools because more and more of their graduates are drawn into the military service.

A dozen years ago before World War II there were more complaints from doctors about lack of patients than there were complaints about lack of doctors. Yet the number of doctors has risen by 21 per cent above the number available in 1940 while the population of the nation has only increased 15 per cent. So now in civilian life there is one doctor for every 710 possible patients while the Army has one doctor for every 275 men and women in service; the more fragile Navy has one for every 195 men in uniform and the Air Force, apparently of hardy stock, has one for every 315 of personnel. This is where the gain of some 36,000 doctors

in the last dozen years, and more too, has gone.

Those hell-bent for socializing the United States can look smugly upon these statistics and this trend. Eventually, as a result of the siphoning of the medical fraternity into the military establishment and into veteran medicine, they can make a case for, on the grounds of scarcity, a health program that will be conducted by the government for all classes of citizens. Experience with past wars indicates that demands for medical care resulting from World War II will increase with the years. It is fixed history that the peak number of recipients of Civil War pensions was not reached until 1915, a halfcentury after the War Between the States was settled. It is just and proper that men disabled in war should receive adequate treatment but to use the results of the war to pervert our form of government would be a tragedv enual to defeat by an enemy.

It bears out a contention of Abraham Lincoln that our way of life would not be lost through enemy attack but rather from internal influence.

The particular enemy here are the selfish and shortsighted congressmen who would buy a vote at the expense of the nation's future welfare.

"When World Government Moves In"

Since I believe that world government instead of promoting peace and better jobs will only impoverish us and cause us to lose more and more of our freedom, I velieve that too much space cannot be devoted to explaining the

end results of world government. Since no man can make a study of all things, we are obliged to use the research of those people who have made a careful study of the end results of world government. Douglas Reed seems to have made such a study. His article "When World Government Moves In" was published in the June issue of the Economic Council Letter. I want to quote for a few days from this careful analysis on the impracticability of a world government:

"World Government' is today's phrase, as 'National Socialism' and Communism' were yesterday's phrases; they have now been tested in practice. How would World Government look if it, too, were to pass from phrase to reality, how would people feel when it moved in? Here is the picture as the One Worlders themselves see it:

'The World Parliament would be composed of appointed members (elections being inacceptable to the Soviet and other dictatorships) and also would reflect population -strengths so that Asia would domleft to the sovereign determination of the nations no longer sovereign tinue unhindered).

"The World Parliament would appoint a World Government (presumably located in Asia), but apparently this Executive would be less powerful than the permanent bureaucracy, consisting of 'A World Director,' 8 Zone Directors and 51 Regional Directors. These potentates would never serve in theor own countries. In their carcerists' Utopia (their realms are already mapped) they would reign over any lands but their own,
