WASHINGTON, May 26 -UP- Rep. Melvin Price (D-III.) charged Tuesday that Budget Director Joseph M. Dodge used the "meat-ax technique" to slash Air Force funds, possibly overriding even Defense Secretary Charles

As evidence, he produced a letter, dated May 7, in which Dodge listed a \$5.09 billion cut in air appropriation requests as an objective and told Wilson to "adjust your recommendations accordingly."



Private Schools

Dr. Clark Kuebler, president of Ripon College, Ripon, Wis., warned members of the Episcopal convention in a speech at Colorado Springs that within the coming aecades the world will choose between one of two religions; the worship of God or the worship of the State.

Another Episcopal dignitary Dean James M. Malloch of St. James Episcopal Cathedral in Fresno, Calif., believes that the second of these two religions is now promoted in racic schools. He said in an article con-... the May 1953 Catholic Digest:

"By a terrible irony, we have turned elementary and secondary public education over to the common enemy of all religion, the common secularist.'

We heartily agree with Dr. Kuebler that worship of statism is on the increase and we think we know the

Frank Chodorov, associate editor of Human Events and a columnist of Faith and Freedom magazine said in his book "One Is a Crowd".

State schools must teach religion whether we want them to or not. They teach the secular religion of Stat-

Dr. Kuebler pointed out in his speech that the reason state owned schools are any good in this country is that they must keep up with private schools, and that private competition furnishes state owned schools with an incentive they otherwise would lack.

"Chicago and Harvard have been established as the two best schools in the country," he said. "They are pri-

'The best state owned schools," according to Dr. Kuebler "are Michigan State, California and Minnesota. And the reason they are so good is because of the competition furnished by Harvard and Chicago.

We might point out that conversely the reason why non-government schools can't expand, grow, give scholarships to as many poor students as they would like is due. to competition from state-owned schools which forces parents who use the non-government schools to first pay for schools they don't want.

Non-government schools are usually forced to draw their teachers and professors from the same teachers colleges used by the state owned schools. This tends to cut down on differences. Whereas non-government schools lead the way into new fields, politically speaking they tend to follow public schools because there is hardly any source of teachers except those colleges approved by the Educational Association.

But we are glad to find an educator who gives credit to non-government schools for academic superiority. He may see the logic that these schools, including his own, could do much more but for the fact that they must bear a double financial burden. If parents who wished to support non-government schools were permitted to deduct the tax they now must pay to public schools and add this money to non-government schools, we would see real

A Familiar Story

"It can't happen to me."

How many times has that thought traced its way across your mind when you read an account of a deathdealing highway crash?

If you are like most American motorists, that's your reaction to traffic accidents, probably because you consider yourself a safe, competent driver.

But it CAN happen to you — and it will!

Just as sure as you are sitting in your easy chair reads ing this, an all-too-large percentage of you will meet a violent, bloody and senseless death when you make a high-speed error or when you become the victim of another's stupidity or carelessness.

Like thousands of motorists who die in traffic, you will not meet a graceful or pretty death. If your speeding auto smashes head on into another, or crashes into a heavy stationary object, whatever beauty or handsomeness you possess will vanish as you hurtle head first through the ragged remnants of the windshield. Perhaps that fancy hood ornament you are so proud of will slice you open as quickly — and far more painfully — than an assassin's knife.

Or the impact may spring a door open throwing you clear of the car. If this happens, your last performance on this earthly stage will be a macabre tumbling act as you roll over and over on the pavement at frightening and fatal speed.

Of course not all of you will die instantly.

Police officers and ambulance attendants may pry you from the tangled wreckage of your car and load you into an ambulance. As the driver runs his grim race with death, a siren lifting its mooning voice above the traffic noises will be your herold's trumpet announcing the entry of another citizen into the over-populated Kingdom

If you are one of the "lucky" accident victims, med-Ical skill and science may save your life. But if you are badly injured, it's certain you will have a long, painful siege in a cast or in a hospital bed. If you live and come through your ordeal with a full knowledge of the penalty of careless driving, you are indeed lucky.

Too many never discover that truth until it's too late. All of this doesn't odd up to a pretty story, does it? However, any patrolman or newsman will tell you that the descriptions used here are mild. Carnage on our highways is just as ghastly and wanton as it is on a battlefield.

If you have spent an hour rending your paper this evening, two people have died on United States highways. In the next 23 hours, 53 more are slated to become statistics in the ever-mounting traffic death toll. Next time you think it can't hapnen to you, just try

to visualize a million dead people. More than that have

"Dr Wallace H. Moore 6201 East Anaheim Long Beach 15, California

"Dear Dr. Moore: "This acknowledges receipt of your letter of March 18 in regard to a discussion on tax supported

"The letter I wrote to Everett E. Alton accepted the question for discussion as being worded: 'Public Education (Tax Supported Schools) is in Essence a Violation of the Golden Rule! It should naturally follow that if people believe in the Golden Rule and if the Golden Rule is a good guide for human relations and if tax supported schools violate it, then they should be abandoned.

"Your question accepts no moral standard or principle from which to reason or draw a conclusion and therefore is vague and evasive and would not help individuals understand that all human relations should be in agreement with some moral principle if moral results are to follow. It would be useless to try to debate a question that did not set down a moral principle from which to reason, and certainly would not be worth \$500,

"My proposal was that since I was to pay \$500 for the interview that I was to write the specifications. They would be that each party would have equal time. Each party would be allotted ten minutes to present his case and then each party would have 20 minutes to ask the other person questions, if he cared to use that much time. Then each party is to have two ten-minute periods to ask each other questions, Each question would have to be answered to the best of the ability of the answerer without evasion in one minute's time without the consent of the questioner for longer time or the answerer must pay \$25.00 to the questioner per minute or fraction thereof that he used more than one minute allotted to answer each question. Then each party would have ten minutes to sum up

"I will make a stenographic report of the investigation and make it available to anyone who wants to publish it in whole or in

"It certainly would be worth \$500 to me to find out whether ax supported schools are in agreement or violation of the Golden Rule, and I will be glad to pay \$500 for your conscientious effort to determine this,

"It is understood that you Dr. Wallace H. Moore, head of Education Department of Long Beach State College.

"If these conditions are satisfactory, we can then get together on a time and place that are mutually agreeable.

Yours very truly, & R. C. Hoiles

P. S. The only reason for limiting the time for answering each question is to prevent either party from taking up the time with irrelevant matter. A judge in a court case will not permit the witness to evade the question and talk on some other subject. Since there is no judge in this case with the power to do that, the only way is to agree before hand to a penalty for wasting time." On March 25 Dr. Moore wrote as follows:

"Dear Mr. Hoiles: "Your letter of March 23 turns down my acceptance of your chalan interview (see paragraph 4), an investigation (see paragraph 5), and court case (se P. S.). I am sorry to learn that you do not want to debate the issue.

"The topic suggested was: 'Resolved: That public education (tax supported schools) in the United States should be abandoned in favor of strong, effective private education.' How can you call that

topic 'vague and evasive'? "I should think that your argument that public education violates the Golden Rule would be only one of the reasons why you think public education should be abolished instead of making it the

entire subject. "Thank you, Mr. Hoiles, for your very prompt answer to my letter. I am trying to return the courtesy. Frankly, I am not interested in an interview, an investigation, or a court case. I am very much interested in a debate; I get together, using my original acceptance of your challenge as a basis of agreement? Let us in all place the issues before the people as fairly and as squarely as we

Most sincerely, WALLACE H. MOORE" This letter was answered by me on March 27 as follows:

"Dear Mr. Moore:

"This acknowledges yours of the 25th instance. I am perfectly willing to debate the subject on terms you suggest provided you will debate on the question and terms I suggest for \$500.00, but I would not give one nickel for a debate where either party has the right to take up the cross-examination time by making speeches. JACOBY ON BRIDGE **Great Plays Show** At Tournaments

By OSWALD JACOBY The standard of play in bridge ournaments has improved enor ously in the last 20-odd years. In the old days only a ranking ex-pert was able to execute a squeeze, and practically nobody knew what a dummy reversal was. In the recent Eastern States Regional Tournament, held in New York, several players combined a squeeze with a dummy reversaland thought nothing of it.

The hand was usually bid to four spades by some such auction as the one shown here today. The most common opening lead was low heart, and South won with the ace. Declarer's first step was to finesse the ten of spades, los ing to East's king. The defense varied a bit from

this point, but it came to the same thing in the end. In two cases I know of, East laid down the ace of clubs, dropping South's king. East then shifted back to hearts, forcing out dummy's king. Declarer got to his hand by ruffing a club and led another trump, picking up West's queen. South next ruffed out dummy's ast club, thus achieving the 'dummy reversal.'
