Bailey County Commissioners Court to request a parcel of land to be used to construct a miniature golf course.

This action was taken because of delays posed by government red tape when the Housing and Urban Development (HUD) raised questions about the proposed location, which would have been in the city park on West Avenue D. Although the city council freely offered a parcel of land to construct the golf course, the park was partially developed with federal funds and no additions could be made without their prior approval.

Following several months of delay, Prather approached the county about land near the Bailey County Exhibition Center and Coliseum.

After some discussion on the probable use of the land, and being informed the land was for sale, Prather asked the commissioners to put a price on the parcel sought to construct the golf course.

More discussion started before Commissioner Bob Sanders proposed giving the land to the Youth Activities Committee to construct the golf course. Commissioner Sanders has not missed a youth activity conducted at the Bailey County Exhibition Center and Coliseum and Commissioner Loyd Stephens has attended many of the functions.

Commissioners Sanders praised the activities and said the YAC should receive the land without charge. Cont. Page 2, Col. 1

### Tax Exemption Deadline Near Says Assessor

Muleshoe's school tax and city tax assessor/collector, Jesse Click, is issuing a last minute notice to persons eligible for the \$5,000 homestead tax exemption to be sure to come in and sign up prior to the April 30 deadline.

Click said all persons in the school district who reside in their home and have declared it as their homestead are eligible for the tax exemption.

At midweek, only about 50 percent of the qualified homeowners had signed up. The tax assessor/collector said they estimate some 1,600 homeowners are eligible, but they have only signed up 805 to date.

He also said that less than 25 percent of the homeowners in the Richland Hills area had signed up, and estimated that nearly 100 percent of the homeowners in that area were eligible.

Remember! April 30 is the deadline to go into the tax office at the city hall and sign up for the exemption.

### Congressman Hance Plans Meeting Here

United States Congressman Kent Hance, of Lubbock, will be in Muleshoe Tuesday to conduct a town hall type meeting.

At 7:30 p.m., he will greet constituents in the community at the Bailey County Exhibition Center

and Coliseum. During the first 30 minutes of his visit, he will brief the persons attending the meeting on what is happening in Washington.

He will also discuss current legislation affecting West Texas and West Texans.

This will be followed by an open question and answer session, during which time he will try to answer your questions on legislation or other matters of government.

Congressman Hance said he will have staff people with him to be available to the general public to handle specific and personal needs concerning problems with government agencies.

The town hall meeting will be open to the public, and all people in the area are encouraged to attend the meeting and hear the new Congressman talk about his first months in Washington.

He is expected to have up-to-date information to present on all legislation affecting this area.

At 5:30 p.m. on Monday, he will be in Morton at the Cochran County banquet room and will be in the Reddy Room at Southwestern Public Service Company at Littlefield at 7:30 p.m.

Before coming to Muleshoe Tuesday, he will conduct a meeting at 5:30 p.m. in the High School auditorium at Farwell.

The meeting is free and open to the public.

### Spotters Are Taught To Watch For Clouds Storm Sentries Save Lives Emphasizes CD Coordinator

With most of the country's attention focused on the northeastern part of Texas where devastating tornadoes slammed into Vernon and Wichita Falls early last week, the National Weather Service was attempting to help weather spotters.

Wednesday night, Larry Eblen of the Lubbock NWS office, conducted a weather school in Muleshoe. He was pleasantly surprised at the large number of persons who showed up at the Muleshoe Fire Department for the School.

Attending were members of the Muleshoe Fire Department; Lazbuddie Fire Department; Earth Fire

Department; Sudan Fire Department; Bailey County Civil Defense; City Police; Sheriff's office; City employees; Boy Scouts and a few citizens.

Eblen started his presentation with a slide grouping, showing various cloud formations and explained as he showed the slides what to watch for when clouds are formed, and what constitutes a potential severe storm.

He explained that the storm moves in the same direction as the top cloud or anvil cloud is moving. According to the NWS spokesman, an ordinary storm lasts from 30-90 minutes and emphasized to watch for lightning, as he said, lightning is the number 1 weather killer in the world today.

Also, Eblen explained that large hail and high wind are always in front of a cloud instead of behind it, very often, the storm abates, and wind dies down and hail stops, immediately before a tornado is formed.

He said a severe storm will last up to three hours without dying and was emphatic that radar can only see rain, hail and

# Winter Damaged Growth Needs Special Care

Severe winter weather has caused greater than normal injury to evergreen plants and fruit trees on the Texas High Plains. Homeowners need to take steps now to save these damaged plants, says a plant pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Injury to perennials occurred during subzero weather around Christmas and New Year, said Dr. Robert Berry, Extension area plant pathologist. Fruit and flowering trees were damaged during recent cold snaps while they were trying to flower, he said.

"If the damage was severe to some types of plants in certain locations in your landscaping, it is reasonable to assume that such damage will recur under similar weather conditions," Berry said.

"This might be a good

time to replace these types in your landscaping with other plants or varieties that are more hardy and less susceptible to winter damage."

The most seriously damaged plants are Euonymus hedges, the Extension plant pathologist said. Many of these plantings have been killed to the ground.

In protected areas, some Euonymus plants just have dead leaves and should be putting out new growth now. But unprotected plants may have been killed back to the crown and should be pruned back to live wood, Berry advised.

"If they have good root systems, they'll make rapid regrowth after pruning," he said.

these plants are not suffering any real harm, he said.

Winter injury, especially mechanical injury from winter wind, has caused a lot of leaf spotting on waxleaf ligustrum. These plants will put out new growth, Berry said. Unless the plants are misshapen, they won't need pruning, he added.

Similar spotting is found on holly. This is mostly mechanical injury caused by spines of older leaves puncturing tender new leaves due to wind action.

"Homeowners should provide windbreaks now to protect new leaves from being punctured," Berry said. Once the puncturing occurs, there is nothing that can be done, he warned. The real damage will become apparent in the fall.

Ground covers, especially vinca, were frozen back this winter, leaving nearly all their leaves dead. The best treatment is to clean beds and cut the plants back to stubble to force new growth.

Many fruit trees in most areas of the South Plains have lost their fruit buds to

winter damage," Berry said. Many of the flowering shrubs suffered similar damage.

The thing homeowners must remember with these trees, Berry cautioned, is that they should not be heavily fertilized. Heavy fertilization and watering, he warned, will cause the trees to grow too fast since they have no fruit load. They will then be more sensitive to cold damage next winter.

Established junipers and Arizona cypresses have had very little winter problem, the Extension specialist said. But he cautioned that plants put in the ground last spring may have suffered more damage than normal, especially if fertilized and watered heavily right up to first frost.

"On all plants, if the roots and lower parts are healthy, there will be regrowth," Berry said. Homeowners should prune damaged plants carefully and water and fertilize them as needed. "It is always in order to cut dead growth out of a plant," Berry said.

## RECIPE

**By Sarah Ann Sheridan**  
Give a lift to everyday meals by using pimientos. They add a note of color to salads, seafoods, spoon bread, stews, or sandwiches.

**Pimiento Spoon Bread**  
2 eggs  
1 c milk  
1 c water  
1/2 c corn meal  
1/2 c cooked rice  
1 t baking powder  
2 T butter  
2 pimientos drained and minced  
1 pimiento drained and cut into rings

Beat eggs. Add milk and water. Stir in meal. Add rice, baking powder, butter, minced pimiento, and salt. Put in buttered casserole. Bake about 30 to 40 minutes in an oven 400 degrees. Garnish with pimiento rings and serve with tomato, cheese or mushroom sauce as a luncheon or supper dish.

**Pimiento with Scrambled Eggs**  
4 eggs  
2 whole pimientos chopped  
4 T milk or cream  
1/2 t salt  
pepper  
1 T butter

Beat eggs, add milk, salt and pepper. Add chopped pimientos. Heat butter in frying pan. Pour in egg mixture. Reduce heat. Cook slowly 5 to 8 minutes, lifting from sides and bottom as the mixture thickens. Serve hot.

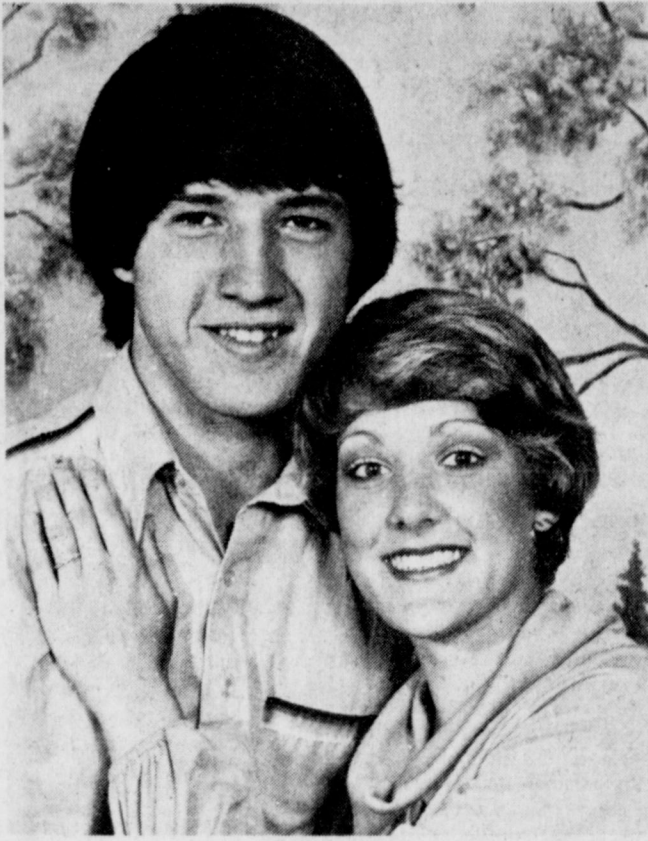

snow. "If we're lucky, we can find one out of five tornadoes." He added that radar is good, up to a point, as it can predict the intensity of a storm and only occasionally will a 'hook' show up on the radar, indicating a possible tornado in the 'wall' cloud which forms below a thunderstorm cloud. He also commented that radar will not see a tornado hook more than 60 miles from the radar.

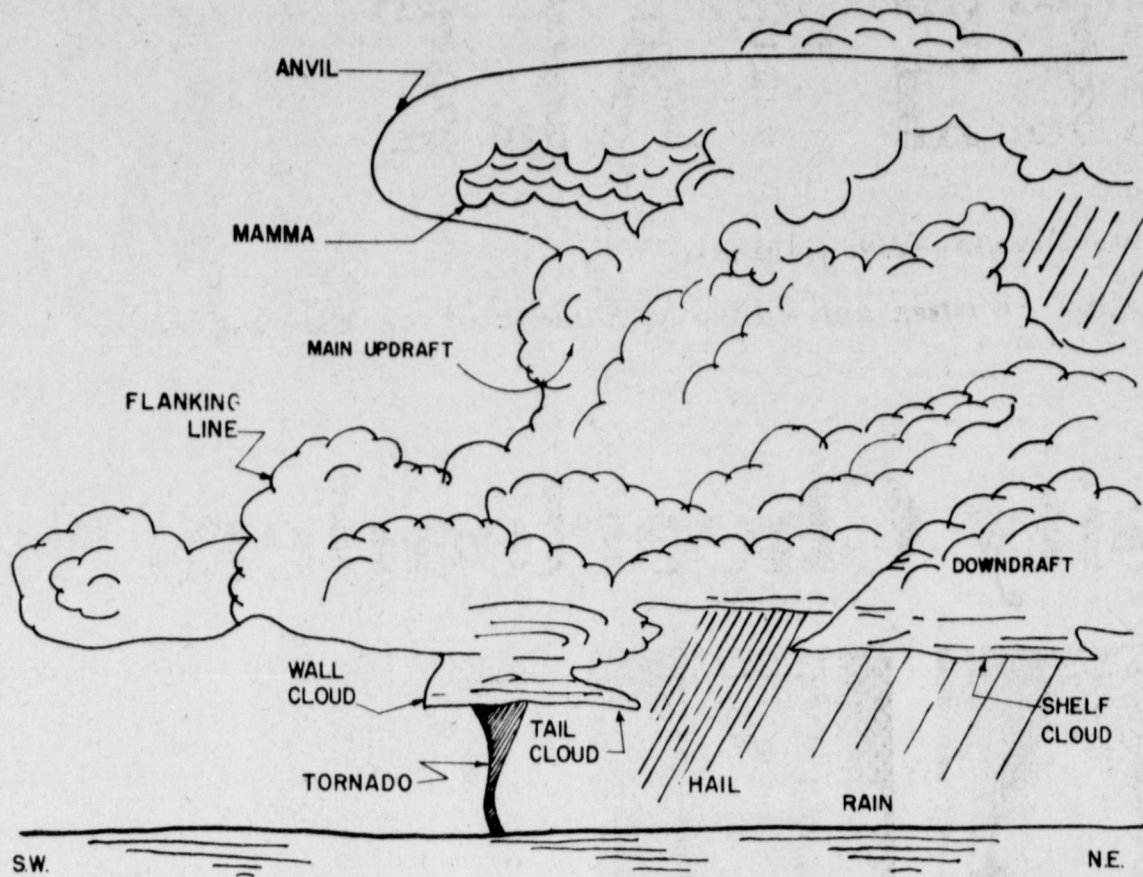
Eblen explained that a tornado is smooth, tapered and rotates, touching the ground and causing damage. At the same time, a funnel cloud is also smooth and may be tapered, but does not touch the ground, and does not do damage.

According to the films shown, a tornado may be white, grey, black or 'invisible.' In other words, the tornado connecting with the ground may not be seen at all until it starts picking up dirt and debris and tossing it into the vortex of the rotating cloud.

Eblen said one third of all tornadoes are medium size; up to 400 feet wide, and will travel on the ground for up to 10 miles. They will last an estimated 20 minutes with winds to 200 miles per hour.

One half of all tornadoes are mini-tornadoes which are to 100 feet wide, a mile or a little more on the ground is usually the maximum with winds to 125 miles per hour. A mini-tornado is usually not a killer tornado.

Maxi-tornadoes, such as the ones that struck at Vernon and Wichita Falls, are killer tornadoes, the maxi-tornado. They are up to a mile and a half wide, and can stay on the ground for more than 220 miles and can last three hours or more. A maxi-tornado has winds to 300 miles per hour.



**TYPICAL TORNADO-PRODUCING CLOUD...**The form of the usual tornado-producing cloud is anvil-shaped at its crest with a rougher overshooting top at the dome. Mamma, which appear to be balloon-shaped formations, may drop from the anvil shape. At ground-level the common appearance is rain falling from a shelf cloud, usually in the northeastern portion of the parent cloud. Southwest of this there will be a wall cloud, sometimes with a horizontal tail cloud at the forward or northeast lower portion of it. This tail cloud is not the tornado. The tornado itself forms typically at the southwest lower edge of this wall cloud. Behind the tornado there is not likely to be rain, but, instead, a precipitation-free cloud base. As Texas still has the highest death toll from tornadoes of any state, Eblen said the deaths are becoming fewer each year with more sophisticated weather spotting. He said weather spotters, who know what they are looking for, save more lives than all the Weather Service predictions.

Bailey County Civil Defense Coordinator Cleve Bland added a word of caution to the film and slide presentation of the

spokesman from the National Weather Service.

He reminded that although trained weather spotters will be watching closely during severe weather, there is still a problem getting the information to the people.

Bland suggests that all homes and businesses add a Storm Sentry, the sure fire 24-hour safety warning device. Silent until it is needed, the Storm Sentry still works even if the power is knocked out by a storm. Periodic checks are made to see that the Storm Sentry is operable and any Storm Sentry not operating should be reported to the City of Muleshoe, Radio Station KMUL or any Civil Defense member.

Check into a Storm Sentry and be sure you can keep informed as to severe weather, suggests Bland. During severe weather, law enforcement officers are too busy to explain the approaching weather. With a Storm Sentry, persons can be kept current with minute by minute cloud movement and intensity.
