British Sign Trade Pact With Commies

LONDON, July 7 - UP -An unofficial British trade delegation was reported today to have signed a \$168 million trade agreement with Communist China despite official warnings that such ac-2ion might harm Anglo-American relations.

A New China News Agency broadcast monitored here said each side would sell the other goods valued at 30 million pounds with payment being made in pounds "This agreement is official as between the China National Import

and Export Corp. and a British delegation consisting of 16 members,' The British delegation repre sents about 50 British manufactur-

ing companies and import-export erchants. It was organized by the British council for the promotion of international trade presided over by Lord Boyd Orr. A source connected with the or-

ganization said the British foreign "frowned on the mis sion from the word go because they considered it might prove prejudicial to our American friends' interests."





No More UN Wars

"No more UN Wars" is the hope expressed in a lead editorial in the June 29 issue of Freeman, conservative magazine of opinion edited by Henry Hazlitt. If Communist aggression makes it necessary ever again to send Americans to fight and die, the editorial says, we should do so under conditions enabling us to dictate the terms of a peace settlement when the conflict ends.

Senator Taft's stand on the subject is praised as one which is based on the realities of the international situation. "Whatever limited value the United Nations may have as an international forum, it is the worst conceivable agency for conducting a war or negotiating a peace. The U.S. cannot safely be supplanted by the UN. The fiasco in Korea should be the last. Never again should Americans be asked to give their lives as part of an unequal bargain in which the Americans do the fighting and dying and the United Nations does the oppeasing and capitulating."

The Freeman's editorial also discourages the hope that we can look with optimism to the political conference which will follow the armistice. "The United States will be subjected to the strongest kind of pressure to consent to the admission of Red China to the United Nations. The nations that have done so much to sabotage the conduct of the war with a view to victory may be expected to do everything in their power to lose the peace."

The United States will lose all prestige and influence In the Orient if it permits the Red Chinese regime, which boasts that it has slaughtered some two million of its own "counter-revolutionary" subjects, to take part in

This regime "has been waging war for almost three years against the United Nations, trying to shoot its May into the organization. It has been actively supporting the Communist attempt to take over Indo-China. To recognize Red China would be a terrific blow to the Chinese Nationalists on Formosa. Surely at Yalta there was enough of sacrificing faithful friends to oppease implacable enemies."

Birds of a feather still continue to flock together.

It is also unfortunate that Representative Jackson did not modify his language in referring to Bishop Oxnam. Few who know Oxnam happen to have known the Bishop for more than 30 years. I have met him in debate and know his stand on this question. Oxnam is not a Communist. He is a Socialist. He is possibly more friendly to Communist ideals than he is to capitalism. He has been for years openly antagonistic to what is known as the American way. To say that he serves the church on Sunday and Communism the rest of the week is too strong. Therefore Jackson is to be censured. But the actual and factual record is against the Bishop. He has indeed been associated with too many Communist front groups. He is consistently critical of his country, as he was when he intimated that the United States had gone into Mexico to steal oil land. Oxnam is much more critical of Wall street and "big business" than he is of the devil. Such an attitude is not easily understood in a minister. Of course The Washington Post is his enthusiastic defender and ally in these matters but that does not save the Bishop. It rather damns the Bishop in public opinion.
