## Pampa Youths Freed By Pair **Of Fugitives**

FRASER, Colo., Aug. 25 -UP-One of two armed youths who es-caped from the Camp Carson stock-ade Monday night and fled into the mountains with two Pampa, Tex., boys as hostages was captur-ed hear here early Tuesday. State patrolmen, sheriff's officers and mounted patrolmen from Grand county were reported closing in on the other youth believed surrounded in the mountainous country.

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The captured youth was identi-fied as Benedict Drango, 21. The other still, at large, was identified as Frank Brinck, 18. Their rank and home towns were not known immediately.

The two reportedly fled from the stockade Monday night, stole a Cadallac in Colorado Springs, picked up two Texas youths as hostages and then led authorities on a wild chase through the mountains.

The hostages were identified as Darwin C. Malone, 18, and Gilbert E. Sulton, 15, both of Pampa, Tex. The state patrol said the two Texas boys were picked up about a mile and a half north of Colorado Springs while hitchhiking.

Darwin C. Malone is the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. D. Malone of Pampa, Mrs. Malone told The Pampa Daily News shortly after noon today they had last seen their son last Wednesday when they left him on the Walden, Colo, ranch of Mrs. Mrlone's father, Bob Adam-

She did not know where the boys were headed when they were accosted by the two fugitives. She said she does not know her son's ompanion, Gilbert Sutton. The car was abandoned and the

hostages released unharmed near here early Tuesday and the two escapees fled into the wooded mountain area on foot.

The fugitives and the hostages were spotted in Denver by a filling station attendant, Lee Brownell, thoud Pass, west of here and high in the Rockies.
