Johnson Slates Radio Program

Farmers Urged To Test Seed Wheat

Farmers planning to seed wheat this fall from the 1953 crop are urged to test for germination percentage immediately by County Agent Ralph Thomas.

An official report on area wheat from the Amarillo Grain Exchange laboratory shows wheat produced from this year's drought crop with only 20 per cent germination. Thomas pointed out.

And, he said, reports from local farmers who have tested their own show an even lower percentage. Usually, Thomas said, drought wheat carries a higher germination test, but for some reason this year's wheat is low.

As wheat with a low germination test produces a weak plant even if enough seed is planted to get a stand, it would pay farmers to obtain better grades of wheat to seed, Thomas stressed.

Wheat should be tested now, the agent said, in order for new seed to be obtained.

Mercury Climbs; Skies Clearing

Clear skies and climbing mercury today marked the return of "good old summertime" to the Pampa area following several days of beneficial rains which broke the drought here and lowered temperatures.

At 11 a.m. today the mercury stood at 89 degrees, three marks above the maximum reached in the area Monday. Low temperature registered early this morning was 69 degrees.

Farm Jobs Due In Few Days

"It's still too wet to plow," That's the reason Bill Ragdale, head of the local Texas Employment Commission, gave this morning to explain why there were still few agricultural jobs available.

"Farmers should be coming in in three or four days, though," Ragdale stated, adding that it could be Wednesday or Thursday.

On tap late this morning on the local TEC office were some 15 positions, including those for stenographer, butcher, bookkeeper and salesman.

Last week saw "no pickup" in the local job situation. "We were just rocking along with very few jobs," said Ragdale.

Pampa Scouters Swim In Pacific

IRVINE RANCH, NEWPORT HARBOR, Calif. (Special)—Though this is the fifth day of the third National Boy Scout Jamboree and activities are in full swing, all of us from the Pampa area are still looking back on Sunday and what it had in store for us.

Incidentally, just a few of the many, many activities offered in this gathering of 50,000 Scouts from all corners of the globe are angling, swimming, hiking, handicrafts and Scoutcraft.

Sunday our section (34) went swimming in warm, blue waters of the Pacific. That night all sections and regions had big campfires. The most popular pastime is "swapping," or trading. All the boys are eagerly engaged in it. The national committee here

at the jamboree has even set up large open sided tents for the boys to swap objects in.

We left at 3 p.m. Sunday and drove by bus to Newport Beach. Newport Beach is a strip of sand-beach about two miles long. It slopes off gradually into deeper water. All along this strip of seashore, there are large waves called "breakers." The riptide is not strong, and there is practically no undertow. It is one of the safest beaches in the State of California.

We swam until about 4:30; by then there are six trading posts, scattered over the Jamboree area. At each of these posts, there is a large swap tent. Here the boys from all sections convene and trade such objects as Scout patches, neckerchief slides and horny loads.

A few boys from North Dakota brought some white and black Kangaroo rats to the Jamboree.

The boys in our troop have been trading or buying these rats, and then selling them to the New York boys for from \$6.00-\$12.00. Some of us have made a lot of spending money out of them.

Some of the rarer region patches have also been worth a lot. Among these, Region 9 (Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico) are the most valuable, with some of them selling to patch collectors for as much as \$20. For the majority of the boys though, their collections contain only those patches which they can "swap" for other patches.

Anyone who wants to send their son to the jamboree something which will be appreciated can buy some patches at the local Scout office and send them to his Scout friends. Camp patches are trading very well.

Two Men Charged In Twin Shooting

(Continued from page one) to achieve the objective during a specific length of time.

Now, Pyun said, Harrison has told the Communists at Pannun-jon that:

1. The U.N. would not interfere with "military action" taken by the Communists against South Korean forces if the ROK government resorted to unilateral action to unify Korea by force.

2. The U.N. promised that all supporting supplies and equipment to the ROK forces would be halted if the South Koreans "violated" an armistice agreement.

3. The U.N. agreed that there should be no time limit on an armistice.

"If Gen. Harrison has agreed to the points as embodied in (chief Red negotiator) Nam Il" latest statements, he certainly has helped to crown the real significance of some of the safeguards which we thought we had gained," Pyun said.

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Ailing Churchill Has One Ambition

(Editor's note: Prime Minister Winston Churchill's withdrawal from active leadership of the British government for health reasons has caused speculation he is far more ill than officially revealed that his sickness was planned to delay a meeting with Russia, United Press Diplomatic Writer R. C. Thaler has disclosed. Churchill with numerous friends of the prime minister and it was on the basis of these conversations the following dispatch was written.)

LONDON, July 20.—Prime Minister Winston Churchill has a burning ambition to crown his long and illustrious career with one more feat.

His close friends and associates said Churchill wants to "settle the world." He wants to get the Russians to sit down at the same table with Americans, British and French and change the course of history in one dazzling stroke.

His final goal is negotiation of the hot and cold war, and putting the world on the path of peace for several generations.

Because of this burning desire, Churchill hopes to return to his desk at No. 10 Downing Street within a month. He is rapidly recovering from his illness.

Must Take It Easy
But Churchill's physicians have advised him to take it easy for still another month, even though they have permitted him to have more visitors and do slightly more work.

The physicians have cautioned Churchill to be patient for one more reason — because of his age.

Churchill is 78. Already rumors have circulated through London that he is dying.

Officials close to the prime minister insist he is "steadily improving" and complaining about his enforced idleness at his country home, Chartwell.

Still Working
He continues to do a "fair amount of work," a friend said.

Dr. Joseph Salreno examined her and sent for an ambulance. But before it arrived Mrs. McCarthy gave birth to her fifth child, a boy.

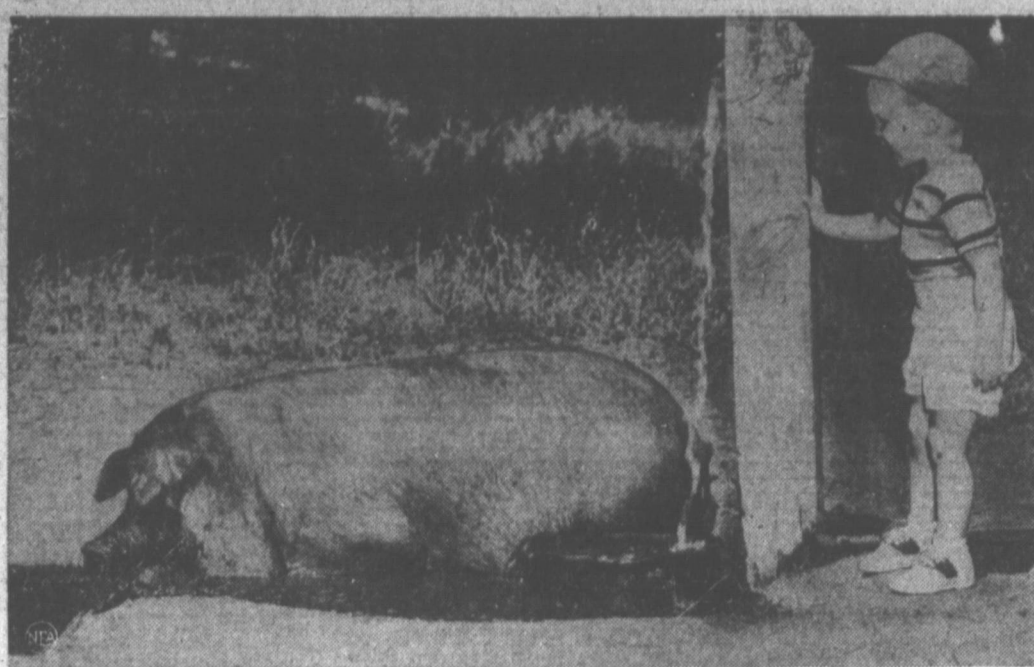
"I never dreamed I was going to have one," she said.

The announcement that Russia and Israel are resuming diplomatic relations has special international implications.

It would indicate that:
1. Russia will continue — although perhaps in modified form — her current peace offensive.
2. The vast, hungry but non-Communist under-belly of Asia minor and Asia, from the Dardanelles of Turkey to the islands of Indochina, are high up on the Communist list of future conquest.
3. Russia broke off relations with Israel last February after the bombing of the Soviet legation at Tel Aviv. Coincident with the break was the fact that the Communist anti-Zionist campaign was at its peak throughout Russia and the

Federal Trade Commission Probes Scrap Metal Works

WASHINGTON (NEA)—Don't ever speak of them as junk dealers again. The scrap metal industry—if you please—has now become so big that it is being given an antitrust investigation by the Federal Trade Commission. To be investigated for alleged monopolistic practices is, of course, a mark of distinction in the business world. The FTC case and report on scrap metal trade is now near completion. The investigation has been going on for nearly two years. It began in the great scrap shortage after the Korean war broke out. It was based on complaints from small scrap dealers that they were discriminated against through exclusive buying contracts which the big steel mills make with a few brokers.



They are mostly the little fellows, who buy it by the pound. Then there are the preparers in whose yards the metals are sorted, put in heavy presses for some types of sheet metal and then, or assembled in carload lots. Finally there are the brokers. A broker may run a yard on the side as a hedge for his telephone business. But mostly the brokers buy from preparers and sell to the mills on monthly purchase contracts. The trade practice has developed in such a way that the mills would prefer to buy from several brokers rather than several hundred small dealers. This is where the complaints of the little fellows come in. When they try to sell direct to a mill, they are told that they will have to deal through brokers who have exclusive supply contracts. The scrap industry is made up of about 2000 firms. Some 1300 of them belong to the Institute of Scrap Iron and Steel, which is the trade association for the industry. It has a swank Washington office, a badge which is "the hallmark of integrity in scrap" and 24 chapters, like a fraternity. The dues range from \$125 to \$1250 a year. There are seven firms in the top bracket who are the big boys. The story of Edwin C. Barringer, executive vice-president of the Institute and its Washington representative, is that there is no monopoly in his business. On the contrary, he says there is too much competition of a particularly vicious cut-throat variety. Dealers quarrel with brokers and brokers with preparers over price and quality.

Kingpin of Industry
It is generally admitted, however, that the kingpin of the industry is Luria Bros. and Co. of Philadelphia. It has offices and yards in 17 cities in all major steel-making centers from coast to coast. In addition, it controls and finances many dealers. The growth of Luria is one of the romances of American business. The original Luria, a Russian immigrant, started the business as a dealer in 1889. His sons carried on the business and took in a partner Max Silberman, who married one of their sisters. This started the tradition that a man had to be born into the Luria family, or marry into it, to be a success in the scrap industry. But the present head of the firm, Joel Claster, is a Dickinson College graduate and lawyer who joined

Luria as its counsel in 1919. He is a past-president of the Institute. Ralph R. Abion, now president, is executive vice-president of Luria in New York. The tie-up of Luria contracts with some 25 of the big steel companies is one of the subjects that has been under FTC investigation. Its purpose is to increase the flow of scrap to the mills. When FTC issues its report, it will be on the basis of whether anything contrary to the public interest is involved in present scrap trade practices. If FTC finds evidence that any of the antimonopoly laws have been violated, it may

issue a complaint, specifying what trade practices should be eliminated, after hearings. If there is a finding of violation, cease-and-desist orders may be issued. These orders may be appealed to the federal courts within 60 days. The steel scrap case is considered important in that it may reveal the future policy line for the reconstituted Federal Trade Commission under its new Chairman, Edward F. Howrey. It is estimated that nearly 2800 languages are spoken in the world today.

Specifically, what the Federal Trade Commission has been digging into is the channeling of scrap—its route it follows from pick-up to ultimate purchase by the big steel mills. Last year the mills bought nearly 34 million tons of scrap. At \$40 a ton, that would amount to over \$1.3 billion, which ain't junk, that is, scrap. Include the copper, aluminum and other nonferrous scrap, and it's a \$2 billion annual business. Back Yard To Mill The process by which this scrap gets from back yard or cellar to be melted down for some new gadget is almost as complicated and full of protocol as a government operation. First there are the collectors.

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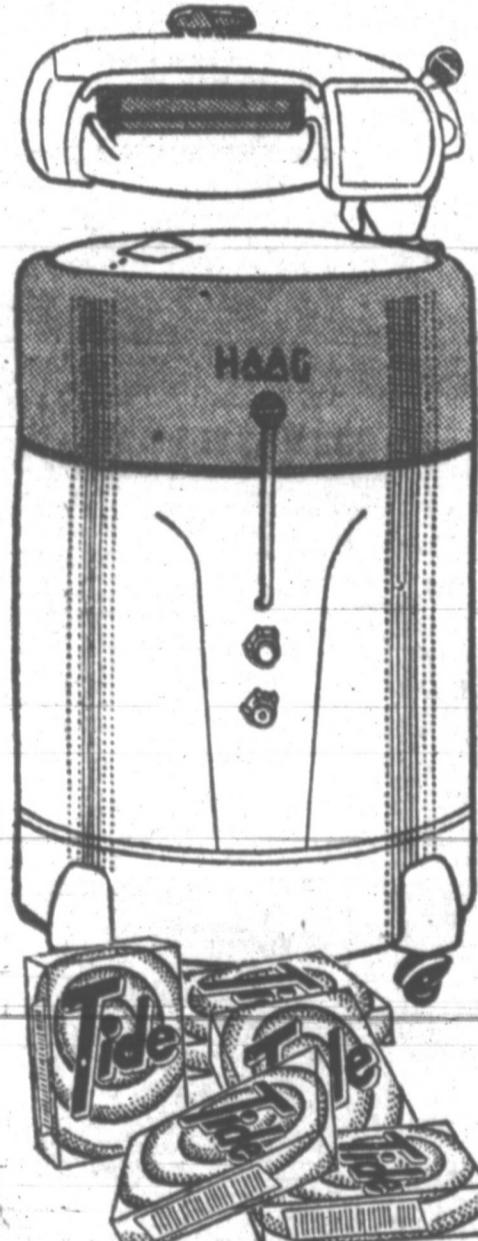

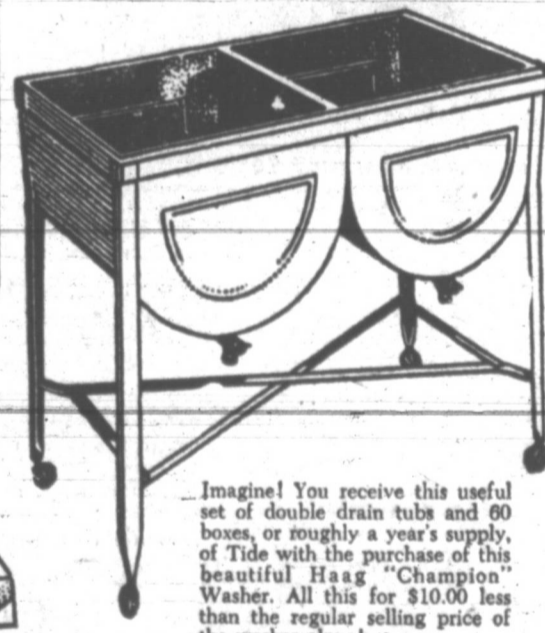
