

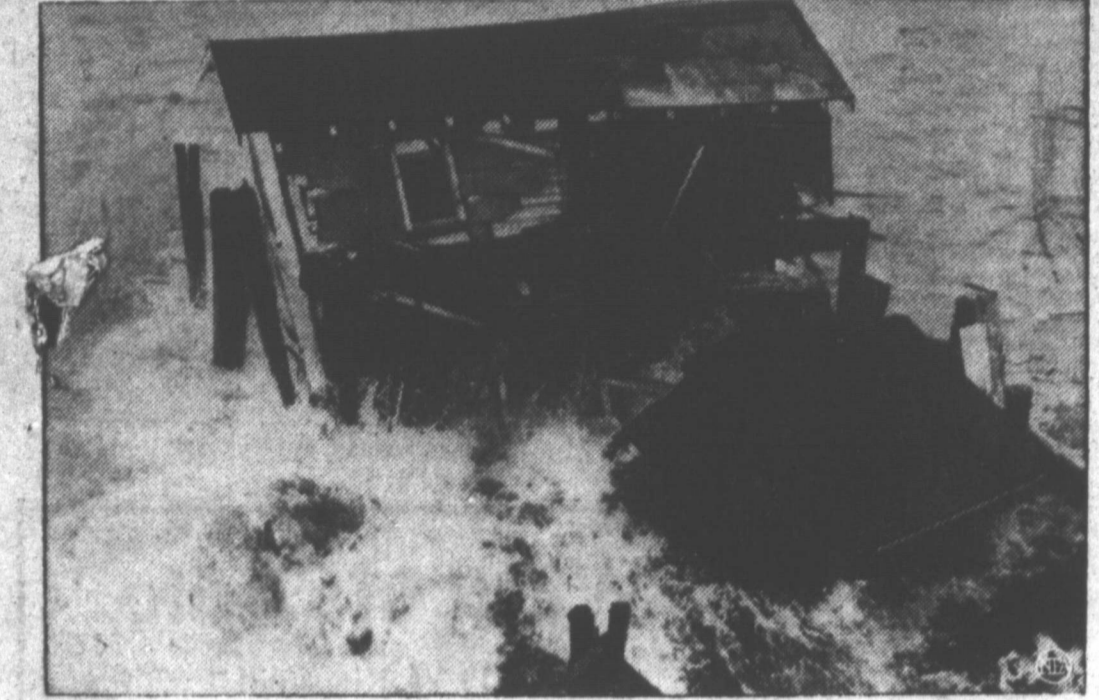

Snow Storm Snarls Traffic In Midwest

A snow storm snarled traffic and closed schools in parts of the Midwest on the first full day of winter Tuesday, and three feet of drifted snow in Kansas City, Mo., kept a weatherman from reporting to work.

Monday the tardy meteorologist, Paul Waite, predicted "light" snow.

A cold wave rolling eastward out of the Midwest drove temperatures downward and dumped the layer

of new snow over a wide band stretching from the western Great Lakes to the Texas Panhandle.

Six inches fell in Kansas City and three at Wichita, and the Missouri and Kansas highway patrol warned motorists to keep off the roads except for essential travel.

A wet, steady snow storm whitened Chicago.

Rural schools in the Topeka, Kan., area were closed.

Temperatures were still dropping as the leading edge of the cold wave moved to a line from the eastern Great Lakes southwestward to southern Texas, and the weather bureau issued several special warnings.

Dulles Says USSR Won't Engage In A General War

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 —UP—
Secretary of State John Foster
Dulles said Tuesday that peoples
under Soviet domination are so
discontented "it would be reck-
less" for the Russians "to engage
in general war."
Dulles said the East German re-
volt last June clearly exposed "the
fast underlying discontent" of
workers in Soviet satellite areas.
"It indicates that if there were
an armed invasion of western Eu-
rope, the Soviet lines of commu-
nications might not be altogether
secure," Dulles said.
Dulles made these observations in
an address prepared for delivery
at a National Press Club luncheon.
He devoted the first portion of the
address to a report on the recent
meeting in Paris.
Dulles said the NATO ministers
judged "the danger of open mili-
tary aggression from Soviet Russia
was less than it had been a year
or two before."
If this is true, Dulles said, it is
largely due to NATO's growing
power. But he added that the de-
creasing likelihood of war also is
due to internal pressures and dis-
contents "resulting from the bad
living conditions within the Soviet

Opposition Heard On Plan For Hobart Street Setback

Two property owners this morn-
ing voiced opposition to the pro-
posed 40-foot setback along the
east side of Hobart street to make
room for a proposed overpass.
However, they were opposed to
the setback for different reasons.
Paul Chambers, who owns prop-
erty along the east side of Hobart
street and who is a member of
the city's zoning commission, told
the city commissioners at a pub-
lic hearing late this morning that
he thought the city should make
a deal with the property owners
to buy their property along the
right of way.
"We told the commissioners that
"we can't sell any property along
that street now at any price since
the announcement of the proposed
setback."
The other Pampan expressing
opposition to the setback was E.
J. Ayers, who said that he feared
that it would turn Hobart street
into a speedway.
He asked Mayor Tom Rose
"are you going to build a speed-
way?" The mayor answered "no,"
adding that "we plan to build an
underpass.
Discussing the safety angle at
length, Mayor Rose told Ayers
that the present crossing over the
Santa Fe railroad is a traffic haz-
ard, adding that it is more of a
hazard than the proposed under-

pass would create.
The hearing, which began at 10
a.m. continued until late this
morning.
In other action the commission-
ers voted to accept a bid sub-
mitted by the Cyclone Fence Com-
pany, Lubbock, in the amount
of \$1,930 for a fence to be in-
stalled at the city's No. 2 pump
station on S. Hobart.
The bid was for material only.
The city will build the fence
around the station, it was pointed
out.
Other bidders were Acme Weld-
ing company, Amarillo, \$1,941.87;
Modern Freecene and Awning com-
pany, Pampa, \$2,050; Osborne
Construction company, Pampa,
\$2,200; Lynn Boyd, Pampa, \$2,310,
and Les Kreis, Skellytown \$2,
837.42.
A bid of \$1,720 for a receipting
and validating machine submitted
by the National Cash Register
company was accepted. The only
other bid submitted was for a
larger machine. This bid was
for \$2,725.
The machine, which will be
used in the city water office, ac-
tually will cost \$1,780 due to the
fact that two more totals will be
added to the present seven totals
on the machine.
Proposed extension of the city's
fire zone and a proposed building
code were discussed, but no action
was taken, pending further study
by the commissioners.

to this country, he found employ-

German Cookies Spice Christmas Holiday Menus

MILWAUKEE — UP Milwaukee still is the home of German cooking in this country and around Christmas time local hausfraus whip up baked goodies to help out Weihnachtsmann, his equivalent of our Santa Claus.
The cookies and cakes are delicious eating regardless of national descent. Mrs. Hilda Burgardt shares some of her favorite recipes.
ONE HOLIDAY COOKIE
One treat she prepares for the holidays is eier plätzchen made as follows:
Cream 1 cup butter, add the well-beaten yolks of 2 eggs and mix thoroughly. Press 4 yolks of hard-cooked eggs through a sieve and add the butter mixture. Next add 4 cups of sifted flour, 1 cup sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1 teaspoon of vanilla flavoring. Form into a roll and place in the refrigerator overnight.
Next day roll the mixture into a sheet 1/4 inch thick and cut into shapes to please.
Spread the shapes with the whites of 2 eggs beaten with 1 tablespoon of sugar and sprinkle with chopped almonds. Bake 10 minutes at 375 degrees on a cookie sheet.
THIS ONE IS SPICE
For a spicier cookie Mrs. Burgardt prepares the traditional lebkuchen.
Sift together 8 cups of flour, 1/2 teaspoon soda, 1 1/2 teaspoons cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves and 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg.
Now boil 1 1/2 cups of honey, 2 cups of brown sugar and 1/4 cup water together for 5 minutes. Let the mixture cool.
To it add 2 cups of blanched and shredded almonds, 2 slightly beaten eggs, 1 1/2 cups shredded candied orange peels, 1 1/2 cups shredded citron and the spiced flour.
Work the mixture into a loaf and store in the refrigerator two or three days. Then roll the loaf on a floured board until it's about 1/2

Pocahontas - Captain John Smith Story True Except Romance, Say Biographer

NEW YORK — (NEA) — Popular opinion has it that the woman behind a famous man must be a loving wife or doting mother. For one exception, consider Capt. John Smith of Virginia Colony fame. Bradford Smith (no relation) did, and has come up with an interesting tale.
Not one, but three women have contributed to the making of John Smith. Or so contends the author of the recently-published "Capt. John Smith."
Bradford Smith, who spent two years delving into the history of this controversial colonial hero, looks like a man who spends most of his time enjoying the scenery around his Vermont home. Ruddy-faced, with sparkling blue eyes and sandy-colored hair, he is quiet in manner and speech.
As he talked of the first woman influential in John Smith's life, Bradford Smith's reticence diminished. In the quiet of the Algonquin Hotel lounge, he warmed up to his subject.
The first of the ladies was indeed John Smith's mother. But a doting one she was not.
"You see," Smith said, leaning forward on his chair, "with present-day knowledge of psychology, we can get a man's whole life into proper focus. For instance, I believe that an experience John Smith had when he was in set his life pattern."
The author explained that John Smith's father died at that time and his mother remarried a short time later. The feeling of rejection which he experienced seems to have profoundly influenced all his relations with women. "His writings reveal this," the Vermont Smith said earnestly.
On the other hand, the author pointed out, the soldier's affection for his mother has been so great that he seems to have spent his adulthood seeking a mother substitute.
At any rate, with this suspicion of women entrenched in his character, the youth had added stimulation to seek his fortune as a world-traveling soldier. Family ties would never bind him.
One flash of amusement traced Bradford Smith's eyes as he started to speak of the next woman to figure prominently in the colonist's life. And enter the now-legendary Indian princess, Pocahontas. In his writings Smith allotted just six lines to her. Yet to many Americans, John Smith's story reaches its height with the introduction of Pocahontas.
Bradford Smith believes he has disproved conclusively the 100-year-old claim that Smith lied when he wrote the Indian princess saved his life. Pocahontas did intervene with her father on Smith's behalf. But also for romance, the story about ends there. Since the princess was just 13 years old at the time of the encounter, she was

hardly his one to fill the mother-substitute role.
The third woman to secure the place of John Smith in history has just now stepped into the picture. She is Laura Striker, a Hungarian historian, who has helped Bradford Smith prove that the dashing captain did not dream the accounts of his famous adventures.
The swashbuckling episodes in Hungary and Turkey that he reported not only are true, but, Mrs. Striker found, actually shed light on Hungarian history. Thus John Smith's historical position seems assured.
Such is the power of woman. Of three women.

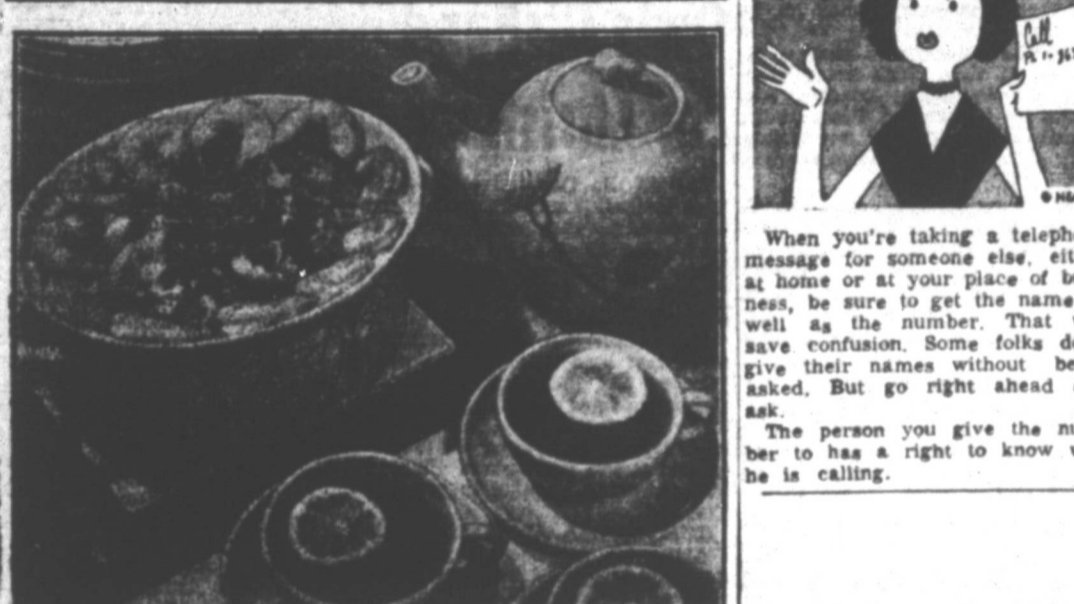

Xmas Eve Casserole and Hot Tea



Shrimp and Oyster Casserole
(Makes about 6 servings)
1 slice bacon, diced
1 clove garlic, minced
2 medium onions, sliced
1 1/2 cups celery and leaves
1 cup silvered green peas
1 bay leaf
1 teaspoon chili seasoning
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1 1/2 cans tomatoes
1 1/2 cups water
1/2 cup rice
1 1/2 teaspoons vinegar
1/4 cup cooked green peas
1/2 cup cooked shrimp
12 oysters
Sauté bacon in 3-quart pot. Add garlic, onion, celery, pepper and bay leaf. Sauté until tender. Add chili, pepper, tomato, water, rice, vinegar and sugar. Bring to a boil. Pour into 3-quart casserole. Cover. Bake in moderate oven 375° F. for 45 minutes. Add peas, shrimp and oysters. Mix lightly. Return to oven. Bake uncovered 10 minutes longer or until the edges of the oysters begin to curl. Serve immediately.

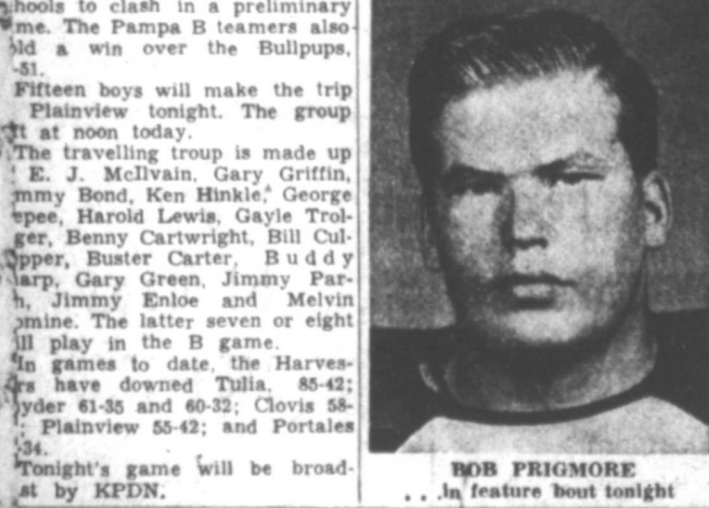

World War II Alliance Was An Aid To Russian Espionage

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the second in a series of five United States dispatches on Communist espionage in the United States. The following story deals with the wartime boom in Soviet spying against the ally.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 — UP—The World War II Russian-American alliance opened vast new opportunities for Soviet espionage within the borders of her new ally. Russia lost no time making the most of the situation. Opportunities for successful espionage activities were enhanced, according to some espionage experts, by these factors:

1. A feeling on the part of some misguided individuals that, inasmuch as Russia was an ally, she was entitled to all information, regardless of its secret classification.

2. The influx after Pearl Harbor, of many Russian officials for so-called purchasing and liaison missions in New York and Washington. In many cases, these officials were high-ranking members of the NKVD, the "holding company" of Communist spies.

One of the most important of them was Vassili M. Zubilin, who became third secretary of the Soviet embassy here in January, 1942, and later was promoted to second secretary before he returned to Russia in August, 1944.

According to congressional committees, Zubilin was in charge of all NKVD activities in this country. As such, he "had complete charge of the movement of Soviet espionage agents into and out of the United States." He himself engaged in espionage activities and had many "contacts" throughout the country.

The wartime Russian-American alliance also enabled known Soviet agents to circulate more freely

without arousing too much suspicion. Among these agents were Gerhart Eisler, a representative of the comintern, and Jacob Golos, president of World Tourists, Inc., who had pleaded guilty in 1940 of failing to register as a foreign agent and had received a suspended sentence.

Golos was the Russian contact for the most highly-publicized wartime communist espionage ring—the operations of Elizabeth Bentley and her two spy groups within the government.

In Love With Golos
Miss Bentley, a graduate of Vassar and Columbia, became a Communist party member in March, 1935. Three years later she joined the Communist underground. She later met Golos, fell in love with him, and, in July, 1941, began her espionage activities.

The silvermaster group—Solomon Adler, Treasury Department; Norman Bursler, Justice Department; Frank Coe, Treasury Department and the Board of Economic Warfare; Bela Gold, the

spy groups. She said the groups were headed by Nathan Gregory Silvermaster and Victor Perlo.

Silvermaster was then with the Board of Economic Warfare and later with the Treasury department. Perlo, named in congressional testimony as one of the Harbord-Ware group's "elite corps" of pre-war underground Communists, was with the Commerce Department and later with the Office of Price Administration and the War Production Board.

Miss Bentley has named 80 persons as having been connected with her espionage apparatus, both here and in New York. Of these, 37 have been identified as federal government employees.

Other Groups
Among the more prominent members of each group, as named by Miss Bentley were:

The silvermaster group—Solomon Adler, Treasury Department; Norman Bursler, Justice Department; Frank Coe, Treasury Department and the Board of Economic Warfare; Bela Gold, the

Agriculture Department and the Foreign Economic Administration (FEA); Abraham George Silverman, U.S. Railroad Retirement Board; William Taylor, Treasury Department; Harry Dexter White, later assistant secretary of Treasury; and William Ludwig Ullman, Army Air Force, and Irving Kaplan, War Production Board.

Perlo group — Edward J. Fitzgerald, War Production Board; Harold Glasser, Treasury Department and War Production Board; Charles Kramer, National Labor Relations Board and Senate committees; Solomon Lischinsky, United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration; Henry Magdoff, War Production Board; Allan Rosenberg, FEA; and Donald N. Wheeler of the Office of Strategic Services (OSS).

She also said she worked with Michael Greenberg, FEA; Maurice Halperin, OSS and State Department; Duncan C. Lee, OSS; Robert T. Miller, State Department; and William Remington, Commerce Department.

Miss Bentley said she received all kinds of information during the 3-1/2 years the apparatus was under her supervision. She said that documents she received often were microfilmed.

In 1944 — after Golos died — Miss Bentley was ordered by her Russian superiors to turn over her apparatus to other agents.

A year later — having broken with communism — she told her story to the FBI.

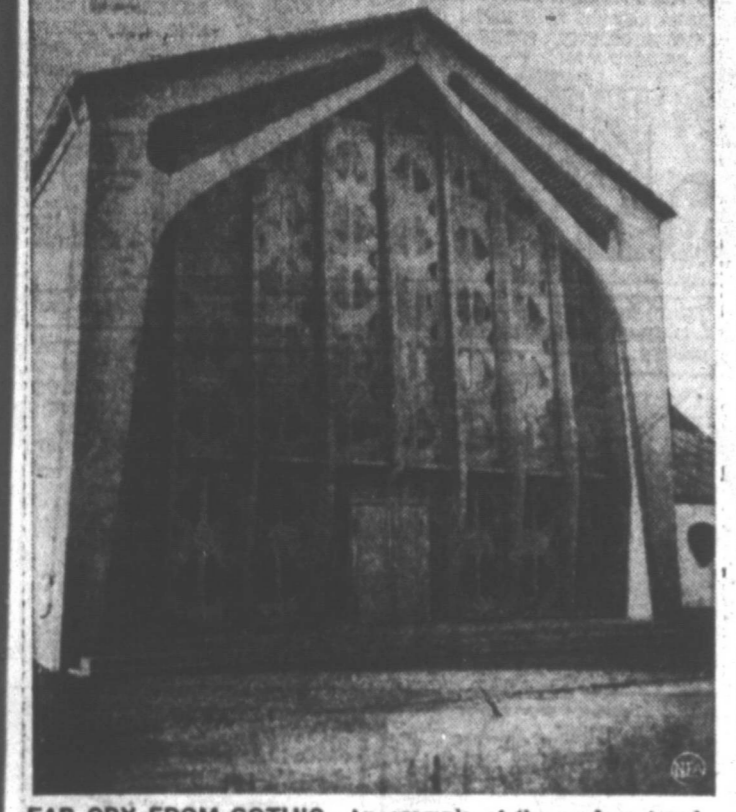

The checks, to pay from everything from alimony to a TV set, were signed merely, "Santa Claus."

Hollywood's anonymous Santa is a famous radio-TV man who for four years has been secretly giving money away to deserving persons. Each year I visit Santa's "workshop" — his swanky office — to find out whose chimney he climbed down this year.

A Bellaire, Ohio, father of five children who flunked the state barber's test got \$100 to try again. A Pasadena boy received \$50 for a new bicycle so he could sell papers and support his ailing parents.

A Troutvale, Va., invalid received the price of a TV set, and a \$100 check paid a Hollywood big actor's alimony bill and kept him out of jail.

"We had many more cases this year," observed Santa, a handsome, dark-haired man as he leafed through stacks of mail on his desk.

"Only about one in a 100 turned out phony when we investigated. We shy away from second requests. Santa wants everyone to know this is no gravy train! I just help people out on their feet."

Santa gets thousands of letters addressed to Santa Claus at the Hollywood, which handles his

checks. He also hears about cases from "Santa's helpers," friends who pass along tips. Producer Walter Wanger, recently in jail, gave Santa names of many ex-inmates who had no funds to eat on while they looked for jobs.

"We gave them \$25 piece—no more," said Santa firmly.

Others got hefty sums. A bod-ridden Hammondsville, Ohio, woman with a crippled daughter received \$100 for doctor bills.

A worried Wichita, Kans., father with Santa's \$100 check can look for a job in Arizona so he can move his sick son to the warmer climate. A New Haven, Conn., laborer was sent money for new teeth. Santa's \$100 helped repair a home demolished by a tornado in Worcester, Mass. He also helped a New Kensington, Pa., mother who is going blind.

"This really is selfish because I get such a kick from it," reflected Santa as he puffed on his pipe. "Besides I got about 700 Christmas cards and nice presents, such as some long-hair books. They think Santa is intellectual, I guess."

"Actually," he grinned, "I read murder mysteries."

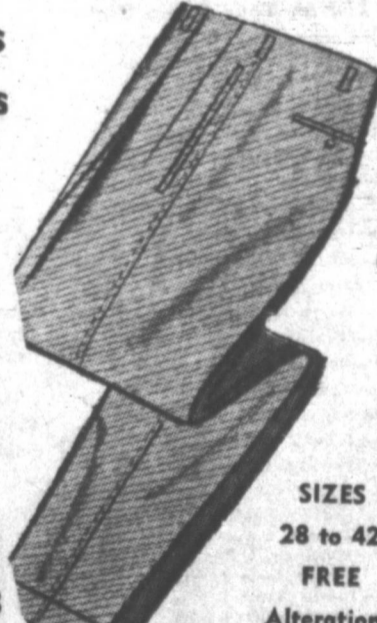

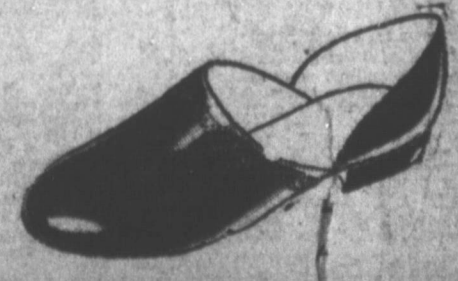
