Russians 'Ready' To Air Proposal

Officials scheduled a series of meetings at the State Department and with Allied reprsentatives to develop specific arrangements. Any one of several courses of action could be adopted.

The United States could explore the chances of Moscow agreement through regular diplomatic channels. It could propose a formal conference with Russia and such other atomic powers as Britain and Canada. Or it could make an approach through the United Nations.



ackdoor Taxes

Of the 24 billion dollars collected from workers and nployers in federal payroll taxes during 16 years of e social security program, 17 billion dollars, or roughtwo-thirds, has been used to pay general expenses of ie U. S. Government, from lead pencils to submarines.

This procedure has been strictly according to law, but means that Uncle Sam's multi-billion dollar social curity reserve fund for future old age pensions and mefits consists of a bundle of his own IOU's. It is tle more than a bookkeeping entry.

This should be clearly understood as we consider nether or not social security payroll tax rates should se another one-half per cent on workers and employrs, as scheduled for Jan. 1.

Old age and survivors' insurance benefits paid from 937 through 1952 amounted to about eight billion blars, or only a third of the money actually collected. s prescribed under social security regulations, the pay-Il tax money left over has been invested in U. S. ernment bonds to build a reserve fund for the inleased claims of the future.

At the end of 1952, the OASI fund's invested reserve intained \$17 billion in U. S. bonds, including bond inirest earned. But as social security payroll tax billions tye been turned over to the U.S. Treasury in paytent for bonds, the Treasury has used the money, along Ith other government income, to pay current governent bills and expenses.

Sooner or later the payroll tax money so spent must be ised all over again by the U.S. Treasury, if it reems its outstanding bonds. Thus in the long run the svernment will have no more cash available for future icial security claims than if this stock of government ands did not exist. And the source that eventually furshes the money the U. S. Treasury collects is Mr. Avage American Taxpayer.

What is the lesson to be learned from all this? We can ly pay the real costs of any national program of sosecurity "as-we-go." Old people, like everybody se, do not eat or wear dollars. They eat food and wear othes. These must be produced by the working generaon, as the goods are needed and used. We are actualpaying the dollar costs as-we-go though by a roundpout and complicated process instead of directly and

When social security tax rates on payrolls rise Jan. 1, le surplus of social security tax collections over present inefit payments will become still greater. The U. S. ands in the OASI reserve will stack up still faster. It the extra money itself will simply go for general pyernment expenses, in accordance with practices set in 1937. To the average citizen, therefore, such an acrease will be essentially the same as a raise in genal taxes.

A GOVERNMENT BASED ON GOD'S LAWS

In two thousand years, just since the time of Christ, forty billion people have lived on this earth. And less than one per cent have ever known freedom as we've known it. Just 160 years ago man almost found God's perfect purpose of government. It was declared by our forefathers in these words: "We hold these truths..., that all men...are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights, that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness." Now, these early Americans were the very first people on the face of the earth to form a government based closely upon the laws of God and His creation and Christ's doctrine of human dignity. For the first time in all history, a government was formed with the understanding that numan beings have certain individual rights from God and not from government - and that these Godgiven individual rights limit what government may do.

All other governments organized before or since, took for granted that human beings have rights only as given them by government. But our forefathers stopped worshipping government! They declared that men's rights are Godbestowed, and that government is instituted to secure those rights. Is it any wonder that America made such economic progress in a mere 160 years? Compare the starvation and want in the world today - or in six thousand years of history with our own unsurpassed scale of

ARE CHURCHMEN'S FEET OF FINER CLAY?

When some of us mortals, acting as though wiser than God, have attempted to stunt the development of other people's talents by taking away their liberty - or have attempted to equalize their earnings by taking away their property haven't we disobeyed the Commandments regarding stealing and coveting?

Whether we have been acting as churchmen or legislators, aren't we, too, members of the human race? Are our feet made of finer clay than the rest of mankind? Are we like the Pharisee who prayed: "God I thank thee that I am not as other men"? Have any of us received from Heaven an ability or tue that places us beyond and above mankind? If some of us feel hus endowed, where are the titles to our superiority?

Why is it that even the church became corrupt in the fifteenth century when it became involved in government - when government was used to force people to pay taxes to finance various church programs and activities? And what is the difference today - when churchmen and church organizations enter political fields and join with politicians in advocating the use of tax money the use of force - to further various programs in which the church interested?

What is the difference if it is churchmen who advocate legalized robbery in the form of government subsidies to businessmen, to farmers, to foreign powers - by forced "charity" which discourages voluntary Christian charity? Isn't it possible that many of us churchmen have become scribes and Pharisees?

As we think of the many good aims of government programs, are we forgetting Paul's warning? Shall we do evil that good may

And yet, we have not advocated activities any more evil than those of other governments. As a matter of fact, other governments are far ahead of ours in charitably stripping most people to their bare necessities; and so, for quite some ime these governments have gazed hungrily beyond their bor-




