Lower prices for bacon, ham and fresh pork-that's what the recent sharp break in hog prices means to homemakers.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture reports that prices of pork have dropped 7 to 12 cents per pound at the major wholesale dressed meat markets since late

Although pork prices usually bewhen more hogs start to market, the recent break was largely due the unseasonally hot weather throughout the country. As a re-sult, heavy holdings of pork aclated at the major wholesale dressed meat markets and prices

had to be cut to move them, This pressure on wholesale meat markets forced prices of live hogs down to the lowest point since last August. Prices to farmers have ropped as much as \$3 to \$4. per o pounds since a month ago. However, USDA points out that rices of pork will likely remain ther this fall than last year because the spring pig crop, which is now coming to market, was out 10 per cent smaller than the previous year. This means that production of pork will likewise be smaller. On the other hand, with employment high and wages stable, mand is expected to remain as



Apple Trading

We just read a rather well written editorial (prosewise) which said that we should continue foreign aid because it's good business. It contained the phrase: "We must have markets . . . real or artificial.

In other words we must subsidize buyers so that they

will buy our products back with our own money. Inasmuch as the newspaper which printed this sentiment is subsidized by a labor union it is logical and understandable that its editors should beat the drum for subsidies.

We suggest that this paper could increase its circulation by lending money to advertisers so they can advertise and lend money to everyone in town so that they can spend it on subscriptions.

Let us see what the economists say about the idea of paying foreign nations to buy American goods. Thomas Barber in "Where We Are At," page 205: "... our bureducracies make these loans to the bureaucracies of foreign nations to restore the purchasing powers of these countries so that in the future they can buy goods from us . . . Would a sane village storekeeper loan money to the village bum, knowing that he would never be repaid, in order that the bum might buy goods from him?

'It is sometimes argued that creating these goods to give Europe also gives employment here to those that make them. This is true, but it would be equally true if the goods were made here and were given away locally or destroyed, which would not be seriously argued by anyone. By giving them away, our capital and effort in making them is destroyed and our wealth diminished, not increased

Henry Hazlitt who wrote "Economics in One Lesson, (and was praised for this gem of a book in this way: "If there were a Nobel prize for clear economic thinking, Mr. Hazlitt's book would be a worthy recipient) said on page 29 and 30:

... all loans, in the eyes of honest borrowers, must eventually be repaid. All credit is debt.

. . But there is a decisive difference between loans supplied by private lenders and loans supplied by a government agency. Each private lender risks his own funds. (A banker, it is true, risks the funds of others that have been entrusted to him; but if money is lost he must either make good or be forced out of business.) When people risk their own funds they are usually careful in their investigations to determine the adequacy of the assets pledged and the business acumen and honesty of the borrower.

The argument for stimulating production by lending money to customers will seem plausible only as long as we concentrate our attention on the particular borrowers whom the government supplies with funds, and overlook the people whom its plan deprives of funds. For what is really, lent is not money, which is merely the medium of exchange, but capital.

To see how capital is lost by loans or gifts to foreigners regardless of whether or not they use it to buy our products, let's take the simplest example possible:

A little American boy has four apples. He wishes to swap with a little English boy, but the little English boy has nothing to swap. So the American boy lends the English boy one apple and says: "Here, use this to trade with."

The little English boy wants to eat the cople but he recognizes that he'd better not eat it if he wants to trade. So he trades it back to the American boy for another

The American boy, who had four apples, now has three apples. He sees there's no point in swapping one apple back and forth all day, so he "lends" the little English boy another apple. Now they each have two apples.

The little English boy gains confidence and says: "I will trade you the two apples you lent me, for the two apples you have left. But it's silly to go on swapping like this, so let me offer to pay you on credit, after have grown on apple tree of my own." The little American boy, being gullible and innocent, ships his remaining apples to the English boy, who being hungry, eats them. This stimulates American production???

Big Time Chiseling

The estimate that \$392 million had been lost through fradulent and improper payments from the California Unemployment Insurance Trust Fund since 1945, is something that should make every one of us pause — and

The estimate, incidentally, was no wild and inflated guess. It came from an Assembly committee, investigating the charges of large-scale chiseling. The committee's studies indicate that 33 per cent of the claims are either fraudulent or otherwise invalid. And since \$1,189,916, 481 has been paid out in claims since 1945, the \$392 million in estimated losses may not be far off the actual figure, whatever it may be. There is no reason to believe that Texans are in general any more honest than Californians, so it would be a very good idea if our legislature started a similar inquiry.

The enormous loss is in itself serious enough. But, worse still, is the fact that should there be a substantial let-down in employment, we might well reach the stage where the legislature demands of unemployed workers could not be met, due to the depletion of the fund through fraud and improper payments.





BETTER JOBS

"The Keystone Of Liberty" I take a magazine called "The Owl." It is a quarterly magazine published in London, and is also called "A Quarterly Journal of International Thought." In the September issue it had a long article under various sub-heads under the general heading of "The Keystone of Liberty." It was written by Pierre Lhoste-Lachaume. It is divided into "The Liberal Era of the 19th Century," "Fifty Years of Liberal Retreating" and "The Time for Choice." These sub-heads are again sub-divided.

The article points out that great progress was made in the 19th Century in promoting liberty. During that century England and France adopted, to a large extent, free trade. Of course, there was great progress made in the 18th Century also. That was the century in which the idea was developed and put in writing that "governments derive their just power from the consent of the governed." That idea was never fully accepted in the United States and the English people never did fully believe that there were higher laws than the civil laws made by Parliament. It was this movement towards liberalism; as set forth in the Declaration of Independence, that was one of the primary causes of the real keystone of liberty.

Under the sub-heading of "Economic Effects of the Liberal Retreat" the author remarks:

"The mass-man will never spontaneously take his share of the burden in proportion to his ability. Instead, he will try and thrive as much as possible on society, while contributing as little as possible in it: he will readily cheat to have it both ways. Hence he will choose his political representatives on account of their talents in obtaining - regardless of the means - priv ileges for their constituents.

"As a consequence of such a state on the public mind, the purposes of political activity have been transformed. "The liberalism of our old

French Republicans aimed at a be suffered to intrude, Conversely, the economic field was strictly reserved for individual contracts, which were to be free as long as they would not infringe on morality or public order. In that line of thought, Liberalism had looked at the majority rule only as a means, to protect against Power the essential liberties of individuals.

"On the other hand, as soon as personal and political freedom was insured, the 'democratic' parties (which up to the war were considered as reformist, or even radical) wanted to legislate and to govern, no longer on the level of the common wealth and of the legal rights and duties of the citizen; they intended to do it on the field of sectional or particular interests and to the benefit the great numbers.' Thus it came that the majority's will has henceforth considered as justifying the interventions of political power in the economic life.

Spiritual Nature of Free Society Then under the heading of "The Spiritual Nature of Free Society" the author remarks:

"Liberalism is based on the spiritual conception - both humanist and Christian - of a Natural Law, which prevails over the authority of government and majorities. Therefrom comes to Man the right to control himself, his activity and his ownings; and also the right to reach, through his work and voluntary association, the resources of the whole world."

A Summary of Principles Here is a sentence that I think pretty clearly explains the bles-ings of liberty. The author is explaining how we do not need the government to interfere in defense of the distribution of goods. He expresses it in this way:

"The factor of spontaneous cohesion, both internal and international, is furnished by the division of labor under the arbitration of the Market, because every voluntary transaction gives advantage to both parties."

Note that statement: "Every voluntary transaction gives advantage to both parties." If that be a principle, then every transaction that is not voluntary does not give advantage to both parties. It is even doubtful in the long run if it gives advantage to either party. Of course, the recipients of involuntary transactions by way of the government, such as pensions and subsidies and protection from competition, believe that they are getting an advantage. And they may temporarily get a material advantage, but time is a factor in every transaction. And if one group gets a material advantage, it also has

a spiritual loss and it is only a question of time until others are demanding material advantage, and then the whole form of government is changed and we have un arbitrary government of men rather than a government promoting justice. So it is reasonable to conclude that in the long run any transaction that is not voluntary is harmful to both parties. A lot of these transactions that have appeared to be to the advantage of

certain groups have brought on fiat, rotting money, long periods of unemployment, worry about security, one war after another and ever increasing taxes that reduce the standard of living of the people as a whole. That is the inevitable result of transactions that are aimed at benefitting one group at

the expense of others. Then the author goes on to say: "The extreme geographical dispersion of natural resources, workers' capacities, capital goods, know-how, needs and tastes, weaves through the world an infinity of individual ties, which,



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

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
