

HANOI, Indo-China, Dec. 31 -UP French Union troops, backed artillery and low-flying planes, by artillery and low-flying planes, Thursday threw back a Communist battalion attempting to advance on an isolated fortress in northern Indo-China,

The French killed 54 Communist Viet Minh rebels and captured an undisclosed amount of automatic arms

Observers said rebel units of the Communist 316th Division apparently were trying to tighten their holds on the area around the pivotal fortress of Dien Bien Phu, 190 miles west of Hanoi.

Quiet was reported from the cen-tral Laos sector and south of Hanoi where French Union forces had killed 20 Communists in hand-tohand bayonet warfare.

A communique from the cabinet of Laos said some of Red Gen. Vo Ngiven Giap's forces, which took river port of Thakhek on the border last Saturday, Thailand came out of hiding near the abandoned city.

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

# Winter Wheat **Crop Outlook Reported Good**

remainder of the growing season (until May) to produce a wheat crob greater than the 476,688,000 bushels harvested this year in the 11 states served by the railroad. Those states usually produce more than half of the nation's y leaf, and their 1954 production wils pegged slightly under that of 1953 in the U.S. Department of Agriculture's December forecast. Cross said much of the wheat crop in Nebraska, Kansas, Colo-rado, Oklahoma and Texas was "seeded in the dust," but "drouth brocking rains in mid-October over much of the hard red winter wheat belt brought the wheat up to a stand in plenty of time to establish healthy plants and good root sys-tems before extremely cold weath-

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

"No one ever regarded the first of January with indifference," wrote Charles Lamb a great many years ago. "It is the nativity of our common Adam."

We have often wondered just what causes us to get excited over the inevitable fact that another year has ended and a new one is just as irrevocably beginning. Certainly we can take no credit for this unavoidable phenomenon. Yet it is our custom to celebrate. And it seems, looking back, that the more harshly the old year has dealt with us, the more gaily we usher in the new . . . which is probably what Mr. Lamb meant when he called it "the nativity of our common Adam."

Thus, we ascribe to ourselves personally a new start as a new figure turns up on the calendar. It seems logical at such a time to forswear the vices for which. conscience itches us. In 1954, for example, we shall be resolute. We shall stop biting our nails. We shall cease our procrastination. We shall go to bed earlier and get up ditto. We shall be kind, and generous, and forgiving. We shall, in fact, be a perfect worm rather than offend our brother man - or sister woman.

But first, if we're going to be so darn good, we should be entitled to raise a little sand!

# The Right Approach

As a general rule, the establishment of new governmental commissions means bad news for the taxpayer. The situation is quite the opposite in the case of two commissions which are now getting down to work.

One is the Commission on Organization of the Execu-Tive Branch of the Government, under the chairmanship of Herbert Hoover. A series of task forces have been established, each of which is headed by an outstanding business man or professional man, assisted by recognized experts in particular fields. The Commission's area of study will be very wide, including such problems as water and power resources; civil service; lending agencies; surplus property; medical services; federal subsistence services, and so on.

The task forces will fully evaluate all available facts In their respective fields, and submit recommendations as to improvements in efficiency and economy, elimination of overlap, and reductions in spending.

The other new commission has not, at least as yet, received as much notice as Mr. Hoover's. However, it too will deal with problems of the first importance. It is called The Commission on Intergovernmental Relations, and Clarence E. Manion, former Dean of the University of Notre Dame Law School is the chairman. Other members are governors, and representatives of the public and of the executive and legislative branches of the federal government. The purpose is to study ways and means to check and reverse the trend toward more and more federal paternalism, and to provide workable plans for returning to the states all or part of certain responsibilities which are now being discharged in Washington.

That this will be a tough job goes without saying. Probably few people are aware of how enormous the growth of federal aid programs has been in the last 30 years so. According to the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, in 1920 the entire cost of federal aid was a mere \$42,000 000, and most of that went for highways, agricultural education and research, and the National Guard. By 1936, the figure had reached \$346,-000,000, not including emergency grants resulting from the depression, and two thirds of this was for hichways. Lost year, the figure was well in excess of \$2,000,000,-COO, and highways accounted for less than a fifth of it. The largest item, \$1,400,000,000, was appropriated for t'e program administered by the Federal Security Agency, which is now known as the Department of Health Education and Welfare.

This aid program now covers about 40 categories veterans, old age assistance, education, control of certain diseases, etc. The Chamber indicated one major problem when it said, "If any sizeable portion of these activities is to be made the complete responsibility of the states and their political subdivisions, some plan must be devised for the transfer to the states of various sources of tax revenue now pre-empted by or shared with the federal government."

In any event, two commissions are now at work to reduce, rather than increase, the cost of government ---and to make the federal establishment smaller, not bigger.
