### Champion Calf Tops Record: \$20 Per Pound

**CHICAGO, Dec. 3**—UP—Lone Star, the grand champion steer of the International Live Stock Exposition, sold at auction Thursday for the record-shattering price of \$20 a pound.

The Pick Hotel chain bought the animal and will pay an estimated \$20,000 to its owner, party 15-year-old Sue White of Big Spring, Tex.

The grand champion, a Hereford senior calf, will be served as prime steak at Chicago's Congress hotel.

### Breaks Own Record

Albert Pick, president of the chain, broke his own record when he made the purchase. In 1950 he paid a record \$12 a pound for the grand champion, another Hereford from Big Spring, Tex., owned by young Lloyd Robinson.

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### Suspicion Evolving Around Big Three Meet In Bermuda

 Notice will be given to the Big Three Bermuda meeting in the Far East and elsewhere, except perhaps in Moscow, will be viewed with greater suspicion.

The interesting thing about it is that the suspicions are held by persons normally friendly to the participating powers — the United States, Britain and France.

Among the things they fear is a split-out to communism.

Most outspoken have been the Nationalist Chinese on Formosa and President Syngman Rhee of South Korea.

Eyed by Indo-China  
 But there are others such as the anti-Communist Viet Namese in Indo-China who fear French pressure for a one-sided deal to get out of the seven-year-old Indo-Chinese war, and the Indonesians who suspect Western powers of trying to force them into the East-West conflict.

Rhee sniffed at the Bermuda meeting as a "waste of time and energy."

"We're too busy fighting Communists," he said.

Newspapers in Taipei talk about an "Asian Munich."

Foreign Minister George Yeh wished the conference "every success" but warned that Nationalist China would not recognize "any decision made at Bermuda pertaining to the Far East" unless Asian governments were consulted first.

Indonesia reacted violently to suggestions that the Big Three might take up recent rebellious activities there as a further Communist threat to free Asia.

In so many words, Indonesians told the Big Three to mind their own business.

They said they would stick to their "independent foreign policy" even if they appeared in Western eyes to lean toward Communist China.

India's Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru also has indicated repeatedly he believes any Big Three meeting a waste of time which could be better spent in a big four or Big Five meeting which would include Russia and Red China.

Considered Unimportant  
 Nehru regards Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek as unimportant.

Generally speaking, Oriental suspicions of the West spring from two sources. A southeast Asia diplomat in Singapore summed it up this way:

"Maybe it's hard for America and the rest of the West to understand, but most free Asians view communism only as the second greatest enemy to their independence. The first and greatest threat is still considered to be colonialism by every Asian who ever had to bow his head to a Westerner."

He spoke for Nehru, Indonesia and Burma.

### Research Launched By Texas A&M

**COLLEGE STATION, Tex., Dec. 3-UP**—The Texas A&M Research Foundation will begin an extensive research program on all Texas resources for use in future development of the state, Dr. Howard Barlow, foundation director, announced Wednesday.

Barlow said the project, which will take nearly two years to bring up-to-date, would depend upon support from private individuals and industry.

"This project has been under consideration for some time," he said, "and will involve the preparation of an exhaustive compilation of information on all of Texas' resources: Agricultural, forest, land, water, marine, climatological, mineral, gas and oil, economic, human, industrial, transportation and educational."

"Much valuable work has been done in many of the individual fields in which we will work, which will furnish the basis for our compilation," he said. "Our job will be to bring this information from many sources together, correlate it and make it available for future development of the state. Filling in with new research results where necessary," he added.

It is believed that the results of the survey will provide a vast source of data that may be used to present summaries of Texas' resources and potentials in specific fields and thus indicate possible areas of development as yet untouched, Barlow said.

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### Kiwanis Club Will Install New Officers

Approximately 250 persons will hear Melvin T. Munn, Dallas insurance man, when he speaks at the annual installation banquet of the Pampa Kiwanis club tonight at 7:15 o'clock in the high school cafeteria. He will speak on a subject based on the "Sermon on the Mount."

Members of the Pampa club and their wives and Kiwanians from Boise City and Guymon, Okla., and Vega, Amarillo, Wheeler, Borger and Stinnett are expected to attend.

County Judge J. B. Maguire, Jr., will be installed as president by Lt. Gov.-Elect Harry Wofford. Wheeler, of this Kiwanis division, Wofford, who is county clerk of Wheeler county, will be introduced by Lt. Gov. Leslie Hart, Pampa. Maguire succeeds Clinton Evans.

Her officers to be installed are Frank Fata, first vice president; Ralph McKinney, second vice president; Creel Grady, secretary; Mac Hiatt, treasurer; and Sam Begert, Warren Haase, Malcolm Hinkle and Ken Meaders, directors.

Maguire moves up to the presidency from the office of first vice president. Fata has been second vice president and Haase is the outgoing secretary. The outgoing treasurer is Aubrey Steele.

Entertainment will be furnished by the order from Frank Phillips Junior College in Borger. E. L. Henderson will serve as master of ceremonies.

This will take the place of the regular Friday luncheon meeting. However, a round-table meeting for those wishing to make up attendance will be held at noon Friday in the First Methodist church basement.

### Says Cabinet Is 'Least Helpful'

**CORNICANA, Tex., Dec. 3-UP**—Sam Rayburn, Democratic leader in the House and a member of Congress since 1913, says President Eisenhower's cabinet is the "least helpful" he can remember.

Rayburn, who was House speaker until the Republicans took control, spoke Tuesday night at a \$10-a-plate Democratic fund-raising dinner.

"President Eisenhower needs help," the Texas Democrat said, but "he has the least helpful cabinet gathered around him than any I can remember."

Rayburn said he had spent nearly 41 years in Congress, and Mr. Eisenhower had spent some 44 years in the Army.

"But all my experience in the government would not qualify me to lead an army," he said.

The Republicans' lack of a farm program will be one of the major issues in the next election, Rayburn said. He said Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson claimed he would have a new farm program, but so far he has only carried out the Democratic program, and done it "much sorer" than the Democrats would have.

Rayburn said he felt sorry for President Eisenhower, also, because of the "sorry support" he received from Republicans in the first session of the 82nd Congress.

"The President is the leader of the country," he said, "and if Mr. Eisenhower doesn't seize the leadership, he will go down in the 1954 and 1956 elections."

### Hearings Opening On USDA Proposal

**WASHINGTON, Dec. 3-UP**—The big fight over Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson's reorganization of the Soil Conservation Service showed signs of collapsing Wednesday just as a congressional committee prepared to look into the matter.

A House government operations subcommittee headed by Rep. George H. Bender (R-Ohio) will begin hearings Thursday on the reorganization plan which touched off a bitter public controversy when Benson announced it last month.

Instead of the public airing of complaints which seemed in prospect when Bender scheduled the hearing, the subcommittee may end up trying to find out how the fuss ever got started.

Waters S. Davis Jr., president of the National Association of Soil Conservation Districts — which sparked all the criticism — now says he is "ready and willing to help make the new plan work."

In a weekly newsletter to NASCD members, Davis said it is "our big job now" to "help the secretary and his staff make good on their promises of a 'stronger, more dynamic' technical agency."

He also said he has invited Benson to be the chief speaker at the NASCD national convention in February.

The main feature of the reorganization plan, which went into effect Nov. 2, was the abolishment of the seven regional offices of the Soil Conservation Service.

### Urge Investigation In Red Atrocities

**UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Dec. 3-UP**—British told the Communists Wednesday that if they want definite proof of American charges of Korean atrocities, they need only accept the United States challenge to permit an impartial investigation in Korea and China.

British delegate Sir Gladwyn Jebb told the United Nations General Assembly again that according to information reaching London, "there appears to be no doubt that atrocities against UN troops and Korean civilians have been committed."

After advising the Communists to accept the American challenge, Jebb, in the same "gloves-off" manner used by Australian Ambassador Sir Percy Spender Tuesday, denounced Russia's Andrei Y. Vishinsky for saying that Britain was responsible for World War II and had sought before the war to isolate Russia so that Germany could attack it.

The United States awaited Vishinsky's reply to the challenge laid down Tuesday by Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge Jr. to let impartial investigators travel with full freedom through Korea and China.

### Ex-Convict Sought In LA Man's Death

**ST. LOUIS, Dec. 3-UP**—Anthony Barr, 54-year-old former convict sought in the slaying of a Los Angeles insurance adjuster, was arrested here Wednesday on a downtown street.

Barr was picked up by two detectives, Sgt. William Murphy and Sgt. Gus Ernest, who spotted him walking down Market Street near 14th.

The suspect was booked at police headquarters as George Barnes and gave the aliases of Anthony Gilbauer and Joseph Barr. Officers said, however, there was no doubt he was the suspect wanted in Los Angeles for the "want-ad" murder of Andrew Kmiec.

### Pinball Machines Offered For Sale

**DURANT, Okla., Dec. 3-UP**—A Durant warehouseman offered Wednesday to sell 300 pinball machines—cheap.

Warehouseman Jack Taylor has been storing the marble-boards for two years—since they were seized by county officers. The resulting lawsuit went to the State Supreme Court.

The high court ordered a new trial in the seizure case Tuesday. But Texas owners of the machines quit paying storage on them four months ago, Taylor said, and he now wants to get rid of them.

### Menace Of Movies

**CALCUTTA, India, Dec. 3-UP**—Members of the legislature of Sikkim state in the remote Himalayas were invited to see a film in the first movie theater ever opened in Gangtok, the capital.

They promptly introduced a resolution in the legislature calling for the theater to be closed for 10 years as a "menace to innocent Himalayan youth."

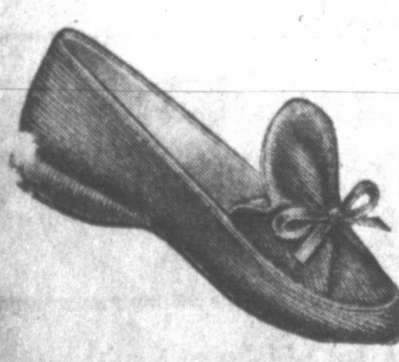

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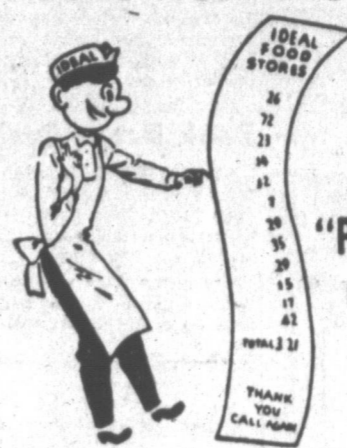

Outlawry Hear's Appeal Denied

AUSTIN, Dec. 3 -UP- Bethel Raymond Fairris, 21-year-old heir to a bright of outlawry, lost a bid for freedom Wednesday when the Court of Criminal Appeals affirmed his conviction on charges of robbing a Houston jewelry store. The lantern-jawed son of a murderer and nephew of one of the Southwest's most notorious outlaws must serve out a 10-year term he received for the crime.

In an opinion by Associate Justice Lloyd W. Davidson the appellate court said, "The record is before us without a statement of facts or bills of exception. Nothing is presented for our consideration. The judgment is affirmed."

Fairris is now serving two years for an earlier burglary in Wichita Falls, a burglary which was interrupted by Wichita Falls police.

Fairris' mother is red-haired Margie Ziegen whose past includes the slaying of two husbands and the wounding of another man in her waterfront bar in Houston while she was appealing her conviction on the second slaying.

She is now serving a five-year sentence for the second husband's killing. Her brother was Raymond Hamilton, an outlaw of the 1930 era of lawlessness. He ran with Clyde Barrow and Bonnie Parker during the height of their crime careers in the Southwest. After once escaping from the death house at Huntsville prison, Hamilton was finally executed.

Fairris was convicted of staging \$16,350 holdup of the Perry and Sons Jewelry Store in Houston just a year ago. In Dec. 8, after a nationwide it had been launched, Fairris rendered to his attorney, because, he said, he was afraid some pie cop would get trigger happy and kill him. He denied staying the holdup with his pretty girl, Mrs. Joyce O'Neal.

Ralph Perry, store owner, said Fairris at the gunman said Mrs. O'Neal "cashed" his check the day before the holdup. A jury found Fairris guilty even though convict Floyd Adams, who was serving a total of 40 years for numerous burglaries and thefts, said it was he who pulled the Perry.

**Williams Says Kick Is Not Obscene 'Where I Come From'**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3—UP—Pink Williams, the 53-year-old Oklahoma cowboy who offered by mail a free kick in the obvious place to any cattleman who voted Republican, shopped among the picture postcards Wednesday for his defense against a post office obscenity charge.

"Where I come from they don't consider a kick in the rear obscene," said Williams. "Anyway, the cards I sent out weren't anything at all compared to the stuff you can buy at most postcard counters."

He said he intends to show Post-Examiner James C. Haynes some of his more lurid purchases.

at a hearing Thursday on post office charges that Williams carried a joke too far when he sent through the mails an invitation to a crowd picnic and "public kicking" for "all cattlemen who voted for Ike."

The post office has impounded Williams' mail on the ground that it was obscene. It also has accused him of using an alias because he offered additional copies of his cards (at 20 for \$1) and gave his mail address as "Cowboy, Box 157, Caddo, Okla."

Williams said most of the 950 people in Caddo know him as "Cowboy Pink Williams" and that box 157 is one he has had for years. He said the alias charge was ridiculous.

Cowboy arrived in Washington by plane Tuesday night. He was wearing boots and a ten-gallon hat, and showed no signs of wear on the seat of his pants. However, he said he voted Republican himself and was sorry, and that he had followed faithfully his own prescription.

Unhappy With Benson  
Williams is unhappy mainly with President Eisenhower's secretary of agriculture, Ezra T. Benson, who he said keeps telling people that cattle prices are still pretty good and that cattlemen aren't so bad off.

Benson means well, Williams said, but he just meets the wrong cattlemen.

"When he came out to the West the people he saw drove Cadillacs. Sure they did. They were oil men. They just raise cattle for a hobby. We are selling range cattle for ten cents a pound that we were selling for 30 cents two years ago. We've got real suffering among some of our people."

**White Criticizes Cotton Acreages**

AUSTIN, Dec. 3—UP—Agriculture Commissioner John C. White slash the parity price to 50 per cent criticized 1954 cotton acreage allotments Wednesday but urged farmers to approve the quota as "the lesser of two evils."

White warned that unless farmers approve the allotments on Dec. 15 they may be "booby trapped" into a 50 per cent parity program which could plummet cotton prices to 50 cents per pound.

"I realize that the present national allotment of 17,910,448 acres is far lower than farmers expected, and that the 7,376,858-acre figure is unsatisfactory in Texas, but right now the plan is the lesser of two evils," White said.

He predicted that if the allotment is approved it is "almost certain" Congress will boost the quota by some 3.5 million acres.

But if the acreage quotas are rejected, White said, federal authorities could interpret the action as

"Present high production costs would make it impossible for Texas farmers to realize any money on 23 cent cotton," the agriculture commissioner said.

He said the present allotment figure would provide the basis for appeals for future increases, and if the quota was raised Texas would come in for a "substantial share" of such a boost.

"An acreage in excess of 21 million would solve most of the difficulties," White added, "but we'd really be in trouble with 50 per cent parity."

# Witnesses Testify On Waco Tornado

WACO, Tex., Dec. 2—UP—The most powerful part of last May's tornado struck the R. T. Dennis Co. building, in which 20 persons were killed and 11 others injured, a tornado expert from Texas A and M College testified.

The expert, George W. Reynolds, a student instructor who wrote his master's thesis on tornadoes, testified that winds during the tornado probably reached 100 to 200 miles an hour.

# British Are Eying Trouble In Africa

"For lack of a nail, the shoe was lost."  
"For lack of a shoe, the horse was lost."  
And partly because the kabaka of Buganda wasn't included in the carriage procession at Queen Elizabeth's coronation, the British now have more troubles on their hands in Africa.  
And because of this new trouble, a great hydro-electric and irrigation project for Uganda, the Sudan and Egypt may be affected.  
And if that's affected, it may also affect Queen Elizabeth's scheduled visit to Africa next spring.

**As An Illustration**  
Which is considerable of an over-estimation of the problems which beset the empire on which the sun never sets. Accompanying an election in the Sudan which was disappointing to the British have been rumblings of discontent in the adjoining East African British protectorate of Uganda.  
Uganda, in turn, adjoins Kenya where the African Mau Mau have been waging their bloody campaign against the white settlers.  
In the center of Uganda lies the native kingdom of Buganda, comprising an area about the size of Oregon and populated by the richest and best-educated tribe in the country.  
The ruler is known as the kabaka.

Now the kabaka has been banished from his kingdom by the British and forced into the role of London pensioner.  
Immediate reason was the kabaka's announcement that he wanted no part of any African political federation, that henceforth he wished to deal with the foreign office instead of the colonial office and also wanted a date set for Buganda's independence.  
**He Went Out**  
The British said that attitude violated a 50-year-old agreement and out he went.

# Labor Agreement Flayed By Wilson

EDITORS: This is the last of three dispatches on the wetback situation in California.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 2—UP—George Wilson, president of the California Farm Bureau Federation, blasts the Mexican labor contract as unworkable and tabs it as the key reason for the increase in wetbacks in California.  
"Any insinuations that the farmers actually prefer to use wets is a lie," Wilson said. "But what can a man do when he is desperate for 30 days of stoop labor and finds that under the contract he has to hire a laborer for 60?"  
That's only one of the bugs farmers say is in the contract.  
Approximately 65,000 farmers belong to the California Farm Bureau Federation, or about two-thirds of those in California.  
The contract, officially the migrant labor agreement of 1951, calls for Mexico to provide much needed field labor to U. S. farmers. Congress recently extended it to the end of 1955.  
Defects Listed  
Wilson lists some of the defects in the contract as follows:  
1. The minimum wage set by Mexican government is above the

scale paid U. S. workers in the same kind of work.  
2. Even when a worker breaks his contract, and about 20 per cent of them do, the farmer has to pay for the man's transportation home. The rate is \$15 each.  
3. The Mexican government has pressured farmers into taking out occupational insurance policies for their help although there is no provision for it in the contract. And Mexico often specifies the company to deal with.  
4. The contract itself is too inflexible. The 60-day employment period is one example. Farmer's can't pass the labor around from their farm to another even if it is needed.  
**Farmers Are Scapegoats**  
Wilson thinks farmers are being made into scapegoats for an illegal alien situation of which the wetbacks are only a part.  
"Last January," Wilson said, "Sen. McCarran said there were from three to five million illegal aliens in the states. I think the bulk of them are in industry where they carry their own Social Security and union cards."  
"There probably are as many wetbacks working in San Francisco hotels right now as on the farms."  
Wilson says the best answer is to work out a new contract which is satisfactory to all parties.  
**Mexican Labor Needed**  
"Mexican labor will be needed in the states as long as employment is as high as it is," Wilson said. "Sugar beets, cotton and fruits must have outside help to produce them. If we can make a legal, workable program with Mexico the farm bureaus are ready to go all out to eliminate the wets."  
The American Farm Bureau Federation met in Dallas three months ago and drafted a set of recommendations for revising the present contract.  
The new program, which was presented to the government as an alternative program rather than a substitute, seeks to eliminate all the bugs enumerated by Wilson.  
It also provides for withholding 10 per cent of a worker's pay until he has finished his stint and actually is crossing the border home. Under this plan, a farmer also could discharge any help which doesn't pan out.

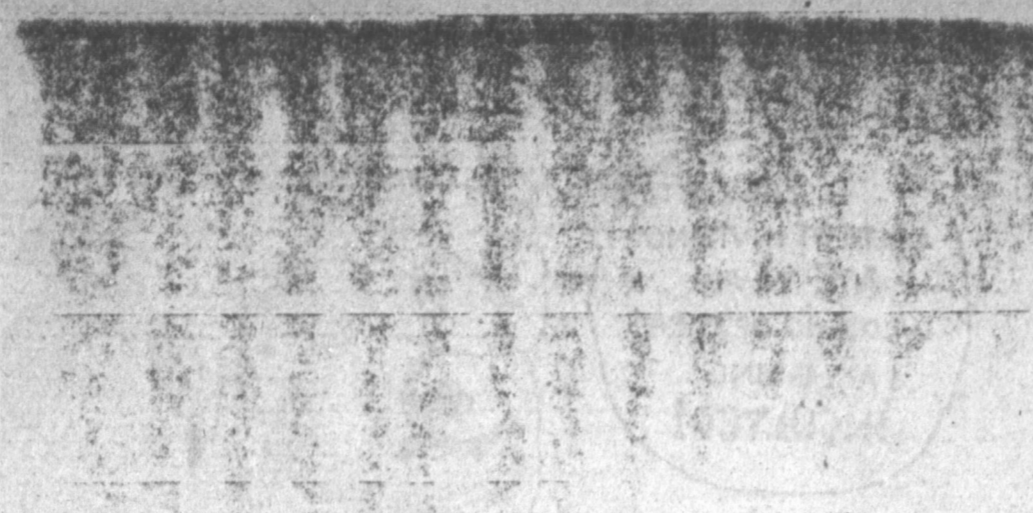

### Cook's Nook

Here's a colorful and delicious prelude to a holiday dinner. A wonderful blend of cranberry juice and red table wine, it is made in this easy manner:

**CRANBERRY FROST**  
(Serves 6)

1 pint bottled cranberry juice cocktail  
1/2 cup California Burgundy or Claret Wine  
1 egg white, unbeaten  
1/4 cup sugar (approximately)

Combine cranberry juice cocktail, wine and egg white in a cocktail shaker. Stir just until blended, then add sugar to taste. Add a generous amount of cracked ice and shake vigorously. Strain into chilled Champagne or cocktail glasses.

From Mrs. Terry Hayaishi of Berkeley, Calif., an American of Japanese descent, comes this recipe for oriental spareribs and rice. Mother of twin sons and two daughters and wife of a dentist, she knows how to feed her family well.

**Spareribs and Oriental Rice**  
(Makes 4 servings)

Three pounds of spareribs cut into 2 or 3 rib portions, 1-3 cup soy sauce, 1/4 to 1-3 cup sugar, 1 clove garlic, minced; 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon ginger, 1-3 cups packaged pre-cooked rice, 1 1/2 cups water, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 cup sliced almonds, 2 tablespoons butter, 3 tablespoons currants.

Place spareribs in bowl or glass dish. Combine soy sauce, sugar, garlic, 1 teaspoon salt, and ginger. Pour over ribs, turning the ribs to coat all sides. Cover and place in refrigerator. Allow to marinate 15 to 18 hours. Turn ribs occasionally and baste with the soy sauce mixture.

Bake spareribs in slow over (325 degrees F.) about 1 1/2 hours, or until done. Baste occasionally with soy sauce mixture, adding hot water to pan if necessary. Turn ribs to brown both sides.

Meanwhile, combine rice, water, and 1/2 teaspoon salt in saucepan. Mix just until all rice is moistened. Bring quickly to a boil over high heat, uncovered, fluffing rice gently once or twice with a fork. (Do not stir.) Cover and remove from heat. Let stand 10 minutes. Saute almonds in butter until golden brown.

Soak currants in hot water to

cover for 2 minutes; drain. Add almonds and butter and currants to the hot rice, mixing lightly with a fork. Arrange spareribs and rice on platter. Serve with additional soy sauce.

2 cups sugar 1 teaspoon rum or vanilla  
1/2 cup light corn syrup 1 cup chopped Brazil nuts, divided  
1/2 cup water 1/2 cup finely cut candied fruit

Combine sugar, corn syrup, water and salt in a saucepan. Place over low heat and stir until sugar is dissolved. Continue cooking without stirring until syrup, when dropped in cold water, forms a hard ball, or until candy thermometer reaches 265° F. Just before sugar reaches 265° F., beat egg whites until stiff, but not dry. Remove syrup from heat and gradually pour the syrup in a very fine stream over egg whites, beating constantly while pouring. Continue beating until mixture holds its shape. Stir in vanilla, 1/2 cup of the Brazil nuts and fruit. With lightly buttered hands form into 3/4-inch balls; roll in remaining 1/2 cup Brazil nuts. YIELD: 1 1/2 pounds.

**Brazil Nut Choco-Crunch**  
2 cups sugar 1 package (1 cup) semi-sweet chocolate pieces  
4 tablespoons butter 1 tablespoon shortening  
1/4 teaspoon baking soda  
1 1/2 cups chopped Brazil nuts, divided

Put sugar and butter in heavy skillet. Place over low heat and stir constantly until sugar melts. It is important to keep the mixture stirred constantly over low heat to get an even caramelization of the sugar. Just as soon as all the sugar is melted and light brown in color, add the soda and stir in 1 cup of the Brazil nuts. Turn onto a greased baking sheet and roll out with rolling pin until brittle is 1/4-inch thick. Pull corners to make a square. While candy is hot, mark quickly into squares with a sharp knife. Break into pieces when brittle hardens. Melt semi-sweet chocolate pieces and shortening over hot, not boiling water. Dip one third of each square into melted chocolate; coat with remaining Brazil nuts. YIELD: 2 pounds.

**State's Small Grain Pastures Increasing Stock Feed Supply**

AUSTIN, Dec. 3 —UP— Small grain pastures in Texas are making "very good development" and supplying an increasing amount of stock feed, the U. S. Department of Agriculture reported Wednesday.

The USDA, in its weekly crop and weather bulletin, said moisture was again needed over parts of the plateau and some southwestern counties. However, the report did not take into account rain which fell over much of Texas after 4 p. m. Monday.

Progress of commercial vegetables in South Texas was "very satisfactory." Growing crops were reported in generally good condition and harvest of both tender and hardy type vegetables was fairly active throughout most areas. Scattered areas of the winter garden and Eagle Pass sections suffered some damage to tender vegetables from the low temperatures of the previous two weekend cold spells.

However, peppers and tomatoes were being marketed from these areas, and harvest of these crops was active in the Laredo and Lower Valley sections.

Preparation for planting spring-crop acreages was underway in the Lower Valley. Some tomato acreage was already seeded.

Irrigation water supplies remained plentiful and most non-irrigated winter vegetable areas "have good sub-soil reserves," the USDA said.

Cattle and calves moved to greening pastures in volume. In central, eastern and coastal counties fescue grass, clovers and winter weeds were supplying considerable feed.

"Over the plateau, west and southwest many ranchmen were busy with deer hunters," the USDA noted.

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"And now tell me why I come here and pay you \$25 per visit!"

**Army's Business Moved To Beaumont**

GALVESTON, Dec. 3 —UP— E. H. Thornton Sr., who has submitted his resignation as head of the Galveston wharves, charged Wednesday the Army moved its business to Beaumont because labor and stevedoring costs were cheaper there.

He said Galveston stopped handling Army traffic on Nov. 1 and he said Army officials told him the reason was because stevedoring charges were cheaper at Beaumont "and the work is better and more efficient."

However, Ben Harris, president of Southern Stevedoring and Contracting Co., which had the Army contract at Galveston, said the real reason the Army left Galveston was because Beaumont charged it no pier rental.

Galveston wharves, he said, charged \$15,000 pier rental a year plus \$30 a month for use of "a shack" at the pier.

Harris said his company does the stevedoring for the Army at Houston, and Houston officials, he said, are making overtures for a larger part of the business that is now going to Beaumont.

**Grand Jury Probes Oil Man's Death**

CRANE, Tex., Dec. 2 —UP— A grand jury will investigate the mysterious death last April of a Fort Worth oil operator, who at first was believed to have committed suicide but later found to have been murdered.

District Attorney John Lee said a grand jury, tentatively scheduled to meet Monday in Crane, has decided to look into the death of Herbert J. Summy on the basis of evidence turned up by investigators.

Summy's body was found in his tightly closed car parked near Crane last April 1. A garden hose extended from the exhaust into a window of the vehicle. An inquest verdict of suicide by carbon monoxide poisoning was first returned by Peace Justice Clarence Key.

An autopsy report later showed that a laceration on Summy's jaw had caused fracture of several bones in his head, and that one of these had punctured a blood vessel, causing a massive hemorrhage, Key said.

No arrests have been made.

# Minors Continue Fight For Survival

ATLANTA, Dec. 2—UP—Minor league baseball makes one more bid Thursday to stay in business.

The assembled club owners will vote on vital amendments to the major-minor agreement and even though the ones they support may be voted down next week by the major league bosses, they will continue the fight against factors which have caused a continuing decline in attendance since 1947.

Most of the amendments to be voted on are the outgrowth of a meeting last month which was called by Dick Burnett, president of the Dallas club of the Texas League.

**Discouraged Over Prospects**

But Burnett, himself, said he was discouraged over the prospects of getting much support.

"We had 23 league presidents at our meeting and they pledged themselves in Dallas to the support of our legislation," he said. "But since coming here, five or six of them have had pressure brought to bear. And they have changed their minds."

Burnett said he was withdrawing his amendment for an unrestricted draft, "because I feel there is very little chance of getting it passed at this time."

However, he said he had high hopes that the club owners would support his amendment to rewrite the governing rules of the minor leagues.

"We don't even have a constitution," he said. "There is no tie between the majors and minors except an informal friendly agreement. There is not one word in it about radio or about television, two things which they didn't know much about in 1901 when the first agreement was written."

**Agreement Gone**

"Since Sept. 6, 1901, over a period of 52 years the minors six times have renewed, ratified, ex-

tended, confirmed and adopted this agreement, yet we are told by the proper custodian of this agreement that it has been lost, destroyed or stolen."

Another amendment which will get some attention, but which probably will be defeated, is the one proposed by Frank Lane of the White Sox through his Memphis, Tenn., farm club. It also would call for an unrestricted draft of minor league players but with the proviso that each player drafted get 25 per cent of the draft price. Players signed from high school or stand lots to minor league contracts would be subjected to unrestricted draft after one year of play. Lane is convinced such a program would do away with high priced bonus players.

There is only one amendment dealing specifically with radio and TV. It was proposed by Frank D. Lawrence, president of the Portsmouth, Va., club of the Piedmont League. It calls for a fine or indemnity of \$750 per club to be paid by major league clubs for each broadcast or telecast into a minor league territory. It was given little chance of passage.

## Johnson Named Most Valuable

HOUSTON, Dec. 2—UP—David (Kosse) Johnson, workhorse back of the Rice Owls, has been selected as the team's most valuable player.

Johnson, who gained 944 yards as the Owls gained a berth in the Cotton Bowl, was announced Tuesday night as winner of the George Martin award, given annually to the most valuable player. Twenty-seven players received letters at the "R" Association dinner.

# Borger's Mac Carter Leads Sooner Aags Past Longhorns

NEW YORK, Dec. 3—UP—Those pesky Oklahoma Aggies are back bidding for national basketball honors again in the same old-fashioned way — throttling their opponents with the nation's best defense.

In a performance typical of Aggie teams coached by Hank Iba, which have marked up the country's best defensive average in an amazing 14 of the last 19 years,

the Aggies scored their second victory in as many nights Wednesday night by turning back a strong University of Texas team, 54 to 37.

Since they won their opening game from Hardin-Simmons Tuesday night, 84 to 40, the current Aggies have permitted only 38.5 points per game — far better than the 55.8 points allowed-per-game average which won them the national crown last season.

**Long String of Home Victories**

Texas had absolutely no luck with the IBA-built defense as the Aggies, defending champions of the Missouri Valley conference, drove to their 23rd straight home court victory. At halftime, the Aggies led by 17 to 12 and then pulled away. Texas was able to hold the Aggies' high-scoring, six-foot, 11-

inch center Bobby Mattick to nine points but sophomore Mack Carter came along to lead the Aggies with 13 points. Fred Saunders paced Texas with 12.

Three other teams also rated as national powers — La Salle, Dayton, and Niagara — scored impressive, lop-sided victories Wednesday night.

La Salle took an early lead and coasted to a 79 to 57 victory over Millersville, Pa., State. Tom Gola, the Explorers' six-seven All-American, was high man with 18 points, but sat out much of the game.

Dayton crushed Gustavus Adolphus 90 to 62. Big Johnny Horan, Jack Sales, and center Billy Uhl each racked up 20 points to lead the Flyers.

Niagara, figured as an Eastern powerhouse, marked up win No. 2, 92 to 29, over Toronto. Charley Hoxie got 18 points.

Villanova, led by Bobby Schaffer's 31 points, gained its 55th straight home court victory, 74 to 59, over little Mt. St. Mary's.

## SWC Quints Break Even

The Southwest Conference batted .500 per cent in two basketball games Wednesday night as Rice downed Sam Houston State 61 to 48, but Texas lost to nationally-rated Oklahoma A&M 54 to 37.

It was the second night of play for SWC cagers, as four schools opened the hardwood season Tuesday night. Texas Christian, which swamped Austin College Tuesday, meets Midwestern University Thursday night.

The Longhorns did a good job of stopping Aggie center Bob Mattick holding the 6-11 giant to only nine points.

But a Texas sophomore, Mack Carter of Borger, scored 13 points for the Aggies to lead both teams in scoring. Center Fred Saunders was high for the Longhorns with 12.

The two teams fought an almost even terms the first quarter but Oklahoma A&M held a 17 to 12 lead at halftime.

Gene Schwinger, Rice's All-Southwest Conference center, is apparently taking up where he left off last year.

The tall, blond sharpshooter rung the nets for 21 points as Rice was never in any real danger from the Bearkats.

Sam Houston's Walter Lee racked up 19 points himself, but unlike Schwinger, Lee had little scoring help from his mates.

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**Other leading games:** Purdue, Big Ten last-placer last year, beat Valparaiso, 83 to 64, with Ted Dunn's 19 points tops; Loyola of Chicago ran its record to 3-0 by beating North Dakota, 90 to 85, despite 35 points by Nodak's Jon Heaven; West Virginia won 86 to 92 over Carnegie Tech; Temple beat Albright, 58 to 50; six-six Bill Lynch tallied 29 points for St. Joseph's (Pa.) in a 91 to 62 St. Vona-venture evened its slate at 1-1 by beating Lemoyne, 87 to 57; Manhattan downed American U., 75 to 52; Duke trounced Furman 110 to 76; Georgetown (D. C.) crushed Baltimore, 53 to 49; New York U. defeated New York Maritime, 78 to 59; and Virginia whipped Hampton - Sydney, 89 to 62.

Notre Dame's debut, appearances by two league champions, and the fabulous Bevo Francis are expected to highlight Thursday night's court program.

Notre Dame bows in with a home game against Ball State. Texas Christian, the Southwest Conference champ, plays Midwestern, and Wyoming, champion of the Skyline Conference, visits Montana State.

# Kansas Five Picked To Repeat

KANSAS CITY, Dec. 3—UP—Coaches of the Big Seven Conference agreed Thursday that Kansas, defending champion, again will be the team to beat in the new basketball season.

They favored Dr. F. C. (Phog) Allen's squad for three distinct reasons: B. H. Born, six-foot, nine-inch center and scoring leader of the conference last season; and forwards Al Kelley and Harold Patterson, returning starters from last year's league champions and NCAA runners-up.

But the coaches agreed on another point, too. It won't be a runaway race and at least three other teams — maybe four — will pose a real challenge to Kansas.

On the list of potential threats were Kansas State, runnerup a year ago; Missouri and Nebraska, with Oklahoma not far behind. Only Colorado, last place finisher a year ago, was regarded as unlikely to challenge the favorites.

Dr. Allen, the 68-year-old Kansas coach who is starting his 37th year at the head of the Jayhawkers, personally viewed the new race as a four-way fight involving Kansas, Kansas State, Nebraska and Missouri.

"I wouldn't be a bit surprised," he said, "if the ultimate winner loses as many as three conference games."

Plenty of experienced material was available at each of the seven camps, but with three starters returning from a championship-winning team, Kansas appeared to have a slight edge.

Kelley, co-captain with Born, is five feet, 11 inches tall and averaged 129 points per game last season. Patterson averaged 9.5, while Born, with a 225 average in 12 conference starts, topped all the Big Seven scorers.

Kansas State has four returning veterans, but gone are the two top

scorers of a year ago—center Knostman and guard Bob Robinson. Sparky Stalcup at Missouri nine lettersmen, bolstered by a transfer from Missouri school of Gene Sully, described by cup as "not so tall but a real performer."

Oklahoma lost only three lettersmen from the team which finished with a 5-7 mark for a tie for first place in the Big Seven. 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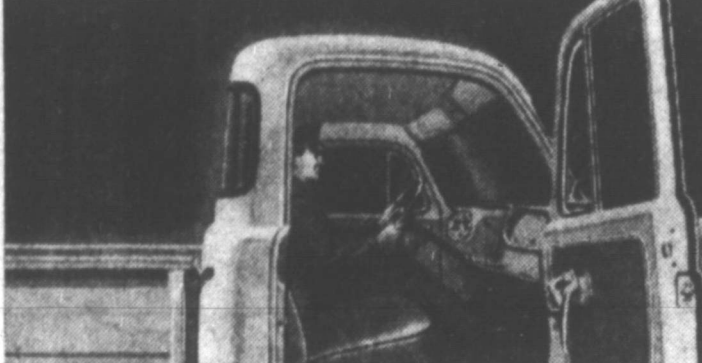

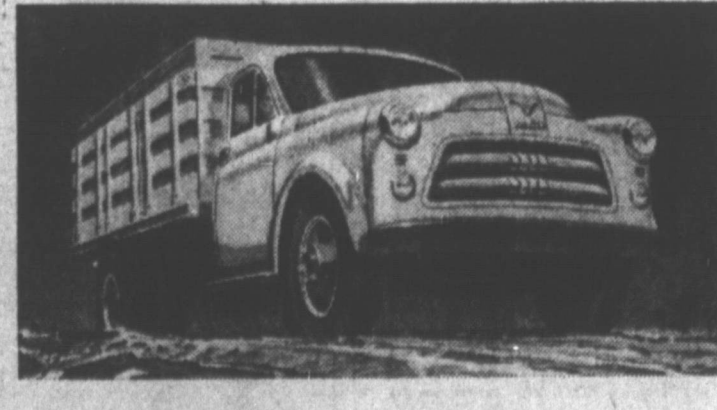

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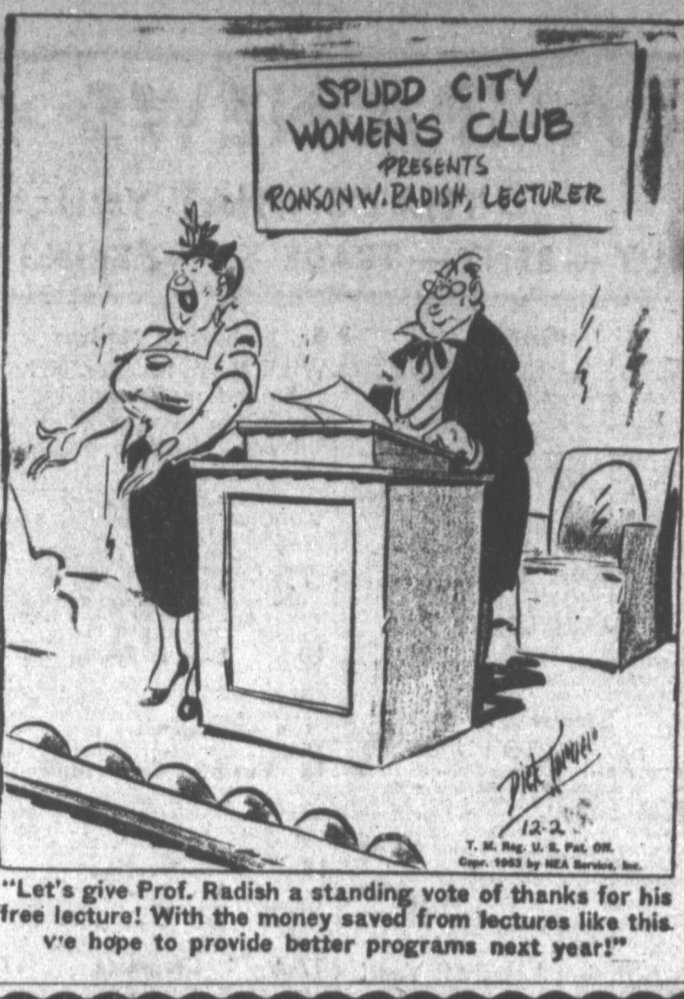

 When I picked up Mary at 3:30 she asked me what I had been doing.  
 "Working in a bowling alley," I said.  
 "Good," she said. "We can use a little extra money for Christmas."  
 That's all she said. Either she understands me or she doesn't. Wish I knew.
