

# Kills Eight, **Hurts Twenty**

ALEXANDRIA, La., Dec. 3 -UP- A mammoth tornado, spawned by an early winter squall, carved a crescent - shaped path through Louisiana Thursday, killing at least eight persons and in-

juring 20 others. Police were receiving only sparse reports from the hit communities-rural areas along a 100mile zig-zag path taken by the giant twister.

Telephone lines were down. The New Orleans Weather Bureau warned that the hurricaneproducing conditions, which were moving eastward, might produce mall twisters in Mississippi before the day was over.

Warning Borne Out Within two hours of that warn-

ing, it was borne out. tornado ripped through the Mississippi River levee village of Fitler leaving "several people" reported dead and at least two persons injured.

Bill Ray, a reporter with the Vicksburg Post Herald, said first reports from the tiny village said 'several people" were killed as the ornado dipped down on its way out of Louisiana.

In short, ladies and gentleman over 65, keep a stiff. upper appetite and don't succumb to obesity. Don't get fat as you get old.

According to leading geriatrists --- doctors for the aged - the one biggest health problem for older people is overweight. They've calculated a definite and frightening relationship between excess poundage and early araves.

There is, for example, a 75 per cent increase in the mortality rate for people who are more than 25 per cent overweight. The more overweight you are, the poorer your chances of living to a ripe old age.

Doctors list 10 reasons why too much weight can kill you as you grow older:

Curtails life; impairs vigor; increases fatigability; breaks down the liver; increases surgical risks; hastens onset of complications; increases likelihood of diabetes; associated with hypertension (high blood pressure); associated with arteriosclerosis (hardening of the arteries); associated with heart disease.

If that doesn't scare you away from the pastry tray, maybe this will: Despite the high state of medical care in the United States, deaths over 45 years of age occur at a rate 25 per cent higher here than in Western Europe. And the difference is attributed to nothing more than a galloping appetite.

The problem of old age obesity has nothing to do with financial condition, either. Rich and poor alike can become too fat --- too many boiled potatoes are just as fattening as too many crepes suzette.

According to a report by the New York State Joint Legislature Committee on Problems of the Aging, the overweight aged are a definite "public health menace." The report called "Enriching the Years" suggests that obesity stems from an emotional disturbance

It quotes Dr. Edward H. Rynearson, of the Mayo Clinic, as saying, "An overweight person is nearly always a compulsive eater who turns to his refrigerator like a compulsive drinker turns to the bottle.

Complicating the problem for many old people are poor food habits. The ones who live alone, for example, often have no incentive to eat sensible meals, and eat fattening rather than wholesome foods. Others have no knowledge of nutrition. In some sections of the country, and in some nationalities, obesity is a sign of distinction, with a large paunch becoming a mark of social position.

1. Drink plenty of water.

2. Center your diet on milk, fruits, vegetables, bread and whole grain cereals with modest amounts of eggs and meat.

3. Limit your use of sugar, alcohol and excess fat. Use brown sugar and dark molasses.

4. Use fruits such as apples for dessert. Insist that meals afford both milk and coffee, not milk or coffee.

5. Instead of synthetic vitamins, use dry brewer's yeast and wheat germ.

6. Use of whole wheat, dark rye or soya - enriched breads instead of white bread.

7. If you cannot afford whole or evaporated milk, use dry skim milk

#### Gas Tax Hoax

Dan Thornton, outspoken governor of Colorado, minced no words the other day when he voiced a demand that the federal government get out of tax fields "that traditionally belong to the states:" He cited the federal gas tax as particularly obnoxious and unreasonable, flatly denouncing it as a "hoax on the American people."

Certainly his logic was as sound as his language was. forceful. The injustice of the gas tax situation has nothing to do with the essential burden of taxation on highway users, heavy though that be. Every motorist knows that he is paying taxes for highway building and upkeep every time he buys a gallon of gas; knows that this is as it must and should be.

But whereas every penny of gas tax collected by a state is rightfully expended on the highways of the state. the federal government allocates only a portion of its gas tax income to highway uses. The remainder is retained by Washington for such federal uses as it sees fit — in clear disregard of the basic purpose for which gas taxes were conceived in the first place.

It is of significance that Dan Thornton speaks not only as the chief executive of a Western State but as a member of the President's Commission on Intergovernment Relations, which is studying the problem of duplication in state and federal taxes. He is in a position to do something about the hoax he decries - and he has with him the moral support of the nation's millions of motorists.




