Right now government holdings of farm products are enormous. A recent article by Milo Perkins, a former assistant to the secretary of agriculture, in Readers' Digest pointed out that the value of government farm holdings amounted to \$3 billion and included such items as 470,000,000 bushels of wheat, 540,000,000 bushels of corn and 160,000,000 pounds of butter. The daily bill for storage and refrigeration in private warehouses ran to approximately \$400,000. This is the result of current price-support legislation. And there is more to come. Secretary of Agriculture Benson has warned that

The elaborate system of farm supports that we suffer with today was born in the early Thirties as a "cure" for depression ills. The New Deal's solution of the overproduction then was to plow under crops and stock, and pay the farmer for such programs. But an emergency solution has become a permanent policy.

When World War II came along, domestic and foreign demand for farm products soared and there was no difficulty with the surplus problem but the political farmers wanted safeguards, nevertheless, against shifts in demand and artificial program was created which paid no heed to day-by-day conditions.

The bugs in this government policy did not show immediately after World War II since a devastated Europe still had to have American food. But the picture has changed steadily in recent years. As war ravaged countries returned to normal they produced their own food and cut down on demand for American imports.

Added to this has been a series of amazingly good crop years. But the farmer was under no pressure to cut down production. Not with the government standing by to take surpluses off the farmer's hands and pay prices above the natural market level. In fact, the farmer was encouraged to produce, not for consumption but for storage - at the expense of the public treas-

For almost two years the drop in American farm prices has been steady - and obvious. This is a natural market development and neither Republicans nor Democrats can control such economic trends anymore than they can control the volume of spring rains.

What these politicians - Republicans and Democrats - are responsible for is the extent to which they allow expensive and destructive farm subsidy programs to go on. And the farmer who demands subsidies and engages in political pressure to obtain them is equally to blame. There is no permanent safety for the farm industry in

a policy of buying up surpluses. They must be actually eliminated by curtailment or consumption. And no artificial crop controls are required to reach

this solution. The most natural of all results will develop as soon as the federal government quits its subsidy program. No farmer in his right mind will produce what he can't sell — or pawn off on the government — and the law of supply and demand will prevail.

There may be some slight pain among the inefficient, but there will be better prices for farm products, more freedom for farmers and a healthier condition in the entire nation.

The Court simply said, in judicial language, that when government pays the bills, it can call the tune to which we must all dance.

Social Problems Textbooks I have been quoting for a few days from A. H. Hobbs' book "A

Critique of Textbooks." As the readers will note, his summary shows how the textbooks in sociology emphasized that government should-"actively provide people with security, equality, happiness, and developed personalities, rather than passively allow in dividuals to pursue these ends within a general framework of regulations.

The author of this book, being a professor of sociology in a state university, doesn't seem to realize how sociology textbooks used in public schools of necessity have to advocate more government con-trol and less individual responsibility. They have to do this because public schools are not based on any moral law; they are a denial of the Golden Rule and the

"It seems somewhat surprising that only 12 per cent of the references in introductory sociology texts are devoted to each of major subjects such as history, philosophy, religion, law, and geography; and less than one per cent to scientific method, education, war eugenics, physical science and medicine."

Education The book, of course, emphasizes that education is the thing that will eliminate the problems facing our society. The trouble with the professional educators is that they want coercive "education" or propaganda. They want a monopoly the impression that going to high schools and colleges is synonymous with getting an education. They never once suggest that going to high schools and colleges might be a great handicap to an education. They would leave the impression that the man who didn't go to high school or college could

not be educated. The author of this book recognizes some of the errors in the sociology textbooks used by coercive high schools and colleges. He

"However, the type of 'education' described by the authors of sociology texts involves processes and purposes which are not necessarily germane to the concept of education, and which constitute a major departure from traditional beliefs regarding both education and society.* * *

"Forty of the 57 texts cititicize the type of education which was



Most of the sociological criticism is directed against education which emphasizes the importance of traditional beliefs in relation to history, the family, the economic system, the form of government, nationalism, or social classes.
