Dulles Blasts USSR Tactics In NATO Meet

Western Countries Give Okay To Six-Nation Army

PARIS, Dec. 14—UP—Secretary of State John Foster Dulles warned Monday that the Soviet Union is changing its tactics—but not its policies—in an attempt to get the western alliance to drop its guard.

He repeated his frequent appeal for quick ratification of the European defense community project by which 500,000 German troops would be added to the NATO armies.

But French Foreign Minister Georges Bidault served notice, in opening a three-day NATO meeting, that France will require guarantees from the United States and Great Britain as the price of its ratification.

Bidault, addressing the 600 delegates packed into the dilapidated Palace de Chaillot, also welcomed President Eisenhower's plan for an atomic energy pool as offering new hope to a strife-torn world.

The President's plan, Bidault said, offers a chance to establish co-operation and association in a field where the best prospects for progress and also the most powerful means of annihilation.

To Insist on Army

Before the three-day session of foreign, defense and finance ministers of the 16-nation NATO group met, informed sources said the United States was prepared to insist upon immediate formation of the European Army if American military aid was to continue.

French Pick A President

PARIS, Dec. 14—UP—France chose a new president Thursday in an election notable for its lack of preliminary fanfare.

There have been no campaign speeches and no brass bands, largely because the people have no direct voice in the election.

The French president is supposed to be a sort of super-party referee, and in principle at least the election is not conducted on political grounds.

CHALLENGED BY McCARTHY

Brownell Claims Commies Are Out Of Government

FORT WORTH, Dec. 14—UP—The assertion in Texas by Attorney General Herbert Brownell Jr. that all persons suspected of Communist leanings are believed "out of government now" apparently was challenged Monday by Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy.

Brownell said of Communists in government on a Republican-sponsored statewide radio broadcast Sunday night:

"We think they are all out of government now. But the President has promised that within the coming year we will have completed the employee security program so the people can be sure none of them is left in government."

At Washington, however, the Wisconsin Republican senator said Sunday night that the job of cleaning up "security risks" holding government jobs was not ended.

Two Killed As Bus Overturns

JEWETT CITY, Conn., Dec. 14—UP—A school bus overturned on slippery pavement in a driving rain Monday and police reported at least two children were killed.

At William W. Backus hospital in nearby Norwich, a spokesman said "several" injured youngsters were being brought in for emergency treatment.

Rail Crash Fatal To 6

ROYSE CITY, Tex., Dec. 14—UP—A Dallas family of five and their maid were killed Sunday night when the Missouri-Kansas-Texas railroad's "Texas Special" streamliner sliced their station wagon at a crossing.

As many as 30 persons, passengers on the train, suffered minor injury and "shaking up." At least four of them were hurt seriously enough to require medical attention, including the train's engineer.

Ten of the crack streamliner's cars and its two connected diesel engines were derailed in the shattering collision with the motor vehicle. The tracks were badly torn and wreckage was strewn over a wide area.

Santa Receives Financial Lift

HOLLIS, Okla., Dec. 14—UP—Ronnie Kent Masters, seven-year-old son of Mrs. Clarence Masters of Hollis, took no chances when he wrote his letter to Santa Claus.

He delivered his letter in person to the office of the Harmon County News and asked Brownell did not say "security risks" were believed removed from government.

In both the Eisenhower and preceding Democratic administrations, "security risk" has been used to mean both persons with communistic leanings and those with personal habits such as drunkenness or sex perversion who might thereby endanger national security.

The attorney general, in the Texas radio broadcast, was interviewed by Republican national committeeman Jack Porter of Houston.

Brownell at the same time promised a fight against Communists outside the government. "We are going after them separately," he said.

Brownell said he considered the Harry Dexter White case "an important development in the life of our nation, because in my opinion the people of this country are entitled to know what goes on in their government."

"And that was the reason I brought out those facts," he said. The attorney general described the federal employee security program now being completed as one of the outstanding accomplishments of the Eisenhower administration. It involves interviews by department heads of everyone in his agency to determine whether or not they are loyal to the United States or are security risks.

Allied Troops May Back Freedom Walk

Dean Claims Reds Building Strength

PANMUNJOM, Dec. 14—UP—UN negotiator Arthur H. Dean said Monday Allied troops, if necessary, will be used to guarantee the walk to freedom of 22,000 anti-Communist war prisoners.

Dean announced to cheering Allied soldiers he had informed the Communists that the troops would line up south of the demilitarized zone in January to handle the men if the Reds try to detain them.

But Dean, who broke off negotiations for a Korean peace conference Saturday, said he expected no trouble when the Jan. 22 deadline for the release of prisoners is reached.

The tough American attorney said the Communists have insisted that the prisoners remain behind barbed wire until the peace conference decides their fate and for that reason have tried to stall on conveying the talks until next spring.

By that time, Dean said, "they will be in a wonderful position militarily if the talks break down."

He said the Reds are "building extraordinary bunkers in the north."

"They are building gun emplacements," he said. "They are building airfields."

Dean said, however, it was his "personal belief" the Korean war would not be renewed by either the Communists or South Korea, despite the "Reds' government's threat to 'seek its own means' for unification of Korea if unity is not achieved by Jan. 27."

To Leave for U.S. Dean, who will leave for the United States Tuesday, said he was "very sure" the Communists would resume the disrupted conference talks when they see that the United Nations means business.

"They may hold off a week or 10 days," Dean said.

The American envoy, representing the United Nations, said President Eisenhower had ordered him back to Washington but that he would return when the Communists "show a serious desire to resume the talks."

PW Of Kermit Has Request On Birthday

PANMUNJOM, Dec. 14—UP—Pfc. Claude J. Batchelor of Kermit, Tex., one of 22 American prisoners who have refused to come home, observed his 22nd birthday behind barbed wire Monday.

Batchelor, son of Mr. and Mrs. O. L. Batchelor of Kermit, apparently had only one birthday request.

In the letter that another young Communist-indoctrinated American war prisoner wrote to his mother now in Tokyo, Batchelor asked Mrs. Portia Howe to visit his Japanese wife, Okyoko Araki, who lives in Tokyo.

The request was relayed in the letter Pfc. Richard R. Tenneson, 20, of Alden, Minn., wrote his mother, Mrs. Howe, who went to Japan in an effort to talk with her son.

Batchelor married after he went to the Far East theater. He has five brothers and two sisters at home. He finished the junior year of high school and drove a dump truck for a time before enlisting.

Batchelor's mother, Mrs. O. L. Batchelor, said at her home in Kermit that the family had not seen him in any special birthday greetings, although they had been writing to him regularly.

Mrs. Batchelor, wife of an oil company engineer, said, however, that they haven't heard from their son since he went to the Panmunjom camp.

"We feel that since this is his birthday and the Christmas season is coming up, this will be his most glorious opportunity to change his mind and return home," Mrs. Batchelor said. "We're just waiting and hoping and praying."

Mine Worker Takes Vacation Without Pay To Avoid Strike

MAUCHLINE, Scotland, Dec. 14—UP—A boiler fireman with 12 good reasons for not taking a vacation was on his first "summer" holiday without pay since 1941 Monday to prevent angry fellow workers from striking.

Willie Farrell, 45, was home from the coal mine where he worked his annual two-week vacation for double pay to help feed and clothe his wife and 11 children. He never felt he could afford a vacation.

But this year his \$50 fellow workers' protest, Farrell's industry and threatened to strike if he didn't take a vacation like everybody else.

IN LETTER TO MOTHER

GI War Prisoner Rejects Country

TOKYO, Dec. 14—UP—A young Communist-indoctrinated American war prisoner rejected his home, family and country Monday in a propaganda-packed letter to his praying mother in a Tokyo hotel.

Pfc. Richard R. Tenneson, 20, of Alden, Minn., advised his mother, Mrs. Portia Howe, to go to Army headquarters "immediately" after reading his note and take a loyalty oath or "you are liable to be arraigned before the House Un-American Activities committee."

Tenneson's 400-word answer to Mrs. Howe's brief telegram to him in his Communist, barbed-wire stockade at Panmunjom bitterly denounced the American way of life.

Refused Permission for Visit Mrs. Howe's son, one of 22 American prisoners who refused to go home in last summer's prisoner exchange, said U.S. authorities were afraid to let her go to Panmunjom to see him.

"They have probably told you that I was forced, doped, brain-

washed, or some other horse manure that they use to slander and defile people like myself who will stand up for his own rights and the rights of man," Tenneson's letter said.

Tenneson said he still loved his family, "my people and my country," (See GI PRISONERS, Page 3)

San Antonio Fire Kills One Person

SAN ANTONIO, Dec. 14—UP—Two Sunday fires in San Antonio killed one person and injured six, including Fire Chief M. L. Butler.

Ben Jackson, 60, a blind Negro, was fatally burned when his clothing was ignited by a defective gas heater hose. He made a futile dash to the bathroom, leaving a trail of soot and finger marks.

In the second fire, six firemen including Butler, suffered minor cuts and burns in a two-alarm fire that destroyed an unfinished 12-unit apartment on Government Hill near Fort Sam Houston. Damages were estimated at \$40,000.

Postal Receipts Showing Increase

According to figures released by Pampa Postmaster W. B. Weathered, Pampa's postal receipts are ahead of last year's receipts by over \$100,000.

At the end of November, the total postal receipts were \$127,795.74, while at the end of November, 1952, the receipts totaled only \$149,549.01. The total through December, 1952 was \$175,236.58, but the figure for 1953 will not be available until the first of the year.

Weathered also stated that the Post Office volume of business has tripled since it moved into the present building in 1954, and they still have room to expand by 50 per cent.

"This is one of the few Post Offices in the country that the department thought would grow and it did," he pointed out.

GAS HEARING LAUNCHED DESPITE DELAY REQUEST

AUSTIN, Dec. 14—UP—A hearing division, and Ross Bell, chief auditor of the gas utilities division, Charles Crenshaw, Austin attorney representing the City of Pampa, sought a delay of "not less than 60 days" in which to obtain information regarding the original cost of the natural gas system in Pampa.

He said the city was in an "intolerable position" unless it could obtain that information. "I don't feel we could possibly go forward with this hearing this morning," Crenshaw added.

However, F. L. Kaykendall of Austin, representing Empire Southern, contended that "if a delay is granted this hearing will never be held."

"If they want a delay, we're willing to delay it upon one ground if they'll agree to put in an interim date," Kaykendall said.

He said that the "search for the record here is like the search for the Holy Grail—you'll never find it."

McInosh denied Pampa's request for a delay.

"In view of the work done by both the company and the city," he said, "and both sides are represented here, I believe we should go ahead."

"Perhaps we can come up with some sort of an answer as to how to get the information by developing it at this hearing," McInosh said.

The first witness presented by the gas company was James A. Davis, president and general manager. (See HEARING, Page 2)

Student Critically Injured In Fight

BEAUMONT, Dec. 14—UP—A 16-year-old Beaumont high school youth was near death and paralyzed from the neck down Monday from injuries suffered in a gang fight at a party here Saturday night.

Held on charges of assault to murder was Ritus Peter Dealinger, one of those attending the party. Doctors at Hotel Dieu said Dealinger suffered a broken neck and other injuries in the fight and said even if he lived he probably would remain paralyzed forever.

According to police Orr was at a party for young people at the home of a Beaumont architect when a 19-year-old guest became boisterous and was asked to leave. He and another guest went outside to settle a difference they had.

Others at the party moved to the yard to stop the fight and ended in a mass brawl during which a police said at least one knive was pulled and another youth used brass knucks.

Pampa Pilot's Funeral Set

Funeral services for William L. Thompson, pilot of a Magnolia Petroleum company plane which crashed Friday near Sherman, will be held in Sherman, Okla., Tuesday at 10 a.m. It was learned here today.

Thompson and four other men lost their lives when the plane, which was enroute from Dallas to Tulsa, crashed near the Helvey community. The wreckage of the plane was found Saturday.

A former Pampaan, Thompson was the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Thompson, 307 E. Browning. The parents left for Dallas Friday after receiving reports that the plane was missing.

Powdered Eggs On Menu Again
WASHINGTON, Dec. 14—UP—Powdered eggs, which many veterans remember as one of the horrors of World War II, will soon be served to troops again.

A new Army regulation specifies that all messes must serve dried on, after the first frost, pulled eggs, milk, apples, onions and potatoes at least nine times during the coming year.

Officials explained that "the use of dehydrated foods... serves a logistic purpose by conserving strategic materials and space." In wartime and Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway, chief of staff, feels that the Army should get used to them in peacetime.

Death Claims Sports Scribe Jinx Tucker

WACO, Dec. 14—UP—Funeral services were scheduled Monday for Henry Harrison (Jinx) Tucker, one of Texas' oldest and best-loved sports writers.

The 59-year-old one-time linotype operator, sports editor of the Waco News-Tribune and Times-Herald since 1920, died in his sleep Sunday, apparently from a heart attack.

Tucker would have been 60 years old on Christmas Day. He had suffered from recurring heart trouble since 1947 but had remained active and, only Saturday, covered the Waco-Houston Lamar high school football game.

He returned home after the game and told his wife "he was tired." After taking a light meal and talking to two or three out-of-town sports writers who came by his house, he went to bed in a specially constructed chair in which he had slept much of the time since his illness.

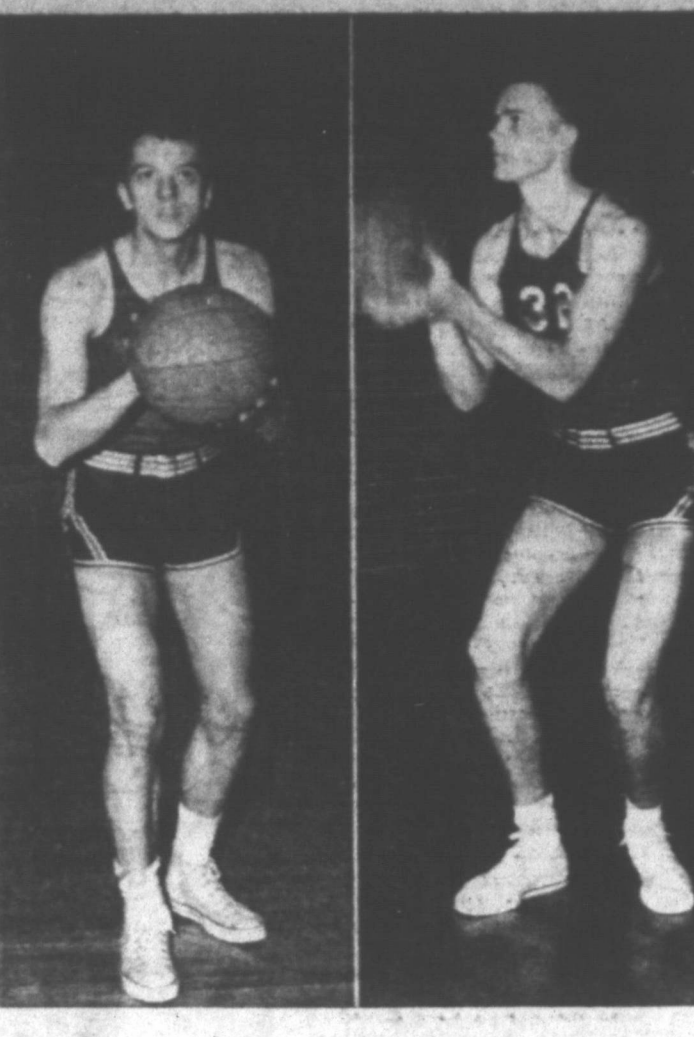
His wife found him dead in the chair about 6:30 a.m. Sunday. Editor of a daily column, "Jinx," Hot-Shots, Tucker wrote in flowery prose and with a distinctive home-spun flavor.

He was widely read and quoted throughout Central Texas and was considered an expert in all fields of sports.

"If Jinx told you a score was such-and-such back in 1917, there would be no need to go and look it up," a friend said. "He would be right."

Tucker was the Boswell who chronicled Waco's great high school football team during the Paul Tyson era of the 1920s when the Tigers marched to one state championship after another.

His other love was Baylor University, whose athletic teams he followed from one end of the country to the other until this year.

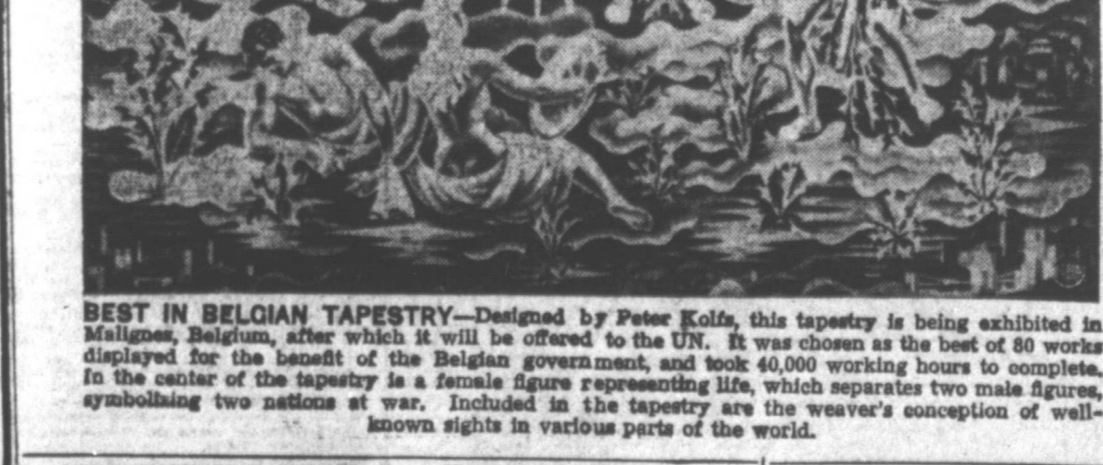

May Prepare Union Speech At Augusta

By MERRIMAN SMITH WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 —UP— Backstairs at the White House: It has long been known, even years before the Eisenhower administration, that a president could work more swiftly and with far less interruption on complicated papers when he was away from Washington, than when he was in town.

This is because a president, when he is settled down in some out-of-town retreat, does not have to cope with a daily list of callers and his telephone traffic is reduced heavily.

For these reasons, much of the work on Mr. Eisenhower's state of the union message and his new budget may be done in his new cottage at Augusta, Ga. Mrs. Eisenhower's health permitting, the chief executive may stay in Augusta longer than just a brief Christmas holiday.

One day last month in Augusta, the President was out on the golf course and his five-year-old grandson, David, was in the basement of the Eisenhower house, playing in the vicinity of a special Secret Service and Signal Corps communications center.

One of the agents asked David if he'd like to talk to Santa Claus. David bobbed his head in vigorous assent, so the agent contacted another agent on the golf course by short wave radio and explained the situation.

One agent out on the golf course played the part of Santa Claus over his portable transmitter and gravely asked David back at the party-time White House if he had been a good boy.

David assured him his behavior had been exemplary and quite worthy of Yuletide generosity.

The alleged bribe plot was uncovered through the cooperation of the Onarud officials and Wattman was trapped after keeping an appointment in which \$300 allegedly was turned over to him.
