A World Of Planty

How can your wants be satisfied? How can the wants of the world be satisfied?

Your wants change from day to day. Only you can know what you want.

Your freedom to choose each and every day, every minute, for that matter, between different products which are competing for your favor, must result in the greatest possible satisfaction of consumers' wants.

When those who are competing for your favor are prevented from doing their best in this competition you have a harder time satisfying your wants. This is true regardless of what your wants may be. Whether they are for material objects or spiritual satisfaction.

When those who are competing for your favor are free to use all their abilities in this competition you can satisfy your wants better. This is true of every individual in the world.

The way to satisfy the wants of the world is to free those who are seeking to satisfy these wants — be they for food, clothing, or what have you — from restraints which have been placed upon them.

Those who dislike the profit motive say that government management will satisfy the wants of the world better than private management. Yet government produces nothing. Only individuals produce. Individuals produce the most when they receive all the profits of their

When government taxes profits, these taxes are used as the bureaucrats decide. They are not used to produce what the people want, but what the bureaucrats want produced. It is almost impossible for the people to overthrow entrenched bureaucrats. Even in a country such as ours, votes on government employees are taken only once every two, four, or six years.

But votes on private businesses are taken every day. Only those private businesses which day in and day out provide services which the consumers want succeed. Were private businesses to pay no taxes at all, the competitive search for profit would cause the wants of the

world to be satisfied to the greatest extent possible. Every single dollar spent by government comes eventually from taxes. Dollars paid in taxes are dollars that

cannot be spent by those paying the taxes.

Communists and Socialists see that government spending means lessened private spending to the exact amount of the government spending. But they want the power to spend for themselves. Every dollar spent by government is spent less efficiently than when it is spent privately, because the profit motive causes the private spender to spend his money to the best of his ability, while the bureaucrat only spends the money in order to obtain votes.

The Bureaucrat spends tax dollars for votes, while the private spender would have spent exactly the same amount of dollars for goods and services, including spiritual services.

Private spending satisfies the wants of the world. Government spending increases the power of bureaucrats over their subjects.

Every dollar spent by government is eventually deducted from dollars which would have been spent privately. Every edifice erected by government destroys edifices which would have been erected privately. You can see government buildings. You do not see the private buildings which would have been erected had this money been spent privately instead of by government.

In the past few years you have seen billions spent by our United States government. You do not see how the billions would have been spent privately had they not been spent by government. You do not see the tremendous increase in our standards of living, the wonderous new inventions, the relieving of poverty, the spiritual progress, the harmonious relations between men, which would have resulted had these billions been spent privately instead of by government.

Those Fixed Costs

There has been much discussion of the fact that the cost at wholesale of many of the things we eat and wear and use is often a great deal less than the price we must pay in the retail store. And that tends to create an impression that retailers are a bunch of bandits who are making "extortionate profits" at the expense of the hapless housewife.

What this attitude fails to take into consideration that, in late years, the fixed costs of carrying on a retail business have tremendously increased. Those costs include labor, taxes, rents, transportation, and everything else. And there is still another factor, which is found in changed consumer preference. As an example, people now want processed foods where they used to buy the raw product. They want goods in a wide range of packagings and sizes and varieties. And all this costs money. The retailer, like the producer and manufacturer, has no choice save to pass the cost on to the buyer.

The real test of whether or not retailing is "exploiting" us is found in its net profit — the money typical stores have left at the end of the year after all bills are paid. Major food chains earn a net of as little as one per cent. Other types of stores customarily earn three or four or Hive cents on the dollar of sales. As anyone can see, if the profit were eliminated entirely, there would be small change in the retail cost of merchandise.


