# **Demos Brand Charges As** 'Political'

WASHINGTON, Nov. . -- UP-Attorney General Herbert Brow ell Jr., promised to document Mon day his politically - explosive charge that former President Tru-man ignored two FBI warning and promoted a known Russian spy to a high government office in 1948. Brownell said he would either hold a news conference or issue statement to back up the allega-tion which Mr. Truman and Democratic National Chairman Stephe A. Mitchell denounced as a "polit-ical maneuver" to offset recent GOP defeats at the polls.

The attorney general indicated he might make public summaries of FBI reports on the late Harry Dex-ter White to show that "White's spying activities for the Soviet government were reported in de-tail to the White House" before Mr. Truman advanced White from assistant secretary of the treasury to U.S. executive director of the

International Monetary Fund. Brownell's assertion that the FBI reports were delivered to Mr. Truman through his military aide, Maj. Gen. Harry H. Vaughan, swiftly produced these develop ments:

# Labor Government

Paul L. Poirot, in an excellent pomphlet called "Bargaining," published by the Foundation for Economic Education, quotes Donald Richberg to show that ALL UNIONS are striving after a labor government for America.

"The present and future intentions and desires of unions have been plainly stated. Their authorized spokesman argued recently in the Supreme Court of the United States that labor monopolies through a union shop were 'indespensable.' They said that 'workers can not thrive but can only die under competition between themselves, and that therefore union membership must be a condition of employment.

"They said that 'the worker becomes a member of an economic society when he takes employment,' and that 'the union is the organization of government of this society,' with the 'powers and responsibilities of a government,' and that union membership must be 'compulsory upon individuals."

"Thus it has been made plain beyond all argument that the goal of the union closed shop advocates a complete monopoly control of all jobs and the complete submission of all workers to government by unions.

The above was quoted from "Free Men vs. the Union Closed Shop" published in the Freeman, July 16, 1951.

In commenting upon this expose of union goals, Paul L. Poirot shows why we should not lend our support to those who are engaged in this struggle for compulsory unionism. When we insist on union baked bread, union made union suits, union plumblers or house painters, or purchasing a newspaper which is financed by union funds, we ought to realize that we are asking for a "labor" government in America. Poirot says:

"It may seem unnecessarily harsh and unrealistic to compare the practices of dictatorial government, but no other comparison is possible. There are only two basic methods of organizing. One way is illustrated by the voluntary cooperation seen with a local church group, or by the satisfaction of consumers who patronize a successful business man. This is the way of personal choice as manifested in a free market. The other way calls for power of coercion - the force of government. And in such a struggle for power, whatever group succeeds is the government. Those who lend their support to the struggle for compulsory unionism ought to realize that they are asking for a 'labor' government in America.

"Communist-Socialist Propaganda In American Schools" VY

I want to quote from the chapter "Fostering Materialistic Educational Policies" from the book "Communist-Socialist Propaganda in American Schools," The book

was written by Verne P. Kaub. It is generally agreed that the Communist - Socialist philosophy

is based on pure materialism. It rejects spiritual laws and principles. In fact, the Communist-Socialist propaganda denies there

are any moral principles. This is the philosophy of Karl Marx. Of course, tax supported schools of necessity must be materialistic because they are based on the belief that might makes right and that the end justifies the means. Thus, they cannot be based on moral principles because they are denying moral principles by their acts.

The author remarks "Insofar, then, as educators ignore and reject all spiritual concepts, they are playing directly into the hands of followers of Karl Marx, and quite naturally the Marxians will approve and applaud. Quite as naturally they will do all they can to speed any trend in the direction of materializing and paganizing education which may develop or appear to be developing."

Then Mr. Kaub quotes from the National Education Association's spokesmen by turning to page 30 of "Education for Family Life, Nineteenth Yearbook of the American Association of School Administrators, 1941," which reads:

"'We must . . . remember that socialized conduct, for example what we call private property and the sanctity of the person, is not natural biological behavior. It is, rather, learned patterns of con-

duct, of respecting the inviolability of things and persons, approachable only thru the group-sanctioned institutional patterns of contract. barter, buying and selling, courtship and marriage, employment,

# Look Out, Fellows

If insurance statisticians keep harping away on the revelations in their researches --- that wives are more likely to become widows than husbands are widowers ---we may find the lodies spurning their contemporaries or elders of the opposite sex, and eyeing younger prospects.

The men who do the figuring for actuarial tables assert that couples marrying today can look forward to a longer lifetime together than those who married in years past, but at the same the likelihood that the wife will eventually become a widow has increased material-Iv.

The explanation is that while average length of life has increased for both sexes, the increase has been greu.er for wives than for husbands. One result of this is a growing excess in the number of widows as compared with widowers.

Currently in the United States about 660,000 marriages are broken by death each year, and in two-thirds of these families the wife is the survivor. Fifty years ago the corresponding proportion was close to one-half

The chances that a wife will outlive her husband are due to our marriage customs and depend essentially upon the difference in their ages. Where husband and wife are the same age, the chances that the wife will outlive her husband are 60 in 100, but the chances rise to 70 in 100 where the husband is five years older, and to almost 80 in 100 if he is 10 years older.

The median age at which wives enter widowhood is about 56 years, and most women still have many years of life before them after their husband dies. Threequarters of the women who are widowed at 50 will live 20 years longer, statisticians say, and the same number of years of life also remain for nine out of every 10 wives who lose their mates before age 40. Even at 65, fully one-half of the widows can expect to survive for 15 years, and almost one-third for 20 years.

One of these days we may start reading more about 12-year-old bridegrooms than about child brides.



The United States is on the threshold of its next advance in commercial aviation.

In the very near future, American Airlines will inaugurate nonstop service from New York to Los Angeles with a new transport plane, the DC-7, which is expected to span the continent regularly in some seven and a half hours. On a recent trial run, the DC-7, with a full crew and a passenger list, actually made it in less than seven.

Within a few years the international lines expect to be flying the Atlantic in six or seven hours.






