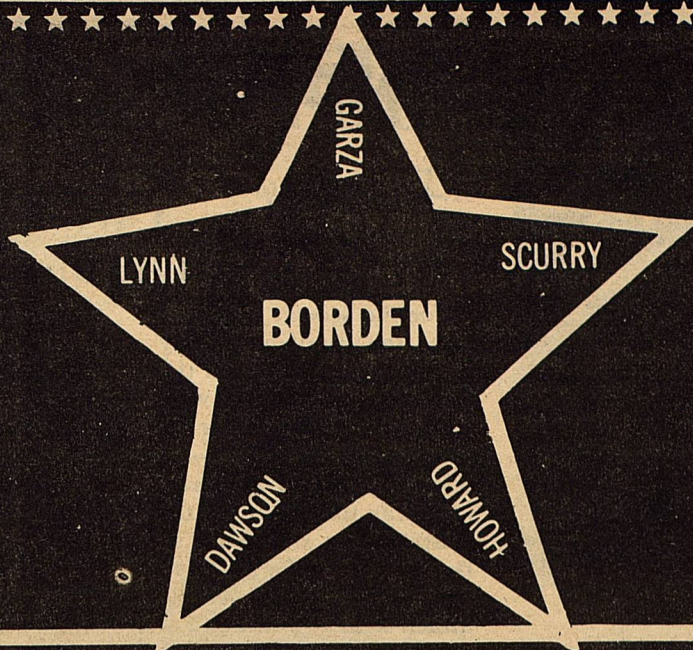

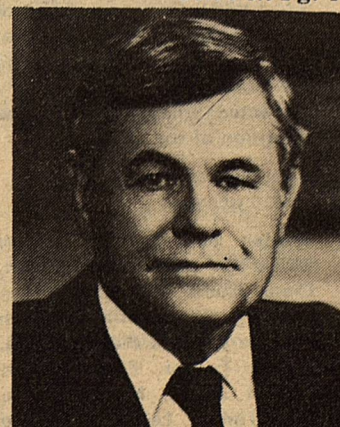
I take this opportunity to announce for a second term as State Senator of the 28th Senatorial District. I would also like to thank the people of this area for their active participation and their interest in state government.

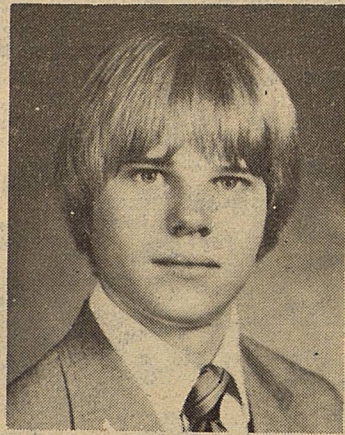

Boys Close Twice

The Borden Coyote boys opened the new year with two of their best games all season. The Coyotes unveiled a new offensive style as they slowed the games down to a more patient rate. On January 5th at Ackerly, the Coyotes held the powerful Mustangs to only 44 points before losing 44-39. The Coyotes could only hit 7 of 17 free throws or the game might have ended differently. Jym Rinehart led the Coyotes with 15 and Keith Martin and Kevin Telchik added eight each. Charles LaRue added 6 and Keith Williams 2.

Against Dawson on the 8th, it was superior defense by the Coyotes that held the Dragons to 32 points. Keith Martin, Kevin Telchik, and Sam Williams teamed to hold Dawson's high scorers to 14 and 2 points. The

Coyotes led most of the game only to see Dawson score on a rebound with only 1 second left to play. The game was a marked improvement over the last game in the Borden Tournament when Dawson won 69-39. Kevin Telchik and Doug Love led the way with 8 points each and Jym Rinehart had 6. Jeff Martin added 5, Sam Williams 2, and Keith Martin 1.

Jr. Coyotes Win Grady Tournament

For the second year in a row, the Borden County Junior High Girls won the Grady Tournament, with their closest game being the first against a tall Forsan team. A 14-4 first quarter lead was too much for the Buffaloes to overcome as Borden held on for the 28-19 win. Kelli Williams led the attack with 16 points, 12 of those coming in the first quarter. Teri Billington, Cindy Balaque, and Mary Washington followed with 7, 4, and 1 points respectively.

In the second game against Klondike, 16 players saw action in the

33-15 win. Leading by only 4 at half, the Coyotes exploded for 12 points the third quarter and held their opponents scoreless for the 28 to 12 lead going into the last quarter. Mary Washington led with 14 points followed by Kelli Williams and Teri Billington with 7 each and Cindy Balaque and Sherry Vaughn with 2. Dana Gray added a free throw for the win.

The finals saw Borden go up against Grady for the second year and once again Borden County came out on top, this time with a 25-14 victory. A slow start saw

Borden fall behind the first quarter as they could only manage 1 point but came alive the second stanza with 10 for the 11-6 halftime lead.

Kelli Williams connected on 8 of 11 free throws and 2 field goals for 12 points followed by Teri Billington with 9. Cathy York added a field goal and Mary Washington and Cindy Balaque each added a free throw for the total.

For their effort, each member of the 17 team squad received a plaque representing their win. Congratulations to the Junior Coyotes!

Missy Coyotes Remain Undefeated

Lady Coyotes Split Decisions

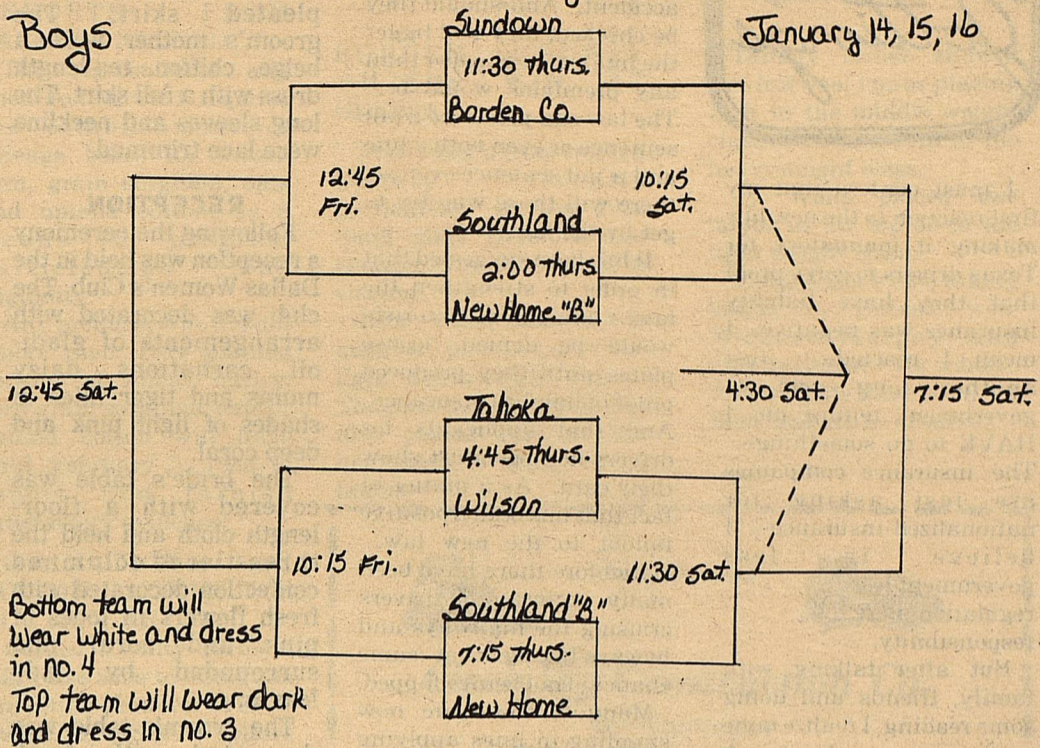

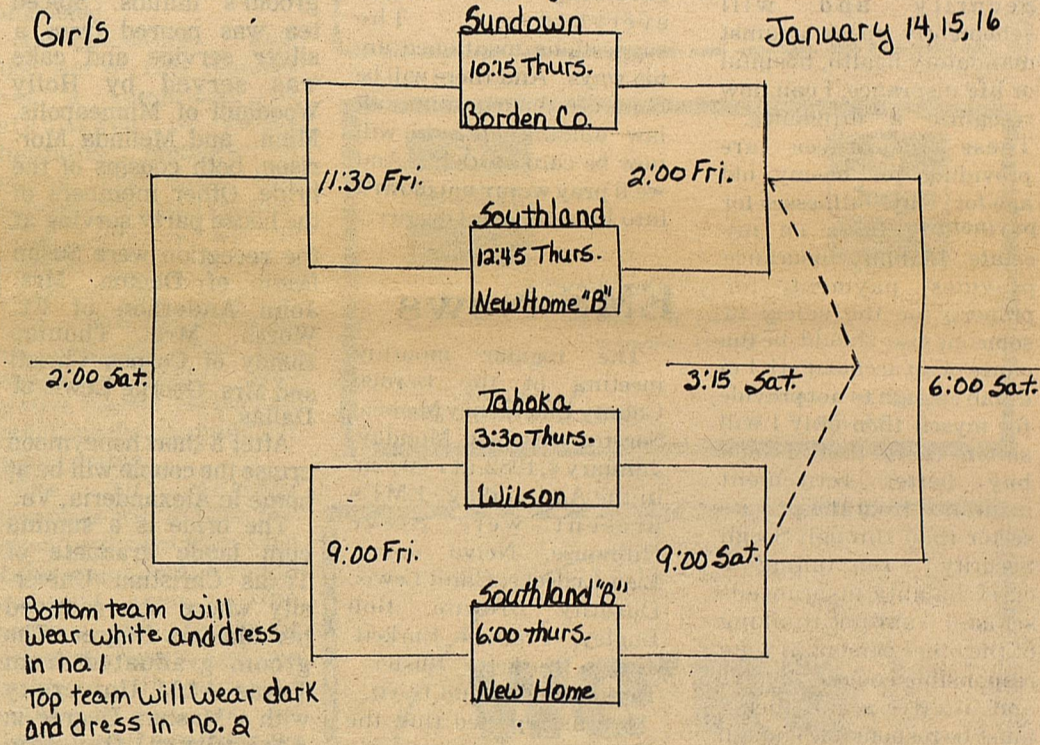

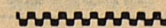

I must confess that my first reaction to the new law making it mandatory for Texas drivers to carry proof that they have liability insurance was negative. I mean I reacted-- Just another long arm of government telling me I HAVE to do something-- The insurance companies are just asking for nationalized insurance-- I believe in less government-less regulation-more responsibility.

But after talking with family, friends and doing some reading, I realize mine was just a knee-jerk reaction. Although I still oppose mandatory insurance such as Social Security and will vehemently speak against mandatory health, hospital or life insurance, I can now recognize a difference. These insurances are providing for me-my old age-for my illnesses-for payment of taxes on my estate. Liability insurance provides payment for property or the safety of someone else should be the cause of an accident. If I'm dumb enough to not provide for myself then only I will suffer. (I still think I could buy better retirement insurance from the private sector than through Social Security.) But failing to carry liability insurance is selfish-I am not thinking of the other person. If I am responsible enough to have and to drive a car, then I must be responsible enough to protect the property and safety of the other person I might run into.

There are loop holes in the law though. There will still be those who will take the chance of not being spot checked-or having an accident. And should they be checked, they will tigger the fine will be cheaper than any premiums would be. I would like to see one cent of the State sales tax returned to the school districts in the form of tax relief, so our homes, businesses, and farms would not have to have such high taxes.

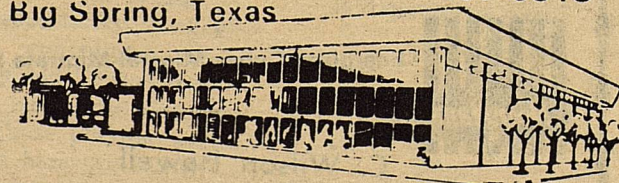

BRIEF SUMMARY THE AGRICULTURE AND FOOD ACT OF 1981

The Agriculture and Food Act of 1981 has now passed Congress. Notice the sequence of words in the title: "Agriculture" precedes "food" as it does in reality. There is no "chicken or egg?" question here. It means market-orientation, not government-orientation, and passage of the bill and its becoming law means a major step towards greater decision making freedom for farmers, reduction of governmental interference, and increased prosperity for the entire agricultural sector. Following is a brief summary of the pertinent sections of the bill.

WHEAT

Extension of the basic program for four years; minimum loan rate \$3.55 per bushel. Minimum target (per bu.): \$4.05, \$3.00, \$4.65 for '82 thru '85 crops, respectively. Secretary authorized to require compliance with either set aside or direct acreage reduction programs in years when he determines excessive surpluses are likely as condition for price support. The Secretary is authorized to operate a paid acreage diversion program but cross compliance is not required for price support eligibility. Beginning with 1982 crop, disaster payments mandatory only for producers who do not have Federal crop insurance available; Secretary has discretion to make disaster payments to any wheat grower if disaster losses acreage economic emergency which cannot be

alleviated by crop insurance and other Federal assistance.

FEED GRAINS

Extension of basic program for four years; minimum loan rate for corn \$2.55 per bushel, '82 thru '85. Minimum target for corn, per bu.: \$2.70, \$2.86, \$3.03, \$3.18 for '82-'85 crops, respectively. Regulations on set-aside, direct acreage limit as condition of price support, use of paid diversion programs, disaster payments and similar provisions same as for wheat. Secretary required to provide target price protection for grain sorghum and oats, and barley if designated as a feed grain; price support loans for grain sorghum, barley and oats to be set at "fair and reasonable" levels tied to the level for corn.

COTTON

Current program continued through '85 crop with loan rates based on a percentage of open market prices and a loan floor of 55 cents per pound. Target prices to be higher of: a) 120 percent of loan rate, or, (b) 71 cents a pound in '82, 76 cents in '83, 81 cents in '84 and 86 cents in '85. Rules requiring compliance with NCA planting limits to be dropped. Secretary may require a reduction in acreage as condition of price support eligibility. Support program for ELS revised to eliminate direct payments to growers. Paid diversion programs authorized but not as a condition for price support eligibility. Disaster payments authorized under same conditions as for wheat, feed grains and rice.

WOOL AND MOHAIR

Existing support programs extended for four years; support level 77.5 percent of rate determined under formula in National Wool Act of 1954.

REPORTS FROM FARMERS NEEDED

The Agricultural and Food Act of 1981 requires the establishment of acreage bases for wheat, corn, grain sorghum, oats and upland cotton, as a means for program participation and eligibility.

Any producer who did not report their 1981 planted acreage of wheat, barley, corn grain sorghum, oats or upland cotton will have until February 5, 1982 to report and furnish satisfactory evidence.

NOMINATIONS FOR COTTON COMMITTEE DUE JANUARY 22

Borden County farmers still have time to nominate the cotton producer of their choice for USDA's upland cotton committee. Nominations must be received in the Washington office by Jan. 22 to be considered.

The Agriculture and Food Act of 1981 requires that a committee be established to study alternative methods of setting premiums and discounts for upland cotton.

The committee will be responsible for recommending optional ways of setting premiums and discounts that will accurately reflect true relative market values and actual market demand for upland cotton.

The 10 member committee will include two cotton producers from each of the major upland cotton producing areas. One member will represent cotton merchants and one member will represent textile manufacturers. An alternate will be named for each committee member.

Nominations should include a biographical sketch showing name, date, and place of birth, residence address (include congressional district), employer (include sub-divisions and affiliates, business address, and occupation), major source of income, membership and offices held, education, and civic activities.

Nominations of those to serve on the upland cotton committee should be mailed to the Director, Analysis Division, USDA-ASCS, P.O. Box 2415, Washington, D. C. 20013, and must be received in the Washington office by January 22 to be considered.

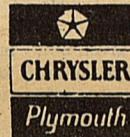

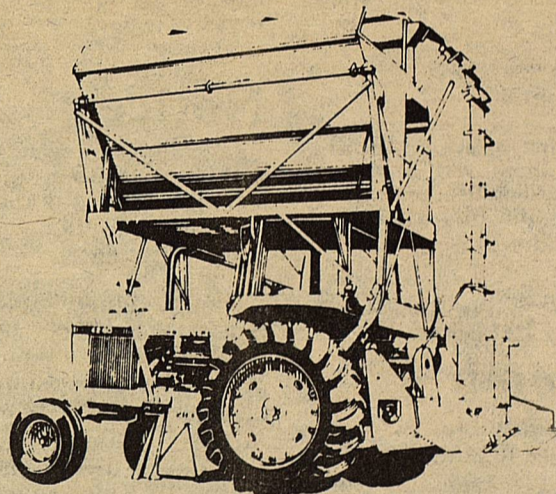
