

Contested races now slated in county

As of 6:00 p.m. February 1, the deadline for filing for local offices contested races are scheduled for three county races as newcomers announced their political intentions this past week.

Attracting the largest crowd is the race for County Judge to replace Judge Jim Burkett, who has announced his desire not to seek re-election this term. Jessie Johnson and Mrs. Pat Porter has joined Van L. York as candidates on the Democratic ticket.

The race for County Treasurer became contested this week with an announcement by Melissa "Lisa" Ludecke that she will challenge incumbent Don Cox for the post in the Democratic primary.

Also contested is the Precinct Four commissioners position where Ricky Evans and Vernon Miller are running against incumbent Ed Rinehart on the Democratic ticket.

Other local incumbents who have announced they will seek re-election in the Democratic primary are: Dorothy Browne, County and District Clerk; Carolyn Stone, Justice of the Peace; and Larry Smith, Commissioner Precinct Two. These three incumbents will run unopposed in the Democratic primary May 1.

Melissa "Lisa" Ludecke, life-time resident of Borden County made the following statements concerning her candidacy: "In announcing my candidacy for County Treasurer of Borden County, I would like to say that, if elected, I intend to fulfill this position with your interests in mind. I feel capable of holding this office and would appreciate your vote, support, and confidence in the upcoming election on May 1, 1982."

OUTSTANDING TEENS PREFER TRADITIONAL LIVING

NORTHBROOK, ILL - More of America's teen leaders are drinking today than in past years, but when it comes to drugs and sex, a good majority still practice abstinence.

This is revealed in the 12th Annual Survey of High Achievers, just released by "Who's Who Among American High School Students." Nearly 22,000 outstanding teens answered

survey questions.

The current poll recorded a significant leap in the number of high achievers who drink. Some 53% say they occasionally take a drink, compared to 40% two years ago and 31% in 1975. However, drugs are still taboo with this group. Nine out of ten have never used drugs and the same number report they wouldn't use marijuana, even if it were legalized.

The top teens want to be educated about sex, but a majority would rather save the experience for marriage. Threequarters think sex education should be taught in the schools. But 73% have never had sexual intercourse and a plurality (44°) believe premarital sex is not acceptable under any

Abortion is out of the question for these teens, too. If they did engage in sex and became pregnant, almost two-thirds of the voung women said they would not consider abortion. More than half of all those polled do not favor abortion in

Traditional marriage is in the cards for the high achievers. Some 90% will opt for the official blessing and certificate. A third think living together outside of matrimony is morally wrong and 44% say it's okay for others, but not for themselves. Half the teens plan to have two children and almost 25% want

Although a good majority of the teens are career-oriented. two-thirds feel that working in the home and raising children can be totally fulfilling for a

The entire nation, hyped by the media, went berserk over January 30th this year. It was the 100th anniversary of the birth of Franklin Delano Roosevelt. Even if you are too young to have been around during Roosevelt's time, you know of him. No one has been allowed to forget that he fathered the social welfare reforms for US. Some deitize him for tha, the rest of us curse him. -anyway-January 30th was Roosevelt's birthday. And January 30th was recognized as a day of Solidarity for Poland. What's the connection you ask? Well, I think there is a

significant one.

Franklin Roosevelt was one of the actors at the Yalta Conference in 1945. In fact, the Conference was held only shortly before his death. Other than Roosevelt at Yalta were Churchill representing Great Britain and Stalin of the Soviet Union. Each of these leaders of the great powers of the world pledged inwriting the holding of free and unfrettered election" in Poland" on the basis of universal suffrage and sekret ballot". Yes, Stalin signed that document too. Yes, the Soviet Union is on record as having guaranteed the Polish people the right of free elections. Now that was 37 years ago and the pledge has never been honored but that is no reason why it should never

The United States has begun to take a tougher stance towards Russia on the Polish situation, thank goodness. (We could be tougher-reinstitute—the grain embargo for starters.) But we should really go on the offensive. We should

We can show Poland we are solidly behind them by demanding that Russia allow free elections in Poland. 


grandmother used to play about a cowboy's prayer My parson is a wolf on his pulpit of bone."

At first, Miller only produced bronzes in editions of three to allow his art in family homes. Now, editions of 15 disappear so fast he can't keep up and still have all the time for taking part in the western heritage activities that inspire the artworks.

If he gets around to sculpting a pioneer, it will be his grandfather, Clyde, who helped tame the West, then looked enough to the future to preserve the buffalo and try a buffalo-cattle cross.

If he ever sculpts a mountain man and it's a part of the future it will be his father, who built up Clyde Miller's buffalo herd, raises Texas Longhorns and Appaloosa horses, pulls off western heritage shows and considers himself a mountain man born 100 years too late.

From these two forebearers came Miller's contact with Indians of South Dakota, bears of Colorado, mountain lions of New Mexico and other almost lost bits of the Old West that is his world for art.



An important deadline occured this month for property owners in Texas.

Kenneth Graeber, executive director of the State Property Tax Board, today reminded Texans that local property taxes assessed for 1981 by cities, counties, school districts and special districts must be paid by the end of January.

Taxes not paid before February 1 are delinquent and penalty and interest begun to accrue, Graeber said.

The state tax administrator notes that delinquent 1981 taxes will incur a 6 percent penalty and 1 percent interest charge on February 1.

Combined penalty and interest charges will total 9 percent in March, 11 percent in April, 13 percent in May, and 15 percent in June.

Total penalty and interest on delinquent taxes reaches -18 percent in July, 19 percent in August, 20 percent in September, 21 percent in October, 22 percent in November, and 23 percent in December.

If not paid until January 1983, delinquent 1981 property taxes would be subject to a combined 24 percent penalty and interest chage. And, Graeber noted, the interest would continue to increase by I percent per month.

In addition, if a taxing jurisdiction or appraisal district has contracted with a delinquent tax attorney, its governing body may add an additional penalty to any tax delinquent on July

The additional penalty may not exceed 15 percent of the taxes, penalty and interest due.

Graeber pointed out that some home rule cities may have different delinquency dates for 1981 taxes. The Property Tax Code does not affect a city's delinquency date for its 1981 taxes if the city charter or ordinance provides an earlier delinquency date, he said.

He also noted that if a taxing jurisdiction mailed its 1981 tax bills after January 10, the delinquency date is postponed to the first day of the next month that will provide a period of at least 21 days after the date of mailing for payment of taxes before delinquent.

Taxpayers with questions are encouraged to contact local government tax offices.

The microwave oven is an amazing kitchen appliance. Knowing more about its fine points will bring you greater successes.

Take for instance many recipes call for different coverings. Knowing what they are supposed to do might help in selecting the most suitable one.

Plastic wrap holds the greates amount of moisture. A glass casserole holds in moisture, creating a steamed effect. Wax paper retains some moisture while preventing some food from becoming soggy. Paper towel absorbs moisture and disperses heat more evenly through food. Remember to remove plastic wrap and casserole lids away from you to prevent painful steam burns.

Another heipful hint for better results in the microwave is that salting food on the surface is not recommended. Salt has a tendency to dehydrate food and can cause a tough product. Salt also has a tendency to distort the pattern of the microwave. If salt is mixed or dissolved in the cooling liquid, it can be added during preparation.. Sprinkle it on the surface of food near the end of cooking or after cooking is completed.

Keep your oven clean!!!

Wipe with a damp, soapy cloth after each use. Food is not cooked on and is very easy to remove. spattering should be difficult to remove, heat 1 cup of water until it steams. This will soften food. Use a nylon net or a nylon scrubber, if necessary. Never use abrasives. Keeping you oven clean will eliminate a major reason for service calls! If cooking odors collect in your oven, place a small dish of baking soda in the cooking cavity and leave the oven door ajar. Removing food after cooking helps to eliminate this problem.





The scholarship was set up as a memorial to Tana Springer of Snyder, who died of injuries sustained in an automobile accident last spring.



OATS, ACREAGE REPORTS NEEDED BY FEB. 5

'Farmers who have not submitted acreage reports for oats need to do so as soon as possible.'

In addition to wheat and other feed grains, the enacted recently Agriculture and Food Act of 1981 requires farmers to file acreage reports for oats to participate in 1982 programs.

Farm owners and operators are required to report their oats and rice acreage by Feb. 5 so that vield and base acreage work can be completed on time.

The oats report should include the planted acreage and crop use such as hay, grain, grazing, et., for 1980 and 1981 crop years.

1982 FARM PROGRAM

Signed into law December 22, 1981, the Agriculture and Food Act of 1981 (P.L. 97-98) authorizes commodity and other agricultural programs for the 1982 through 1985 crop years. Below are highlights of the new law as it pertains to ASCS.

MINIMUM TARGET PRICES

The 1981 Act sets minimum target prices for each of the 1982-85 crop years and requires target price protection for oats and grain sorghum as well as for wheat, corn, cotton and rice. Barley, oats and sorghum target prices will continue to be pegged to corn.

Wheat (bus.) 1982 \$4.05; Corn (bu.) 1982 \$2.70.

MINIMUM LOAN RATES The Act sets minimum

loan rates for the four year period. Loan rates for feed grains will continue to be pegged to corn.

Minimum rate, 1982-85 crops; Wheat (bu.) \$3.55; Corn (bu.) \$2.55; Upland cotton (lb.) \$.55 (continues to be based on market price formula).

WOOL AND MOHAIR

The 1981 Act extends the existing wool and mohair support program for four years, and sets the wool support level at 77.5 percent of the rate determined by statufory formula in the National Wool Act of 1954.

FARM STORAGE FACILITY LOANS DISCRETIONARY

Laons to build on farm storage and drying facilities will be discretionary; however, the law still mandates facility loans in areas where the Secretary determines there is a shortage of farm storage.

EMERGENCY FEED PROGRAM DISCRETIONARY

The law continues the emergency feed program, but makes it discretionary rather than mandatory, and extends program eligibility to poultry as well as livestock producers.
