

PARIS (AP) - Henry A. Kissinger and Hanoi's Le Duc Tho resumed their peace talks in an apparently icy atmosphere today, conferring for 412 hours. in a suburban villa owned by the

It was the first meeting of the two top negotiators since the talks were suspended Dec. 13 and followed by massive American bombing raids on North Vietnam.

Resumption of the peace talks was reportedly part of a backstage deal under which President Nixon ordered the raids halted above the 20th Parallel on Dec. 30. North Vietnamese public statements since then have given no hint of a softening in Hanoi's position.

The American negotiators emerged grim-faced after the meeting, again with no North Vietnamese official on hand to bid them farewell as in the past. During previous meetings. Tho and Kissinger were frequently seen shaking hands and smiling together. There was no information from either delegation on what was discussed at the meeting, or when the two sides would meet again.

Technical experts met inde pendently to continue their dis cussion of details of a possible future cease-fire agreement. These discussions apparently were not concerned with the major political problems still under dispute between the two sides

Tho and Xuan Thuy, the head of the North Vietnamese delegation in Paris, arrived more than 20 minutes before the Americans and smiled and waved at the waiting newsmen. Most of the Americans had tense, serious expressions when they arrived.

### FROM ADMINISTRATION House Committee Organized To Get Control For Budget

WASHINGTON (AP) - Congress is preparing to begin its organized effort to get better control of the budget-and in the process to regain some of the power which, its members contend, has slipped over the

years to the White House. The 16 House members of a special committee created by the last Congress to devise effective legislative budget machinery have set their first meeting for Wednesday, Rep.

Al Ullman, D-Ore., said. Ullman is author of the provision creating the committee. enacted when Congress turned. down President Nixon's request for sweeping authority to cut back funds the legislators had already authorized.

establishment of permanent budget committees in both House and Senate, composed of senior members of the two taxing and spending committees in each body.

These committees would be charged, he said, with examining the president's spending proposals and developing, within 60 days, a congressional budget that would set limits on all appropriations.

The regular congressional committees then would take over and produce the money bills for the various government activities. At the end of the appropriat-

ing process, the budget committees would make a final review, recommending cutbacks and adjustments or, if the state

AUSTIN (AP) - "Reform" will be the watchword of the 1973 Texas House, but there also will be a strong undercurrent of political rivalries and personal grudges. Some members predict a power vacuum that

several tough and shrewd veteran representatives will try to fill. Rep. Price Daniel Jr., 31, is assured of election as speaker Tuesday on a platform of "reforms" that would take away much of the speaker's

Daniel himself will be a "lame duck" speaker from the moment he takes his oath because he has publicly pledged not to seek another term. "After he appoints the committees, there's

With Daniel ruling himself out of the 1975 speaker's race, numerous candidates for the job-mostly unannounced-are expected to jockey for members' support during the ses-

Among those mentioned as speaker candidates are veteran Reps. Jim Nugent of Kerrville. chairman of the powerful House Rules committee in the 1971 session: Bill Clayton of Springlake, Counties Committee chairman; DeWitt Hale of Corpus Christi, Judiciary Committee chairman; Carl Parker, Port Arthur; Dave Finney, Fort Worth; and Fred Head,





Soviets Launch New Spacecraft

MOSCOW (AP) - The Soviet Union sent an unmanned spacecraft toward the moon today. Tass news agency said Luna 21's mission "is to further scientific studies of the moon and near-lunar space."

'The stations was launched to the moon from the orbit of an artificial satellite of the earth and was placed on a trajectory close to the estimated one," the agency added.

### Massive Oil Spill Covers Mississippi

Environmental Protection Agency says it has done about all it can to clean up a massive Mississippi River Oil spill spawned by four petroleum barges involved in a river accident which killed two sailors.

Early today, the diesel oil stretched downstream past Greenville, Miss., to near the Louisiana state line-a distance of about 150 miles. There will be "unquantifiable

damage" to the biology of the area involved, which is rich in fish and wildlife, EPA said. "As far as the oil mop up. we've done about all we can

do," said the EPA's Hagan Thompson of Atlanta, one of the agency's emergency officers on Some of it (the oil) will end up in the Gulf of Mexico, eventually," he said. "this

ranks as possibly the biggest spill on the inland waterways." The river, swelled by almost daily rainfall during the past two months and moving at a 10mile-per-hour speed at points. remained choppy Sunday as government workers battled

But the absence of "Firing Line" from the list surprised many who have enjoyed the probing questions and sophisticated, sardonic repartee of an loquent conservative. It startled Buckley, too.

Opening lead—♥ 5

Oswald: "The basic reason for the standard 16-18 point no-trump is that if you open such hands with one of a suit you will be faced at your next turn by an impossible rebidding problem.

Jim: "This means that you can't wait for hands with all four suits stopped. You must take a chance with three small or occasionally just two small in one suit."

Oswald: "You should try to stay away from opening no-trump when you hold a worthless doubleton but jack small is likely to be enough to protect you on most oc-

Jim: "Today's hand is a good example. If South opens one diamond his partner will

merely respond one no-trump. This time South can bid two no-trump and get a successful game, but if North holds six or seven points instead of 10 two no-trump will be too high.

Oswald: "Conversely, if North held just six or seven points today, he would let South play one no-trump. As it is he takes him right to game."

Jim: "With everything breaking nicely, South has no trouble making 10 tricks. Not that the North-South cards will always do that well. The point is that they do belong in three no-trump. And the no-trump opening gets them there.





By BOB BEATTIE QUESTION: What is a jet

Simply stated, a jet turn is a slide or side-slip and then an edge set, combined with an anticipation.


Let's analyze the first maneuver. If a skier is sideslipping down the slope and sets his edges (Illustration "a"), his skis will involuntarily squirt or 'jet' for-ward (Illustration 'b''). The key word in this description is "involuntarily." The skis are not purposely pushed forward—that is done only in the hot dog skiing maneuver known as a "wheelie."

Next, in order to effect the turn, the skier must anticipate the turn. This means that the skier turn the upper body so it faces down the hill (Illustration "c").

Now, the natural physical reaction at this instant in the maneuver is for the lower body to seek realignment with the upper body Once this has occurred, the skier is in the fall line, ready to complete the turn (Illustration "d").

But there is a definite danger in relying upon politican action to cure what, reporters in jail! What kind of when you think about it, is a political disease.

For if lawmakers pass a law shielding the press, they can just as easily amend the law they have passed so that it no longer shields the press. Any legal safeguard serves to promote a sense of false security so that alarm seems groundless when the safeguard is removed. Whatever legislators enact, judges nterpret, and any judge worth his salt can make a law read

backward if he so chooses.

Far better for the press, therefore, that the members thereof appeal to the opinion of mankind, as the colonists did in the Declaration of Independence. For if men in eneral understand their own stake in the free flow of information, they will not long submit to lawyers and jurists who endeavor to cut them off

As to the evils in legislation, we have only to look at the bill offered by Senator Weicker ec. 2 (a) (1) of the proposal states as follows:

### Education Won't Cut Inequality

By PAUL HARVEY Before every election, until this last one, it has been safe for any politician to speak out against sin and in favor of motherhood. But during this last election campaign, candidates ran scared even from the latter. There is a vigorous public controversy

I expect this to initiate a vitriolic controversy among academicians; so do they.

One must read carefully the information they sought and got. They are not saying that an education is not worth it. They do say that improved schooling will be little help to a poor student when it comes to earning a living.

You can send the dullard to the best school there is-and enhance his odds for success little, if any

What they have done here is to take much of the family. school, job and income data gathered in the last decade. feed it into a computer. evaluate all the factors influencing 'job status and income and deduce that poverty and inequality are not eliminated by better schooling.

QUESTION: Recently in discussion of the power of political government over the cople, a writer expressed the view that appointive government officials were less responsible to the will of the people than those who are elected. Is there any real

difference?

ANSWER: Only a few years back it seemed that there was considerable difference. Elected officials who are required to return regularly efore the voters seemed more responsive to the people, and as a result, more responsible. Appointive officials, usually blanketed in with some sort of job protection such as civil service, usually took the attitude that the people paying their salaries were of no consequences-Harry Hopkins was said to have commented that the people were too dumb to understand.

But, nowadays, there seems to be little difference between most elected officials and most appointed officials. It is the same on a national level as on

the local level. People who voted for Nixon in 968, generally believed the 'conservative" statements he nade. Yet he abandoned nearly every promise, and when it pie could see only a more rresponsible opponent. Members of Congress now are elected usually because they have seniority. The same is true of state legislators.

The result is that Congress' members boost their own salaries, now proposing to go to \$50,000 a year.

We fear these people have ecome imbued with their own self-importance, since they are nearly immune from recall. Even when they leave office. they do so with either pensions or other benefits they have voted themselves

### **Inside Washington**

Allende Bites U.S. Hand Before It Feeds Him

By ROBERT S. ALLEN

WASHINGTON - Chile's Marxist President Salvador Allende is baldly playing both sides of the ideological street-seemingly with U.S.

acquiescence and cooperation. On one hand, he is enthusiastically acting the Kremlin's stooge and puppet; on the other, he is engaged in wangling some \$10 million in ground and air weapons from the U.S .- on credit, naturally!

It would come under the expansively inclusive heading of "military aid."

In the past two decades, the U.S. has dished out to Chile more than \$1.218 billion in "foreign assistance" of various kinds. In addition, there is outstanding \$1.7 billion in defaulted loans and credits by U.S. government agencies. foremost among them the Export-Import Bank and the Agency for International

In the latest arms acquisition. Allende has made considerable

progress. A contract has been signed with Lockheed Aircraft Corporation for the purchase of a giant \$5 million C-130 air force transport-with the Pentagon

putting up the money. The big cargo carrier still hasn't been turned over to Chile, but Lockheed has a sale order all signed and sealed. So presumably delivery will be

The contradictions in the bewildering dealings with Marxist Allende are mind-boggling, but the facts are indisputable. Following is the series of paradoxical events that have taken place recently:

Dizzy Record November. President Allende made a fanfared pilgrimage to Moscow where he was lavishly eulogized and feted

by Kremlin rulers. Following his departure. Chile's Foreign Minister Clodomiro Almeyda staged a press conference in Santiago and announced Russia had granted a \$30 million credit for the immediate purchase of food Dear Reader-I've heard and cotton, and another \$180 million credit for machinery! transport equipment and other capital goods.

Chile is urgently in need of food and cotton because of steadily ceclining agricultural production since the Marxist Allende regime came into power several years ago.

Enroute back to Chile, Allende made two stopovers: -Cuba, where he and fellow Kremlin stooge Fidel Castro rhapsodized over each other in elaborately staged gatherings, with Allende outdoing Castro in heaping hosannahs and acclaim

on the Soviet Union. -The United Nations, where Allende was given a prolonged standing ovation after venomously denouncing the U.S. for "new imperialism" and waging 'financial-economic blackade' against Chile by opposing her efforts to obtain more loans from the World Bank and the Inter-American

Development Bank The U.S. has challenged such loans on two grounds: Th Chile's credit is unsound as evidenced by the indisputable fact it is in default of some \$3 billion in foreign debts; (2) as a consequence of this and other internal and foreign difficulties, Chile's credit is below acceptable levels.

Allende said nothing about these undeniable fiscal and economical factors in his vituperative UN harangue.

Instead, he inveighed vehemently and lengthily against the U.S.

The Chilean ruler put on this public excoriation against the background of a secret effort to finagle an invitation to come to Washington to meet President Nixon.

That undercover proposal was conveyed through friendly UN sources

It was coldly brushed off by the White House.

Startling Disclosure Several weeks later, a high-level Chilean delegation met in Washington with State Department officials for an exchange of views on Chile's \$1.7 billion in overdue debts to

the U.S. Those defaulted obligations are part of the \$3 billion Chile owes other countries. Last April, these creditors met in Paris and reached a general understanding to "renegotiate" these debts. Since then, several minor creditors have come to terms with Chile-but the bulk of its defaulted obligations are still

unsettled After three days of closely-guarded parleying, the Washington discussions ended with no evident results. Publicly, all that was forthcoming were non-committal statements from the two sides, and private word that both had agreed to say

nothing. From informed sources, it was learned however that the talks had deadlocked on U.S. insistence that "renegotiation" of the debts must include consideration of payment by Chile for the one-half billion dollars in expropriated U.S.

property Allende has flatly refused to pay compensation on the contention that U.S. corporations had for many years "earned excessive profits" and nothing was due them: in fact, they owe Chile large and unspecified

reparations. Whether there will be further negotiations is anyone's guess. Neither side is talking.

As far as the Chileans are concerned, they apparently don't have to-to get what they're after, at least in the way of U.S. weapons

While the defaulted billions in debts and other economic and the air, it has joltingly come to light that Communist-ruled Chile is in the process of getting some \$10 million in U.S. arms. Of this total, half has already

Pentagon spokesmen, while admitting Chile is trying to get the C-130 and other arms on credit despite the billions in defaulted debts and nationalized American holdings, solemnly aver, "We have reached no decision on this. Each of these requests is considered on an individual basis, and no conclusion has been reached on any of them.



Since the chances are good to have a bout with the "cold bug" this year, it might behoove each of us to know more about what a cold is and what to do with it when you have it, say state health officials.

What is a cold? The common cold is a name given to any of a number of short-lived infections of the nose and throat. All of them are highly contagious. They have similar symptoms.

Sometimes they are called by other names, which simply tell you what part of the upper respiratory tract is particularly affected: rhinitis, affecting the nose; pharyngitis, the throat; or laryngitis, the voice box.

What causes a cold? The Texas State Department of Health points out there are many different viruses which cause a cold. A virus is a disease-producing agent so small that it goes right through the very fine filter that stops bacteria.

These cold-causing viruses are present in great numbers in your nose and throat when you have a cold. They are carried on the droplets you expel when talking, coughing, or sneezing.

How do you catch a cold? Though a virus causes your cold a number of conditions seem to increase your susceptibility (science does not yet know why or how.) People appear to catch colds mainly indoors. They get more of them during the colder months.

Fatigue, chilling, and poor physical condition seem to give the virus a better foothold. What's the course of a cold? From one to three days after the
