Following another wintry blast that help add to the records that toppled all previous November records National Weather Service has cautiously predicted sunny weather again returning to the area. However, as the temperature moved into the

mid 40's on Friday, it almost seemed as though a heat wave had invaded the entire region, and snow was melting rather fast from the latest ten inch snowfall.

Also, weather that dipped as low as six degrees above zero on Tuesday norning, is now holding in the low 20's for nighttime temperatures. NWS said a high pres-

sure ridge is building over the western portion of the state, leaving skies sunny and temperatures progressively warmer through the weekend.

On Thursda, the high temperature in Muleshoe was 35, and although some melting of the snow was noted, the nightfall again brought icing of streets and very hazardous driving conditions in some areas. Glare ice again forced crews from the Texas Highway Department to be called out to sand the dangerous 12th and West American Boulevard intersection. Water standing in the dip was spread across the highway and an ice glaze formed for approxi-

With Growth

Getting your soil tested

has always been important, but now this proven prac-'tice is more important than ever, emphasizes Spencer Tanksley, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Fertilizer is getting more and more expensive, so it's crucial for producers to get the most from their fertilizer dollar. And getting a profitable return from fertilizer depends on the level of available nutrients in the soil before fertilization.

That calls for a soil test. A soil test will determine which nutrients are deficient in the soil for a particular crop so that a producer can fertilize to supplement those nutrients points out Tanksley. It's not profitable to supply nutrients already available in the soil in sufficient quantities for a particular crop or to supply added nutrients that the crop does not need or cannot use.

Tanksley also emphasizes that now is an excellent time to take soil samples and have soil tested for fall crops as well as those for the 1981 season. Soil test results can be obtained more quickly this time of Cont. Page 6, Col. 3



The Scientists Tell Me . . .

We Can Use Lignite Energy Without Permanent Loss of Cropland

Texas has an estimated 110 billion tons of lignite. a low-grade coal often called "brown coal," that so far, we've used very little. In heat value it lies between peat and bituminous coal. Not considered worth developing as long as we had plenty of oil and gas, it's

now of great interest as lowcost fuel for power generators. Estimates are that the State's 110 billion tons are the equivalent of about 500 billion barrels of oil, or about twice the amount of Texas oil we've discovered until now. Of course not all of this fuel is available with present methods of surface mining. About 10.4 billion tons of lignite are within 200 feet of the ground surface, and that's about as deep as practical for surface mining. But as much as a million acres of land could be disturbed by surface mining. and there is concern that this could spoil land needed for food and fiber production. Since 1974, a team of scientists with Texas A&M University has been working on problems associated with restoring this land to production after completion of mining. Their minimum goal is that the land should be at least as productive as it was before the mining operation. And they believe that in some instances it will be possible to improve productivity. "We have found that these lands usually require heavy applications of both nitrogen and phosphorus fertilizers," says Dr. Lloyd Hossner, soil chemist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. "This is to be expected since the original soils overlying the lignite are some of the more infertile soils in the State and require heavy application of fertilizer under normal conditions to produce good yields. "After several years of testing such crops as corn, soybeans, and grain sorghum, we're convinced that with proper handling during min-

ing and after, land can be returned to production agriculture.

"Note, though, I said proper handling; this is the key! Unless mining is done with full understanding of the soils being worked with, very difficult problems with excess acidity, water pollution, hard pan, etc. can be created.' Hossner said.

during the 1970's as a result of public concern about environment. The Texas Surface Mining and Reclamation Act established a permit process for coal, lignite, and uranium mines and is presently administered by the Texas Railroad y Commission. It is empowered to declare areas unsuitable for mining, to reject inadequate applications, and to deny or condition permits if the applicant's reclamation plan is unsuitable.

All applicants for surface mining permits are required to describe the existing environment, including the geology, topography, land use, vegetation, wildlife habitats, and soils. A plan must be presented for reclamation of the mine

spoils, including vegetation of the area. The applicant is responsible for the success of the vegetation for 5 years and must determine alternative end-use of the reclaimed land. "Mining companies are anxious to comply with all regulations in the easiest,

fastest, most economical way possible," says Hossner. "To do so, they're finding that the detailed information required to get a mining permit can often serve as a blueprint for restoration, if used

intelligently. "By this, I mean that knowledge of the soil characteristics can dictate its order of restoration. Often, you can avoid excess acidity, or restoration of a claypan, or similar problems and actually improve soil productivity.



State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Thursday that during the past year gasoline consumption in Texas took a nosedive at a time when the number of vehicles on the state's roads increased.

He said during the state's past fiscal year, which ended August 31, Texas mortorists consumed 8 billion gallons of gasoline.


Figures for the 1979 fiscal year show that more than 8.5 billion gallons of gasoline were sold in Texas and about the same amount sold in 1978.



Bullock put total vehicle registration in Texas for the 1980 fiscal year at 11.9 million vehicles, compared to 10 million vehicles on Texas roads during 1979.

"A half billion gallon drop is significant at a time when the state's car and truck population is skyrocketing," Bullock said.

"Our analysis doesn't show whether people are driving less or getting better mileage, but they are definitely buying less gas," he said.


Texas motorists used between 600 and 700 million gallons of gasoline a month, Bullock said.

Bullock said his office collected \$399.4 million in gasoline taxes during the past year, compared to \$417 million turned into the state during 1979.

He said three-quarters of the tax goes to the highway fund and one-quarter is put into the Available School Fund.

Gasoline is taxed at five cents a gallon and diesel fuel is taxed at six and a half cents a gallon, according to Bullock.

Diesel fuel tax revenues amounted to more than \$78 million during fiscal 1980, compared to \$70.7 million during 1979. About 5 billion gallons of

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




